## Vanpool-Burton Buys Bowling Alley From Pettit

### PLAN TO REMODEL, RENAME, PURCHASE PINS & AIR CONDITION

Pete Burton and Bud Vanpool, co-owners of the Ford Motor Company in Wheeler, purchased the Lucky Strike Bowling Alley from Carroll Pettit last week. Pete and Bud took over operation of the alley June 1st and immediately started making plans for improvements. At press time Wednesday workers were tearing the old awning off the front of the building and were installing a new 10,500 C.F.M. air conditioner.

The front of the building will be stuccoed and painted and a large sign erected. New pins are also on order and should be here sometime next week.

The new name chosen for the Bowling Alley is, "The Mustang Bowl". Pete and Bud plan to operate the bowling alley themselves. New permanent hours have also been announced, and are as follows: Open from 2:00 P.M. until 6:00 P.M. Sunday, Open from 10:00 A.M. to 12 midnight Saturday, Open from 7:00 P.M. until 11 P.M. Weekdays.

Bowling charges will remain the same, 45 cents per line, with the exception of Saturday. From 10 A.M. until 5 P.M. each Saturday bowling will cost only \$1.00 for 3 lines. Rental of shoes, as usual will be 15 cents.

Monday night is Men's League night and no open bowling will be permitted. However, on Tuesday night, which is Women's League Night, the alley will be open for Open Bowling at different times during the evening. The women have only four teams and will not take up the full evening.

After two full weeks of bowling in the Men's League, Cicero Smith and the Lucky Strike teams are tied for first place with 6 wins and 2 losses each.

### SETLIFF SIGNS 5-YEAR CONTRACT WITH TRANSLATOR COMMITTEE

Wheeler County TV Committee announces the signing of a five year contract with Mr. O. E. Setliff to manage and maintain the county's Translator System.

Mr. Setliff has been a successful operator of the Valley Translator System located in Turkey and Quitaque, Texas for the past three years and is familiar with the Wheeler County system since he handled most of the original engineering for the system.

In a meeting Tuesday night tentative plans were laid out by the committee and Mr. Setliff to complete the county wide project by building an originally planned booster station to cover those who cannot receive TV from the station now in operation.

Provisions were made in the contract to establish a building fund separate and apart from the operation and maintenance funds to accomplish this end. It was determined that if due diligence was exercised in the selling of participating stock and the collection of operating dues this station could be financially practical in the very near future.

### LINDSEY MC CASLAND RECEIVES ADULT LEADERSHIP AWARD

Lindsey McCasland, of Wheeler, has been selected to receive the recognition Award for 4-H Adult Leadership during State 4-H Round-up, College Station, Texas, Wednesday June 7, 1961. Mr. McCasland was selected as one of the outstanding adult leaders of Extension Service District One, Panhandle Area. This award is presented on a State basis by Friends of 4-H to Adult Leaders over the State for the adult leadership they have given to 4-H members, clubs and 4-H activities.

Mr. McCasland was recommended for this award by the Wheeler County 4-H Council and County Extension Agent, Bryan Swaim, for the leadership he has exhibited as 4-H Adult Leader in Wheeler County. Mr. McCasland has served as 4-H Adult Leader the past four years. Two of these years, 1959 and 1960, he has served as Adult Leader to the Wheeler County 4-H Council. As an Adult Leader, Mr. McCasland has assisted in planning the Wheeler County 4-H Program of Work, planning and carrying out 4-H Camps, Livestock Shows and Fairs, 4-H Sponsored Junior Rodeos, Riding Clubs, Beef Cattle Demonstration, County 4-H Awards Banquets, Recreational Parties and assisted 4-H members exhibiting their livestock at major livestock shows over Texas. Mr. McCasland became interested in 4-H when his boys, Kenneth and Terry started feeding livestock as their 4-H demonstration in 1956.

In 1957 he attended the Dallas State Fair as an adult leader with the county agricultural agent and twenty two 4-H Club boys. Since 1957 Mr. McCasland has devoted many hours in assisting 4-H members as adult subject matter leader of Beef Cattle and assisted boys in grooming, trimming, hooves and exhibiting their livestock. Other major livestock shows he has attended are Odessa, Amarillo, and Pampa.

In 1959 the county 4-H council selected him as one of their Adult Leaders and he has served in that capacity for the past two years. As an Adult Leader to the 4-H Council he has assisted in planning, organizing and carrying out the overall county 4-H program of work such as, Awards Banquets, 4-H Sponsored Junior Rodeos, Riding Club, Periodic County Recreation Parties, Rally Days and 4-H Camps on a county wide basis. 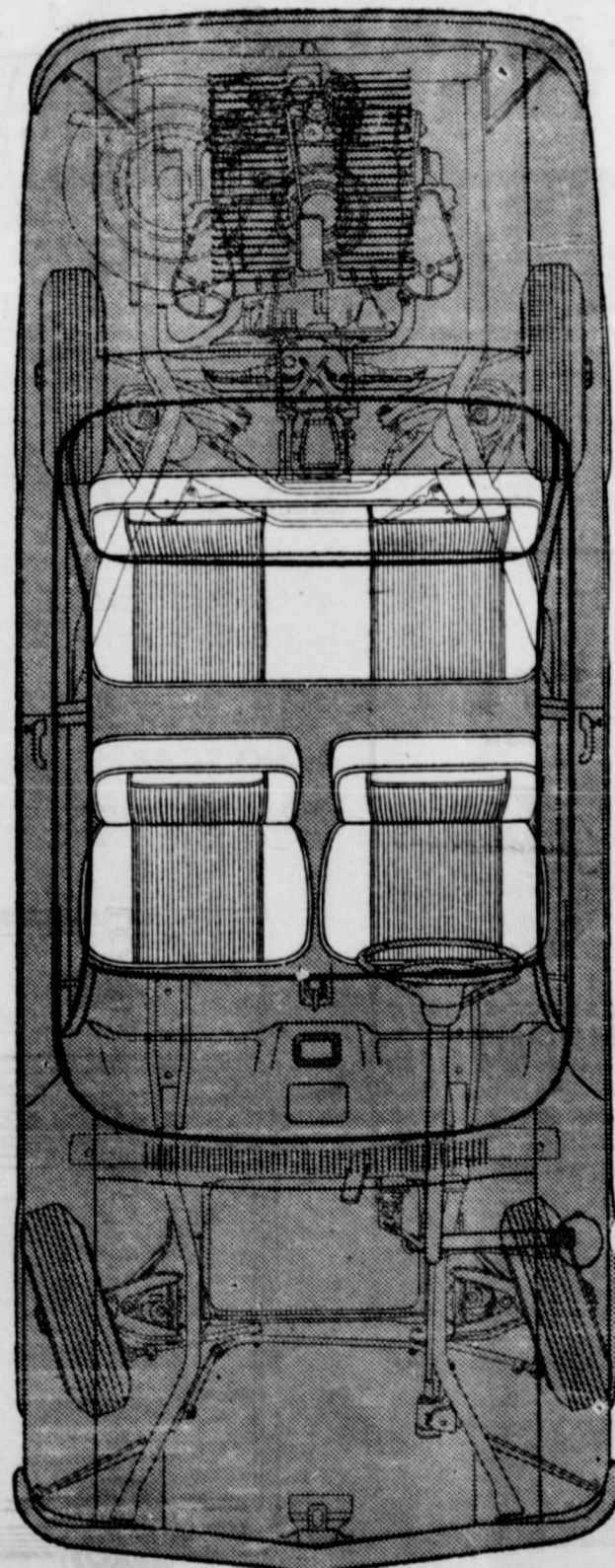

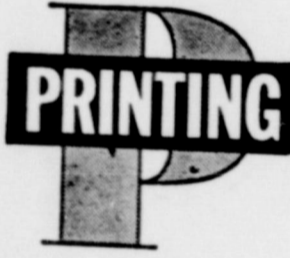

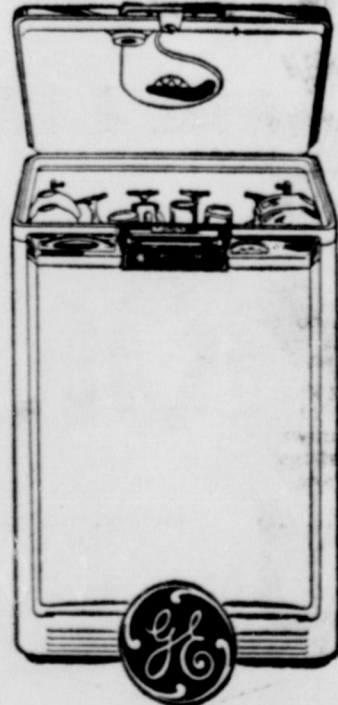

### WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION


E. A. Zybach of Briscoe has shaped two waterways on his place this year. Several other farmers have planned to build waterways this season. The purpose of a waterway is to get water across a field without making a gully or to make a place to empty terraces when no grassland is available for spilling extra water.

Waterways are designed to spread the water enough to keep from making a gully. On flatter slopes, they can be farmed to small grains like wheat but on steeper slopes and sandy land they need a permanent cover. Most of the permanent grasses will do.

Although the main purpose of a waterway is to dispose of excess water without damage, they may be used for meadow or pastured when the stalk field is pastured. With the present type of equipment in use on most farms, it is not hard to hay a narrow strip.

Waterways are included in the cost-sharing programs of the Great Plains Conservation Program and in the ACP Program. Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Wheeler District will assist with the design and layout of waterways under either program.

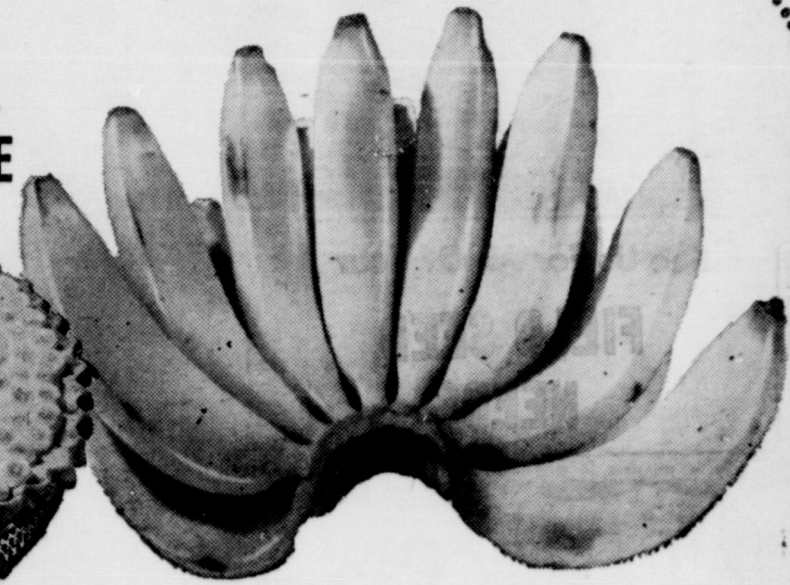
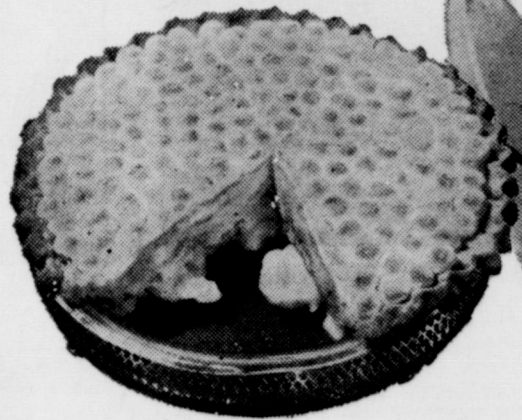

ing points; 9. Check idler pulley bearing; 10. Check crankshaft pulley for tightness and alignment; 11. Check hose clamps; 12. Check grommets for proper position; 13. Check and properly tension belt; 14. Check automobile radiator pressure cap; and 15. Road-test the car.

Dependent on manufacturer, certain units must be gauge-tested for performance under certain ambient temperatures, engine speeds, etc. In any event, follow the manufacturer's instructions, although the above applies to all models.

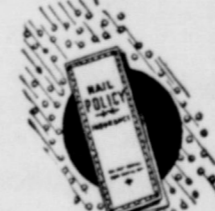

**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL**

Austin Tex. — From now until July 10 will be a period of testing how representative democracy works in Texas.

Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years. Gov. Price Daniel has urged Texans to give the legislators and him their views on how the matter should be handled.

But without passage of a money-raising bill to back it up, appropriations had no meaning.

Senate adopted the appropriations conference committee report—a plan that called for spending \$385,500,000 from general revenue, compared to the present \$320,000,000 general revenue appropriation. Welfare programs the state hospital system, junior colleges and the state senior college and university system would be among the main beneficiaries.

Senate also passed an equally ineffective \$810 a year raise for school teachers before adjourning.

All was naught, however, when the tax bill failed to pass.

14 Amendments Proposed — Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanent disability from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.
2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs constructed by other units of government, such as the federal government.
3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to non-veteran buyers to liquidate land the state is "stuck with."
4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.
5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by major catastrophe such as enemy attack.
6. Raise the present \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments to \$52,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments.
7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital districts without a special constitutional amendment for each one.
8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation on public beaches.

New Power For Probers — Future witnesses before legislative investigating committees can be compelled to tell the truth or face perjury penalties under a measure that passed both houses.

Last year the perjury conviction of former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders was voided by the courts on grounds the anti-perjury statute did not cover statements to legislative committees.

This bill spells out the right of legislative committees to make investigations and makes it penal offense (two to ten years) to lie deliberately to such a committee.

Ratlift Is Pro-Tom — Sen. David Ratlift of Stamford was elected by his senate colleagues to serve as president pro tempore of the Senate for the interval between the regular sessions and the special session's beginning.

President of the Senate presides in the absence of the lieutenant governor and is second in line of succession to the governor. He usually serves as "governor for a day" when both the governor and the lieutenant governor are out of the state.

Ratlift, a radio station owner, has been in the Legislature since 1951, in the Senate since 1955.

Oil On Troubled Waters — A number of lawmakers had their "backs up" before the governor made his statewide "report to the people" after the regular session closed. But the governor's message smoothed some feathers.

Many lawmakers expected Daniel to roast the Legislature for its failure to take care of money matters during the 140-day session. They had their hot replies all ready for press release.

Instead, Governor Daniel adroitly praised the lawmakers as one of the hardest working legislatures he had ever seen. He even singled out for kind words some leaders who had opposed his program.

It was those infernal lobbyists who were to blame, said the governor. He described hordes of lobbyists, choking the hallways and bothering members while they were in session.

Now it's the lobbyists who are riled.
