A LETTER THAT YOU SHOULD READ

In every morning's mail we receive hundreds of letters from United States Senators down to chairmen of the D.Y.O.D.L. organizations. (Do You Own Dirty Laundry). Most of the letters have been printed or mimeographed and in more cases than not the sender has never even read the letter, much less signed it. His secretary does all of this.

However, in the Monday mail we received a different kind of letter. It was typewritten and contained three pages and every line contained information which took man hours of labours research. The letter was from Harry Clay, Wheeler County Chairman of the American Cancer Society.

After reading the letter, my respect and admiration for Mr. Clay was doubled and I might add that I am going to do everything possible to help him in his cause. I say his cause, I should say our cause.

The following are a few excerpts from his letter:
Don, we are in the short rows on this year's Cancer Crusade. We need more money. The only thing left is to try to contact the ones that haven't been asked for a donation this year. I kept a file over here of all the gifts each year and check this back on the campaigns of the two previous years and pick up quite a few we have missed. Also we try to encourage those who haven't given so far to give through the newspapers (this is where you come in). I know we have missed a lot of people.

Here is how we stand now, \$1,938.75 deposited as of yesterday from the Crusade itself for this year. In addition we have \$125 coming from the employees of the Carbon Plant out here. We can add this figure of \$125 to the above though as we know we have the money, that gives us a total to date from this year's Crusade of 2,063.75. That is without counting the memorial gifts.

During this year many individuals instead of sending flowers to a funeral make a memorial contribution to the American Cancer Society, in memory of such and so. This isn't limited to deaths. We have one lady who gives them for birthday presents. Those memorial gifts are kept on record by the State ACS and at the end of the State Crusade fund raising Campaign (Continued on Page 5, No. 5)

It is the taxpayers who foot the bill in the end, and the usury exacted by big government is painful and costly. Most costly is the loss of freedom which accompanies this process of degeneration into a Welfare State.

But it need not be so. Men who have once tasted freedom, when they find they have been duped by coniving politicians are capable of reversing the trend toward slavery. A new generation is raising a conservative banner around which the citizens of this republic are rallying, and once again men are recognizing the truth of the adage that "the Lord helps those who help themselves."

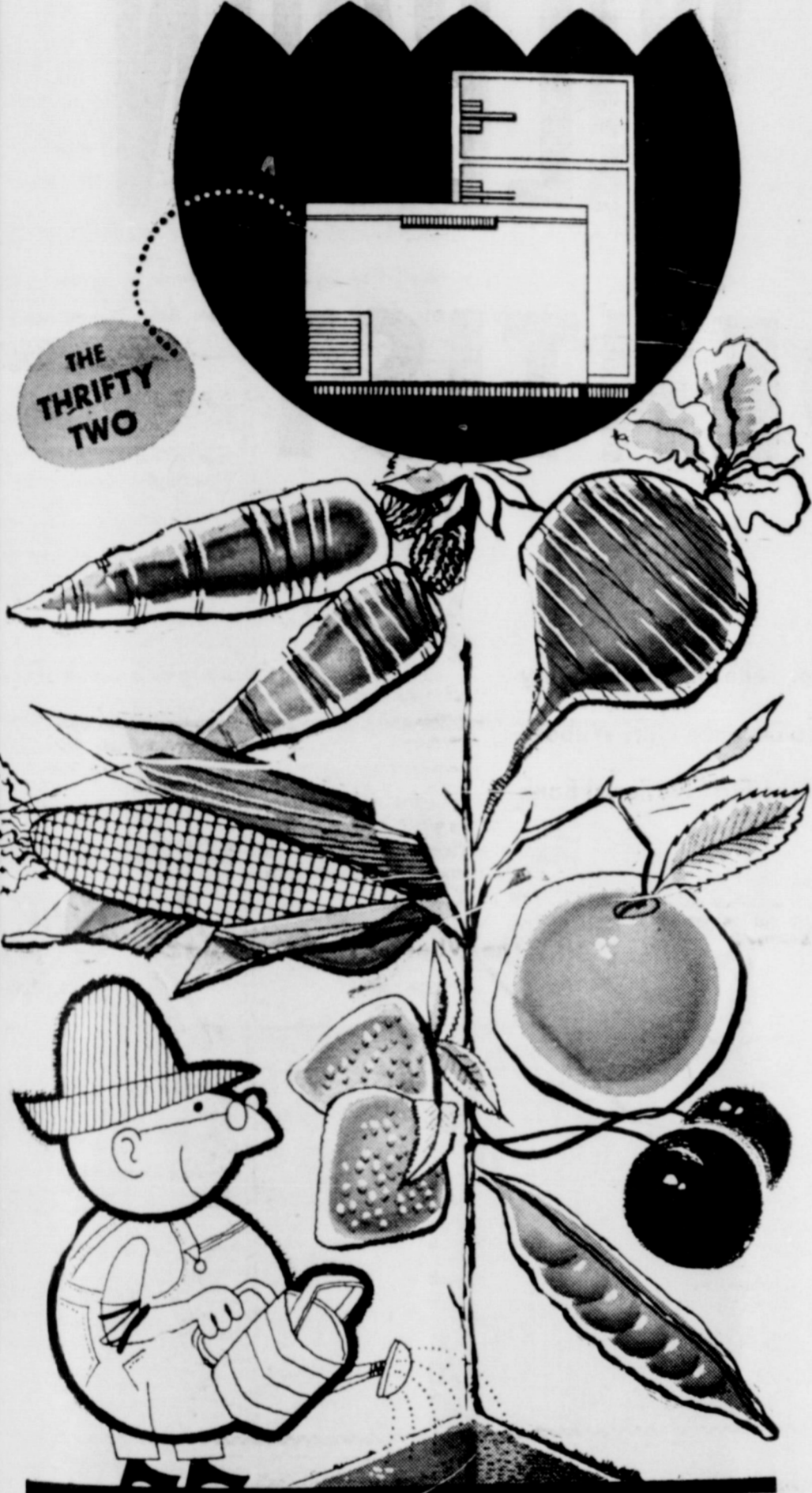

We had some radio appeals addressed to your residents asking them to send their contributions to Mrs. Lang, don't know whether this resulted in any or not.

I think if you wanted to make up a story from all this stuff I am unloading on you, emphasizing the fact that this is a Wheeler County Unit of the American Cancer Society, that the co-chairman for this year's Crusade is Mrs. W. D. Lang, a resident of Wheeler, and with the figures illustrating the fact that the participation of the North side of Wheeler county is far out of proportion to that of the South Side you might get some additional contributions mailed in to Mrs. Lang. And have them mail them to Mrs. Lang.

By the way—we don't have any very large donors down here. Our largest contribution this year was \$35.00. Only one of those. Four at \$25.00 and from there they skid on down pretty fast.

Don—I hope you will give this some thought and maybe write up a couple of good stories on it. Going to try to wind up in about 2 weeks. I hope we can make this the best year ever for the Wheeler County Unit of the ACS. Some day somebody is going to whip cancer and we want to know we did the best we could to bring it about.

Seven Rural Accidents Investigated In County

The highway patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Wheeler county during the month of May, according to Sgt. E. G. Albers, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for 13 injured and a property damage of \$7,600.00.

This brings the total for the first five months of 1961 in this county to 27 rural traffic crashes resulting in four persons being killed, 24 injured and a combined \$25,175.00.

After noting the accident picture for this county for the first five months of this year, the sergeant pointed out another significant fact. As summer approaches with longer days and additional good driving weather, the driver should be especially aware of the danger period at dusk. Many accidents happen during this period. One cause of this is the driver fails to turn his lights on soon enough. Although the law sets out when lights must be turned on, the driver should also use his own good judgment. At any time a driver cannot see an unlighted object approximately one-half mile away, he should turn his lights on. He may be able to see the other driver, but can the other driver see you?

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin, Tex. — See Texas first this summer. Texas Highway Department will help you plan a good time.

"Many Texans have never seen their own state through a tourist's eyes," says State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. They're unaware of the pleasures immediately available to them via Texas' excellent highway system.

For example, Greer noted, Texas has:

1. One National Park (Big Bend)
2. Four National Forests
3. More than 600 miles of coastline
4. More than 50 mountains over 6,000 feet high
5. Numerous scenic caverns, in land lakes, old cattle trails, restored forts, monuments and museums.
6. More than 50 state parks for outdoor recreation including water sports and camping.
7. Some 1,000 roadside parks where travelers may rest or picnic.

Highway Department will send maps and descriptive literature on points of interest and special events upon request without charge. Those writing should indicate the part of the state they want to visit and the sort of things they would like to see and do.

Task Force For Taxes—Gov. Price Daniel has named a 19-member committee to study Texas tax problem and recommend a plan for raising some \$350,000,000 for the next two years.

All the 19 appointees are in positions causing them to have a strong interest in seeing sufficient money raised for coming state appropriations. They include the chairmen of the governing boards of the state's educational, welfare and hospital systems and officials of a number of school-connected associations.

Their report is to be ready prior to July 10, opening date of the special legislative session.

What's In A Name—Pro-sales tax legislators declare that Governor Daniel is merely calling "a rose by another name" in his labeling of what is and what is not a sales tax.

Sen. Wardlaw Lane and four House members presented "their side of the story" in a formal answer to the governor's report to the people in the regular session failure to pass a tax bill.

Any \$350,000,000 tax program, including governor's will have to run heavily to sales taxes, whatever they're called, said the lawmakers. They recommended "telling the truth about it."

Governor Daniel announced he had received a heavy volume of mail since his talk, with the sentiment running 6-to-1 in favor of his program.

Several legislators said this was contrary to the way their mail was running.

Troubles All Over—To make matters worse, Comptroller Robert S. Cavert reported what some of Texas' prime sources of tax revenue seems to be dwindling.

Oil production taxes for the nine months ending May 31 were \$92,110,769, down by \$3,000,000 from the same period a year ago and down \$12,000,000 from the year before that.

Gasoline taxes, which have spiraled up at about 5 percent a year, have hit a slow down. They are expected to be about \$129,000,000. This is identical to the same nine months period a year ago.

Corporation franchise taxes were also down to \$51,542,964 for this year, a drop of about \$7,000,000 from last year.

One bright spot was in "sin taxes." Cigarette taxes brought in \$7,821,931 during May compared with \$6,310,562 for April. Taxes

on alcoholic beverages (beer wine and liquor) were up from \$2,672,947 in April to \$2,835,650 in May.

But poll taxes were down from \$2,818,527 in 1960, the presidential election year, to only \$1,827,574 for 1961.

Despite everything, the deficit in the state general revenue fund dropped in May to \$78,848,137, a high of \$102,000,000 in April. Hopes are that it will go even lower not to exceed \$33,000,000 by August 31, the end of the fiscal year.

Some Changes Made—Despite the bog-down on tax bills, the Legislature did not add quite a bit to the law of the land in its recent session. Among noteworthy changes:

1. Old age pensioners, beginning next January 1, can receive help with their hospital, doctor and nursing home expenses. Any state-licensed hospital or nursing home will be eligible for participation in the program.

2. Filing fee for candidates for statewide office will be \$1,000. Previous fee for candidates in special statewide elections was \$50. This brought out 71 candidates in the recent special senatorial race.

3. Persons who refuse to hang up when a party telephone line is needed for an emergency call will be subject to fine. Notice will be printed in this year's new telephone directories.

Not all these bills have been signed, but the governor has indicated no opposition.

Small Loan Law Urged—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has urged Governor Daniel to add loan company regulation to the list of subjects which may be considered in the upcoming special session.

At present the governor has limited the session to revenue and appropriations bills. Only subjects included in the governor's "Call" may be considered in a special session.

Wilson said that by beginning where the last session left off, lawmakers should be able to pass a loan bill quickly. A regulatory bill was passed by the House last session, but opposed forces came to a deadlock in the Senate.

Governor Daniel has evidenced coolness toward considering anything else until a revenue-and-appropriation agreement is reached—not even his pet escheat bill.

Also being asked for special consideration is a bill to increase unemployment benefits which failed in the regular session. It passed on second reading in the House, but never got any further.

He's Still Judge—A district court conviction cannot be thrown out because the judge of the court had not paid his Bar dues, the Court of Criminal Appeals ruled.

In the case at issue, the defendant was sentenced to 10 years for theft. He sought his freedom on grounds that the judge of the trial court, because of failure to pay dues was not a member of the State Bar of Texas.

Appeals Court ruled that the judge was qualified for his office under the requirements of the Texas Constitution and the conviction was upheld.

Youth Takes Over—On the heels of the Legislature's departure, the Capital was invaded by two new contingents of politicians — the youngest and most vigorous it sees from one year to the next.

They are the delegates to Boys State and Girls State, outstanding highschool seniors who come to Austin each summer to gain experience in government. And they learn to do by doing. Each group (separately) forms political parties, nominates candidates, holds elections and sets up a state government—all with realistic zeal.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Blowing sand, wind, hail, seedling disease, and thrips have caused extensive damage to young cotton in the area, report Extension Service personnel, Billy C. Gunter, Extension Area Agronomist, states.

"For maximum yields, healthy seedlings are essential. Seedlings stunted by winds, sand, and hail, disease and insects require days and even weeks to recover; taking valuable time from our short growing season."

Thrips population increased rapidly in many cotton plantings during the past week, reports John G. Thomas, Extension Area Entomologist. Little can be done to prevent damage by wind, sand, hail and seedling diseases; for this reason severe thrips injury should be prevented or reduced as much as possible to allow rapid healthy growth of young cotton, Thomas added. Hard rains will normally reduce thrips populations, but careful field inspection is necessary to determine the number of thrips hatching in the terminal growth following these rains, according to Bryan Swaim, Wheeler County Agent. Thrips control, when needed will mean continued rapid growth and maturity of cotton necessary to produce maximum yields in Wheeler County, Swaim added.

Swaim also stated, that May cotton severely injured by thrips is often surpassed by June plantings; thus losing the advantage of early cotton. Therefore, weekly checks should be made on older cotton, and if assistance is needed call 2661, County Agent's Office. Cotton plant-County Agent's office. Cotton plants that have been damaged by sand sometimes need to be sidedressed with nitrogen-fertilizer to make it start growing. This is especially true when heavy rains have occurred.
