Bi-District Friday At White Deer C. of C. Christmas Open House

The Wheeler Mustangs wrapped up District Play last Thursday night as they traveled south to play the Shamrock Irish. The Mustangs would need the win to gain an outright district title. An Irish upset would give them first win of the year and cause the Mustangs to share the district title with White Deer.

The Mustangs would kickoff to the Irish to start the game. The Mustang defense would force the Irish to punt, but would be victimized by the fake punt, giving the Irish new life. But again, the defense would hold and force the Irish to punt. The Mustang offense would get cranked up as they would drive 40 yards in 6 plays with Justin Chapman getting the final 17 vards for the TD. The extra point, failed and the Mustangs would lead 6-0 at the 5:10 mark of the first quar-

The Mustangs would erupt for 217 points in the second quarter to secure the district title. Justin Chapman would get his second TD of the night on a one yard run to cap a 10 play 68 yard drive. The extra point try was no good and the Mustangs lead would be 12-0 with 10:26 to go in the second

The Mustang defense would get into the scoring act as Caleb Finsterwald returns an interception 65 yards to paydirt. Again the extra point try was no good and the lead was 18-0 at the 9:07 mark

Gavin McQueen would be the next Mustang to score as he caught a 10 yard pass from Justin Chapman. A Chapman to Finsterwald pass for the extra points would increase the Mustang lead to 26-0.

Again the Mustang defense would force a Shamrock punt, and the Mustang offense would get one more score before the half. James Chapman would go over from one yard out to complete a nine play, 60 vard drive. Bret Goad's kick was good and the Mustangs would go to halftime with 33-0 lead.

The third quarter would see the Mustangs pick up where they left off. As the offense would drive 86 yards in 14 plays as Finsterwald got in from one yard out. Goad's kick was good and the lead was now 40-0 at the 5:50 mark of the third quarter.

The Mustangs would finish out their scoring for the night as Justin Chapman hit Caleb Finsterwald on a 55 yard pass for a TD. Goad's Kick was good and the Mustangs now lead 47-0 with 1:45 left in the third.

The Mustangs would substitute through the fourth quarter and Shamrock would get their lone score on a 40 yard pass from Satterwhite to Dean. The Extra point attempt failed and the score would read 47-6.

Preparing poultry in an oven cooking bag is a moist heat cooking method. It is the best way to produce a moist, tender bird. It also helps reduce oven splatter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Shake I tablespoon of flour in the bag to prevent bursting.

Place celery and onion slices in the bottom of the bag to help prevent poultry from sticking to the bag and to add flavor.

Place poultry on top of the vegetables, close the bag with the enclosed twist-tie, and make 6 half-inch slits in the top to let steam escape. Insert meat thermometer through a slit in the bag. There is no basting necessary. The poultry is done when it reaches 180 degrees.

top of the bag down the center. Loosen the bag from the turkey so there is no sticking and carefully remove the poultry to the cutting board. Store turkey, stuffing, gravy, broth and other leftover cooked foods in refrigerator within two hours after cooking.

How much turkey do I need? The guidelines for the size of turkey to get are 1.5 pounds per person for one meal. If you want leftovers, allow 2 pounds per person.

Should I stuff my turkey? There are many pros and cons to stuffing a turkey.

1. There is a pretty significant risk of bacteria flourishing in the stuffing because it does not get hot enough in the cavity of the turkey.

2. When you bake a turkey that is stuffed it takes longer to bake than un unstuffed turkey.

3. A turkey baked with stuffing in it is drier because of the longer roasting time and because the

stuffing soaks up many of the juices and fats that the turkey would normally be using to keep

4. Stuffing baked in a turkey are often times soggy and they are higher in fat and calories from the fat that has

soaked into them. People still continue to stuff a turkey because it is traditional. It is nice to see a beautiful turkey come out of the oven filled with golden brown stuff-

Suggestion: Stuff the turkey, but don't eat that stuffing.

Dear Editor, I was born in Wheeler as were both of my parents, Jack Guynes and Vergie Ashley Guynes. We moved from Wheeler in 1948, when I was 3 years old. across the highway, and I'm not sure what the name of the hill is. About a year ago, my dad started talking about a Letter to the Editor in the Wheeler Times written by Mr. P. A. Clepper. 




