## REPRESENTATIVE MCILHANY ASKS RE-ELECTION TO LEGISLATURE

State Rep. Grainger McIlhany announced this week he would be a candidate for re-election subject to the action of the Democratic Primary. His district, the 87th, is made up of Gray, Collingsworth, and Wheeler Counties.

Rep. McIlhany is 43, married, a graduate of the University of Texas with degrees in law and business, and is a veteran of World War II. He is the owner of a small department store in Wheeler and is a stock farmer.

McIlhany has represented the 87th District in Austin for the past seven terms and is now second in seniority in the entire House membership. He is chairman of the House Agriculture Committee and is vice-chairman of the Committee on Constitutional Amendments. He is a member of the State Affairs Committee; the Oil and Gas Committee; and the Committee on Conservation and Reclamation.

Rep. McIlhany is chairman of the Special House Committee that is at present investigating the status of state-owned lands. This

committee, working with the land Commissioner and the attorney general, is currently laying the legal groundwork to recover for the state a number of tracts that are being used by private interests but have never been deeded away by the state. Most of this property is submerged land on the Gulf coast which has great mineral value.

McIlhany has secured passage of bills to modernize the livestock health laws of Texas which now comply with federal requirements for the interstate shipment of animals. He has also sponsored bills that recodified the livestock feed inspection and control laws as well as the commercial fertilizer inspection laws. He is one of the sponsors of the present farm-to-market road program, and is the author of the bill providing for improved farm practices.

McIlhany has been the author of legislation to promote safer driving on the highways; to increase the penalties for the sale of narcotics to minors; and to prohibit the sale of lewd literature.

## March of Dimes Helps Dry Youngster's Tears of Pain

Anthony Ryan wasn't normally a crybaby. But at 10 months he began crying almost incessantly, and at times even screamed.

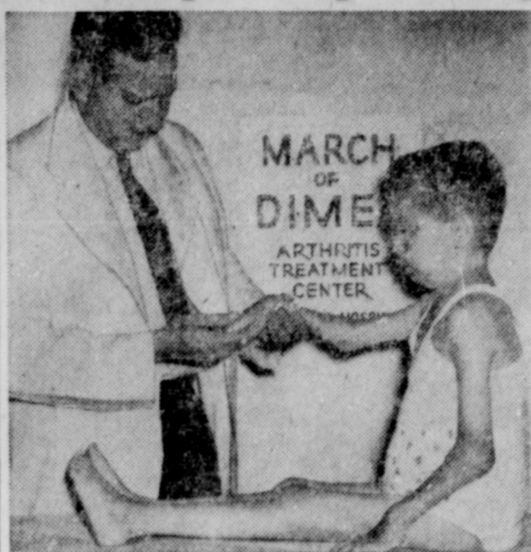
His loving parents in Philadelphia were nearly out of their minds. With four other small children, the household was pandemonium. No one appeared to know precisely what was causing the infant's dreadful paroxysms of pain.

Eight months and countless tears later, the cause of Anthony's agony was at last diagnosed as rheumatoid arthritis, seemingly afflicting every area of his tiny body.

It's 11 years now since Anthony was stricken. He will limp the rest of his life; he cannot play baseball today with the other boys in the block, and he is still in a great deal of pain. As a matter of fact, until just a short time ago he couldn't even turn his head.

Science has not yet licked the problem of Anthony and of thousands of children like him. There is still no simple, accurate test for the early diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis, although the outlook is hopeful. But many rheumatologists would agree today that had modern diagnostic tools been available to him, and had Anthony been examined immediately by a "team" of specialists in the medical and allied professions—the group of orthopedists, pediatricians, laboratory research scientists, physical therapists and others now available in March of Dimes-financed treatment centers in many parts of the nation—Anthony today might be skating with the other kids on the frozen pond at the bottom of Prince Circle where he lives.

Although much of the injury done to Anthony in past

years is irreparable, doctors at a new arthritis treatment center at Philadelphia Children's Hospital, sponsored by five March of Dimes chapters in the area, check him regularly to ease his pain and avoid further damage.

This same "team approach" is also employed by the ever-growing number of National Foundation-March of Dimes chapter-sponsored clinics for treatment of birth defects, another area in which the health organization is concentrating. Infants with any of hundreds of major birth defects are now examined by as many as 12 specialists at each clinic, working together as a team that might include a pediatrician, neurosurgeon, urologist, orthopedist and internist as well as others.

For instance, consider the perils from one birth defect

that surrounded Cathy and Carol Gile, identical 8-year-old twins of Vancouver, Wash. From birth, the children have been seriously ill with a succession of maladies—pneumonia (each six times), ear infections (again, each six times) and other disorders which have meant prolonged hospitalization. Both were found to be afflicted with an inherited lack of antibodies, the substances in the blood which combat bacteria.

At the University of Washington Hospital, Seattle, where 88 March of Dimes chapters in Washington, Idaho and Alaska have financed a birth defects clinic, the attractive little girls twice monthly are given injections which literally keep them alive.

The Seattle "team" at the March of Dimes clinic watches over the twins devotedly.

There are tens of thousands of Anthonys and Cathys and Carols in the United States today. One reason The National Foundation-March of Dimes turned to these diseases three years ago is that almost 700 babies are born each day in this country with significant birth defects, accounting for more than 21,000 deaths each year. Crippling rheumatoid arthritis affects 30,000 children and adolescents—apart from the overall toll of 11 million American victims of rheumatic diseases.

An increasing number of sufferers from these two cruel handicaps are receiving treatment from the specialist "teams" at March of Dimes-financed chapter clinics. As more funds become available, additional centers will be established to provide medical care for even more victims of chronic crippling disease.

### Who Must File Federal Income Tax Returns

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$200 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return. Wiley E. Davis, administrative officer, Internal Revenue Service, Pampa, Texas, announced today.

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners and independent contractor, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self employment were \$400 or more.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by telephoning the IRS office.

"Oh, yes, the filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16!"

### Drive Is Underway To Raise \$3 Million

The Southwest Animal Health Foundation's drive to raise \$3 million to combat screw worm menace in Texas is going great guns, reports C. G. Scruggs, acting president. By December 7, 157 counties had organized committees and the number is increasing almost daily.

With county agents and vocational agriculture teachers conducting educational meetings throughout the state, it has been difficult to keep pace with the rapid developments, Scruggs said.

He emphasized that all funds contributed to the Foundation would be used exclusively for the screwworm control program. Activities of the non-profit foundation, Scruggs pointed out, are governed by a board of trustees. With the recent addition of 5 prominent Texans, its membership now stands at 10. The new trustees are Alvie L. Cole, Sterling City; W. E. Crenshaw, Weslaco; Dr. G. Kendrick, Marlin; Claude K. McCann, Victoria, and T. J. Richards, Paducah.

Scruggs said that five remaining vacancies will be filled in the near future, bringing the governing body to its authorized strength of 15 members. Initial board members include Dolph Briscoe, Jr., Uvalde; T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Ozona; C. H. Devaney, Cobana, and Marvin Bridges of Buffalo.

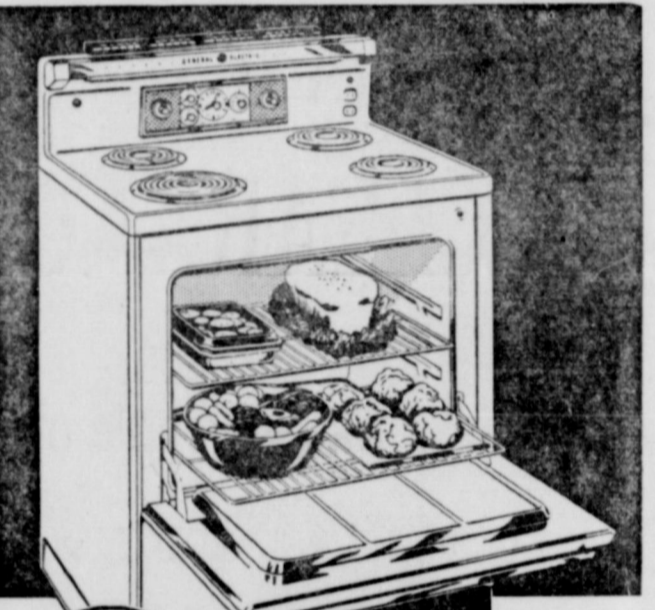

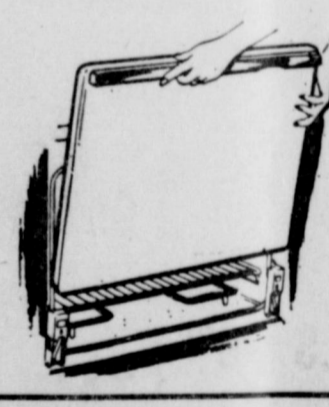

## A FREE GIFT FOR YOU

It seems that everything is going up in cost these days. Nothing comes down; everything goes up—up—up. Wages too are going up, but not as fast as the cost of living, for our dollars are decreasing in value all the time. That's why former President Eisenhower suggested we begin calling them dollarettes!

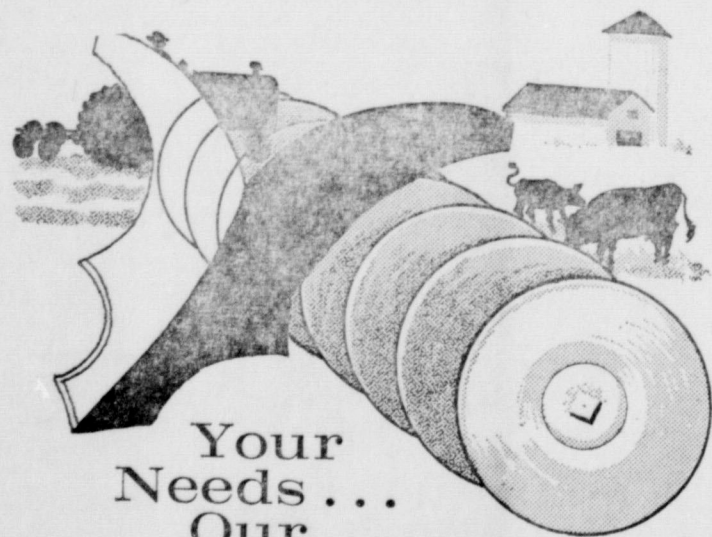

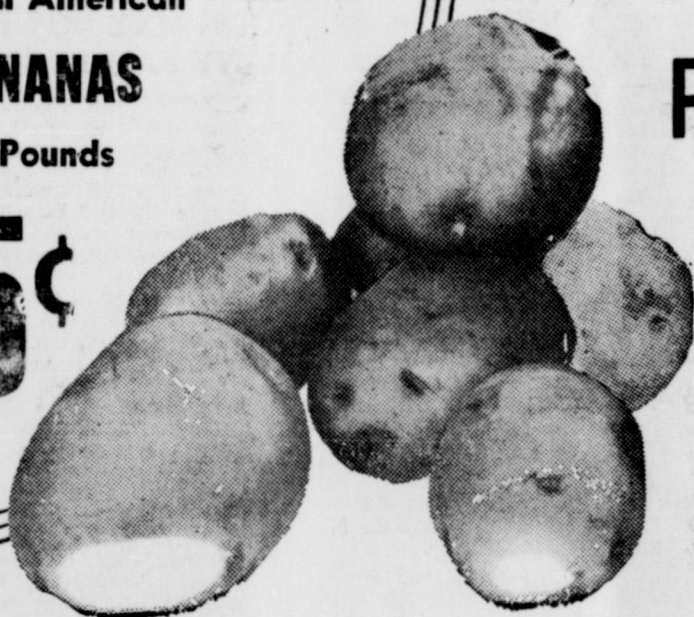
