CANCER DRIVE WORKERS ARE COMMENDED

Leaders of the 1961 Cancer Crusade in Wheeler County have been commended by officials of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society for their part in what appears to be a record breaking year for cancer control education and fund-raising in Texas.

Co-Chairman Harry Clay of Shamrock and Mrs. W. D. Lang of Wheeler have been notified by the Society that an all-time high for Texas is now within reach before this year's activity concludes in August.

The Wheeler County unit achieved 204 percent of quota. The quota was \$1,200, based on population, tax rolls and per capita income.

In District 3-N, comprised of 19 counties, the Wheeler County unit was first in percentage of quota attained. Throughout the state, with 209 units, Wheeler County was 12th.

This marks the third year in a row this county has led District 3-N.

The total amount credited to the Wheeler County unit for 1961 is \$2,454.05. Of this, \$361.00 was contributed in the form of memorial gifts during the year, and \$2,093.05 was contributed during the Crusade.

This is the largest amount ever contributed during a Crusade in Wheeler County, and also the largest total of both Crusade contributions and memorial contributions.

The 1959 campaign achieved a percentage of quota of 208.9 percent, with a year-end total of \$2,305, but with a slightly lower quota.

Results Gratifying

Results of the Crusade are certainly gratifying to the Co-chairmen, Clay said. "Success of the fund-raising campaign can be directly attributed to the fine cooperation and efforts received from the residents contacted and their desire to support the efforts of the ACS," he declared.

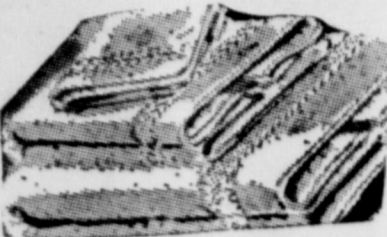

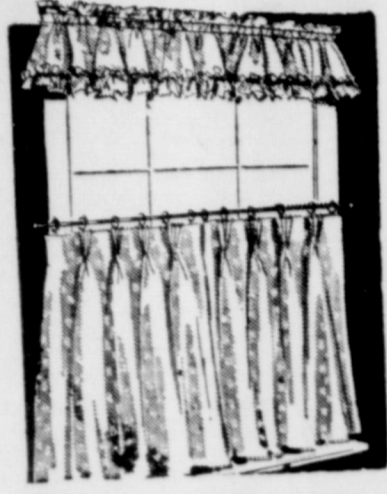

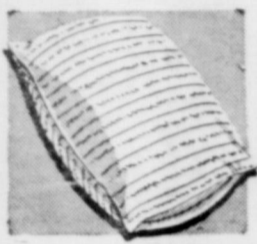

Farmers Advised To Ask For Gas Tax Refund

College Station, July 18—Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of their eligibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline gallonage purchased between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961.

The claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 and not later than September 30, Bates said.

The gasoline on which a refund may be obtained covers that used for farming purposes and includes normal production operations. Three exceptions, however, are noted by the specialist. They are gasoline used on the highway, even though that used for processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations and that used for non-farming or personal purposes.

Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate or excessive claims. Bates said. He noted that Form 2240 does not apply to diesel and special motor fuels. Farmers who have questions regarding taxes on these fuels are advised to contact an Internal Revenue Service director or local County Agent's office, Wheeler Texas, for forms for tax refunds.

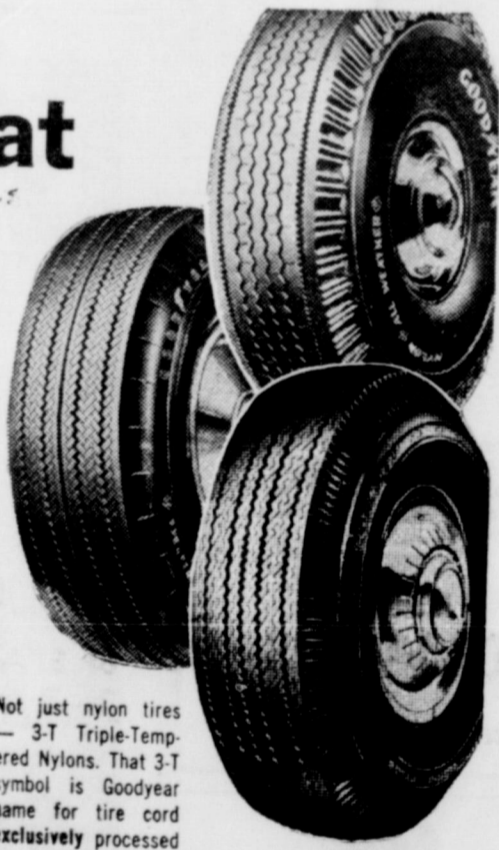

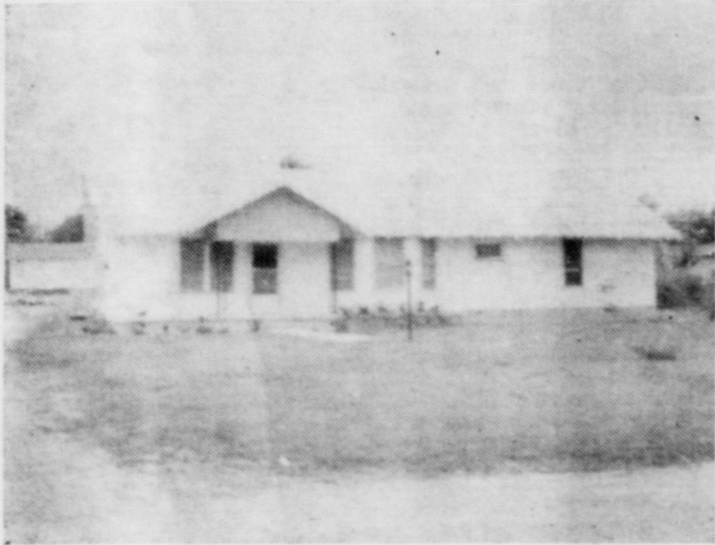

Social Security Law Increases Benefits

The new social security law means increased benefits to widows beginning with the checks received in early September, according to Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo District Office.

"There's nothing that they need do except wait for a check with the increase on it. For widows already receiving monthly insurance benefits, the increase is automatic," Geldon continued. "Our payment centers are already figuring the increase with the aid of electronic machines."

This increase will be received only by widows and widowers of retirement age. Younger widows, who get survivors benefits because they have young or disabled children in their care, receive a Mother's Benefit. The new law does not change the portion payable to that group. But it's a 10 percent increase to those widows who are 62 years or older, Geldon said.

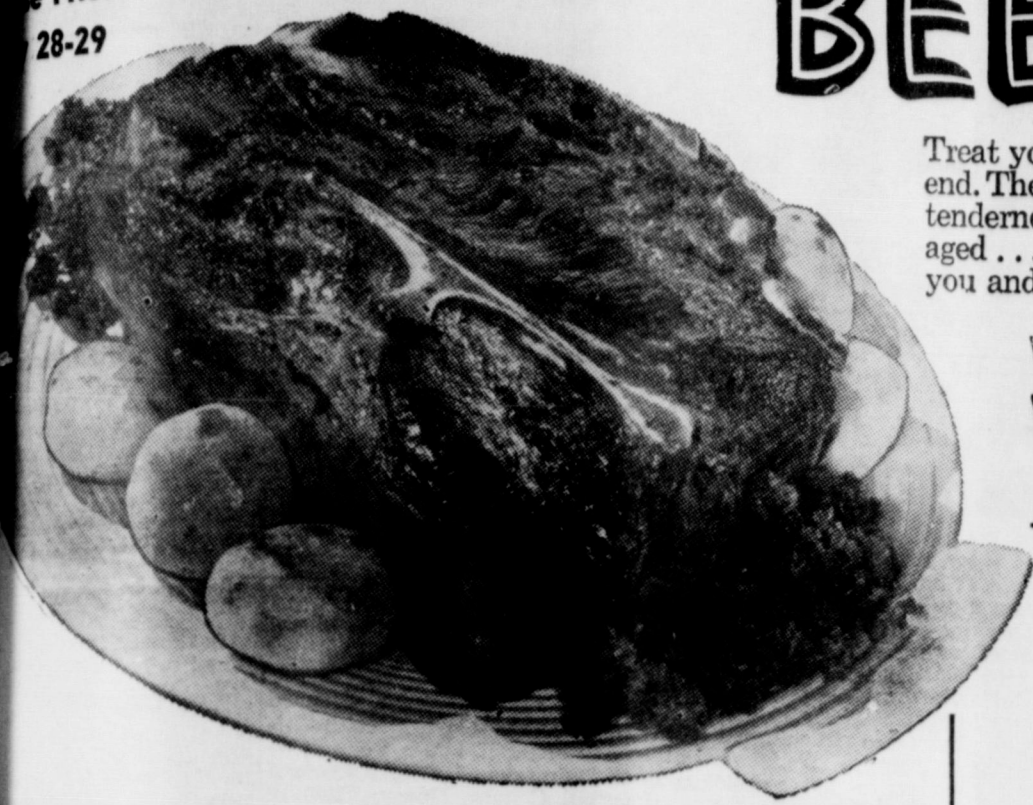
