## Work Available In McLean

### 19 TO 40 YEAR OLD WOMEN NEEDED AT MARIE FOUNDATION

### SCHOOL STARTS AUGUST 28

Four McLean met with the Kiwanis Club Monday and discussed the possibility of hiring from 10 to 35 women in the Wheeler area to work in the McLean factory. The factory is undertaking an expansion program and is in need of additional help immediately according to Tom Greenwood, production Superintendent. Amos Page, Boyd Meador, John Haynes and Tom Greenwood, all of McLean, discussed and explained their plan to the Wheeler merchants.

Interview and tests will be given Saturday morning beginning at 10:00 A.M. in the banquet room at Nora's Cafe. Every woman between the age of 19 and 40 interested in working should make application at that time. If possible those interested should check at the Times office sometime before Saturday and select the most convenient time for an appointment.

The interview and tests will take only about 30 minutes. Wage scale at the factory runs from 80 cents per hour for beginners to 1.90 for the skilled workers. The hours are from 7:30 until 4:00 P.M. Six days a week with a 30 minute lunch period.

In the event enough Wheeler women become interested, a regular schedule will be set up between Wheeler and McLean.

### WILDCAT WELL TO BE DRILLED NW OF TWITTY

Highlighting news of drilling activity in the state-line area is announcement of the location of a 5,000-foot well about one mile east of production in the Kellerville field.

The location has been stated by Johnny Grimm on the J. M. Porter land, north of the North Fork of Red River, four miles west and two miles north of Twitty.

Official description of the wildcat is: Johnny Grimm - No. 1 J. M. Porter - 330 feet from the west line of section 22, block A-8, H&GN Survey, 10 miles northwest of Shamrock - proposed depth 5,000 feet.

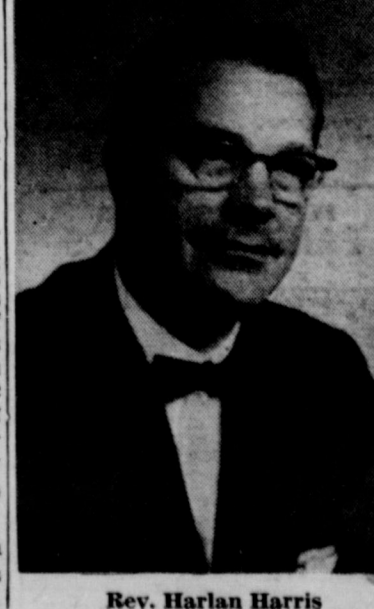

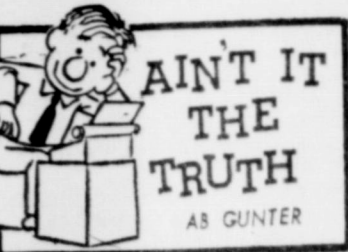

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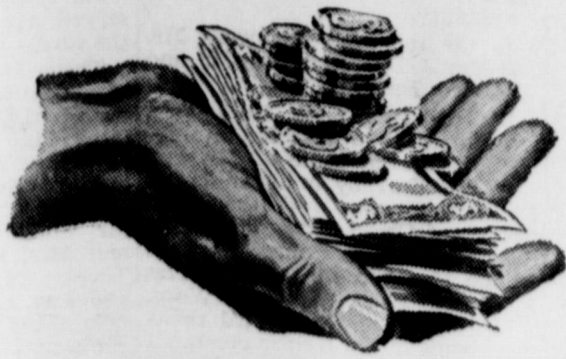

## \$100 MILLION INCREASE IS POSSIBLE FOR TEXAS FARMERS

Many Texas farmers can increase significantly their net income by utilizing more fully presently known technology, according to Director John E. Hutchison of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He said that farm families could increase their annual net income at least \$100 million by using the most advanced technological and management practices. Hutchison's statement followed an evaluation of first-year results in Extension's intensified soil fertility program which was launched early in 1960.

Initially, 12 counties representing different major land resource areas were selected to participate in the pilot project. They included 4 counties on the High Plains, 3 on the Coast Prairie and 5 in the Northeast Texas where both Blackland and sandyland were involved. Land was given to crop production practices important to those areas. These included the use of fertilizer based on soil tests, planting the best varieties of crops, effective insect and disease control, appropriate soil and water conservation measures and other practices based on the best research information available.

Results were obtained by comparing net profits from crops grown under advanced technological methods with income from carefully controlled check plots where usual farming practices were employed. Increased net income reported ranged from \$1.86 per acre to \$52.07 per acre. In one county, Red River, 47 demonstrations indicated that net income of the county could be increased \$2.9 million if all farmers followed recommended practices.

"If results in the 12 pilot counties are indicative of what can be accomplished on a state-wide basis, it means a potential equivalent to an important new industry in each Texas county," Hutchison said.

The immediate success of the pilot project already has prompted 17 additional counties to initiate an intensified soil fertility program and many others are making plans to follow suit. "The key to the

success of this venture was the active participation of local people under the direction of County Program Building Committees," Hutchison emphasized. In each county, local agricultural and civic leaders assisted the county extension staff in carrying out the program. USDA personnel and soil conservation district supervisors also played an active role. Other cooperating organizations included the Texas Plant Food Educational Society, the American Potash Institute, and the Texas Agricultural Limestone Association.

"This success presents a challenge to the total leadership and educational forces of the state, for here is profit that the problem primarily is one of the man and not of the land," Hutchison said.

## Auto Insurance To Increase

The State Board of Insurance recently announced some increases in auto-mobile insurance rates effective August 1, 1961. This is the first increase in public liability and collision rates since August 1, 1958. In 1959 the automobile rates were increased by an average in excess of 10%. Due to some changes being made in the safe driving plan which was inaugurated on January 1, 1960, for which no compensatory change was made in the rates, the rates, in effect, were reduced further as the realized amounts were smaller than originally computed.

The insurance buyers would doubtless be interested if he could go through the rate making process and see the degree of care that is exercised to compile accurate statistics, and to assemble them in proper form, for use in determining the exact cost of insurance. Insurance rates are made on past experience for use in the future. Classification plans are used to distribute the cost as nearly as possible to those incurring it. One of these plans is to classify by territory. Thus, Harris County, Dallas County, Bexar County and other large counties form separate territories for rate making purposes. The rates developed for those counties are based on their losses alone. Smaller counties are grouped with other counties that have approximately the same experience in losses for the purpose of making rates.

Another classification is that of use, whether the automobile is used as a private passenger automobile, and if so whether or not for business use or for non-business use. In this field also is the classification of the driver, whereby male operators under 25 years of age will, under most circumstances, pay a larger premium than an older man. The Texas Safe Driving Plan is a classification plan and permits a further refinement in rate based on the motorist's driving habits as an index for the distribution of cost of insurance by allocating more of it to the groups producing higher losses.

The rates announced recently were an overall average increase of about 15% of the present rates. However, in many instances this did not raise the cost of insurance as high as it was in August, 1958.

Generally speaking, using an all-state overall average, basic liability coverage on private passenger automobile, combining bodily injury and property damage, will be 3.3% higher this August than August 1, 1958, but 75% of the drivers who are in Sub-class 0 will have a total premium of 7.1% less for this coverage this August than in the same month in 1958. On collision coverage on all types of 6.1% less than it was in 1958, and automobiles and all deductibles averaged over the state, the rate effective August 1, 1961, will be for the 75% of the drivers in Sub-class 0 their premiums will be 24.8 percent less than they would have been for this coverage in 1958. On medical payments coverage, the all-state average will be 2.7% higher rates this August than in 1958, but again the safe driving plan will bring the Sub-class 0 motorists a reduction of 17.8% of the August, 1959, rate. On all types of cars, statewide, comprehensive rates will average this August 3.2 percent less than in August, 1958.

This is further illustrated in Wheeler County, by following comparisons in reference to one of the higher priced models of the Ford, Chevrolet or Plymouth lines, less than six months old; using a coverage of basic limits public liability, full coverage comprehensive, and \$50.00 deductible collision, before application of safe driving plan will show:

Prem. as of Aug. 1958 --- \$154.00  
Prem. as of Aug. 1959 --- \$131.00  
Prem. as of Aug. 1960 --- No Cge  
Prem. as of Aug. 1961 --- \$170.00  
Percentage of change --- -8.0%  
% of change from 1958 --- 10.0%

In spite of popular belief that insurance is comparatively high, a comparison of the cost of the automobile with automobile insurance rates in Texas over the past years is particularly revealing. In Travis County on a Chevrolet 4-door sedan from 1938 to 1961, insurance coverage for non-business private passenger automobiles, without a male operator under 25 years of age, have increased a total of 69% while the list price of the automobile has increased 179%.

Increased costs in the fields of hospitalization, medical expense, repair costs and other items for which automobile insurance pays have also contributed to increase its cost.

The recent hearing by the State Board however, demonstrated that insurance can be and is priced with as much accuracy as any product sold today. It was also pointed out that more careful driving and reduced number of accidents and fair claims will do more to hold down insurance cost than anything else that might be done.

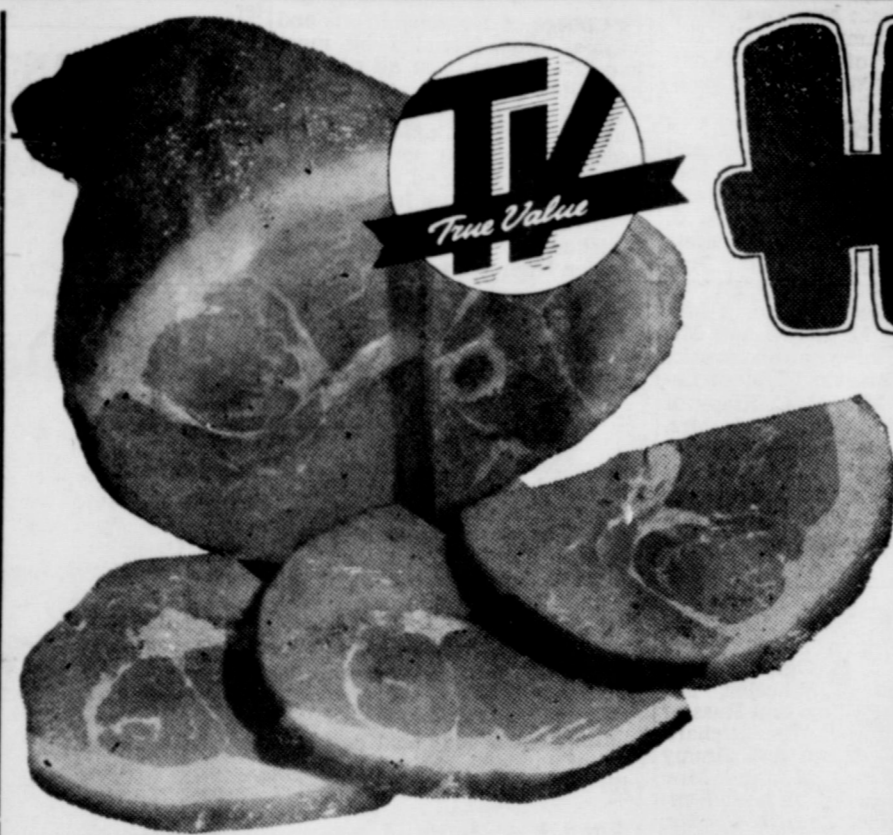

Rodeo officials are: President, Ty Mills; Announcer, Albert Gunter; Arena Director, Clois Hanner; Bucking Judges, Truman Bradstreet and Floyd Davidson; Time Keepers, Arnold Jones and Richard Gaines; Barrier Man, Owen Jones; Flag Man, Richard Kiker, Clowns, Mike Shannon and Terry McCasland.

**Bull Riding:** Contestant must ride six seconds. Senior Boys, one hand; Junior Boys, one or two hands. The more the animal is contested the higher the score.

**Calf Roping:** Catch as catch can, but the loop must go over the calf's head. Contestant is allowed two loops if he is carrying two ropes or two minutes to catch the calf.

**Saddle Race:** Saddle and Blanket are placed at one end of the Arena and the boy riding bare back will be at a line on the other end of the Arena. All contestants will go at one time at the flag of the field judge and the first five back riding with the saddle and blanket place.

**Walk and Lead Race:** Boys on horse back are at a line on one end of the arena, all ride at one time, flagged to start by the field judge and the boys ride to the far end of the arena, get off the horse behind the line and lead their horse back. The first five place.

**Three-Man-Tie-Down:** Three Junior boys are stationed on a line approximately forty feet from the roping shoot. Calf is turned out and each boy may throw one loop before the calf crosses the line the boy starts from. Any of the three boys may catch the calf but the boy who is the contestant must tie the calf. His helpers may help in throwing and holding the calf. Contestants have two minutes, one loop each or until the calf crosses the boys starting line without a loop on the calf.

**Barrel Race:** All barrel races will be run in the clover leaf pattern and will be timed between the flags. The contestant must cross their train each time they round a barrel. Five second penalty for each barrel knocked over and twenty second penalty for breaking the pattern.

**Calf Dressing Contest:** Three girls from the same age division start when flagged from a line on one end of the arena and go to the calf on a rope at the other end of the arena. When the girls make contact with the rope the calf is theirs. The one who is entered as the contestant will be given a pair of pants and she must dress the calf with the pants. The helpers may hold and throw the calf but the contestant must dress the calf. When the contestant dresses the calf she runs back to the starting line to be flagged out Time event, between the two flags Pants must be put on to cover the rump of the calf and each leg
