**SWEETWATER PHILOSOPHER NOT AFRAID OF MACHINES ENSLAVING MAN, SAYS MAN CAN DO IT ALONE.**

Editor's Note: The Sweetwater Philosopher on his Shinnery grass farm on Sweetwater Creek is not afraid of machines, his letter this week claims.

Dear editor: I never have been worried over the chances of machines replacing man, as some people seem to fear as the machines get more and more complicated, especially the big, block-long electronic brain machines. In the first place, any time a machine can take over any job of work I'm doing, it's welcome to it. Nothing about that prospect that scares me.

But I was interested in the reasons a scientist gave the other day on why machines will not replace man.

Invariably, I suppose, when you

feed the wrong information to a machine, bells ring and lights flash "tilt" and it comes up with the wrong answer, but feed the wrong information to people and you never know whether they're going to blow a fuse or throw their hats in the air and vote for you. There's many an office-holder today who owes his success to the fact people aren't as apt as machines when it comes to analyzing data.

People are more like my tractor engine. Regardless of what kind of gasoline you pour into it, it won't always plow.

It may be true that machines will never enslave man, but we really don't need a machine for that anyway. Man is managing to do that by himself.

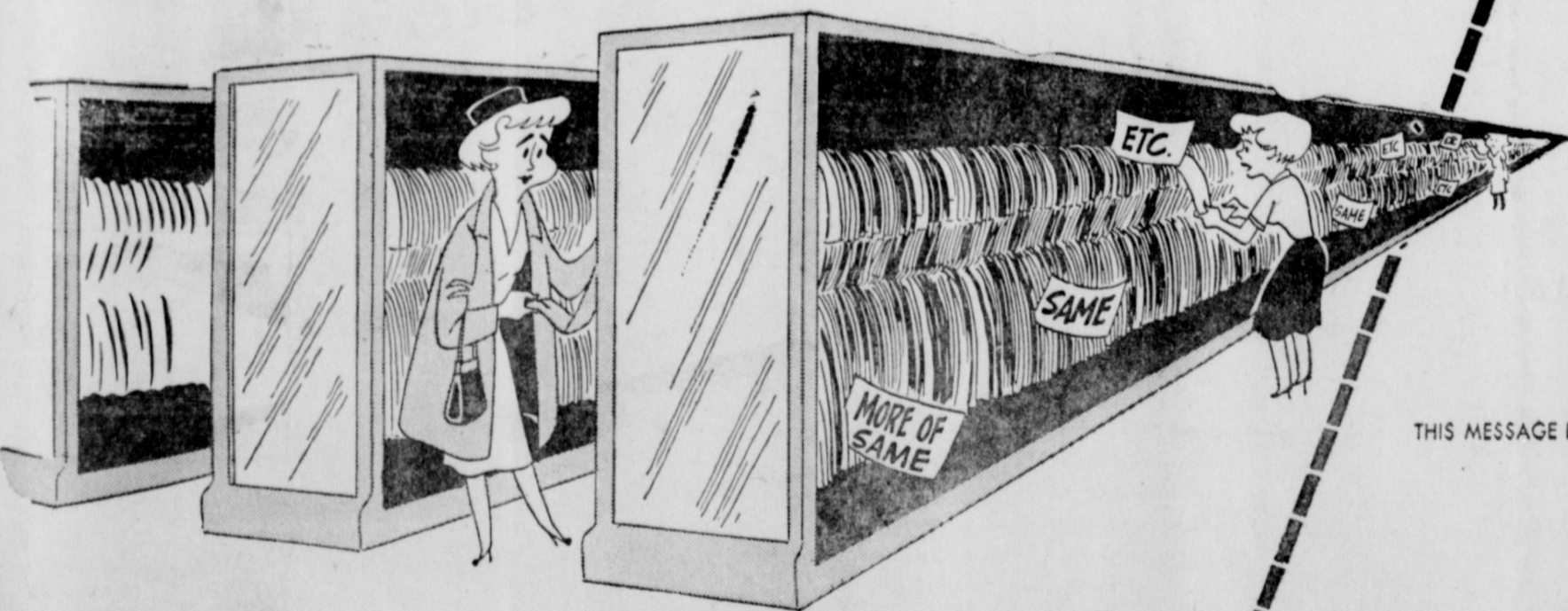

# Wiley McCray Is Selected To Appear In The National Finals

Wiley McCray, named World's Greatest Rodeo Clown in 1950 and 1960, has been honored again by having been selected by the top twenty bull riders and the National Finals Rodeo committee to participate in the 1961 National Finals Rodeo to be held December 27 through December 30 at the Fair Grounds in Dallas. Wiley, a Wheeler County man, and Wichita

Peth of Washington, were chosen from thirty-five applicants to be the clowns at the most important rodeo of the 1961 season. As always, the clown's first and foremost thoughts and actions are to keep the cowboys from being hurt by bulls, regardless of the risk of bodily injuries to themselves. Evidently Wiley is held in high esteem by all the cowboys as the repeated honors and the trust placed in him prove that he is very serious in this career he has chosen and followed since the age of sixteen. He has a broken bones record that would fill a volume, but Wiley, a very modest man, says he's been lucky.

The National Finals Rodeo will not only feature the top cowboys, clowns, but top stock as well. Rodeo stock from such names as

Walter Osward, Walsenburg, Colo., Harry Knight, Washington; Butler Bros., Elk City, Okla.; Ray, New Hall, Calif.; Stiner, Austin; Reynolds, Florida; and a few pride and joys from top names in Canada will see action in Dallas.

Wiley started his rodeo career at the Anvil Park Rodeo in Canadian in 1931 and in 1933 after winning the Canadian Rodeo, it was only a matter of time and a few broken bones that he gave up his trick riding, bronc riding, bull fighting and turned to the full time business of being a clown. Wiley has appeared in rodeos in practically every spot in the nation and quite a few in Canada. Some years he has worked as many as 32 major shows and had to fly from one show to another. He estimated that in his busiest year he faced about 2,000 bulls. Even in the busy life Wiley leads he often finds time to visit children's homes, hospitals, etc., as well as maintaining his own farm in the Briscoe community.

During his career, Wiley has worked with actors, singers and other nationally known entertainers. Among them are Gene Autry, Rex Allen, Smiley Burnett, Roy Rogers, Matt Dillon, Chester, Doc and Kitty, The Everly Brothers, Sons of the Pioneers, Charley Weaver and others.

He appeared in "Arena" filmed in the rodeo arena. In filming this movie, he worked with Gig Young, Jean Hagen and Robert Horton and doubled for Henry Morgan. He also appeared in "Rough Riding".

Down through the years Wiley has trained for use in his acts: dogs, goats, pigs, skunks, mules, chimpanzee, and a dancing ostrich.

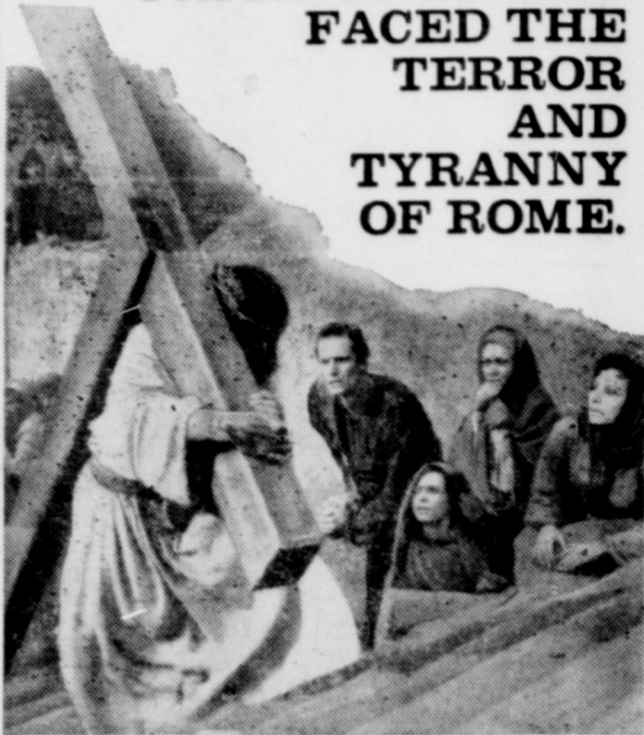

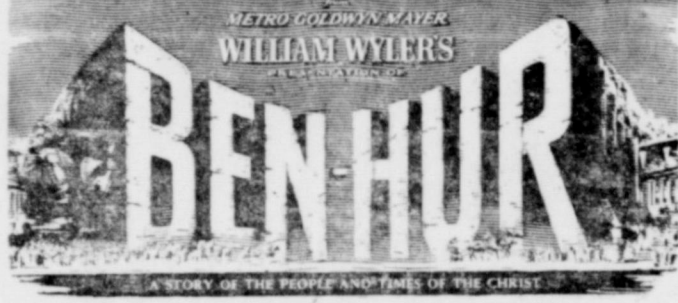

Remember our Christmas holidays which will be December 20 through January 1st.

Very soon thereafter, our first semester ends on January 12, 1962, well as your children prepared for the mid-term examinations?

It might be well at this time for us all to review briefly just what an education should provide for our children. Thomas Jefferson said that only through the efforts of an educated citizenry could our Democracy survive. In general terms, it seems to me that an education, so far as the public school is concerned should:

(1) teach people how to communicate with others, (2) know how to permit others to communicate with them, and (3) know how to use quantitative solutions in dealing with numbers.

Would not the number one item listed above cover the Language Arts area including reading, writing, spelling, and speaking?

The third item would cover all the Mathematics and Science needed to prepare our youth for life in this complex world, plus training in the vocations.

Help your child by looking closely at their report card grades, their scores on the tests we are giving. # Child's Arm Turns Hard, Stony; Medical Treatment Slows Process

Christine Versluis, who is nine and lives on the shores of Lake Ontario at Hilton, N.Y., is unable to straighten her right arm because of rheumatic disease.

Her arm and parts of both shoulders are becoming increasingly calcified, which means change of the muscle tissue into a hard stony substance.

This somber-faced child is the tragic victim of dermatomyositis, one of the forms of rheumatic disease. Another form is rheumatoid arthritis. The majority of people don't know that children suffer from arthritis; they believe mistakenly that arthritis affects only the aging—someone's grandfather or grandmother, surely not the very young.

But there is urgent reason today why grownups and parents especially should be intelligently informed about arthritis among children. Dr. William S. Clark, director of medical care of The National Foundation, whose expanded program embraces arthritis, birth defects and continued work in polio, said this week:

"Rheumatoid arthritis is a type that can make children very ill indeed. They may become severely crippled. Their joints may 'freeze.' Happily, we can now demonstrate today that with proper treatment and care, most of the crippling caused by juvenile rheumatoid arthritis can be prevented."

But the cardinal point, Dr. Clark emphasizes, is that thousands of children have rheumatoid arthritis without knowing what the disease they suffer from really is. Their parents may dismiss the aching in neck, knees, wrists or elbows (or, more rarely, in all these joints simultaneously) as "growing pains"; or for a variety

of other reasons, the right diagnosis is not made.

"We now estimate that in the United States, more than 50,000 adults who suffer from rheumatoid arthritis had their actual onset of the disease in childhood," Dr. Clark added. "Had they received modern treatment at that time, most of the crippling in maturity could have been prevented. That's one reason why The National Foundation's program in arthritis and patient aid for the young is so significant."

Child victims of rheumatoid arthritis are estimated to total 30,000 in this country alone, with 16,000 a year ill enough to need medical care. About 5,000 or 6,000 of these may require treatment as intensive as the rehabilitation needed for those stricken by paralytic polio.

There are at least 11 millions in the nation today who suffer from some form of rheumatic disease, including arthritis. Rheumatoid arthritis victims

total about 1,500,000. The disease is the nation's No. 1 crippler.

To return to Christine, the little girl with the arm and shoulders turning into a stony element, she is receiving treatment at the March of Dimes-supported Arthritis Study Center at the University of Rochester School of Medicine—one of four National Foundation arthritis centers around the country. Her doctors hope they are slowing the advance of calcification but the outlook at this time is not certain.

Uncertainty, then, is the disquieting prospect facing this little girl. Her mother, Mrs. Eugene Versluis, hopes that if enough people support National Foundation research, perhaps in time Christine's right arm will fall back where it belongs and the stoniness will disappear; and that eventually the appalling figure of 30,000 children with crippling rheumatoid arthritis each year will decline.

## PERSONAL SAFETY IN AN ATOMIC AGE

The neutron bomb, they tell us, will not wreck buildings, but will destroy all life, easily penetrating concrete walls three feet thick. Yet we are being advised to build fall-out shelters for the safety of ourselves and our families. These can be erected for only a few hundred dollars—obviously not with walls three feet thick!

As General Mac Arthur has rightly said: "There is no security on this earth." No man can count on physical safety, for the simple reason that, apart from bombs and death rays, "it is appointed unto men once to die" (Heb. 9:27). The moment we are born we begin the race with death, and death always finally wins.

But physical safety is not most important after all. It is not so much death that men fear as the thought might usher them into the presence of God (Heb. 9:27; Rom. 14:12).

But even this need not be feared if we have "Peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:1). The Apostle Paul, once a self-righteous pharisee, had come to trust the Christ he had persecuted and now proclaimed: "This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief" (1 Tim. 1:15). Having thus been saved from sin by faith in Christ, he had no fear of death or of God. Indeed, he could say: "For, to me to live is Christ, and TO DIE IS GAIN" and "to depart and be with Christ . . . is FAR BETTER" (Phil. 1:21,23).

Why then, should we Christians shudder with fear at those things which are frightening others so? Our Lord said to His disciples: "I say unto you, My friends, Be not afraid of them that kill the body, but after that have no more that they can do" (Luke 12:4). No, the true believer in Christ need not fear, for he is safe in Christ, not only in this life, but forever. "He that believeth in the Son of God hath EVERLASTING LIFE" (John 3:36).
