Child's Arm Turns Hard, Stony; Medical Treatment Slows Process

nine and lives on the shores of Lake Ontario at Hilton, N.Y., is unable to straighten her right arm because of rheumatic disease.

Her arm and parts of both shoulders are becoming increasingly calcified, which means change of the muscle tissue into a hard stony substance.

This somber-faced child is the tragic victim of dermatomyositis, one of the forms of rheumatic disease. Another form is rheumatoid arthritis. The majority of people don't know that children suffer from arthritis; they believe mistakenly that arthritis affiicts only the aging—someone's grandfather or grandmother, surely not the very young.

But there is urgent reason today why grownups and parents especially should be intelligently informed about arthritis among children. Dr. William S. Clark, director of medical care of The National Foundation, whose expanded program embraces arthritis, birth defeets and continued work in polio, said this week:

"Rheumatoid arthritis is a type that can make children wery ill indeed. They may be-come severely crippled. Their joints may 'freeze.' Happily, we can now demonstrate today that with proper treatment and care, most of the crippling caused by juvenile rheumatoid arthritis can be prevented."

But the cardinal point, Dr. Clark emphasizes, is that thousands of children have rheumatoid arthritis without know-ing what the disease they suffer from really is. 



PERSONAL SAFETY IN AN ATOMIC AGE

The neutron bomb, they tell us, will not wreck buildings, but will destroy all life, easily penetrating concrete walls three feet thick. Yet we are being advised to build fall-out shelters for the safety of ourselves and our families. These can be erected for only a few hundred dollars-obviously not with walls three feet thick!

As General Mac Arthur has rightly said: "There is no security on this earth." No man can count on physical safety, for the simple reason that, apart from bombs and death rays, "it is appointed unto men once to die" (Heb. 9:27). The moment we are born we begin the race with death, and death always finally wins.

But physical safety is not most important after all. It is not so much death that men fear as the thought might usher them into the presence of God (Heb. 9:27; Rom. 14:12).

But even this need not be feared if we have "Peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:1). The Apostle Paul, once a self-righteous pharisee, had come to trust the Christ he had persecuted and now proclaimed: "This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief" (I Tim. 1:15). Having thus been saved from sin by faith in Christ, he had no fear of death or of God. Indeed, he could say: "For, to me to live is Christ, and TO DIE IS GAIN" and "to depart and be with Christ . . . is FAR BET-TER" (Phil. 1:21,23).

Why then, should we Christians shudder with fear at those things which are frightening others so? Our Lord said to His disciples: "I say unto you, My friends, Be not afraid of them that kill the body, but after that have no more that they can do" (Luke 12:4). No, the true believer in Christ need not fear, for he is safe in Christ, not only in this life, but or ever. "He that believeth in the Son of God hath EVER-ASTING LIFE" (John 3:36)




