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Elk City Rodeo To Open on Labor Day:

ELK CITY, Okla.—(Special)—The 24th annual Elk City Rodeo of Champions, to be highlighted by the appearances of television star Clu Gulager and extra added prizes, will get underway at 8 p.m. Labor Day, Sept. 3, and extend through September 5.
Gulager and Miss Rodeo America, Karen Lavens of Idaho, will head up a star-studded cast of professional attractions which will augment the regular rodeo contest.
The famous star of NBC-TV'S "Tall Man" series will ride in the opening night grand entry and Miss Rodeo will ride in the traditional parade.
The parade this year will be held at 4 p.m. Sept. 5, and will feature roundup clubs from all over the state and the Panhandle of Texas.
Float Entries in the parade are expected to be at an all-time high and reports indicate riding club entries will be bigger than last year.
Performers who will lend glamor to the billing include Frank Gil-

bert and his famed White Sock Jumpers, Ken Boren and his new Old Grey Mare, Junior Meeks and the Kajun Kid, clown and bull fighters.
Another highlight of the rodeo will be professional girls barrel racing and the event will attract top girl racers in the rodeo association.
An extra incentive for competing cowboys will be the presentation of saddles at the final performance to contestants making the highest scores in each of five events from three rodeos—the Elk City event, the Pampa, Tex., show and the Woodward rodeo.
Arena direction and stock for the \$3500 purse, three-night rodeo will be furnished by the Beutler Brothers, whose headquarters ranch is located four miles north of Elk City.
Cy Taillon, nationally known professional rodeo announcer, will emcee the show and Ruby Nance and his band of Oklahoma City will provide musical entertainment and background "sound effects."

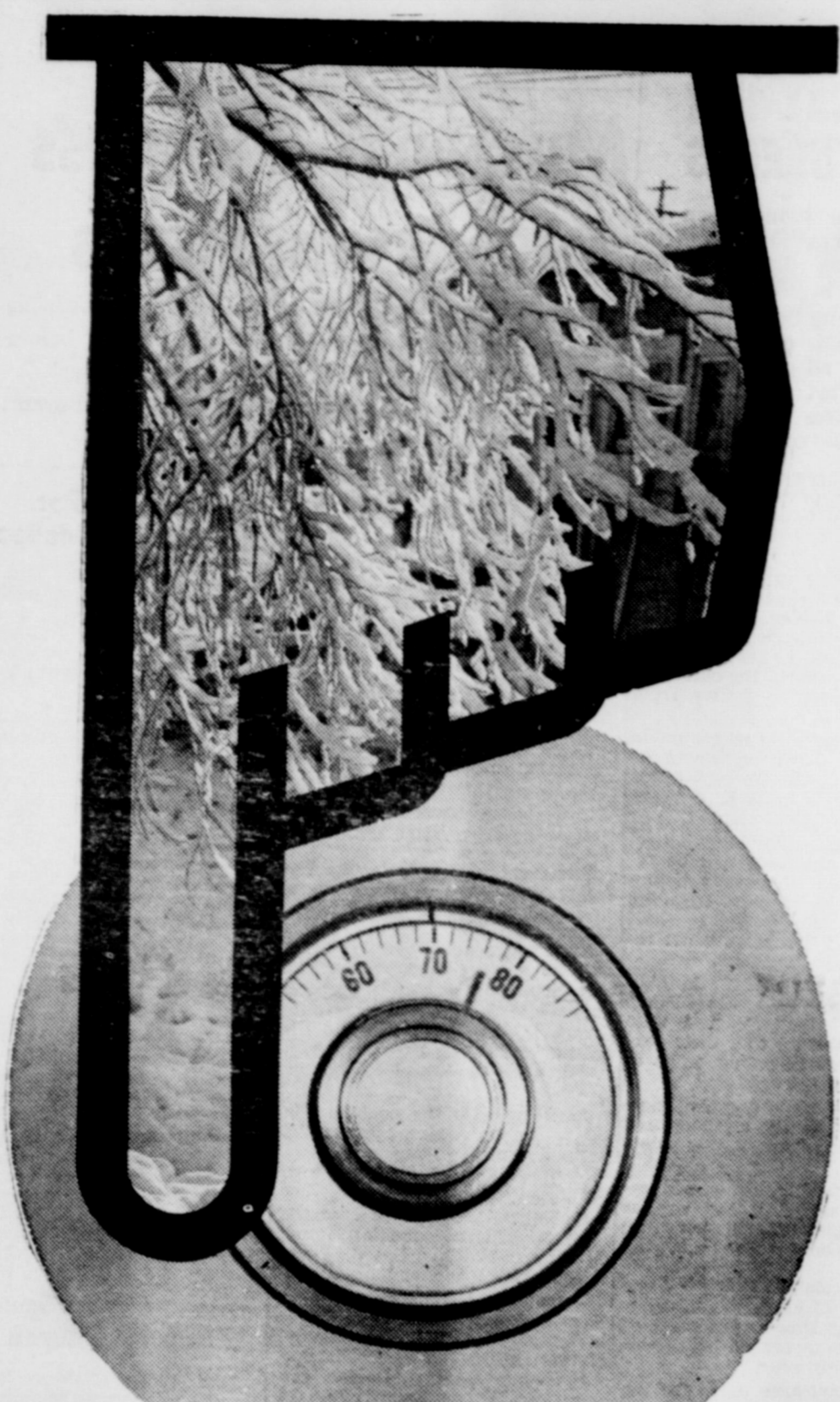

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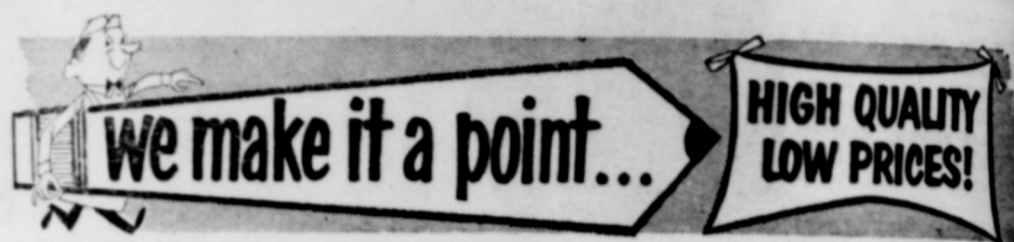
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ALL ABOUT YOUR SCHOOL

WHEELER COUNTY Soil Conservation News . . .

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District is gradually recovering from the heavy washing rains that fell during the last few months. Ditches across roads are being graded and filled in. Gullies in cropland have been plowed across and partly filled and covered up. Weeds and grass have gained a partial foothold in still other washes to partly hide their bare appearance. The gullies may have been covered up or hidden by now, but the fact remains that they valuable soil was lost. Now is the time to start planning on how to keep this washing from happening again during the next big rain.
 The personnel in the local Soil Conservation Service office are currently helping farmers and ranchers to plan and install conservation measures. Farm ponds have been completed on the Dean Tipps and Howard Caswell farms. Frank McDonald has built a terrace to control water. Milton Liles is in the process of having three seep-type ponds constructed for stock-water.

Boys Ranch Rodeo Is Scheduled For Labor Day Week

A new rodeo arena and a record number of contestants is expected to attract the largest number of people ever to visit the Cal Farley's Boys Ranch when the 300 boys now living there put on their 18th annual Boys Ranch rodeo Sept. 2 and 3, the Labor Day weekend.
 A total of 265 boys have registered as contestants in the nationally famous event that has become a Boys Ranch tradition, although all of the boys who make their home at the ranch will participate in some phase of the rodeo, only the best riders will be riding the professional rodeo animals that have been taken to the ranch for the occasion.
 Boys, from 5 to 17, will be competing for honors and prizes by riding calves, steers, Brahma bulls and bucking broncs.
Large Area
 To prepare for the crowd, the boys have been helping with the construction of the new and larger rodeo arena, located in the midst of shady cottonwood trees, south of the ranch picnic grounds.
 New chutes and corrals have been constructed to assure a fast-moving rodeo and bleachers have been elevated to provide an excellent view of the action for all of the spectators.
 The boys will be competing in two divisions, according to ages, and will ride under RCA rules. Clowns and trick riders will provide the color and excitement along with other special feature attractions.
 The Boys Ranch Rodeo is the biggest Labor Day weekend event of the Golden Spread area. Performances will be held at 2:30 on Sunday and Monday afternoons.
 Admission is 75c for children and \$1.50 for adults. Proceeds will go to help the Boys Ranch expansion program.

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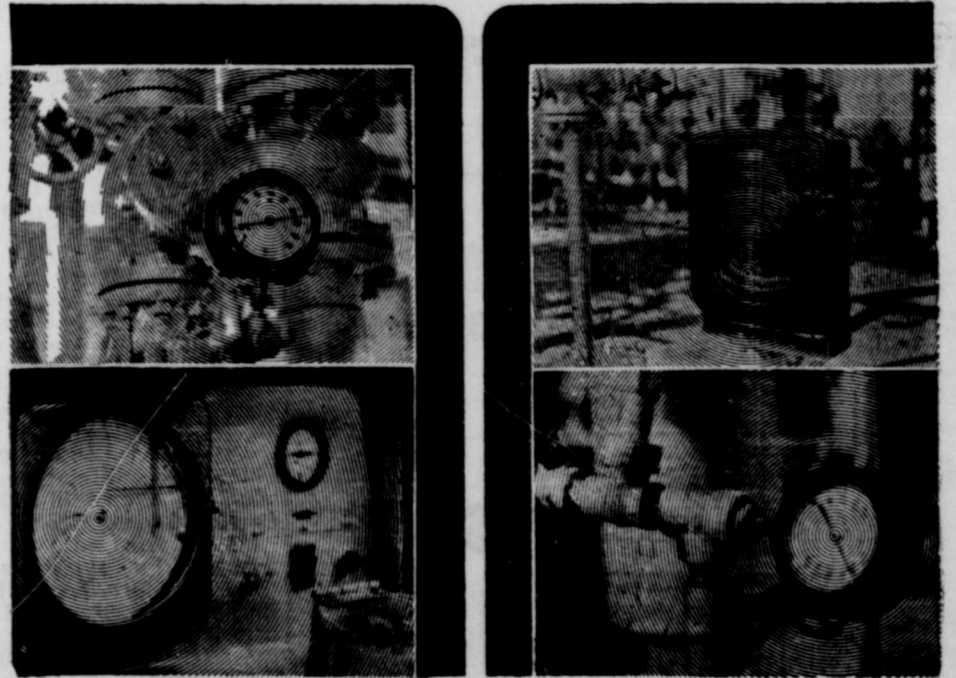

City Agent's Notes

CHARLES D. JACKSON

Farmers will vote in the August 30 election on wheat planting quotas which will apply for 1963 crop.

Referendum was announced by Secretary of Agriculture in accordance with law which makes such necessary more than 20 percent. The same situation now as existed in 1961, because emergency wheat program was enacted for the 1962 crop.

Directs that wheat allotments are to be used but at least two-thirds voters in the referendum vote quotas if they are to be next crop.

Referendum Quotas means, (1) in commercial wheat all farmers with more acres of wheat will be subject to quota penalties on their wheat except those who comply with the feed wheat provision. The parity price would be 45 percent of the parity price as of May 15, 1962.

(2) growers who comply with their allotments will be eligible for price support for price support of not less than 85 percent of the national basis. Approval of Marketing Quota will not be in effect until the 1963 wheat crop; (3) allotments will be used to determine price support of the wheat price support to be at 50 percent of parity, \$1.21 per bushel national average.

Who can vote are the farmers in the 39 commercial wheat counties who will harvest more than 100 bushels of wheat in the 1962 crop. These will be helpful to the referendum decision on the referendum.

Person that will have an income in 1963 crop of wheat as that is larger than fifteen percent of the total income. This owner, operator, cash tenant, or sharecropper in production of more than 15 ac wheat for harvest as grain.

May vote between the 8:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. August 30, 1962. Polling places will be set up on this date will be in the County Courthouse, Shamrock City Hall for communities D and E, Wheeler County A.S.C.S. office for communities B, and the Mobeetie Elevator communities C, as established by the Wheeler County A. Committee.

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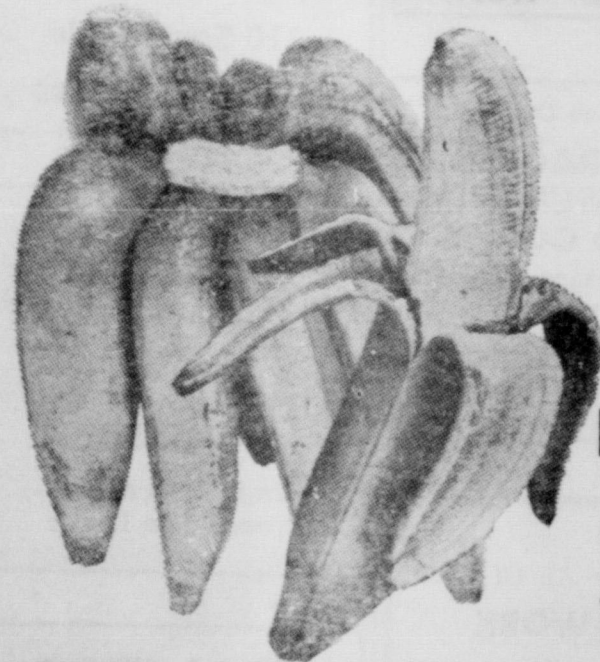
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
