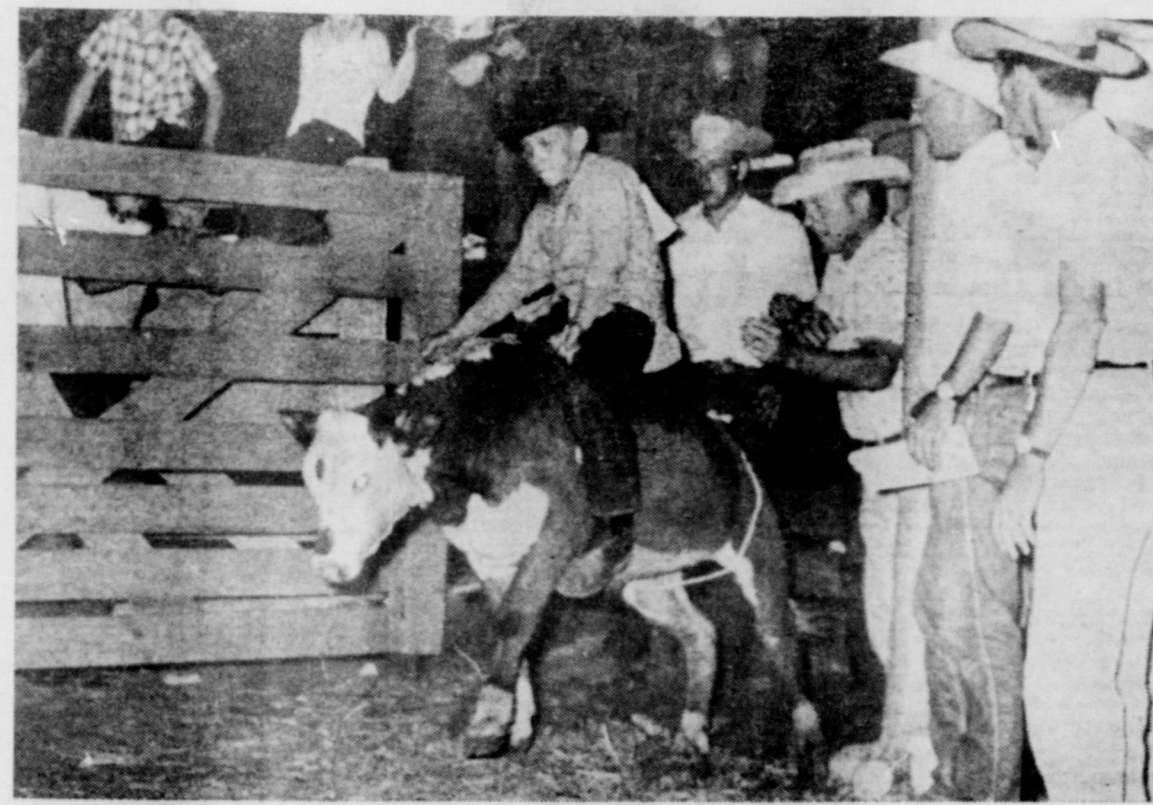
The decision was also reached at the meeting to consider colored athletes for all-star honors. In the past they have been unable to earn a birth on the all-star team.

LICENSE LAWS ARE EXPLAINED

Several times in the last two years applications for marriage license have had to postpone wedding days, in some instances where invitations had been mailed out, because they failed to make application for their marriage license in time to satisfy the law.

The law provides that if the male is 21 or above and the female is 18 or above, the marriage license may be issued immediately upon application to the County Clerk, provided each party can present documentary proof of age and has obtained a blood test from an approved state laboratory. The blood test is good for only 15 days — which means that only 15 days may elapse from the date the blood taken until the marriage is performed.

If one or both of the parties are under age when application is made, they must meet specifications above and in addition each minor must be accompanied by a parent or a legal guardian when application is made. The parent or guardian must appear before the County Clerk in person. After application is made there is what is known as a three-day waiting period for minors, but in complying with the waiting period the date application is made may not be counted and the date the license is issued cannot be counted, making in reality a FIVE-DAY WAITING PERIOD.

If you are planning a wedding, please allow time to conform to the law in making application for your license in order that you may not be disappointed.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin, Tex.—Texas has crossed the great divide of controversy and entered the field of general sales taxation.

To the central collection point for the operation of the state's business, this means some \$320,000,000 in the next two-year period.

To the individual taxpayer, the cost is unknown, but educated guesses already are being made. James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, has estimated it will cost the average Texas family \$25 to \$30 a year, "maybe less if they don't buy any furniture or home appliances."

With some exceptions the general sales tax will be two per cent on purchases of 25c or more.

Passage of the tax bill and the attending publicity caused many a man—and woman—on the street to suddenly realize that there already was a state sales tax on such things as cosmetics and appliances.

Actually, the sales tax bill was only part of the tax package handed down by the lawmakers. In addition to the \$320,000,000 estimated to come from this source, they passed a corporate franchise tax worth \$20,500,000. They increased drivers' license fees by \$7,250,000. They made a bookkeeping transfer of motor fuel tax funds totaling \$4,000,000. They also taxed dedicated gas reserves \$3,330,000. And they passed a bill designed to bring in some \$3,000,000 from abandoned property.

In addition, the Legislature previously had passed a tax on private clubs, calculated to raise some \$4,000,000.

Roughly, it is figured that all these things will cover the state's needs for the next two-year period, and provide for a school teacher's pay raise of \$810 a year.

Escheat Bill Omits Banks—Gov. Price Daniel won a partial victory in his long fight to tighten the state's escheat law. The law under which abandoned cash and property held by private business and industry is supposed to revert to the state.

After several attempts the Legislature passed a bill requiring institutions holding property to report it to the state. Banks, however, were exempt from the provisions of the bill, much to the dis-

may of Governor Daniel. "With everyone else covered," he said, "the banks cannot hold out much longer. The enforcement procedures should include banks and I shall continue to fight for this both as a principal and as a means for the state to obtain property it already owns under the present escheat law."

Problems At Gatesville—Recent breaks at the Gatesville School for boys and the death of an attendant beaten with a baseball bat, have focused attention on that institution which is without walls or barricades of any kind.

A delegation of attendants came to Austin, talked with Governor Daniel and complained that measures which they are allowed to take are too indefinite. They said no attendant is allowed to discipline inmates of the school. Sometimes the boys will mind and sometimes they will not.

Dr. James A. (Jack) Turman, executive director of the Texas Youth Council, told the men that changes were being made which would help. A maximum security unit is being built, a trade school is under contract, and a double maximum security fence is in the works for the worst offenders.

Legislative Council Swamped—Texas Legislative Council has been requested by the Legislature to look into a host of things which may require new laws.

One request asks a study of the adequacy of the present cattle brand inspection laws. It was pointed out that Texas, unlike many other western states, has no statewide brand registration system, relying on county by county registration which permits duplication of brands.

TLC also has been asked to look into the problem of job discrimination because of age; problems of urban mass transportation; and the feasibility of using state parks as evacuation centers in the event of enemy attack.

House Streamlines—The House of Representatives has voted to do away with more than a third of its committees in order to streamline its operations. House's 43 committees will be reduced in the 1963 session to 25 by combining several groups. Seniority would determine the membership of one fourth of each committee.

Texas Business Good—Business activity in Texas dropped three percent in June, from an all time high in May, reports the UT Bureau of Business Research. But it still was seven per cent above the level of one year ago.

June activity also was the second highest for any month since the bureau began computing in 1935.

Prospects are fine for good business conditions to extend well into 1962. This partially as a result of the expanded arms program, resulting from the Berlin situation.

However, the agency said there is a possibility of inflation plaguing the economy again.

State Guard Strength Reported—With the possibility of calling up the National Guard for active duty, Adjutant General James E. Taylor has been furnished a report on the active strength of the Texas State Guard—1,534 officers and enlisted men in active reserve units, and 218 officers is the ready reserve unassigned.

Corps has a total authorized strength of 10,000, when mobilized to full table of organization. All officers and men in this Service serve without compensation and provide their own uniforms.

The State Guard is subject to being called by the Governor for internal security service.

Insurance Board Member Resigns—Dr. Robert W. Strain has resigned as a member of the State Board of Insurance. He is to become executive secretary of the National Association of Insurance Agents. With 100,000 members it is one of the largest trade organizations in the country.

Governor Daniel said of Strain's work on the board: "Dr. Strain's term on the board has been marked by fine progress in the administration of the insurance laws, and he has made lasting contributions to the State of Texas in this field. He has served with distinction and great ability in a highly important position."

Strain joined the board in March of 1958. Formerly he was an associate professor of insurance at the University of Texas.

Collegeians Urged To Stay With It—Colonel Morris Schwartz, State Director of Selective Service, has advised college students to stay with their studies and not be disturbed by increased draft calls.

He predicted no change in the present policy of not drafting anyone under the age of 22, "at least in the foreseeable future," and said

college students will be considered for scholastic deferment, and likely will be deferred if they are full-time students making passing grades.

He reported Texas draft boards currently have more than 8,000 college students deferred on the basis of education.

Teachers Honor Newspapers—Ten Texas newspapers were honored for public service by The Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association at a meeting in Austin.

Awards went to the Marshall News - Messenger, the Bovina Blade, The Midland Reporter-Telegram, the Colorado County Citizen at Columbus, The Clay County Leader at Henrietta, the Weatherford Daily Herald, the Fredericksburg Standard, the Clifton Record, the Dayton News and the Raymondville Chronicle.

Three Varieties Of Wheat Being Tested

Three popular varieties of wheat are being used in a milling quality test, comparing the quality of irrigated wheat with that of dryland at the High Plains Research Foundation. The purpose is to determine whether milling quality can be maintained at a high level under irrigated conditions. Dryland wheat is favored by bakers because of its consistently high milling quality.

Aztec, Comanche and Wichita were the varieties being grown in the test. Delbert Langford, associate agronomist of the Foundation, stated that this is a co-operative test with Dr. I. M. Atkins of Texas A.&M. and that Mr. Paschal Scottino of the Bakery School, Arlington State College is analyzing the samples.

The irrigated plots were fertilized with 60 pounds nitrogen, 90 pounds phosphate, and 30 pounds potash. They were irrigated three times during the growing season a total of 12 inches. The same varieties on the dryland plots received no fertilizer or irrigation.

The dryland yields were: Wichita, 37.7 bu.; Comanche, 36.2 bu.; and Aztec, 32.0 bu. Irrigated yields were: Comanche, 55.7 bu.; Aztec, 55.4 bu.; and Wichita, 50.7 bu.

Tasosca, although not included in the milling quality determinations was grown side by side with the other varieties and yielded 49.4 bu. dryland and 84.5 bu. irrigated.

Flame Cultivation To Be Observed

All phases of flame cultivation research will be observed by visitors on August 23 at the High Plains Research Foundation. The special tour is being sponsored by the Texas Butane Dealers Association. Murice Bell, Donna, Texas is President of the Association and Bill Lawson, Austin, is the Executive Secretary.

Local hosts to the farmers and dealers throughout the state will be Fred Garrison, District Director of the Association, and Bill Taylor, who was instrumental in starting the research projects, both of Plainview; and J. L. "Red" West, Petersburg, Past State President of the Association.

During the afternoon tour, the staff at the Foundation will distribute the results of flaming on various crops including cotton, grain sorghum, corn, soybeans, sesame, castor beans, sugar beets, and other vegetables.

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director of the Foundation, in announcing the date, said that he joined the Association is extending an invitation to all interested in flame cultivation.

Communist "Peace"

There is much talk in the churches and throughout America today about the prospects for peace. There is plenty of reason to doubt that one out of every thousand Americans entering into these discussions understands the communist concept of "peace." It means something entirely different than what the word means to us.

The most elementary fact about Communism is the deep-seated belief of communist conspiracy leaders that there can be no peace until freedom is destroyed and a world-wide communist dictatorship established. The communist conspiracy's concept of peace was declared bluntly by William Z. Foster in the August 1954 issue of the conspiracy's official monthly, Political Affairs. Foster told the communists that the sole road to "peace" was in the abolition of "imperialism", and above all "American imperialism". By this he means the abolition of freedom and establishment of the communist dictatorship of the proletariat in the United States.

To the communists, the Soviet Union with its vast slave camps, its cruel Secret Police, and its fear-ridden, suffering millions, is the "peace camp".

They say that free enterprise or capitalism, as they always call it, is "war-like". In the March, 1951, Political Affairs, Gus Hall said, "... under capitalism the danger of war is ever present." In the July, 1959 issue of this communist publication, William Z. Foster said that the communist-enslaved

nations were "peace-loving" and their very structure "to abolish war." Dr. Fred Schwartz effectively described the communist concept of peace as follows: "Peace to the Communist, is total victory... the Communist or Proletariat class is the peaceful class. There is no action that they can do which is not a peaceful action. If they shoot you, it is with a peaceful gun; they put a peaceful bullet into your war-like brain; they give you a peaceful death and they bury you in a peaceful grave. When the forces of Communism advance... littering the field with dead, what is it? The advance of the forces of peace. The Communists are utterly dedicated to peace. When they say they stand for peace, they can say it with the utmost sincerity, because peace, according to their system of thought and definition, is total Communist victory."

In the September issue of Political Affairs the communists were told that "peace" was the paramount issue in American life and called for "labor" to "lead in the fight for peace." Americans, do not be deceived by a communist-inspired "peace" propaganda which calls for further appeasement of Communism. Each surrender to them only calls for more surrenders, all in the name of "peace."

Accidents Investigated During July In County

The Highway Patrol investigated 4 accidents on Rural Highways in Wheeler County during the month of July, according to Sgt. E. G. Allibers Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and a property damage of \$2,100.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Wheeler County from January through July 1961 shows a total of 35 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 26 persons injured and four persons killed. The estimated property damage amounted to \$28,225.00. This compares with the first seven months of 1960's total of 35 rural crashes injuring 24 people, killing one person and causing an estimated property damage of \$16,735.00.

"Prior to August 1, throughout the state of Texas, there had been a total of 974 fatal crashes resulting in 1214 persons losing their lives needlessly," the Sgt. stated. This compares with 929 fatal crashes and 1134 lives lost for the same period in 1960. Therefore, in 1961 there have been 45 form fatal crashes resulting in 80 more lives lost, or a 7% increase.

With the summer vacation period in its final months and Labor Day approaching, many thousands of people will be crowding in their final visit, outing, etc., before their children start back to school. This means many people will be trying to travel too far in a short time. Many will be carefree and careless in their driving.

The Sgt. listed some fact about last year's Labor Day Weekend and some suggestions to remedy this. There were 22 fatal crashes resulting in 30 smashed out lives over the 1960 three-day Labor Day Weekend. In order to arrive at your destination start in plenty of time to allow for delays along the way. Give the right of way, don't take it. Be prepared for the other driver's actions; if he can't or won't stop at an intersection, you can. Remember, drive with caution so as not to arrive in a coffin!

Several times in the last two years applicants for marriage licenses have had to postpone weddings, in some instances where invitations had been mailed out, because they failed to make application for their marriage license in time to satisfy the law.

The law provides that if the male is 21 or above and the female is 18 or above, the marriage license may be issued immediately upon application to the County Clerk, provided each party can present documentary proof of age and has obtained a blood test from an approved state laboratory. The blood test is good for only 15 days — which means that only 15 days may elapse from the date the blood is taken until the marriage is performed.

If one or both parties are under age when application is made, they must meet the specifications above and in addition each minor must be accompanied by a parent or a legal guardian when application is made. The parent or guardian must appear before the County Clerk in person. After application is made there is what is known as a three-day waiting period for minors, but in complying with the waiting period law the date application is made may not be counted and the date the license is issued cannot be counted, making in reality a FIVE-DAY WAITING PERIOD.

If you are planning a wedding, please allow time to conform to the law in making application for your license in order that you may not be disappointed.

THE LOVE OF GOD

Millions of people—even religious people—are afraid of God and are struggling to earn His favor. They suppose that salvation is the reward of showing enough love to Him.

If only they would believe what God Himself says: that we are ever saved it will be entirely because HE LOVED US and graciously provided for our salvation.

The Apostle Paul in the Bible, called God "THE GOD OF LOVE" (II Cor. 13:11) and John declared that "GOD IS LOVE" (I John 4:8). Thus John goes on to say: "HEREIN IS LOVE, NOT THAT WE LOVED GOD, BUT THAT HE LOVED US and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins" (I John 4:10).
