There is much talk in the churches and throughout America today about the prospects for peace. There is plenty of reason to doubt that one out of every thousand Americans entering into these discussions understands the communist concept of "peace." It means something entirely different than what the word means to us.

The most elementary fact

about Communism is the deep-

seated belief of communist conspiracy leaders that there can be no peace until freedom is destroyed and a world-wide communist dictatorship established. The communist conspiracy's concept of peace was declared bluntly by William Z. Foster in the August 1954 issue of the conspiracy's official monthly, Political Affairs. Foster told the communists that the sole road to "peace" was in the abolition of "imperialism", and above all "American imperialism". By this he means the abolition of freedom and establishment of the communist dictatorship of the proletariat in the United States.

To the communists, the Soviet Union with its vast slave camps, its cruel Secret Police, and its fear-ridden, suffering millions, is the "peace camp". They say that free enterprise or capitalism, as they always call it, is "war-like". In the March, 1951. Political Affairs, Gus Hall said, "... under capitalism the danger of war is ever present." In the July. 1959 issue of this communist publication, William Z. Foster said that the communist-enslaved

nations were "peace-loving their very structure" and th their role was "to abolish war Dr. Fred Schwartz effectiv

described the communist co cept of peace as follows: "Peac to the Communist, is total v tory . . . the Communist Proletariat class is the peace class. There is no action the they can do which is not peaceful action. If they she you, it is with a peaceful gur they put a peaceful bullet in your war-like brain; they giv you a peaceful death and the bury you in a peaceful grave When the forces of Commun China advance ... littering the field with dead, what is it? The advance of the forces of peac The Communists are utter dedicated to peace. When the say they stand for peace, the can say it with the utmost sir cerity, because peace, accordi to their system of thought an definition, is total Commun victory."

In the September issue Political Affairs the communi were told that "peace" was th paramount issue in America life and called for "labor" "lead in the fight for peace. Americans, do not be deceive by any communist-inspire "peace" propaganda which cal for further appeasement Communism. Each surrender them only calls for more su renders, all in the name "peace."

Several times in the last two years applicants for marriage licenses have had to postpone weddings, in some instances where invitations had been mailed out, because they failed to make application for their marriage license in time to satisfy the law.

The law provides that if the male is 21 or above and the female is 18 or above, the marriage license may be issued immediately upon application to the County Clerk, provided each party can present documentary proof of age and has obtained a blood test from on approved state laboratory. The blood test is good for only 15 days - which means that only 15 days may elapse from the date the blood is taken until the marriage is performed.

If one or both parties are under age when application is made, they must meet the specifications above and in addition each minor must be accompanied by a parent or a legal guardian when application is made. The parent or guardian must appear before the County Clerk in person. After application is made there is what is known as a three-day waiting period for minors, but in complying with the waiting period law the date application is made may not be counted and the date the license is issued cannot be counted, making in reality a FIVE-DAY WAITING PERIOD.

If you are planning a wedding, please allow time to conform to the law in making application for your license in order that you may not be disappointed.
