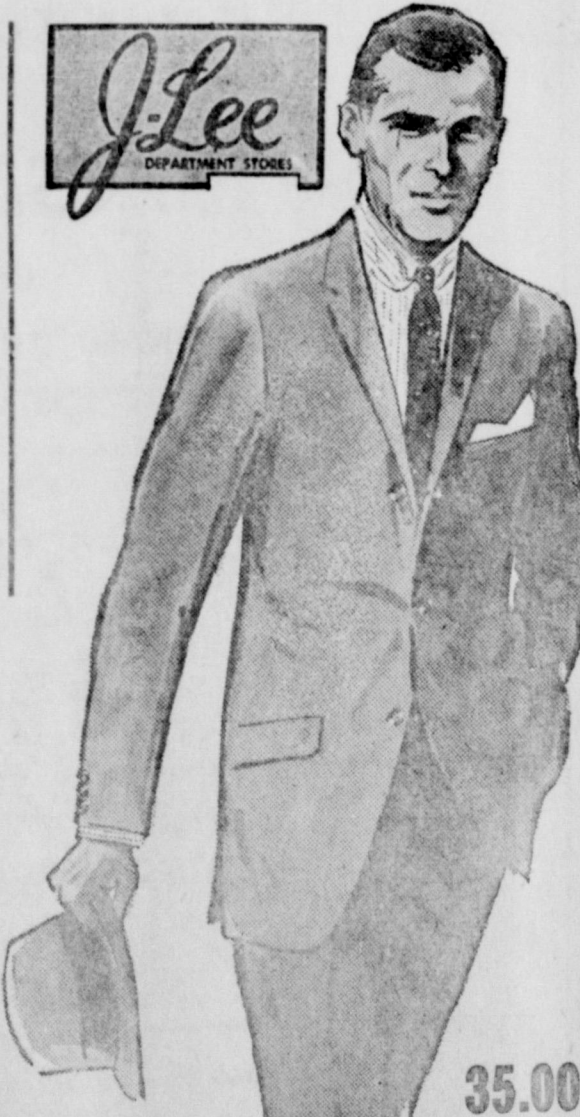

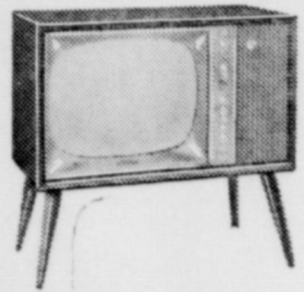

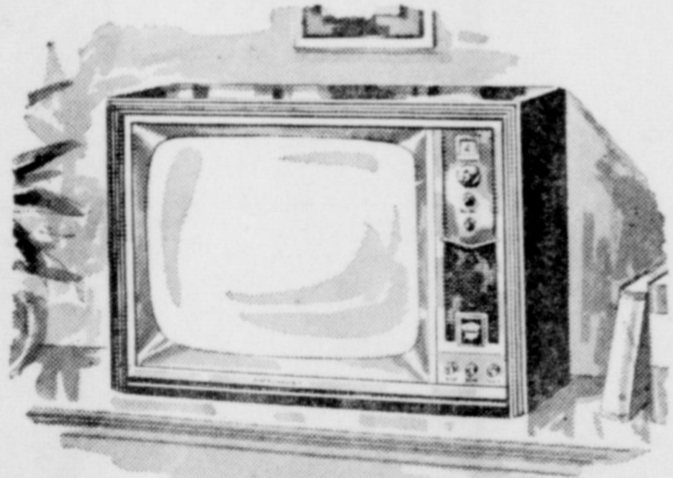

OLD ISSUE OF TIMES TELLS OF BIG FIRE; WHEELER FOOTBALL

Mrs. Annie Sivage brought the Times a copy of the Wheeler News Review published December 30, 1920. We appreciated it and would like to share with you some interesting bits of information we read.

Big Fire, South Side of the Square

About fifteen minutes after twelve o'clock on the night of December 22nd the people of Wheeler were aroused by the cry of "Fire! Fire!". The buildings on the south side of the square were in flames and by the time the bucket brigade was formed the fire had gained such headway that it could not be checked until it reached the brick building occupied by W. E. Pennington and Son with their dry goods and grocery business.

Three buildings which housed the Hall Drug Company, Happy Hour Theatre, The Wheeler News-Review and Lotts Barber and Shoe Shop were completely destroyed.

Christmas Day the football teams of Wheeler and Wellington met on the local gridiron in a football contest that was the best exhibition of real football that this place has ever witnessed. The game resulted in a tie of 6-6.

The Wheeler lineup was: Roy Smith, fullback; Dick Craig, left half; Buck Britt, right half; Tom Hall, quarterback; Frank Breeding, left end; J. D. Kutch, left tackle; Dan Sanders, left guard.

Perry Morris, center; Stanley Green, right guard; Paul Green, right tackle; Bob Holt, right end; Buck Britt went through the line for a touchdown, his interference was run by Dick Craig.

We are so proud of the new stage cyclorama and other items modernizing our gym facilities for programs and plays. This project has been headed by the Thursday Review Club. If you haven't seen it, be sure to visit our gym soon, and take a good look. Clubs and P.T.A. who have not yet contributed to the project are encouraged to consider doing so before January 1st when the balance owed will be due.

Our regular in-service faculty meeting on Wednesday afternoon disclosed that our teachers feel that some progress is being made in improving our students' reading, writing, speaking and listening abilities. Some of the students are still very weak in these areas, and we all need to continue our very best efforts in helping them to improve. Some of our research shows that more failures occur in the first, second and seventh and eighth grades. These later failures lead directly to a drop-out rate that is nearly 40% of our high school boys and girls. This group which doesn't graduate constitutes one of our greatest public school problems. The solution is to help them much earlier in their school life to have a better knowledge of the fundamentals. These basic skills, we think, are Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Speaking and Listening. These are the tools with which we solve the problems of life.

Control Peach Bacterial Spots By Spraying Now

It is about time to spray peach trees to control bacterial spot. Dr. Harlin E. Smith, Extension plant pathologist at Texas A&M College says the chemicals should be applied soon after the first killing frost.

Disease symptoms appear on leaves in the spring as pale green tissue tears away from the healthy part, giving a "shot hole" effect. Leaf infection causes serious loss of leaves. This weakens the tree and makes it more susceptible to other diseases.

Fruit is also affected. The affected peaches bear small, circular sunken spots which later crack. These cracks provide another place of entry for the brown spot organism.

Small suggestions applying four pounds of copper sulfate per 100 gallons of water followed the same day by a spray containing 4 pounds of hydrated lime in 100 gallons of water. The second spray is essential in order to neutralize the effects of the copper on the tree.

For further information about this or other fruit diseases, pick up a copy of MP-283, "Peach and Plum Diseases," at the county agent's office, Wheeler, Texas.

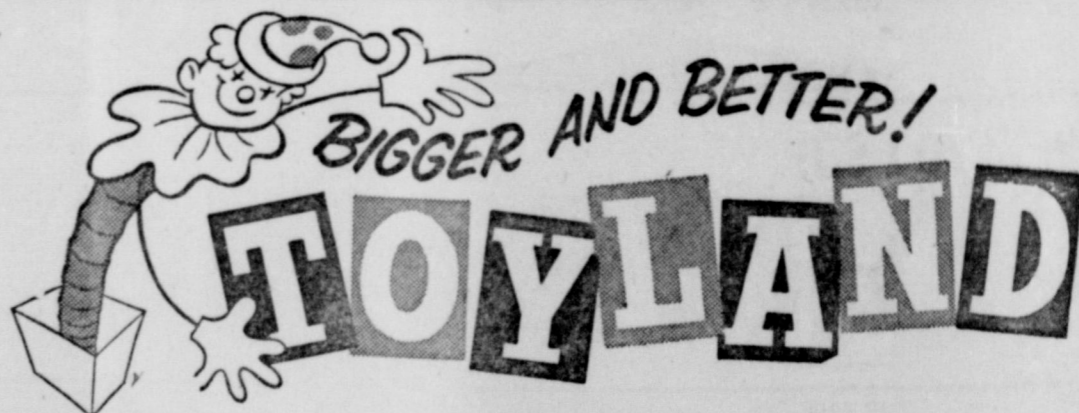
