Funeral services for Clara Eva Guest were held at the Methodist Church in Wheeler, November 23 at 2:30 p.m. Rev. Robert Ely, pastor, officiating and was assisted by Rev. Frank Ross and Minister Robert Frahm.

Clara Eva Ladd was born Feb. 25, 1880 at Birmingham, Ala., and died Nov. 20, 1962 at Shamrock at the age of 82 years, nine months and 25 days.

After undergoing surgery in July, 1962, Mrs. Guest never regained her full strength. She became seriously ill Monday evening and was taken to Shamrock General Hospital where she passed away Tuesday at 7:10 p.m.

She was married to Sam Guest on Nov. 2, 1895 at Covington, Hill County, Texas. They first moved to Greer County then filed a claim on land six miles from Guyton, Okla. They moved to Shamrock in 1913 and then five miles southwest of Shamrock where they resided from 1917 to 1934. They moved to San Antonio and lived there until Mr. Guest passed away in 1941. Since that time she has made her home with her children at Wheeler, Wichita Falls, Dallas, San Antonio and Harlingen.

During her active life she was a devoted housewife and mother and member of the Bible Baptist Church at San Antonio.

Among survivors are two sons, Jack (Guest of Harlingen) and Jess (Guest of Oklahoma City); five daughters, Mrs. Nora Watson of Wheeler, Mrs. Pauline Cavonah of Dallas, Mrs. Frances Hooper of Dallas, Mrs. Gertrude Flick of Wichita Falls, and Mrs. Bell Simpson of San Antonio.

One sister, Mrs. Fannie Maner of Wheeler; 19 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

Her husband, two sons, four brothers and two sisters preceded her in death.

Serving as pall bearers were Archie Hibler, Harry Wofford, James Verdier, Robert Holt, Bas Freeman and Jim Montgomery.

Interment was in the Shamrock cemetery by Kirk Funeral Home.

LAST RITES HELD FOR KENNICOTT

Funeral services for Herbert Clinton Kennicott, better known in Wheeler as "Doc", were conducted Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. at the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. Frank Ross, officiating.

Mr. Kennicott had resided in Wheeler 11 years and had been employed as a pharmacist at the Wheeler Drug during that time. He first became ill in 1960 and spent some time in the VA Hospital at Amarillo. Since January, 1961 he had lived at a rest home in Wellington where he passed away November 26 at 6:15 a.m.

He was born Dec. 10, 1886 in Illinois and at the time of his death he was 75 years, 11 months and 16 days of age.

As a pharmacist, Mr. Kennicott held license from Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Missouri and Texas. He served as a state photographer at Yosemite Park from 1928 to 1929 and at Carlisle Cadavers from 1929 to 1945.

He served in the armed forces during World War I and was a member of the Baptist Church. He was married to Helen Bruden at Butler, Mo., on Dec. 20, 1919. She preceded him in death Oct. 12, 1945.

There are no known surviving relatives. Serving as pall bearers were E. J. Holt, Jr., Harry Wofford, Dennis Porter, Harrison Hall, Mari Jaco and Murray Sanders.

Interment was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Kirk Funeral Home.

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

Even though the screwworm season is past in Wheeler County I know that livestock producers are interested in the latest information on Co-Ral.

Most of you are aware of difficulties which have been encountered with the use of certain lots of Co-Ral. Certain lots produced during the summer contained small amounts of tetraethyl dithionophosphate ("sulfoTEPP" or sulfur TEPP). This material in conjunction with the Co-Ral produced toxic effects including deaths among treated animals. If there is any doubt about the safety of any lot of Co-Ral it should be returned to the place of purchase. According to Chemagro Corporation all lots of Co-Ral being manufactured at the present time are tested chemically and biologically to insure that the material is safe before it is released.

Label registrations for the use of Co-Ral as an 0.5% spray and as an 0.25% dip have been withdrawn. Consequently, Co-Ral should no longer be used at these rates on livestock. Containers used to package new production will carry labels that have been altered to remove instructions for the use of Co-Ral at the higher dosage levels (0.5% spray and 0.25% dip).

Co-Ral can still be used as an 0.25% spray or an 0.125% dip. The 0.25% spray will provide adequate screwworm protection and control as well as control of lice, ticks and horn flies. Korlan applied as an 0.5% spray will also provide screwworm protection and control as well as lice and horn fly control.

Spraying for preventive screwworm control continues to be of the utmost importance particularly in the present fly release area where treatment of animals and the release of sterile flies are the primary tools to eradicate screwworms.

Sprays of 0.5% Korlan should be used for preventive screwworm control until supplies of adequately tested Co-Ral are available. After this time either Co-Ral or Korlan may be used.
