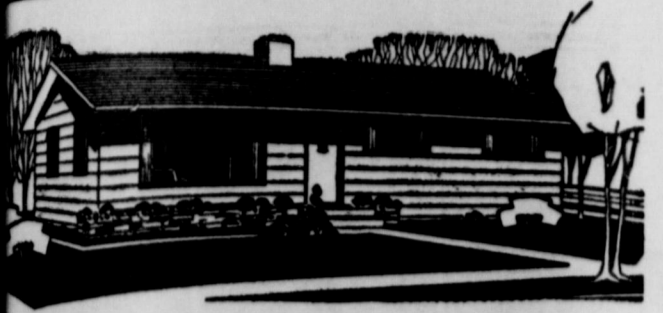

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to such person by the county and State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

Section 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Section 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 61 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties, or all or part of the district of any included city, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

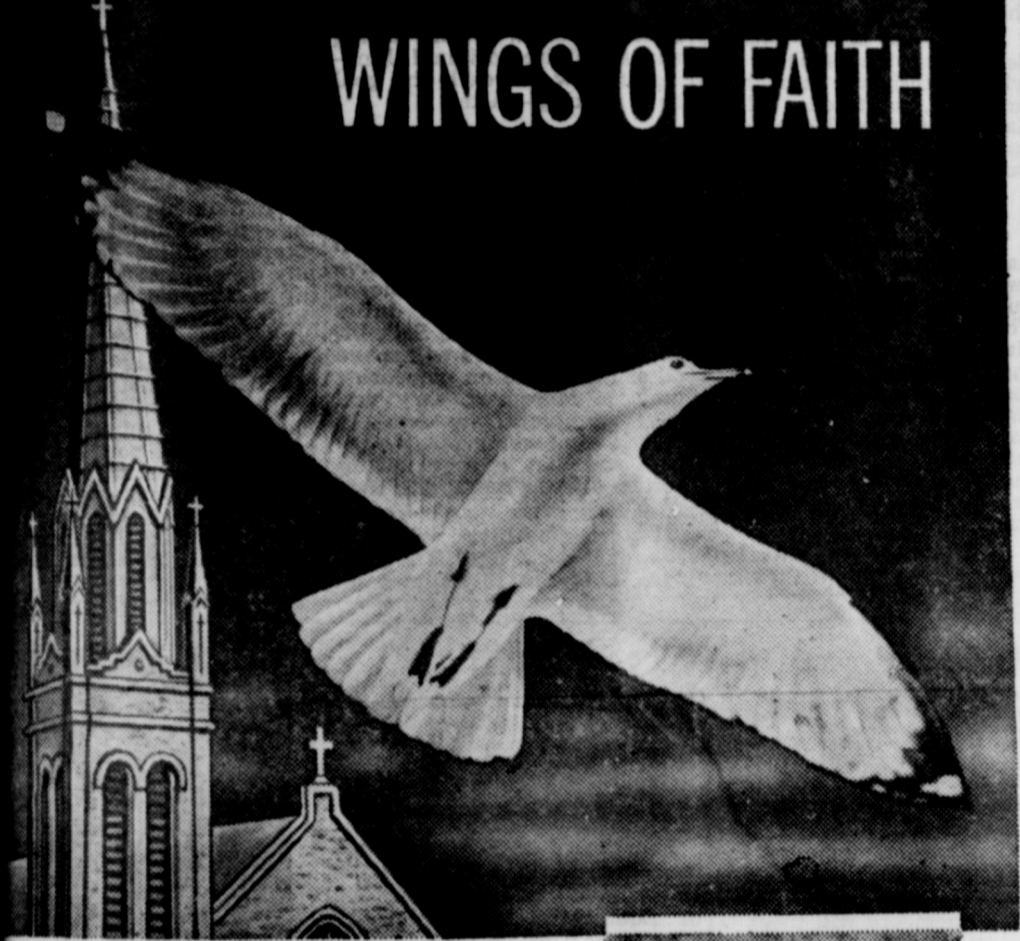
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows: "Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its newly inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers electing to vote at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district. "Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

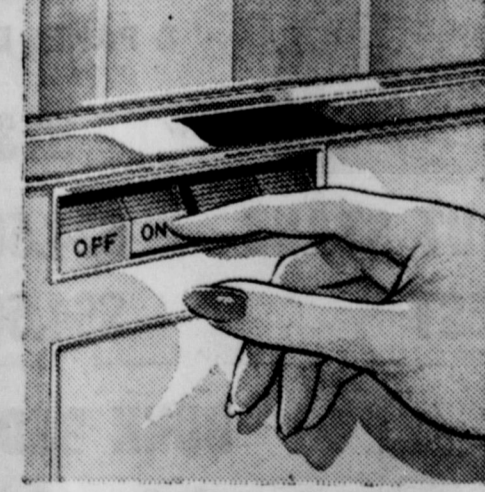

WHEELER COUNTY Soil Conservation News . . .

Several good farm ponds have been built lately. Ruth DeWolf and Howard Caswell of Wheeler have built large ponds that will serve as livestock water, recreation, and control some flooding.

Good seep-type ponds have been built on the Gierhart and Adkins farm at Shamrock. C. A. Means at Twitty, E. J. Pannell and Jack Finsterwald at Briscoe, Paul Shumate and R. H. Lacy at Wheeler, H. B. Krug at Kelton and Bob Douglas at Shamrock have recently built new field terraces. Several people have plans to build terraces on wheatland this month. Interest is still good for obtaining the Sweetwater Creek Watershed control project. The owners on the Sweetwater Creek are being contacted for increased land protection practices. New Soil Conservation District agreements with new farm plans have been developed for Warren Thompson, R. R. Watson, Gwyn Edwards, E. J. Pannell and Paul Shumate. All of them are on the Sweetwater Watershed. Erosion control structures, range seeding, brush control, and conservation cropping systems are the main conservation treatment needs for Sweetwater Watershed treatment.

CROP RESIDUE USE

Farmers and ranchers of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District are to be commended for their crop residue management this year. The District Supervisors are especially proud of the fact that very little stubble was burned this year. The past sandstorm season was held to a minimum because of the cover on the land.

The main value of good crop residue use is what it does for the cropland. The decaying organic matter returns some of the chemicals used in producing the crop. The intake of rainfall is increased. Evaporation of moisture is reduced. All of the benefits added together gives the operator a better income now and for the future.

Several methods of managing crop residues have proven to be good. The stubble mulching tools do the best for small grain. Leaving sorghum stubble standing until about April 15 gives the best wind erosion control. Stalk cutters or shredders to get the residue to decay on or near the surface gives the best use to the soil and to the next growing crop. The practice of spreading residues such as cottonbolls on the land in the fall is paying off big on a lot of farms. The use of the small grain green manure crops in cotton and sorghum crops on some farms east of Wheeler has really paid off. The Soil Conservation District Supervisors of Wheeler County District hope to see more green manure crops planted this fall.

Historical Survey Committee Meets Aug. 18 in Amarillo

Wheeler and 43 other Panhandle counties will be represented at a meeting of historical survey committees in Amarillo on Aug. 18.

Dr. Rupert L. Richardson of Abilene, president of the Texas state historical survey committee said the session is to begin with a noon luncheon in the Vic Mon Motel.

Members of the Wheeler County historical survey committee are: Mrs. H. M. Wiley, Wheeler, Mrs. Grady Harris and Mrs. J. M. Hawthaway, Mobeetie; Mrs. Frankie Stanley, Mrs. A. R. Hugg, Mrs. Lillie Trostle and Mrs. J. B. Harvey, all of Shamrock.

"All county historical survey committee members, members of county historical associations and other people interested in historical preservation are urged to attend," Dr. Richardson said.

"We want this meeting to be a re-awakening of interest in historical preservation in the Panhandle," he added. "It will also afford the opportunity to discuss the coordination of all our efforts."

This will be the fifth regional meeting the Texas state historical survey committee has held this year.

Three Wheeler volunteer firemen attended the annual Fire School at Texas A and M College the past week, and as a result local residents will get five percent credit on their fire insurance premiums during the next year.

Thurman Rives, one of the firemen attending the special courses, discussed the school at Monday's Kiwanis Club luncheon.

Rives explained that the key insurance rate is reduced when a city is represented at the school held yearly at Texas A and M.

Attending from Wheeler were Rives, Bob Patterson and Bob McNeil.

More than 2,000 firemen from some 15 states and foreign countries enrolled for the school.

R. J. Holt, Jr., Wheeler fire chief invited all interested residents to visit the department on any meeting night and learn more about the firemen's activities.

Five representatives of the Pampa Kiwanis Club attended Monday's luncheon.

FOOD FREEZING PROGRAM IS WELL ATTENDED HERE

The program sponsored by the county extension foods and nutrition committee July 26 "Food Freezing—the newest Methods was well attended.

Seventy-five people were registered by Mrs. Doyle Standlee, member of the committee and Mrs. Watson Burgess, wife of the manager of the Southwestern Public Service, Wheeler.

Mrs. Cula Nowlin, county home demonstration agent welcomed the guests and expressed hope that each one would take advantage of the educational help the county extension personnel office could and would give to them if they wanted it.

She also expressed appreciation of their interest shown by their presence at the program at that time.

Mrs. Gordon Whitener, also a member of the foods and nutrition committee, introduced Watson Burgess, who had charge of the arrangements for the equipment and building. He presented the district home service director of Southwestern Public Service, Amarillo, Miss Murriel Bridges, Amarillo, Mildred Prince, home service advisor of the Pampa office.

They presented the uses and advantages of home freezers. Mrs. Prince showed a colorful slide set explaining how to use a freezer to an advantage with 43 different food items prepared and served from the freezer.

Demonstrations were given on how to prepare and package vegetables, using green beans as a product. Fruits, by syrup method, using peaches were prepared and packaged. Also strawberries with the syrup method were packaged. The drug store fold was demonstrated on the packaging of meats. It was explained this method had

the natural moisture and flavor of the product to its maximum.

Packaging and wrapping materials were shown, giving the uses and advantages of each.

A complete freezer meal was displayed from the freezer, including a picnic meal stored in a stock pot in one piece. Many other items as salads, cakes, peas and casseroles were also displayed.

Mrs. Nowlin gave pointer on the necessity of using fresh products to freeze to consume the food value in them. The preparation methods are important as they determine the natural quality, fresh flavor, color and texture of frozen foods.

The way they are handled from the freezer to the table makes a difference in the food value present for consumption.

Burgess presented the door prizes which were donated by Southwestern Public Service Co., electric clock; H&B Appliance, electric percolator; Nash Appliance, center piece of artificial fruit. These merchants also furnished the freezers for display and use during this program.

Refreshments from the freezer of grape ice and cookies were furnished by Southwestern Public Service. Grape ice was served from the punch bowl by Mrs. Lee Kiker, chairman of the county extension foods and nutrition committee.

The Extension offices in the county court house are for use of residents who are invited to call on your county home demonstration agent for educational help in foods and nutrition anytime. The frozen foods material may be picked up at any time at the office, persons may call if they would like to have this information.

CANCER CRUSADE CHAIRMAN IS COMMENDED FOR CAMPAIGN

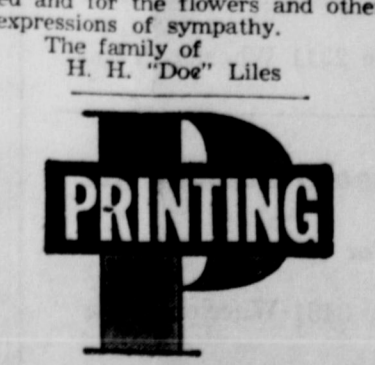

Dr. Salk Coins A Word: Bionauts

"Super stars" of science will make up the research team of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies.

Dr. Jonas Salk, who will direct the Institute at San Diego, Calif., quite often draws analogies between sports and science.

He once said, modestly referring to his historic role in developing the polio vaccine, that "I just happened to be in the right place to catch a long forward pass."

Today he might select another sport and say that the Institute faculty members are the Mickey Mantles of science—they can hit home runs from either side of the plate. Dr. Salk points out that in recruiting his Institute Fellows he searched for and found versatile scientists "who have all been trained in a field other than that in which they are working today."

Varied Abilities
They possess more than one skill or field of knowledge. They are not limited to biology. Some of the 10 Fellows already appointed are equally at home in higher mathematics and physics, or history and literature.

This unique combination of professional skills, versatility, imagination and intellectual curiosity has been described by many as the magic formula needed today to achieve the conquest of disease—from the common cold to cancer. The Institute firmly believes that an assault on disease of the kind and magnitude planned by Dr. Salk and his colleagues could pave the way to revolutionary breakthroughs.

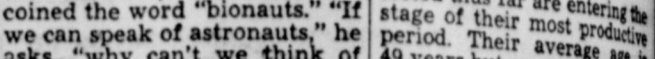
Just as the Mickey Mantles depend on the baseball fans who pay their way through the turnstiles, construction of the Salk Institute will depend on contributions from the general public.

\$15 Million Goal
This summer all across the nation a campaign is in full swing to raise \$15,000,000 to build and equip the Institute. The drive is sponsored by The National Foundation through the March of Dimes. It is a renewal of the partnership between all Americans and Dr. Salk—the man who did so much for them in developing the polio vaccine, and will do so much more as director of the Institute.

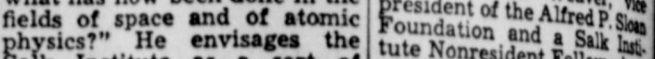

the Institute, Dr. Salk has coined the word "bionauts." "If we can speak of astronauts," he asks, "why can't we think of 'bionauts'—scientists who are capable of doing in biology what has now been done in the fields of space and of atomic physics?" He envisages the Salk Institute as a sort of launching pad for the gifted "bionauts" of the scientific world who will comprise his faculty.

The conditions under which the Salk Institute "bionauts" will pursue their studies are probably unique. The physical as well as the intellectual atmosphere of the Institute has been designed so that the individual scientist can concentrate fully on productive work and thought. Laboratory equipment will of course be the most modern. A highly specialized reference library on biology and related fields will be maintained. The whole environment is designed to spur the Institute Fellow toward daring and uninhibited original thinking on how to reach the goal he is seeking—faster.

Pioneering Projects
In most great universities and other research centers scientists are obliged to invest a great deal of their time in teaching and in administrative detail. There will be none of these time-consuming duties for the faculty of the Salk Institute. Its members will spend all of their time on pioneering projects. Moreover, they will have complete freedom to launch whatever projects they elect and may change the direction of their research if they wish.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article III a new Section to be known as Section 49-d authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and to dispose of such storage facilities and water upon such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe; providing for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 49-d, as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49-c of the Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governments or governmental agencies by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as State bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on

Telstar Model To Be At 1962 State Fair



A full size model of the Telstar satellite which was launched into orbit early in July will be a feature of the new Telephone Exhibit at the 1962 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 6-21, in Dallas. The Telstar, shown here undergoing tests, is 34 inches in diameter and has 72 flat faces or facets. The Telephone Exhibit, to be completely redesigned for the 1962 Fair, will occupy a prime exhibit area in the World Exhibits Building.

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THE AMERICAN WAY

Never before in human history have two nations opposed each other on such clear-cut, contradictory ideologies. In view of these contrasts, the two pet words of the Communist lie, "Peaceful Co-Existence," are reduced to ridiculousness.

Communism poses an awesome threat to our liberty and freedom. We are threatened from within by both Communist philosophers and sympathizers who work under the protection of our courts and with the blessing of the naive, and by uninformed and complacent citizenry who are as yet unaware of the sinister plot.

The type of government under which we may expect to live—democratic (free) or dictatorial; the type of economic system—free or regimented; man in society—whether free or enslaved, depends upon the way we fight today's battles.

If you are as yet unimpressed with the threat of communism, perhaps the expansion of communism will impress you.

Expansion program of world conquest: 1903 - 17 supporters of communism; in 1917 - 40,000; today - 1 billion; to project what could come in the future - multiply present population by less than three.

Expansion of communism in Europe: 1917 - Russia; 1939-40 - Polish, Finnish and Rumania provinces, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania were taken by communism; in 1945-46 - East Prussia, East Germany, Albania, Bulgaria, Rumania, Yugoslavia were swallowed up; in 1947-48 - Hungary, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Expansion in Asia: In 1945-46 - North Korea, Mongolia and Afghanistan territory were taken; in 1949 - China and Manchukuo; then in 1951-54 - Tibet and North Vietnam, what is next? Only the Kremlin knows.

Truly the expansion of communism has been awesome. Most of this expansion has been accomplished without a single bullet being fired - by sabotage and subterfuge.

If you still have some doubts as to the threatening clouds on our horizon, then listen to these blunt statements from a number of Communist leaders. Here are their announced aims:

1. Stalin said: "We must march in such a way that the working class of the whole world looking at us may say, 'This is my vanguard, this is my shock brigade, this is my working class, this is my fatherland.'"

2. In the Manifesto of the Communist Party, Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels state, "They (Communists) openly declare that their ends can be attained only by the forcible overthrow of all existing social conditions."

3. Lenin wrote, "There is only one banner on earth under which it is well worthwhile to struggle and to die. It is the banner of the Communist International."

4. Dimitroff (general secretary of the Communist International) states, "The working class is the real master, tomorrow's master of the world."

5. William Z. Foster (national chairman of the Communist Party, U.S.A.) dedicated his book, The Twilight of World Capitalism, "to my great grandson Joseph Manley Kolko who will live in a Communist United States."

6. In a sworn statement made by Foster, he says, "When a Communist heads the government of the United States - and that day will come as surely as the sun rises - the government will not be a capitalistic government, but a Soviet government, and behind this government will stand the Red Army to enforce the dictatorship of the (working class)."

In an address before a young men's lyceum in Springfield, Ill., on Jan. 27, 1837, Abraham Lincoln asked, "At what point shall we Americans expect the approach of danger? By what means shall we fortify against it? Shall we expect some trans-Atlantic military giant to step the ocean and crush us at a blow?"

Thoughtfully, Lincoln answered his own question: "All the armies of Europe, Asia and Africa combined, with all the treasure of the earth... in their military chest... could not by force take a drink from the Ohio or make a track on the Blue Ridge in a trial of a thousand years."

What, then, is the danger Lincoln foresaw in 1837? The danger, "if it ever reach us... must spring from amongst us; it cannot come from abroad. If destruction be our lot, we must ourselves be its author and finisher. As a nation of free men, we must live through all time or die by suicide."

Lincoln had no concept of atomic bombs, jet planes or rockets. But he understood the only course by which free men shall perish from the earth.

Ours today is a day demanding greatness in individual men and women, greatness in sacrifice and greatness in disciplined service of the highest. As Lincoln noted, "If destruction be our lot, we ourselves must be its author..."
