

# SECHRIST AND McCASLAND OBTAIN TOP HONORS

There are three extremely happy people spending the winter in Amarillo at the Fat Stock Show. Richard Sechrist and McCasland, 4-H members, and their sponsor, Bryan Swaim, are sweet history being made in Wheeler County! Never before has Wheeler County been able to place both Grand Champion and Reserve Champion honors at the Amarillo Show.

Richard Sechrist and Terry McCasland walked away with the four awards at the Junior Show. Their animals were

competing against 250 entries from throughout the Golden Spread.

The grand champion steer of the entire show was "Poncho", exhibited by Richard Sechrist, who had earlier won the champion banner in the Hereford classes. Poncho, a medium weight Hereford, was bred by C. J. VanZandt.

"Blackie", exhibited by Terry McCasland, received the reserve championship as well as the champion banner of the Angus steers. Blackie was also one of a pen of two Angus steers which

placed first in their division. Blackie was bred by Earl McGarrough of Perryton and Terry's other Angus steer was bred by Gordon Stiles.

These two 4-H Club youths have been hitting pay dirt in calf shows all over the state with their calves. Richard placed first in the medium weight division of the Hereford Club Steer Show as part of the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show in the Ector County Coliseum, Odessa, January 4th and 5th. Terry took top honors in the Wheeler County Calf

Show December 22 with reserve champion going to Richard. Terry also took top honors with Blackie at the Greenbelt Show held January 13 at Childress as well as winning Grand Champion of Wet Lot Division, Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of the Wheeler Free Fair in 1961. Blackie, less than a year old, was first in his class at the State Line Free Fair in 1961. In addition to these honors, Terry has received three showmanship awards.

Richard, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. L. "Shorty" Sechrist, is serving

the County 4-H Council as song leader and is a member of the Wheeler Junior 4-H club, the 4-H Rockets. In 1961 at the Amarillo show Richard received the Reserve Champion of Herefords, and Reserve Champion of the entire show, and sixth place herdman award which gave him \$87.00 prize money. Last year Richard received a fourth place with a Hereford light weight calf in the Sand Hills show as well as grand champion in the Wheeler County Junior Beef Calf Show and placed first

in the Hereford Wet Lot division and first in the heavy weight division. He received an award at the 4-H Awards Banquet held recently in the Wheeler School Cafeteria.

Richard, a sixth grade student in the Wheeler Schools was awarded a large silver platter Tuesday night at the banquet at the Herford Hotel held in conjunction with the Amarillo Show.

Terry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey McCasland, is co-chairman of the County 4-H Council and is

serving the Clover Leaf 4-H Club as parliamentarian. At the 1961 Top of Texas Livestock Show he placed first in the light weight Hereford Steer Division, received a showmanship trophy and was awarded a \$25.00 Stetson hat. He is president of the junior riding club, the 4-H Texans. During his past experience he also received a first place on a heavy weight barrow. Terry, along with Richard, received an award at the 1961 4-H Awards Banquet. He is a freshman at Wheeler High School.

## GRADY HARRIS WAS WHO-ZIT LAST WEEK

Grady Harris a farmer-rancher and rural mail carrier in the Mobeetie area, was the person pictured as last week's who-zit. Grady, 61, is such a well rounded, experienced, and intelligent individual that a complete volume could be written to record his many endeavors and adventures!

As a 1917 graduate of Vernon High School and a 1922 graduate of Texas A&M Grady has followed many paths of employment but has always held true to his love of farming and raising livestock. With the exception of two periods of time, 1926-1929 and 1942-1945, he has been engaged in the farming-ranching profession.

Grady and the former Sally Brock Horton were married December 28, 1947. They reside three miles southeast of Mobeetie on their 965 acre farm where they raise wheat, grain sorghums and performance registered Angus cattle. The Harris home is not only one with a friendly atmosphere that welcomes any visitors but has a style and history that is most interesting. Part of the house is original Harris adobe ranch home which has been remodeled and enlarged. The windows in the Harris living room, however, have retained their original styling. A painting of the adobe house was made by Maurice Bernson, a friend of the Harrises, and hangs over Grady's desk as one of his most prized possessions.

## LAST RITES HELD FOR O. L. DALE

Funeral services for Oather Londell Dale, 21, who was accidentally killed Saturday, January 6, 1962, were held Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. in the Kelton Methodist Church. Rev. Gene B. Louder, pastor, was in charge of services.

Dale was killed Saturday about 11:15 p.m. when the car in which he was a passenger missed a curve on Hwy. 124 a mile northwest of Plainview and sideswiped a tree several yards off the pavement. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace, J. C. Lewis of Plainview, Thurman Clay, a 26-year-old Hart farmer, driver of the automobile, was taken to the Plainview Hospital for treatment. His condition is reported as not being serious.

Dale was born May 30, 1940 in Wheeler and moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oather O. Dale from the Kelton community to Hart in January, 1961. The word "world", which our Lord used in this connection, does not refer to the earth, or even the people on it. It is a Greek word, aion, or age. Several ages in God's program already come to an end, and others will, but no matter how many may devise, in the way of destructive weapons, earth will never be destroyed. In Isaiah 45:18 we read:

"For thus saith the Lord that created the heavens Himself that formed the earth and made it; He hath lished it, He created it not in vain; He formed it to be habited: I am the Lord, and there is none else."

But doesn't Rev. 21:1 predict "a new heaven and earth"? Yes, but the context clearly indicates that it refers to the future renewing of the present heaven and not the creating of different ones. Verse 5 says: "The Lord sat upon the throne said, Behold I make all things new; He didn't say "I make all new things," but "I all things new." There is a difference.

People should not be concerned about the end of the world, but about the end of this present age. "The day of the grace of God," for God has never promised long it would last. Every hour He delays the return of His ambassadors, is an hour of wonderful grace which men may be saved by grace, through faith in who died for our sins. This is why Paul urges us: "As we are together with Christ, we beseech you that ye receive the grace of God in vain . . . Behold, NOW is the time; Behold, NOW is the day of salvation (II Cor. 6:2). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved (Acts 16:31).

**Great Plains Program Available To Farmers**  
 There has been increased interest by Wheeler County landowners and operators in the Great Plains Program. Nine new applications have been made since December. The Great Plains Program is designed to assist the farmer do a complete land treatment of his farm or ranch in a planned order that fits his finances and time distribution. Some farmers are scheduling conservation work for the next eight years. Great Plains funds are allocated at beginning of the contract for each year of the schedule prepared by the farmer.  
 The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District supervisors and the technical staff do not determine the number of livestock that a Great Plains participant can put on his farm or ranch. An analysis of each conservation problem is made by the farmer or rancher and a Soil Conservation Service technician before a time schedule and allocation of funds are made. For example, a range survey for a rancher is made to analyze the kind of grasses and supplemental pasture available. From this range analysis, the rancher can determine proper stocking rates and the kinds of supplemental feed and pasture needed to feed his livestock.  
 The Great Plains Program is designed to help get conservation on the ground with a plan. See the Soil Conservation Service technicians

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Grass seeding time is here again. The earlier in the year that the seeds are planted, the better seems the stand that results. Research and the experiences of the Soil Conservation Service show that early seedlings have less weed competition. Also, the hard freezes and cold weather seem to break down the seed coat and help the seeds to germinate better. This is a proven fact with many seeds of other plants.

On land where there is a good vegetation cover by running lished, it is necessary to destroy the competition by running sweeps just under the surface of the ground. This leaves the plant cover on top of the ground for soil protection. Where no cover is present, a drilled cover of sudan or sorghums is needed. This will be planted late or mowed to prevent it from heading out. The cover will keep seed from being buried too deep by blowing soil or being uncovered. It also prevents the soil from drying out and keeps the temperature down in hot weather.

Several grasses that are native to our rangeland are excellent for reseeding purposes. Such grasses include Big bluestem, Switchgrass, Indian grass, Little bluestem, Sand lovegrass, Sideoats grama, Blue grama, and Western wheat grass. Weeping lovegrass, an introduced grass, is also good on very sandy soils. It seems to produce a fair amount of grazing from late fall through spring.

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District has some drills which may be rented for a small fee. The Great Plains Conservation Program and ACP will pay approximately 80% of the cost of seeding the grasses and the cost of the seeds. The Soil Conservation Service personnel are available to help farmers and ranchers pick the right kinds of grasses for their particular soils. They will also help to determine the right mixtures and pounds of seeds needed.

Wonder if you have noticed the nice calendar pads on our desk each year? Well, we think it is time to thank Mr. Harold Nash for them.

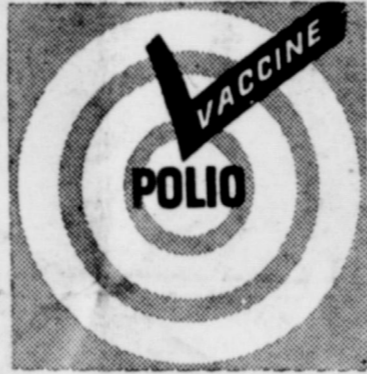
