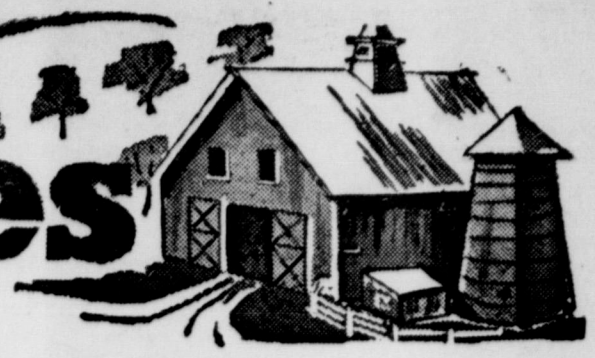

County & State Post Campaigns In Progress

The lid was put on the political pot Monday, February 5, as that was the deadline for filing for elective offices. Now the simmering stages may come rapidly to a boiling point as candidates begin in earnest to make their most effective campaigns.

The last candidate to file for office with the Times was Lester Jones of Pampa who will be seeking the post of State Representative from this district. Grainger McIlhany, incumbent of Wheeler and George Terry of McLean announced earlier their candidacy for the State Representative post. It has been brought to the attention of the Times that Johnny Wills and Warren Fatheree have filed as candidates on the Republican ticket, but the Times has received no formal announcements.

MCILHANY REPORTS ON SPECIAL SESSION OF STATE LEGISLATURE

During the special session of the Legislature just completed the Governor submitted five major topics to be considered. They were modification of the farm-to-market road program; regulation of dormant bank accounts; regulation of the address of the owners is unknown; re-organization of the State Board of Water Engineers; regulation of small loan companies; and appropriations for advertising to attract tourists to Texas.

Holdeman Hosts John Deere Day

All Registered Vehicles Must Be Inspected

Less than thirty per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safely inspected for 1962, according to Patrolman Gwin Fowler, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

With the April 15 deadline, for having the vehicles checked, rapidly approaching this means there are approximately 3650 vehicles in Wheeler County remaining to be inspected by the eight approved inspection stations available.

Many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline draws nearer, due to the inspection stations not being able to cope with this large number.

The patrolman urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to avoid this last minute rush. In addition, he reminds drivers that this time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which prevents the inspection stations from checking the vehicles.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," Patrolman Fowler said. "All motorists not displaying a valid 1962 inspection sticker by April 15 will be in violation of state law."

Official motor vehicle inspection stations in Wheeler county are: Wheeler—Nash Appliance & Supply, Percy's Garage, Vampool-Burton Motor Co., and Ware Chevrolet Co.; Shamrock—Blackmore Chevrolet Co., Holmes Motor Co., and Shamrock Safety Lane.

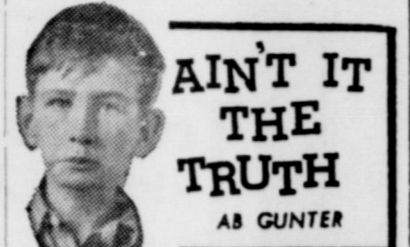

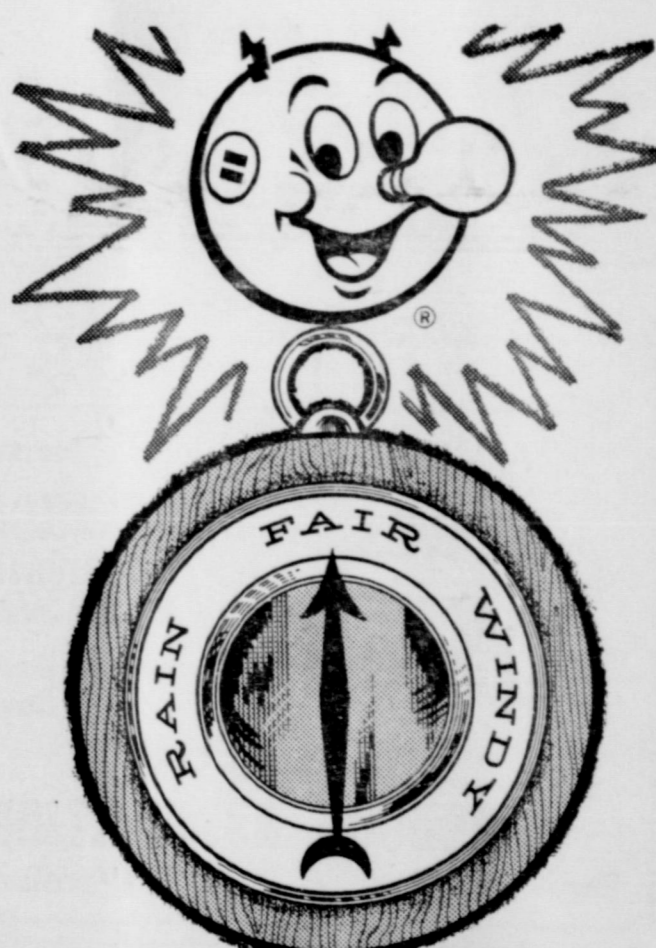

WHO SAYS

 NEW YORK, July 7 (AP) — Old North Dakota archives strongly indicate that the fastest mile ever run by a human was recorded 89 years ago this week, long before either John Landy or Roger Bannister was born, and before Wes Santee learned to walk. We are indebted to Eugene Fitzgerald, sports editor of the Fargo (N.D.) Forum, for having made available this long forgotten page of track history.

"At a celebration at Fort Rice, Dakota territory about 25 miles south of Mandan, on July 4, 1885, the 'Frontier Scout' of July 6 that year had a report on the holiday festivities," Fitzgerald writes.

"Four companies of US volunteers, infantrymen who deserted from Confederate army, were stationed at Fort Rice, along with a company of the 6th Iowa Cavalry, Col. C.A.R. Dimon was the commanding officer.

"The first event on the holiday celebration following the review was a mile run, three times around the fort. There were six entries for a prize of \$5.

"The event was won by Cpl. W. H. Green, F. Co. D of the Confederate deserters in the time of 3:34 minutes, the 'Frontier Scout' reported. Pvt. W. M. Winfrey of Co. C was second in 4 minutes.

"E. G. Adams, the editor of the 'Frontier Scout' in which the report was made, also was a Confederate deserter.

"Of course, someone is going to say the timing wasn't accurate. But even allowing for the accuracy of the timing, you'll admit that 15 seconds (under 4 minutes) would be a big margin of error for 225 seconds. Even conceding that the timing might have been inaccurate, there wasn't much wrong with the engineering of those days, and 12 inches was a foot.

"The fort was rectangular, 510 feet on its north and south sides and 500 on the east and west. Three times around the enclosure would be 5,070 feet, or 780 feet more than the regulation mile which Bannister and Landy ran under 4 minutes. The best sprinters of our day would require more than 25 seconds to cover the 280 yards which Green and Winfrey ran after completing the mile.

"Possibly the \$5 first prize

(which automatically made the runners professionals) is a reason the accomplishment has never been given official recognition, because there was no shortage of spectators.

"The 'Frontier Scout' reported that the wives of officers and soldiers and visiting ladies watched the celebration from the parapet of the fort. The Indians below, some only in breech cloth, wore grotesque costumes, leaning on the fort. Squaws bore their off-spring pig-back. The Indians wore fringes, beads, feathers, buffalo robes the tassels and a conglomeration of everything that shines, hangs and flutters."

"That concludes the on-the-spot account of what must have been about the greatest foot race ever run. One can only wish that the reporter who covered the event for the 'Frontier Scout' had been a more conscientious type & a bit more excited about the race itself instead of bearing down on the crowd scene.

He leave too many questions unanswered, questions the modern track expert will not fail to ask. What were Corporal Green's quarter times? How many timers were there, and were they registered with the AAU? Was the track surveyed after the race, and was Green helped by a following wind?

Personally, we do not intend to be contentious about it. The 'Frontier Scout' had nothing to gain by putting out a false report. All we would like to know is what Private Winfrey said when he learned he had ripped off a mile in four minutes flat and been beaten by 15 seconds. There was a soldier who was running hard luck.

FAVORABLE CREDIT CONDITIONS FOR 62 FORECAST BY LOCAL PCA

Favorable agricultural credit conditions for 1962 were forecast by an official of the Canadian Production Credit Association, in a report of 1961 activities of the agricultural credit organization, released this week.

"Conditions look good for another year," declared Erbin L. Crowell of Canadian general manager of the Canadian Production Credit Association.

Ample funds will be available through the association for the qualified farmer and rancher, Crowell pointed out. He stressed the importance of efficient management to increase the profit margin of an average agricultural operation.

Dependable sources of credit will be increasingly important to agricultural operators, Crowell said, to provide operating funds and to build capital structure.

The Canadian association reported an active year in 1961. Loan volume totaled \$6,660,757 for the year, with an end of year volume of \$3,124,418. Number of loans totaled 321. The association has loaned nearly \$72,000,000 to area farmers and ranchers in its 28 years of existence.

"Ample credit will be available to qualified borrowers," Crowell said, pointing out that the \$6.6 million in loans made by the association represents new money

put into circulation, giving a substantial boost to the economy of the six-county area.

The 36 Texas PCAs receive loan funds sold each month on the nation's commercial money market. The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston serves as discount agency for the Texas associations.

Owned and operated in its entirety by its farmer and rancher stockholders, the Canadian PCA serves Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler counties.

Central office is in Canadian and field offices are operated in Pampa, Wheeler and Perryton.

"We have but one reason for being in business," Crowell said, "and that is to provide a dependable source of low-cost credit for farmers and ranchers in our area."

The association's board of directors and loan committee are composed of farmers and ranchers familiar with agricultural conditions and problems in the area. Professional and personal credit counseling is offered to help each borrower make more money in his individual operations through sound credit practices, he said.

Composing the Canadian Credit Association's board of directors are H. H. Keahey of White Deer, president; Wallace N. Hamker of

Booker, vice president; Henderson of Wheeler; of Canadian, Hutch F. Perryton, directors. Since their organization and early 1934, the 36 Texas PCAs have provided more than \$1 billion in agricultural credit to state's farmers and ranchers.

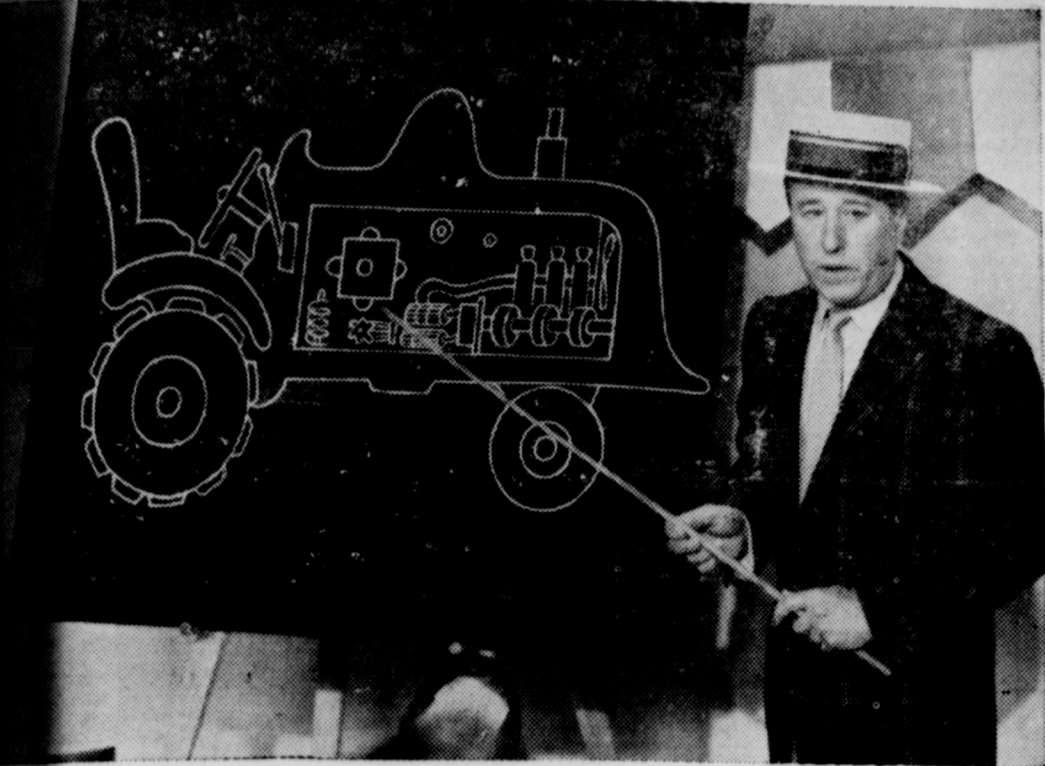

Recent Discovery May Aid In Fight Against Screwworm Infection

A recent discovery may prove of great value in future efforts to control or eradicate a very expensive livestock parasite, the screwworm. The discovery was a black screwworm fly. Normally, the flies are blue green. According to the chairman of our Animal Health Committee, Tom Puryear said, Tom said, the first black screwworm fly was found by Dr. Leo E. LaChance, insect geneticist of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service at Kerrville, in a Laboratory colony obtained from Orlando, Florida. Since these flies had not been irradiated, the black one is believed to be the result of a naturally occurring mutation.

Several generations of the black screwworm fly have been produced by LaChance and his associates.

The black color is important as a genetic marker (a distinguishable physical characteristic that is heritable) and could prevent a problem which delayed the eradication in the Southeast, a quick, effective way to identify the released flies.

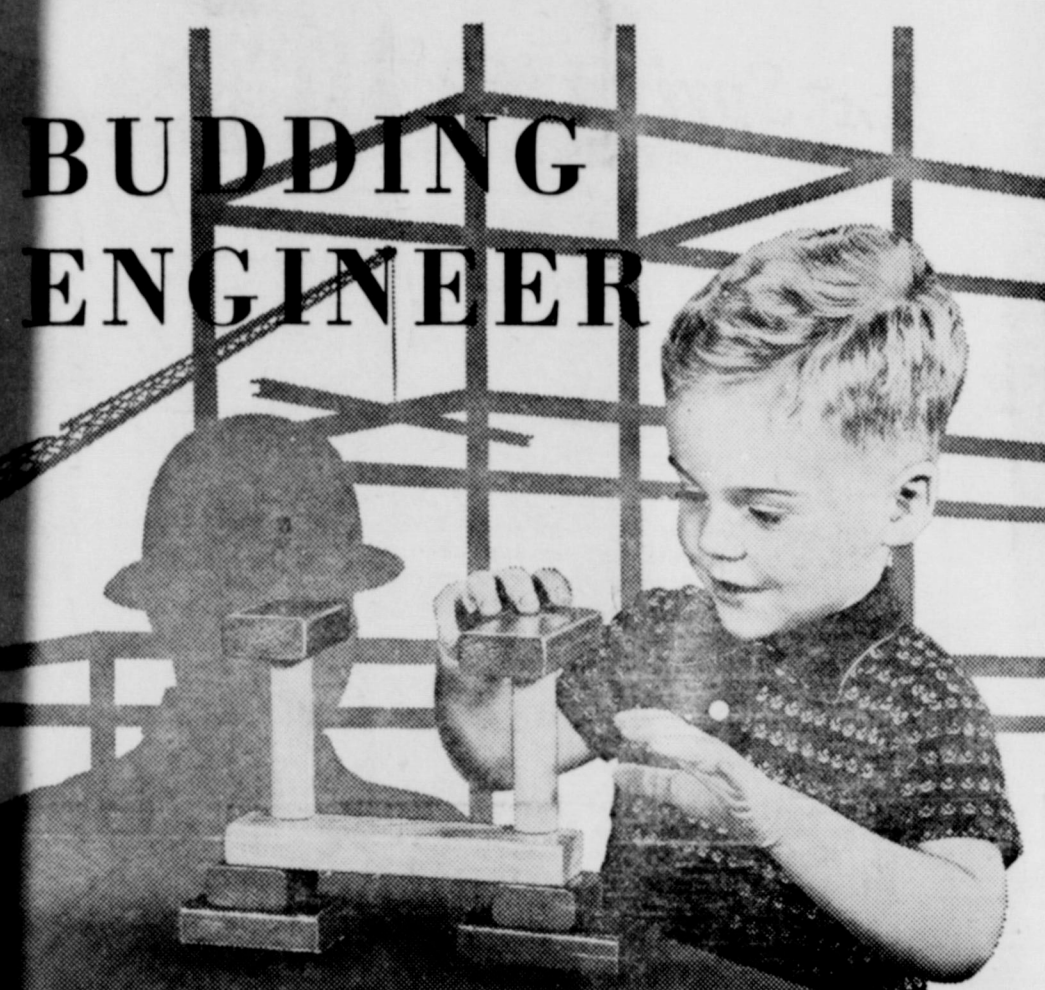
Irradiation does not later the appearance of screwworm flies, and they are not radioactive when recovered in traps. Dye or other markings are not sufficiently permanent for accurate identification. An easily distinguishable marker, such as the black color, could eliminate this problem and speed progress in future eradication efforts.

This discovery could mean much to the program now getting underway in Texas under the sponsorship of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. This extremely cold weather should make this year ideal for our screw worm control program. Mr. Puryear reports, Tom said contributions may be mailed in to any of the three treasurers, J. T. Johnston, Mobeetie; James Verden, Wheeler and Buddy Risinger, Shamrock. This program has been endorsed by the Local Wheeler County Farm Bureau as a worthwhile program and deserving support.

Farm Windbreak

Several Wheeler County landowners are making plans to establish tree rows for farmstead and feedlot protection, for field windbreaks, and for wildlife protection. Some of the landowners

who have or plan to establish windbreaks in this area are: F. M. Grimes, Neal Raymond, Ray Miller at Wheeler, Henry Hise, Jay Burkhalter and Joe Cooper at Shamrock are establishing windbreaks.

The planting of windbreaks is not a new practice for the Wheeler Soil Conservation District. Hundreds of windbreaks were planted in this area in the early part of the 1930's.

There are several little things

that need to be done before setting the trees. Plans for length and width of the tree row must be made. The kinds of trees, and spacing of the trees must be planned. The trees need to be ordered at least a month before planting time. The soil needs to be prepared for the trees. Such planning and information is available through the Soil Conservation District program and at the County Agent's office. The Forest Service has nurseries that

can furnish most suitable for windbreaks at a very economical Federal cost sharing program. The trees and shrubs keep the livestock from overgrazing through the Great Conservation Program.

authorize part of the maintenance cost to come out of earmarked farm road funds and under this plan the highway department can build about 1500 miles of new roads for the same cost as the 1,000 miles of last year; since with maintenance funds available, they can adjust road specifications to actual traffic needs rather than to maximum specifications.

I believe that the new program is a better use of farm road funds by providing maintenance for roads already built. The primary road system also will have more funds available for highway improvement because of the reduced demand on it for farm road maintenance.

The bill in regard to bank accounts of persons who cannot be located sets up procedures to advertise and try to find these owners. Under the re-organization bill for the Water Board, the department is set up along the same lines as the Highway Department which has built up a national reputation for efficient operation.

Grainger McIlhany On State SCD Program

Several problems of special importance to all Texans were the chief topics of discussion by farmland-rancher supervisors of Texas Soil Conservation Districts in their recent statewide meeting in San Antonio.

In addition to considering ways and means of getting more soil and water conservation work done, special attention was given to problems of and what Supervisors should do about increasing damages to farm and ranch lands by salt water pollution, more teaching in public schools of conserving soil, water and other natural resources, financing of soil conservation district operations and planning of small watershed flood prevention projects, and the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Supervisors also adopted a resolution calling for exemption from income tax the capital gains received from forced sale of land and property taken for public uses for water conservation projects or other related public works.

One of the principal speakers at this two-day state session was State Representative Grainger McIlhany, who discussed, "Agriculture and the Texas Legislature". Other speakers were Don Williams, head of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C.; W. S. Gibbs, 1961 President of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts; Henry LeBlanc, Jr., President of Sportsmen Clubs of Texas, and District Supervisors Jack Garrett of Harlingen and Ed Huggins of Rosenberg.

Soil Conservation Districts are subdivisions of state government, established for the purpose of promoting the application of conservation measures to the lands and waters of Texas. Each District is organized by vote of landowners, and is governed by five farmer-rancher supervisors elected by these same landowners. District Supervisors serve voluntarily, receiving no pay for their services. Districts have no power to tax or otherwise charge landowners or others within their boundaries. The 182 Soil Conservation Districts in Texas now cover more than 99 percent of the state, and include as cooperators more than 195,000 farmers and ranchers.
