## Pampan to Face Rep. McIlhany In General Election

Wheeler County's first Republican primary election last Saturday attracted a total of 141 voters to the polls, a larger number than officials had anticipated. Few races were featured in the balloting to nominate the

GOP standard-bearers for the November general election. In the 87th District state representative campaign, Warren Faheree of Pampa was favored by 97 county voters, and he succeeded in winning the nomination over

Johnny Wills, also of Pampa. Wills received 37 votes.

As a result of the voting. Faheree will face Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler in the general election. McIlhany eliminated both nis Democratic opponents in voting Saturday, and no runoff is neces-






