



to be stopped. The farmers and Ranchers Livestock Exchange of Shamrock is one of the nearly 175 livestock aucstate that will help collect funds for the program during January. The local market will have its sale Jan. 25 at 1 p.m.

The period of Jasuary 21-26 has een designated as "S-O-S" or "Stamp-Out-Screwworms Week" in Texas. During this time many of the livestock auctions will donate part of their commissions from sales to the program. The markets are also assisting in collecting funds from individual farmers and ranchers on the basis of fifty cents per animal unit.

Puryear commended all of the livestock auction markets in the county for participating in this special effort.

He recommended that livestock producers should give their support to the auctions during this month since this is an excellent way of raising the funds required to wipe out the screwworm menace in the outhwest.

The screwworm costs the Southvetern livestock industry an estimated \$100 million annually, Puryear pointed out.

The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program will be stopped March 31, 1963 unless by that date, livestock producers have contributed the remaining \$1,000,- Department—7:00 000 of their \$3,000,000 goal, it was Pucketts Store vs decided by the Board of Trustees ton Motor Co.—7:00 of the Southwest Animal Health Mustang Bowl vs. Research Foundation.

The termination could become necessary because the Federal appropriation bill specifies that cost wil be shared equally by Federal and non-Federal sources. Necessary state funds requested will not become available until after

Trustees voided a "one shot contribution policy ti ask that producers contribute a second time in order to save the program. An emergency appeal for \$1.000,000 The orginal \$3,000,000,goal is based on the expectation that every livestock producer

would participate.

The livestock industry has contributed, and will have spent \$2,-000,000 on sterile fly produc-tion and release by March 31 These funds move the three year eradication program costing an es-timated \$12,000,000, underway a full year ahead of schedule.

Tre Texas Legislature will be requested to appropriate \$3,000,000 which will be necessary to continue the program after producer funds are exhausted.

Cooperating in the program have been producers and sportsmen of Texas, New Mexico, Okla-Arkansas, Louisiana, the United States Department of Agriculture, and the Texas Animal Health Commission.

The Texas Livestock auction association has proclaimed the week of January 21-26, 1963, as S-O-S Week in Texas. During this week, two fund-raising devices will be featured: (1) individual market participation, through contribution a portion of commiss on or a per ead allowance to the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation; and (2) individual markets through their local offices, acting as collectors for contributions direct from livestock producers in their respective trade areas. The funds collected during S-O-S Week (which stands for Stamp Out Screwworm Week) will go toward making up the \$3 million goal estabished by SWAHRF to be raised from individual livestock produ-

At the last SWAHRF meeting on December 3, trustees reported that slightly more than \$2 million had already been collected. There are additional funds that are being held by County Committees that will be turner over to he foundation in the near future.

Any livestock producer in Wheeler County who would like to contribute to the program is urged to do so in the near future so that the goal may be reached. Tom Pur-year, of Kelton is the county-wide chairman and there are asigned community chairmen in each com-

Contributions may be turned into Tom Puryear, community chairman or sent to the Mobeetie State Bank and made payable to the Wheeler County Animal Health

Everyone concerned with the program feels that it is a very beneficial program and is one that we all would like to see completed since the ranchers themsedves are contributing so much and it is a program that was originated by the livestock producers.






