HIGHWAY PROJECT PLANNED

POSSIBILITY OF SPONSORING BOUTS IS DISCUSSED AT COFC MEETING

An announcement was made Tuesday night at the local Chamber of Commerce meeting that the Highway Department has released SARAH L. WREK plans to widen Highway 152 from where construction stopped this side of the Red River Bridge to the stop light in Wheeler. This will be a wide highway which will carry four lanes of traffic, but it will not be divided.

The highway Department has offered to curb and gutter Shamrock Street under a contract similar to the one used in paving, and crubing of Main Sreet. The property owner will be asked to put up \$1.75 er front foot of property and the difference between the cost and contract will be refunded. There vill be no engineering charge.

The highway will be approximately 42 feet wide without curb and gutter and will be approximately 64 feet with curb and gut-



The Hospital District, as proposed, will comprise the area commonly known as precincts one and two of Wheeler County. The tax rate can never exceed 75c per \$1.00 valuation as set out in the constitutional amendment and the valuation will be that of the state and county as is set out in the bill for the creation of the Hospital Dis-42½ 33½ trict.

A person interested in the hospital has expressed the opinion that the cost will not be excessive to anyone. For instance, the tax at the highest rate, 75 cents on a 167 valuation of \$10,000 which is a 156 high state and county valuation, 155 cannot exceed \$75 annually.

This hospital is needed to care for the usual illnesses of the people and a community can certainly do no less than care for its own. Distances can be too great in many cases.—they could mean the Reg. \$6.95 _____ \$1.98 difference between life or death. Also the distance and expense involved in the travel from home to hospital to visit or care for loved ones is a major factor with most

Certainly the people in this area will continue to go to larger med-ical centers for specialized treatnent or call in doctors who can handle such cases but this type care represents a small percentage
