HIGHWAY PROJECT PLANNED

POSSIBILITY OF SPONSORING BOUTS IS DISCUSSED AT C OF C MEETING

An announcement was made Tuesday night at the local Chamber of Commerce meeting that the Highway Department has released plans to widen Highway 152 from where construction stopped this side of the Red River Bridge to the stop light in Wheeler. This will be a wide highway which will carry four lanes of traffic, but it will not be divided.

The highway Department has offered to curb and gutter Shamrock Street under a contract similar to the one used in paving, and curbing of Main Street. The property owner will be asked to put up \$1.75 per front foot of property and the difference between the cost and contract will be refunded. There will be no engineering charge.

The highway will be approximately 42 feet wide without curb and gutter and will be approximately 64 feet with curb and gutter.

The C. of C. president, Hyland Weaver, appointed a committee consisting of Bud Vanpool, Cecil Denson, Harold Kenady, Archie Hibler and T. J. Daughtry to contact the property owners within the city and get their ideas about the project.

Mr. Clyde Drake, engineer for the Highway Department, felt that it would cost the property owner between \$1.50 and \$1.75 per foot. The curb will begin at the Bud Vanpool property, corner of Shamrock and FM 2167. The curb will be laid flat for drives and driveways. The property owners have to tell the contractor where they want the curb flat.

If the city council approves the plan it will still be up to the property owners whether or not to curb and gutter. However, a small minority of property owners will not be allowed to prevent the completion of the project. The city will pay for the curb on the corner of each block. This will be about \$1500.00. The Council meets Thursday night to discuss the program as the deadline is March 3.

"This will be Wheeler's best chance to get the street done right," expressed Mayor Thomas Daughtry.

This project would enhance the beauty of Wheeler when approaching from the south. Furthermore, it would curtail much dust blowing within the city. It would also eliminate the need for street cleaning.

SARAH L. WREN SERVICES HELD HERE SATURDAY

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon for Sarah Elizabeth Wren at the Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Robert Ely, officiating. Rev. Frank Ross, pastor of the First Baptist Church, assisted with the service.

Sarah Elizabeth Payne Wren was born September 5, 1869 at Crossroad, Tenn. and died Jan. 31, 1963 at the age of 93 years, 4 months and 26 days.

She was married to Dr. Wm. C. Roberson at Hardy, Tex., on Nov. 4, 1886. After his death in 1893 she served as postmistress at Hardy and upon the closing of that post office she was transferred to Forrestburg where she continued in the same capacity.

On July 7, 1910, she was married to George Lee Wren at Saint Jo, Tex. At that time Mr. Wren was superintendent of the Valley View Schools. Later they resided at Milam, Tex., and at the time of Mr. Wren's death he was superintendent of the Texas City Schools.

Since that time she had resided with her daughters.

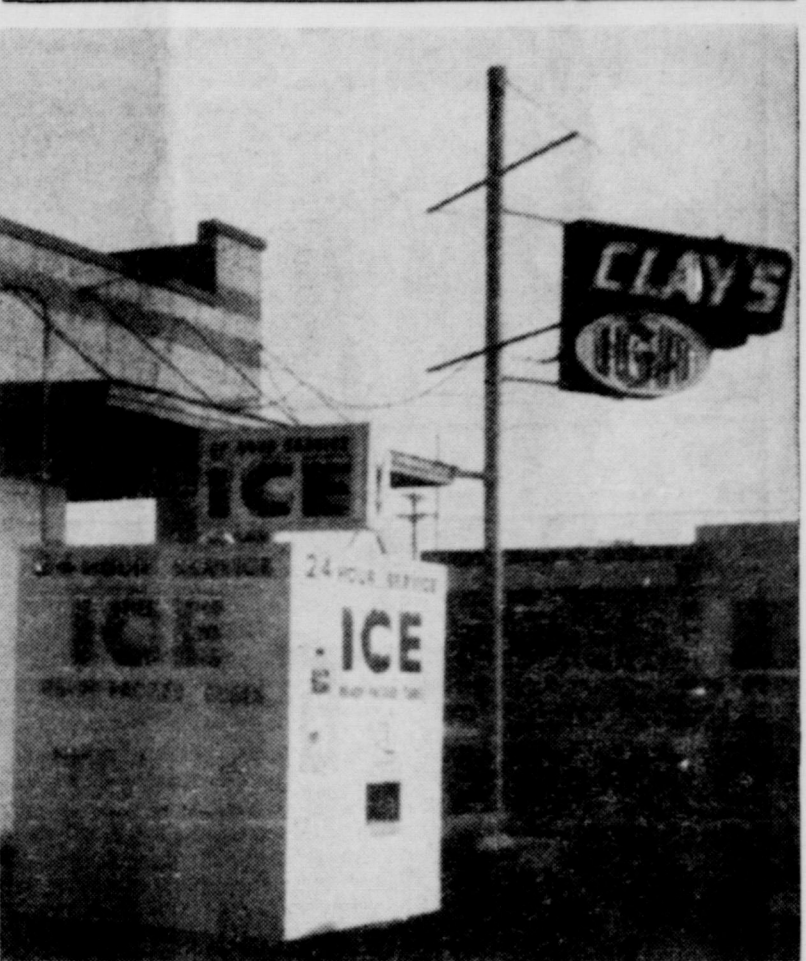
She was known fondly in Wheeler by her many friends as "Mother" Wren.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Olive Dearen and Mrs. Grace Meek, both of Wheeler; two step daughters, Mrs. Eileen Connelly of Texas City and Mrs. Mae Vance Milligan of Bay Town; one step son, Jack Wren of Houston; three grandchildren, nine great grandchildren, two great great grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. G. T. Nichols of Abilene and Mrs. C. L. Maxwell of Myra; and one brother, Eric Payne of Long Beach, Calif.

She was preceded in death by two husbands, one brother, two sisters and one grandchild.

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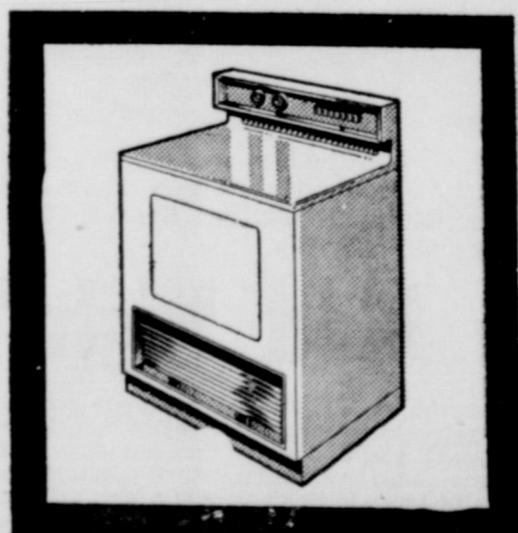

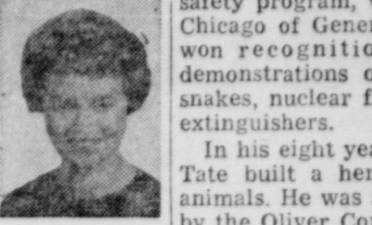

This machine has a huge bin, or two of them really, and is open at the front with a kind of scoop on it. The farmers were using it to pick cotton off the ground where the regular harvester had dropped it. Then they were piling the cotton and dirt mixture at the end of the rows.

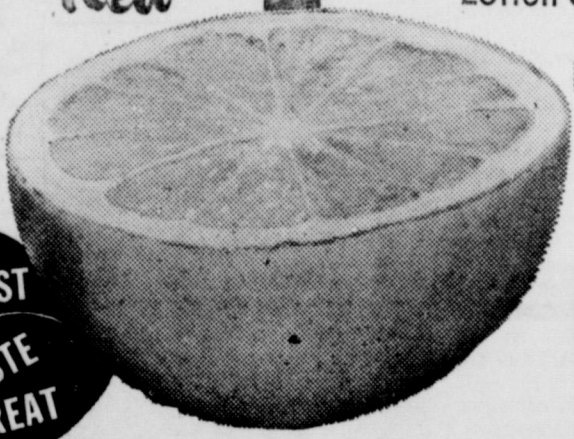
