 These wrecks accounted for person killed, thirteen persons injured, and a property damage of \$23,020.00.
 The rural traffic accident marmory for Wheeler County January through August shows a total of 45 crashes, a result of these crashes were 5 persons killed and 39 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$245,000.
 With the taring of school Captain reminds all motorists the State law regulating traffic regard to school buses. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from any direction any school bus which stopped on the highway for purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall pass the school bus, but proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding (10) miles per hour, due caution for the safety of children.
