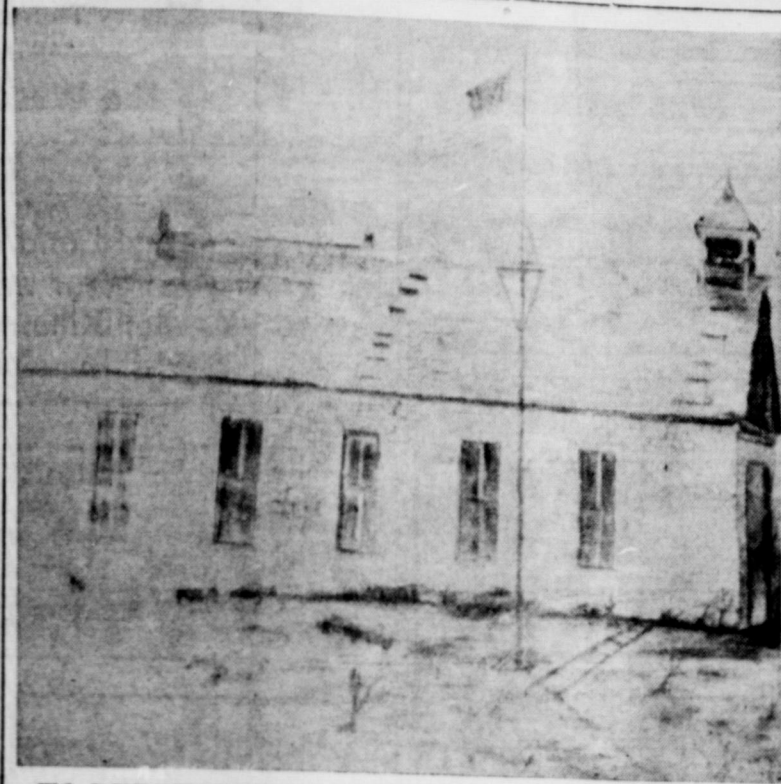

Funeral services for James Otha Hays were conducted April 18 at 2 p.m. at the Methodist Church in Allison with Rev. Robert Ely, pastor of the Wheeler Methodist Church, officiating.
Mr. Hays was born at Sedalia, Mo., March 29, 1880 and passed away at Shamrock April 16, 1963 after a lingering illness.
In active life, Mr. Hays had been a railroad employee and merchant. He was a member of the Methodist Church.
In January, 1901, he was married to Minnie Bell McKay at Rogers, Ark. They moved to Allison from Hunt County, Texas and had resided in the Allison Community for the past 35 years.
Survivors include one son, Leon Hays of Allison; three daughters, Mrs. Nevasa Evans of Allison, Miss Edith Hays of McLean and Mrs. Lillian Stewart of Tulsa, Okla.; one sister, Mrs. Audra Cameron of Lubbock; one brother, Arthur Hays of Gilmer; six grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.
He was preceded in death by his wife, one brother and three sisters, serving as pall bearers were Monroe Reynolds, L. Loyd Jones, Ern Begert, Ting Aderholt, Glen Elmore and Darrell Gray.

Interment was in the Zybach Cemetery under the direction of Kirk Funeral Home.

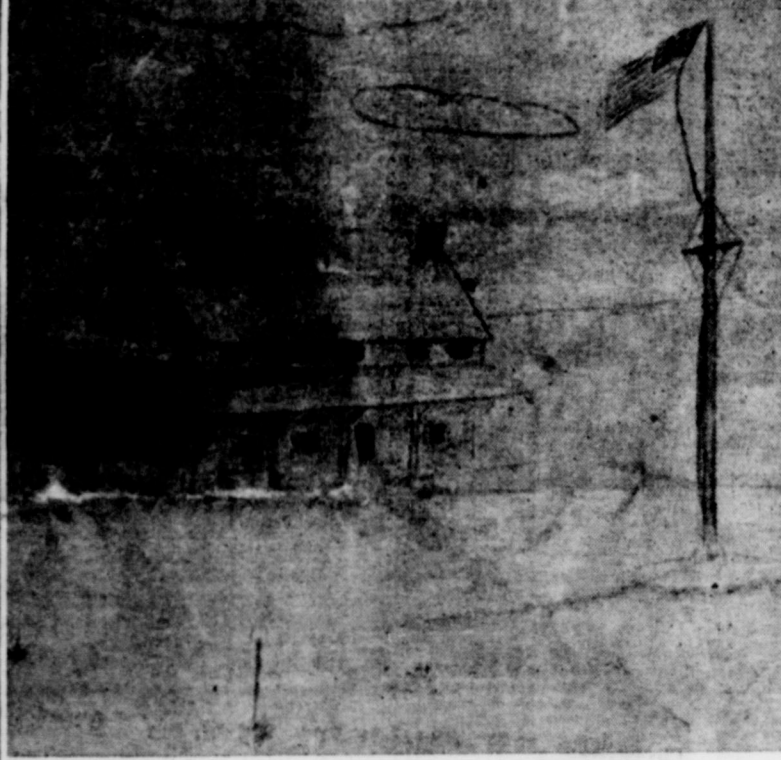
Spring Festival Is Friday

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

Newly set sprigs of Midland Bermuda often have serious competition from weeds before they are fully established. To my knowledge only one chemical has been accepted to date by the USDA Pesticides Regulation Division of pre-emergence use on new planting coastal. This material is Simazine 80 W, which is distributed by Geyg Agricultural Chemicals. It has been tested by the Louisiana and Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Stations with rather encouraging results. The chemical is reported to control most annual broadleaf weeds and grasses.
Simazine is a wetttable powder which forms a suspension when mixed with water. It is used as a pre-emergence treatment only. The Midland Bermuda sprigs should be planted on clean, prepared land and then the Simazine should be applied as a broadcast spray before the weed seeds germinate. The rate to apply per acre is 1-4 pounds, depending on the types of soil. Directions on the container should be followed closely for the proper rate on any particular soil type.

Simazine does not become effective until rain or irrigation water moves the material into the soil and into the root zone of the weeds. The weeds may appear normal when they first emerge, but should turn yellow and die in a few days.
We suggest this material be used on a trial basis only until more experience with it is accumulated. Some annual crops such as small grains, cotton, vegetables, and possibly legumes will be affected for as long as 12 months following application.

Do not graze animals or cut the Midland Bermudagrass for hay for at least 5 months following application of this herbicide.
Call Mission Collect If Screwworm Found

Knowing immediately where every screwworm case in the Southwest is located has become so important to the eradication program that arrangements have been made so livestockmen can call the Mission headquarters collect when an infestation is detected.

When a screwworm case is found, officials would like producers to do two things: (1) collect about 10 worms from the wound, place in water or alcohol and hold them for further instructions and (2) report the infestation to eradication officials by calling collect to J.Ustic 5-1646 (Mission). No telephone call should be made unless a sample is available.

The following information should be available at the time the call is made:

1. Name
 2. Address and telephone number where producer can be contacted
 3. Date when sample was collected
 4. Location of farm or ranch where case was found
 5. Location of wound on animal
- Sample bottles may be obtained from the County Agricultural Agent's office for the collection of screwworms.

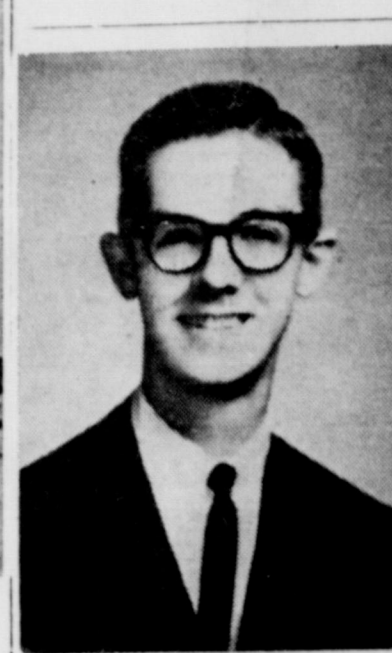

HENDERSON ATTENDS BANK MEET

Mr. C.B. Henderson, of Route 1, Wheeler, attended the seventh annual meeting of stockholders and late Credit Bank of Houston, held at the Texas Hotel in Fort Worth on April 15-16.

More than 500 of the state's leading farmers, ranchers and dairymen and guests attended the three-day meeting of the agricultural financing institution. The supervisory agency for 37 Production Credit Associations and 14 credit bands serves as discount and other agricultural credit organizations serving Texas.

Mr. Henderson represented the Canadian Production Credit Association at the meeting. He is a prominent Farmer and Rancher in this area, and is director of his association.

Highlights of the meeting included addresses by some of the nation's top agricultural leaders, including E. L. Patton, U.S. Department of Agriculture from New Orleans; Roy B. Davis, general manager of the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill at Lubbock; J. M. Haffington of Cypress, Texas, rancher and livestock feeder; John C. Rhein, president of the Houston Bank for Cooperatives and President W. N. Stokes of the Intermediate Credit Bank, sponsor of the meeting.

The 37 Production Credit Associations and 14 other agricultural financing institutions discounting with the Credit Bank provide short and intermediate-term credit for more than 30,000 of the State's farmers, ranchers and dairymen.

These organizations are owned and operated in their entirety by their farmer and rancher stockholder-borrowers and in 1962 had a total loan volume of more than \$400,000,000. The state's 37 Production Credit Associations are stockholders in the Credit Bank.

Ab Gunter Attend Meet About Veterans Benefits

Albert Gunter, Veterans County Service Officer for Wheeler County, attended a Regional Rehabilitation Clinic for Veterans Service Officers which was conducted in Lubbock, on April 18-19.

This Regional Clinic was conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission in cooperation with the various veterans organizations and the Veterans County Service Officers Association of Texas. The purpose of the Clinic was to offer Service Officers from the 79-County West Texas Region an opportunity to gain first-hand knowledge of recently enacted legislation dealing with benefits to veterans, their dependents and survivors. Topics discussed during the 2-day Clinic included compensation, pension, GI loans, educational and training for veterans and war orphans, and hospitalization and medical treatment for veterans.

Conducted annually, these Clinics serve refresher training courses for County, Post and Chapter Eureka Veterans Service Officers. Five such Clinics are to be conducted over the state during this spring.

Junior Sale and Show At Amarillo Has New Rules

It is the considered opinion of the Executive Committee that certain steps should be taken to improve the Junior Show and Sale of the Amarillo Stock Show for 1964.

In order to accomplish these objectives, the following changes have been made and will apply to the 1964 Show.

Lambs:

- The minimum weight on lambs shall be 80 pounds and the maximum weight shall be 115 pounds.
- A maximum of 100 lambs will be sold at auction. The top ten lambs from each class will aggregate the 100 to be sold.

Barrows:

- The minimum weight shall be 190 pounds and the maximum weight 240 pounds.
- A maximum of 126 barrows will be sold at auction. The number from each class to be auctioned will be determined on a percentage basis of the number eligible for sale.

Steers:

- A maximum of 75 steers will be auctioned and the number from each class to be auctioned will be determined on a percentage basis of the number eligible for sale.
- If any entry, eligible for the sale, is scratched, then the next highest ranking animal in that class becomes eligible for the sale.
