The first showers were light and then fear arose as the sound of hail was heard. It proved to be very small hail and did not last much longer than a minute.

At press time the rain had stopped, but the heavy clouds remain and hopes are high that the dry spell which has lasted close to two months is about to end. The last measurable rain to fall in the Wheeler area was April 5 when .43 in. fell. However it has also been noted that in June of last year 10 in. of rain was received.
