JAMES AUSTIN SERVICES HELD MONDAY, MAY 27

James Reginal Austin was born in Stephens County, Texas, August 23, 1885. He was married to Carrie Belle McElroy at Clovis, N.M. He has been a resident of Wheeler community for 47 years, coming here from McLean. He resided five miles north of Wheeler, and his occupation was farming.

Mr. Austin was a member of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler. He has been in bad health for the past several years, and seriously ill for the past few months. He passed away in Shamrock May 24, 1963, at 3:45 p.m. at the age of 77 years, 9 months and one day.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler on Monday, May 27, 1963 at 2:00 o'clock with the pastor Rev. Frank Ross officiating.

Survivors are the children, Raymond Austin of Enochs, Mrs. Charles Gilmer of Merced, Calif., Clifford Eugene Austin of San Jose, Calif., Harold Austin of Wheeler, and Garland Austin of Atwater, Calif.; seven grandchildren, three great grandchildren, and one brother, Nick H. Austin of Plainview.

His wife, one daughter, four brothers and three sisters preceded him in death.

Local Roper Wins Calf Roping At Rodeo Grounds

Approximately 150 persons were in attendance at the local roping sponsored Sunday afternoon by the Wheeler Riding Club and J. T. Johnson.

The two events, calf roping and heading and heeling, were entered by 25 professional contestants.

The calf roping Sunday afternoon was typical of what one would expect at a roping where many top name ropers are entered since it was won by a split second. That was the margin that J. T. Johnson of Wheeler won the calf roping over Powder Coffman of Stratford.

Johnson's total time on four calves was 59.5 seconds and Powder Coffman's total time was 60 seconds. Third place was soundly taken by Clifton Smith of Tell, Tex. This cowboy also tied the fastest

calf during the afternoon at the remarkable time of 10.4 seconds.

This was J. T. Johnson's third win of the season since he had already won at Lubbock and Clovis N.M. after placing second at San Antonio. His next show to enter will be this week at Ft. Smith Ark.

Head and heeling of steers is an event that is gaining in popularity and seems to be here to stay as a rodeo event. It was won Sunday by John McMordeie and Clinton Hill of Canadian. The second place team ropers were Bill Bomar of Clovis, N.M. and Buddy Cockrell of Pampa. The fastest time in the team roping went to J. T. Johnson and Buddy Cockrell with thirteen seconds.

MCLEAN RODEO, HORSE SHOW SET

McLEAN, TEXAS (Special)—McLean kicks off its annual 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration next Wednesday afternoon June 5, for a four-day run. Festivities open at 4 p.m. Wednesday with a parade through the following Saturday.

In addition to the parade, the Old Settlers Reunion is to be held Wednesday, with registration at Lovett Memorial Library.

The rodeo, which lays claim to being the best amateur rodeo in the Panhandle, begins Wednesday night and will be held nightly through Saturday, starting at 8 p.m.

Cowboys will be competing in two go-rounds for a total purse of \$2,400, plus \$225 trophy saddle to each event winner.

The events, with a purse of \$400 in each, include saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heeling and bulldogging.

There also will be a girls barrel race. Contestants will vie for a \$15 jackpot, plus awards to the three top riders.

Stock contractor for the rodeo is Ratjen Brothers Rodeo Co. of Happy, Texas. Rodeo announcer will be Nat Fleming of Wichita Falls, and the clown will be Richard Walters of Amarillo.

As AQHA—approved horse show and cutting horse contest are scheduled for 9 a.m. Saturday, June 8, and an old fiddlers' contest will be held at 2 p.m. the same day. Dancing is planned in the American Legion Hall all four nights.

Re-Surfacing Of Streets By Texas Highway Dept.

Re-surfacing of Wheeler city streets was completed last Thursday by the Texas Highway Department.

The highway department is responsible for maintenance of the main street and highway, but they also resurfaced the street south of the courthouse and the street between the Baptist Church and Wheeler Lumber Company.

Mayor Thomas Daughtry stated, "The resurfacing of the city streets by the Texas Highway Department has saved the city of Wheeler one thousand dollars; and we especially appreciate their doing the two extra streets that they are not responsible for doing." KITTY HIBLER IS TOURING EUROPE

Kitty Hibler, junior student at Baylor University, will be a member of a group of students and faculty who will tour 12 European countries and eight countries in the Middle East this summer.

The 68 day tour of Europe and the Near East will be conducted by Mr. Robert L. Reid, professor of Ancient and Medieval History at Baylor University, and Dr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Lynn. Dr. Lynn is professor of modern European History at Baylor University. Twelve university students will take the tour.

The group will visit historical points of interest in Ireland, England, Holland, Belgium, France, Luxembourg, West Germany, Austria, Liechtenstein, Switzerland, San Marino Italy, Lebanon, Syria, Egypt, Jordan, Israel, Cyprus, Turkey and Greece.

The group taking the tour will leave Oklahoma City June 6 for New York City. On June 9, they will depart for Europe. Transatlantic travel from New York to Europe and return to New York will be furnished by British Overseas Airways Corporation Jet-Prop Britannia. The tour will return to the United States August 14.

TEN ACCIDENTS ON RURAL ROADS

The Highway Patrol investigated ten rural accidents in Wheeler Co. during the month of April according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one death, four injuries, and property damage in the amount of \$8,395.00.

The rural accident summary for Wheeler County from January through April of 1963 shows a total of 22 crashes resulting in two persons killed, six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$15,475.00.

If you travel the rural roads this month, you will meet up with lots of slow moving farm machinery. The Patrol Supervisor reminds motorists to be ready to slow down in plenty of time to avoid collision and pass only if you are sure you can do it successfully and safely. Remember too, where there is a farm house, there is a driveway—even though it may be hidden from view. So be prepared to yield, if you must, to traffic entering and leaving. Yielding right-of-way costs you nothing. Demanding it can cost you an accident.

The Sergeant also stated, "Owners of boat trailers should check to see that they meet the State's Motor Vehicle Laws. If they do not you are asking for an arrest or an accident—or both. Every time you take your trailer on the road, make sure all warning and safety devices are working properly. Check especially the lights, and the strength of hitch and coupling. It is a good idea to make additional checks whenever you make a stop."

DEPT. OF AGRI. MARKS 50 YEARS

May marks 50 years of organized marketing service to farmers, industry and consumers by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

This anniversary is of special interest to cotton farmers because they represent one of the largest groups to use these marketing services, points out C. E. Cox, Officer in Charge of the Altus, Oklahoma Classing Office.

Cotton farmers sell nearly all of their cotton on the basis of the USDA classification—the green card—and they use USDA cotton market news to guide them in getting the best price for their cotton.

Both of these cotton marketing services were started soon after the first organized marketing office was established in USDA in 1913.

"One of the most important developments during this first 50 years came in 1937 when the Smith-Doxey Act authorized USDA to class cotton without cost for groups of farmers organized to promote cotton improvement," Mr. Cox said.

"Another important development—the micronaire testing service—will be offered this year to all farmers in Smith-Doxey groups," he announced. A fee of 8 cents a sample will be charged for "mike" service.

In addition to grade and staple the "mike" test gives the farmer another measure of the quality of each bale of his cotton.

This can be used to advantage in selling cotton for the best going price, according to Mr. Cox.

Applications for USDA "mike" testing services are due by July 1. Farmers wanting this service should ask their ginners to apply for it, since all or more of the cotton from a gin will be miked.

Notaries Public Should Apply for Appointment

Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1965 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963. Do not send requests directly to the Secretary of State, as County Clerks must approve notary bonds.

Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

Wheeler County livestock producers should certainly be proud of their contribution towards raising the three million dollars needed to complete the screwworm control program. This county has contributed \$378,500 towards the program, according to Mr. Tom Puryear, the County chairman. All the local money contributed has been forwarded to Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. C. G. Scruggs, Foundation president, announced that the Southwestern livestock and sportsmen have already exceeded their goal of \$3 million and additional funds are expected to be donated in the near future.

Tabulations made early this month showed contributions from Texas totaling more than \$2.9 million. Oklahoma reported \$24,000; New Mexico \$33,500 and Louisiana \$38,700. A group of California livestock producers donated \$500.

Some of a few Texas counties have not yet turned in all of the funds that had been collected and workers in other Southwestern states indicated additional money was forthcoming.

Scruggs termed the fund drive as "an achievement by the livestock industry and sportsmen of the Southwest that is unprecedented as to amount of funds contributed and overall interest and participation by individuals."

"This is a marvelous example of voluntary action," Scruggs declared. "Altogether it forms another exciting chapter in the colorful history of the Texas livestock industry and exemplifies Texas citizenry at its best."

The private funds comprise part of \$12 million that has been estimated will be required to rid the Southwest of the bothersome screwworm over a three year period. The Federal government is furnishing half of the money and the Texas Legislature is presently considering a \$3 million appropriation.

Tom Puryear, chairman of the Wheeler County Screwworm Control Program and his committee are to be commended for their untiring efforts to help complete one of the best programs ever sponsored by the livestock industry.

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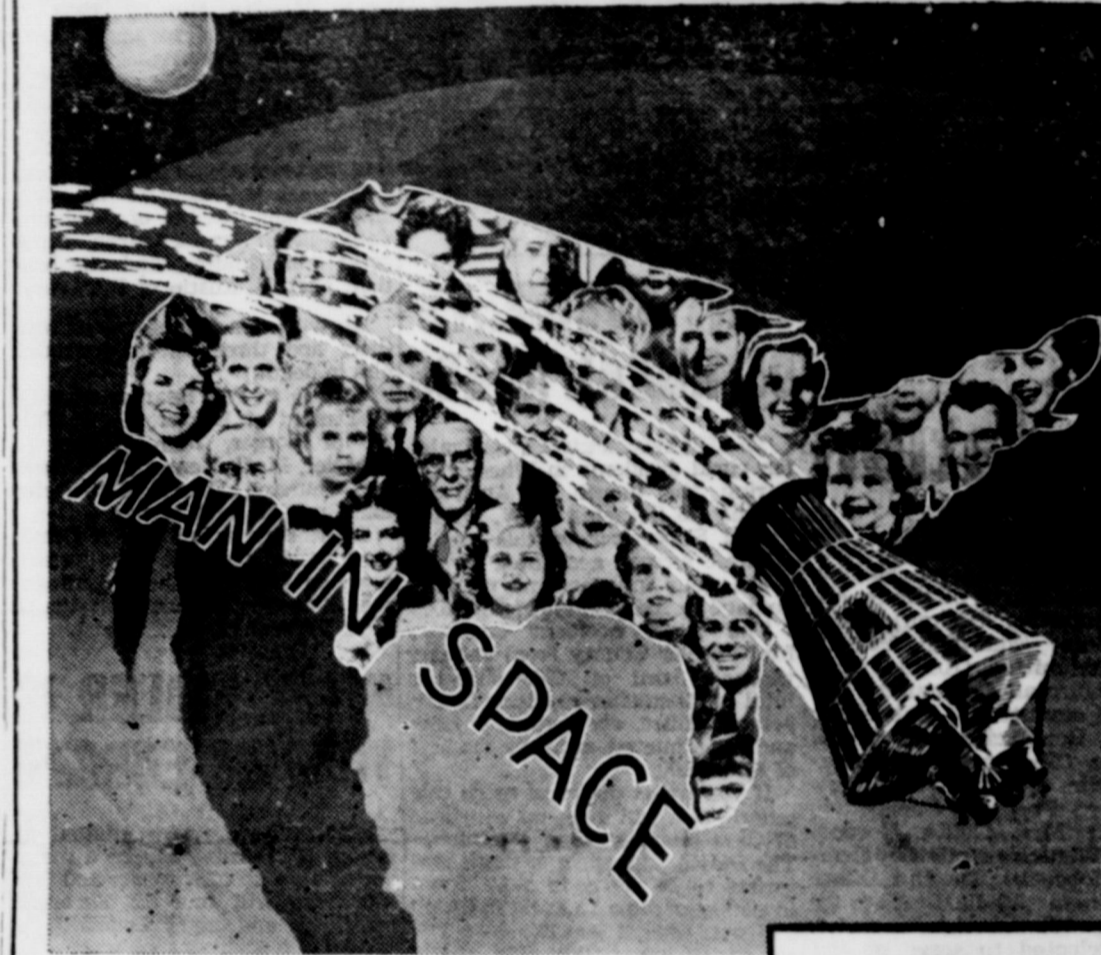

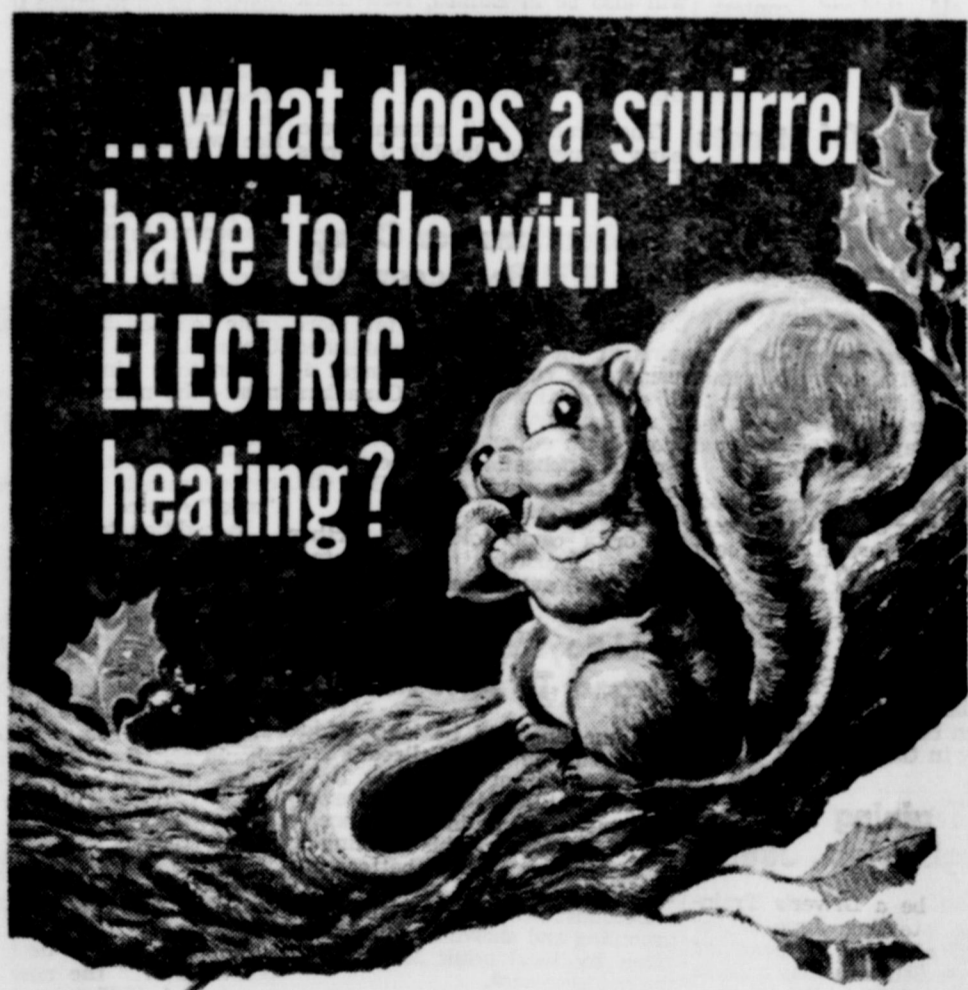
