The Wheeler County 4-H Council and the 4-H Texans are featuring a new event for the Junior 4-H Rodeo. For the first time, there will be a Rodeo Queen.

Each candidate must be sponsored by an organization, merchant or a ranch.

Girls must attend school in Wheeler County and will be judged by two adult judges on appearance and horsemanship.

Judging will be the first event on Friday night, June 28, 1963. Queen will reign over Rodeo Performance on Saturday night, June 29. All candidates must wear blue jeans, long sleeve western shirt, boots and hat on the night of judging.

Candidates will be asked to show these things: leading the horse into the arena; mounting; riding the walk, trot, and lope; stop; backing; dismounting; and leading the horse out of the arena.

Miss Jett George, Queen of the 4-H Texans, will serve as hostess to candidates and will set pattern for riding prior to judging.

GUAR CAN RESIST LONG DRY SPELL

An effort is being made in this area to locate farmers interested in producing guar, a drought resistant legume that has been planted to varying degrees in Texas and Oklahoma for several years.

The government ruling that diverted grain acres must be planted to some type of soil improving crop, plus the fact that the General Mills plant in Kenedy is making an effort to get more acres of the crop seem to be the reasons for the unusual interest this year, according to a release from the Soil Conservation Service.

Not only does guar present good earning potential from the sale of the beans, but it is also considered an excellent land improvement crop, according to Bill Brooks, work unit conservationist for the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District.

The new cash crop push for guar as a bean producing crop is based on a breakthrough in industrial processing technique which minimizes the risk of crop damage from exposure to extended fall rains during harvest season. Bean color is no longer a critical factor in marketing, so long as the beans are fully developed and plump.

Several farmers in Wheeler County at one time grew guar, but discontinued the crop due to the lower prices paid for the rain-damaged beans.

John W. Stewart, field representative for General Mills' guar plant in Kenedy, Tex., has been contacting farmers in the area for the next several days to get them to devote a substantial acreage to guar.

The guar plant in Kenedy was established in 1951 and operates on a year-round basis. Not enough of the beans are produced in Texas and Oklahoma so that some are imported each year from Pakistan and India.

The Kenedy plant extracts vegetable gum from the beans. The gum is used in a number of industrial processes such as mining production, petroleum drilling mud compounds, manufacture of paper, printing pastes and other specialized uses.

The major product recovery from guar bean processing is a 35 percent protein supplement animal feed widely used by cattle feeders and feed manufacturers in Texas.

Farmers in the area who plant guar can expect yields of from 400 to 800 pounds per acre. The crop will sell for \$4.00 per hundred, F. O. B. Kenedy, Grade No. 1.

Mr. Stewart said that one of the principal reasons guar has failed to produce sufficient beans in this area is because it has been planted too early. It should be planted in late spring.

The guar plant grows to about three to five feet in height and the beans can be harvested with a standard grain combine.

Pot Pourri . . .

It's that time of year when families move themselves to the backyard to dine summer evenings. As pleasant and hospitable as is the summer tradition, there is a hidden danger lurking in the pretty shrubs, trees, and flowers, according to J. E. Peavy, M. D. Commissioner of Health for the Texas State Department of Health. He advises, "On your next backyard cook-out, don't make your weenie skewer from an oleander branch. Even if your host offers you one peeled and sharpened, tell him politely but firmly: "Thanks, but no thanks."

The things are poisonous—leaves, limbs, flowers, bark and roots. When a group of hunters suddenly sickened after broiling steaks over an open fire, a doctor detected symptoms of digitalis poisoning. All disclaimed and connection with digitalis, a powerful heart stimulant.

But when the medico learned that oleander limbs had been used to skewer the steaks, he had his answer: oleander branches contain a poison which acts like an overdose of digitalis.

Chances are many of your backyard shrubs and flowers actually are making powerful poisons behind a facade of beauty.

Of all plants grown in the average American home garden, an expert on plant poisons counted more than 100 which contained poison, some lethal. The same authority counted 54 harmful plants in a single issue of a seed catalog.

A dime package of castor bean seeds, for example, packs a poisonous punch sufficient to kill five children.

One tulip bulb contains enough poison to kill a man. And sweet peas, although seldom fatal, are poisonous enough to keep a victim bedridden for weeks with a form of paralysis.

A poison in elephant ears, so plentiful in Texas, causes a painful swelling and itching of the mouth, tongue and throat when chewed. A growth called "dumb can" gets its name for the fact that when chewed it causes tongue swelling to the point that speech is impossible.

Admittedly there are few actual deaths attributed to eating poisonous plants. But the potential is always there. And your guess is as good as anyone's as to how much discipline illness is caused by backyard foliage.

Besides the ones mentioned, here's a partial list of the most common poisonous plants. Poisonous parts are indicated in brackets: Monks hood (all parts), water hemlock or poison hemlock (all parts), larkspur (foliage), fox glove (foliage), Christmas rose (roots), mountain laurel (all parts), gold-chain (seeds), all species of rhododendron (foliage) wild black cherry (dried foliage).

All this is important to know, even though we can't imagine anyone chewing on elephants ears! But this might serve as a warning . . . not to let the family get too famished before starting the steaks!

Anyone have a recipe they would enjoy sharing? Vida Brown took a bean salad to Wednesday Study Club luncheon at Leota Wiley's, that was said to have been most palatable. Doris Forrester did a repeat and shared it with me. It was one of the best salads I have ever eaten. I shall try to "con" Vida out of the recipe and pass it on to you. What about it, Vida?
