YOU FROM POLLS Wheeler county wheat producers with less than 15-acre allotments, for the first time, may elect to participate or not to participate in a national wheat program.

LESS THAN 15-AC

DOES NOT KEEP

County Agent, Charles D. Jackson said among the provisions of the proposed 1964 wheat program were those covering the less than 15-acre allotments. Such a producer, if he desires to vote in the May 21 referendum and be eligible for price support and land diversion payment, must declare his intentions at least seven days prior to the referendum.

If the small producer files a written intention to participate in the program, thus becoming eligible to vote in the referendum, he obligates himself to participate if two-thirds or more of the nation's growers vote 'yes'

(All wheat producers, including the 15-acre man, will be under acreage allotment provisions.)

On the other hand, Jackson pointed oiut if the less than 15-ac. producer does not desire to partic-pate in the program, he files no pate in the program, intention and will not be eligible to vote in the referedum. He will not receive certificates, price support or land diversion payments. However, such a producer still will be required to plant within his acreage allotment and his wheat nust find a sale on the open mar-
