WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

May 19 will be Rural Life Sunday in Texas and also the beginning of Soil Stewardship Week. The fifth Sunday after Easter is traditionally the day for emphasizing the spiritual values in rural life.

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District conducted a tour on Tuesday morning of this week for the pastors of all churches in the County. Results of soil conservation work and its benefits was observed on this tour in the Northern part of the County. Many sermons throughout the nation will be on Soil Stewardship on May 19.

According to Regan Brown, extension rural sociologist, "Emphasis of Rural Life Sunday and Soil Stewardship Week this year will be on measures to help solve problems of low rural economic conditions. Rural poverty is sometimes covered by inadequate and inefficient use of resources, he says. A lack of skills, education, special training, & leadership can also result in poverty and poverty may cause inadequate schools, poor roads, erosion of social and community life and economic retardation.

Church leaders are deeply concerned with the problems of low incomes and underemployment due to its crippling effect on the human personality. The broader concept of stewardship today is a concern for the welfare of people and the use of conservation to benefit them and not so much the preservation of the soil," says Brown.

There is an increasing recognition on the part of the people and communities of the nation, that soil and water resources are not only vital but vulnerable & therefore, demanding of continuing constructive attention. As the awareness has grown, more than 2,900 soil conserv. districts have been formed especially to accomplish the individual, community, and national goals of better resource management.

Most important, soil stewardship—the spirit of a responsible people at work on the land has become a vibrant, growing force as ever-increasing numbers of us recognize and accept our obligations under God to nurture His precious gifts of soil and water.

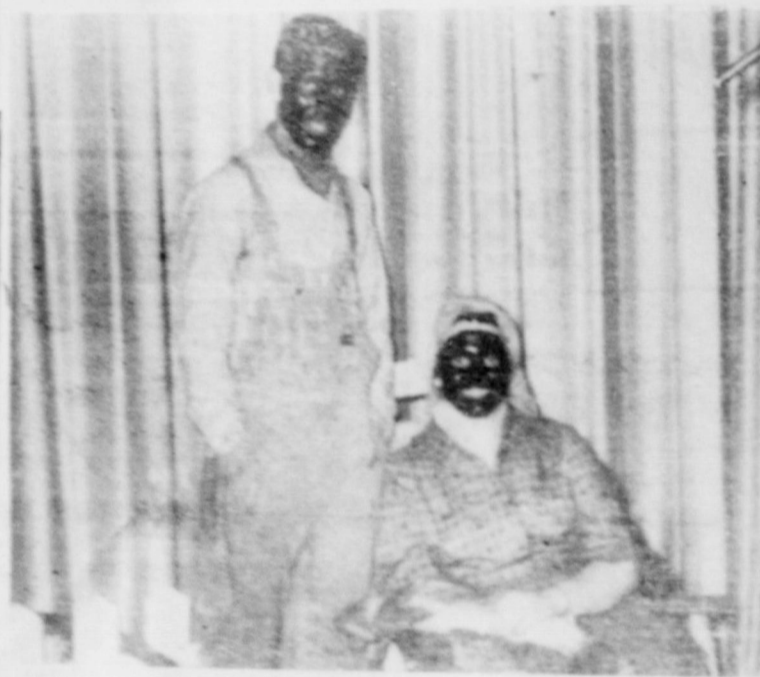

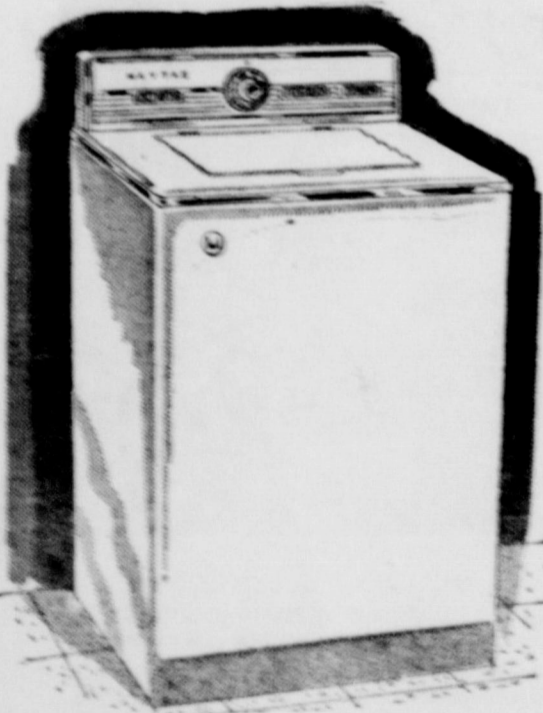

"BASSING" FOR TROUT

Trout fishermen can borrow a chapter from bass angling techniques if they're looking for large fish on opening day.

In fact, the Mercury outboard fishing experts say it might be wise to go all the way — borrow bass tackle and lures, as well.

Cold water temperatures found in early spring call for a change in the fishing tactics usually associated with trout. Until the water reaches the 50-degree level, hatching insect activity will occur.

Trout, too, are inactive in the mud, and even the choicest of foods fail to move them far. If the water is high and murky the problem is compounded.

In such situations casting or spinning gear rigged with deep running bass plugs can save the day. Any style that resembles a minnow and will burrow right down on bottom is acceptable.

Fit the outfit downstream, standing directly above hole's where trout will be lying. Let the lure sink to the bottom and drift into the hole. Retrieve an inch at a time if the current is strong enough to work the lure. If the water is still, occasionally wobble the offering.

Just like the indomitable bass fishing, say the Mercury people — "ask 'er deep and slow."

The secret of this style of fishing is to get the plug right in front of the fish's nose. It takes plenty of patience and a few strange lures. But these "water witch" techniques are guaranteed to let the fish swim a little longer day.

We are proud of our bands and the fine concert performed by them under the direction of Miss McMurry on last Sunday afternoon.

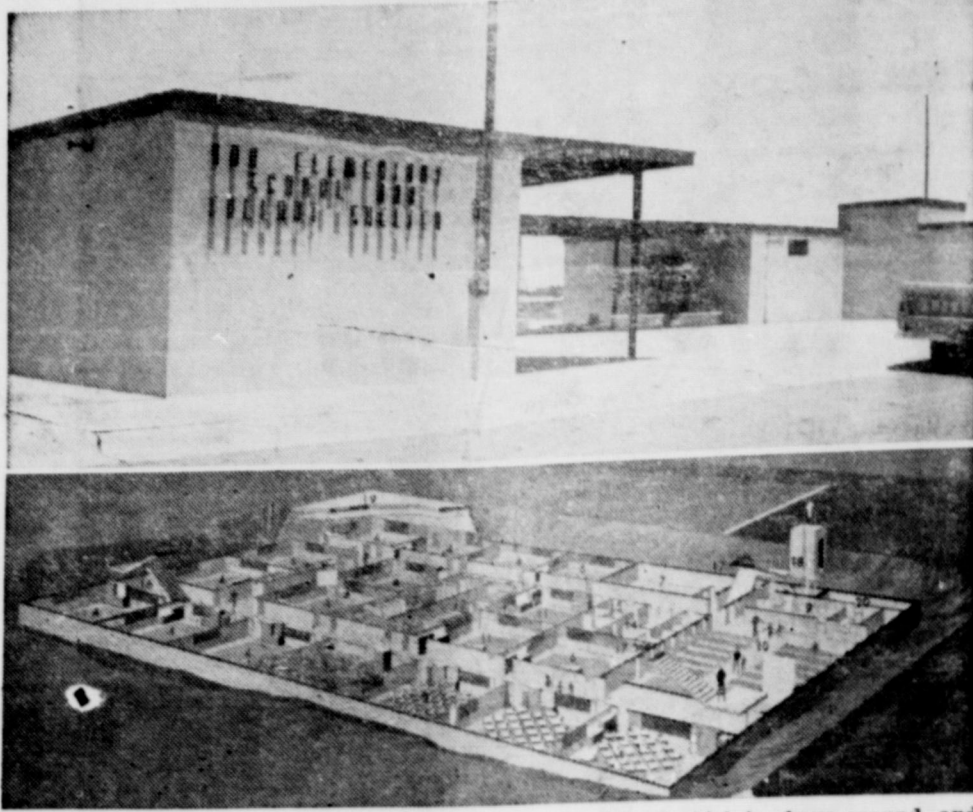
