





#### Notice To Teachers Planting Retirement

Any teacher planning to retire at the end of this school year should notify the Teacher Retirements System as early as possible. The law requires filing any selec-tion of an option with the retirement system at least 30 days before the effective date of retirement. Effective date can be the last of the month in which the member serves the last day of duty. The first check will be mailed at the end of the following month if the school has paid the retirement system. Those schools on a 12-month salary basis have generally found it possible to pay this retained salary at the end of the spring term to avoid delay in the first retirement check.
