Parade, Ex-Student Reunion Are Slated For Saturday At Mobeetie

The Old Mobeetie Jail will be the site of the 44th annual Mobeetie Old Settlers Reunion on Labor Day, September 4, 1995. In addition to the Old Settlers Reunion, Mobeetie Ex-Students will be sharing memories Saturday, following a parade in downtown Mobeetie to kick-off activities over the weekend.

The parade will be held at 10:00 a.m. Saturday. Those interested in being in the parade are urged to be across the street north from the First State Bank of Mobeetie at 9:00 to get their place and numbers. Parade entries will be judged and prizes awarded. This will be the 13th year for the parade.

The school gym will open at 10:00 a.m. for registration and visiting to begin. All former students and teachers are invited to attend. There will

be snacks for lunch. The business meeting will be held in the afternoon, followed by a catered barbecue dinner by Steve Walker. Drawing for door prizes will be held during the program.

Chances on a quilt will be offered throughout the day and the drawing will be held at the end of the day.

Saturday evening, the annual dance will be held at the Arbor on the jail museum grounds. The dance will begin at 9:00 p.m. and continue until 1:00. "Outback Express" will furnish the music for the evening. Admission will be \$5.00 per person.

Sunday will be a day of visiting and remembering labor days past, as families and close friends get together.

On Monday, the 'Old Settlers' will begin gathering at the old jail for a day of activities and visiting. Registration will begin at 9:00. Barbeque will be served at noon and entertainment will be from 1:00 until 3:00.

WHEELER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS ARE RECOGNIZED FOR THEIR SAFETY PROGRAM

The Texas Association of Counties is pleased to honor Wheeler County by presenting them a 1994 Safety Award. The Texas Association of Counties administers a Workers' Compensation self-insurance pool in which Wheeler County participates for their Workers' Compensation coverage.

They are receiving this award for their record of involvement and commitment to safety in the workplace, as well as controlling their Workers' Compensation claims. To qualify for this award, the entity must have a safety program rated in the top 10% of approximately 350 governmental entities that collectively self-insure their Workers' Compensation in this pool.

These programs are evaluated by the Texas Association of Counties Safety Specialists who work with each pool member to develop loss control and safety programs. In the evaluation of the program, the following criteria are considered:

- Safety program elements in place.
- Activity and success of program in the 1994 calendar year.

Support for the program by the upper management, governing board or commission that directs the operations of the entity.

Recent loss history.

Improvement in the safety program since 1993.

Through the safety program and participation in this pool, Wheeler County will save approximately \$55,406 in Workers' Compensation costs in 1995 compared to the manual rates for Workers' Compensation published by the State of Texas and used by insurance companies. The savings are the result of a good modifier and discounts received through participation in this self-funded pool. The discounts are greatly influenced by the safety performance of the county.

The Texas Association of Counties proudly recognizes these efforts to maintain a safe workplace and extends its congratulations and appreciation to Wheeler County.

LEGAL MATTERS

DON'T DUMP ON TEXAS

All across Texas, record numbers of landfills are closing down. Some have simply filled up with trash. Others cannot meet tough, new environmental standards. As a result, many individuals and businesses are having to drive farther and pay more to legally dispose of their trash. Unfortunately, some have opted to save time and money by dumping trash wherever it is convenient, not necessarily where it is legal. In increasing numbers, too many Texans are giving in to this temptation.

What the Law Says

According to the Texas Litter Abatement Act, it is against the law to dump garbage in places that are not licensed landfills. It is also illegal to collect or receive litter in a place that is not an authorized landfill, even if that place is on private property. For example, you could be subject to prosecution if you allow a friend or relative to discard old appliances or furniture on your land. Other common violations include throwing litter out of cars and boats, and junking old cars in rivers or lakes.

It is also a crime to dump trash at an illegal site for commercial purposes. For instance, some unscrupulous trash haulers will increase their profits by dumping your trash illegally and pocketing the landfill fee. Likewise, a business may not dump construction or manufacturing debris in a vacant lot to avoid paying the costs of disposing trash in a legal landfill.

You Can Make a Difference

You can make a real difference by reporting illegal dumpers and dump sites to local authorities. You can also take direct action by organizing volunteers to clean up river banks, dumping grounds and roadsides. Clean sites are less likely to become dump sites.

If a problem is severe enough, you can organize local groups to publicize the situation. Enlist television, radio and newspapers to spread the word about illegal dump sites and to highlight the efforts made by local residents. Involve high schools, neighborhood groups and business organizations in the fight against litter.

Other steps you can take to curb illegal dumping include:

Dispose of your own waste properly. Always place trash in bags and tie off the top before transporting it or placing it in a dumpster.

If you need to dispose of large, bulky items, call your city or town for assistance. If you use a private hauler, ask for tipping fee receipts or other proof that they actually took your trash to the landfill. Report suspected illegal trash haulers to the authorities.

If you run a business, report all competitors who are illegally dumping their solid waste. No one should profit or gain a competitive advantage by breaking the law and trashing our state.

Work with your neighbors and local officials to set up licensed transfer stations, places where you can legally drop off your trash without having to drive all the way to the county or municipal dump.

Take Action

To report illegal dumping, call the regional office of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission or your county health department.

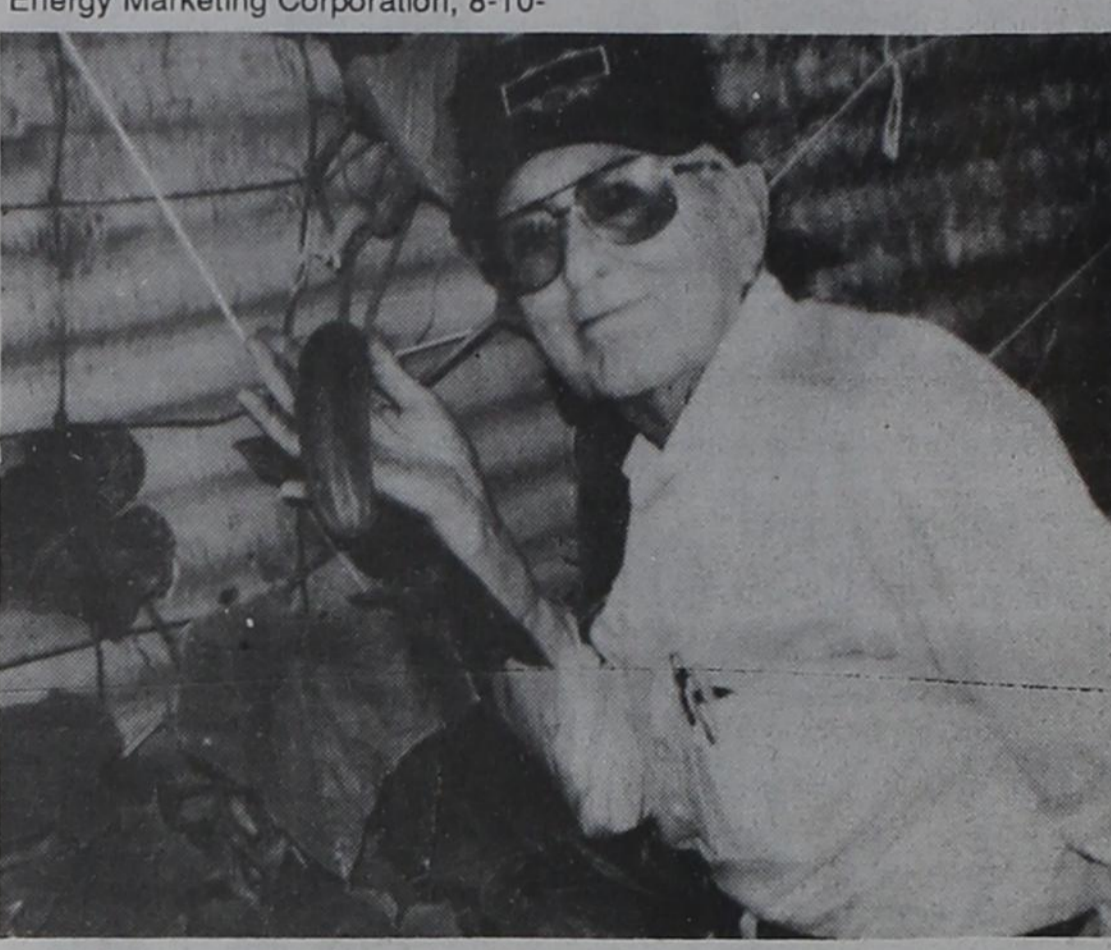

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Extension Update

"Bzzz." The alarm goes off and you "hit the ground running." Every morning seems to be a battle with the clock as you get yourself and your family out the door. Except the clock seems to be winning the battle and you end up late or leaving things undone.

Your morning routine can be made easier with the little planning. If possible, allow yourself enough time to get ready without having to get a child ready at the same time.

Be sure to eat a quick, but nutritious breakfast. Bagels, fruit, yogurt, frozen waffles, juice and cereal are good choices.

Have a morning routine. Children feel a sense of control when they know what to expect each morning.

Allow extra "wake-up time" for the slow to wake-up child. Giving them the extra few minutes they need can reduce everyone's stress level.

Reduce distractions. Set rules about when television can be on and when it's O.K. to play with toys.

Designate a place for coats, keys, school work, lunches, etc. so there is only one place to check before going out the door.

Be sure to have an extra set of keys in a convenient place (Just in case you can't find yours.)

Allow children to do what they are able to do. Teach preschoolers how to dress themselves. Let them help "make breakfast" by keeping utensils and cereal at a level where they can reach them.

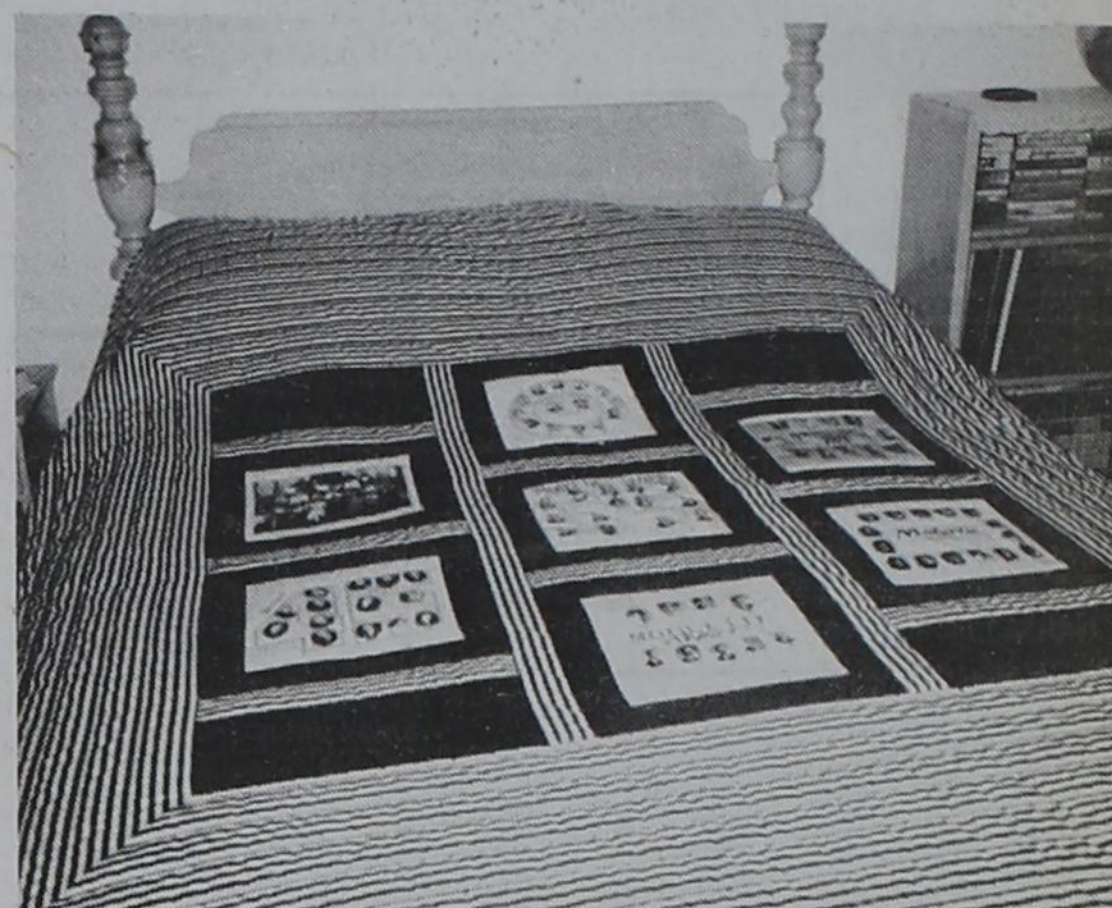

From The Minister's Desk:

A recent issue of the *Christian Chronicle*, a religious periodical, contained an article that was written by Bill Halstead, the minister of the Church of Christ in Griffith, Indiana. This thought-provoking article was entitled, "Cheap Life Is The Consequence of Spiritual Poverty" and it said: - - -

"There is no respect for human life at any stage until there is respect for human life at all stages. Several months ago we as a people were clenched in a paroxysm of grief and outrage at the carnage in Oklahoma City. We were aghast that anyone or any group could wreck such havoc, display such wanton disregard for human life or human suffering, just to make a point. How can human life become so callously disposable to anyone?"

"Perhaps enough time has now passed, enough calm reflection has been allowed, to permit us to reason better than in those first days of shock and disbelief. Perhaps now we can more dispassionately assess how such an attitude can develop."

"I watched the memorial service in Oklahoma City. I cried. I cried for the men and the women who died. I cried for the children. I cried for the families torn apart by this senseless slaughter. So did the nation."

"And yet, even as those tears were wrung from our hearts, even as Americans, from the president down, were feeling that collective loss and grief, other children were being slaughtered with equal disdain, and there were no tears. They were, somehow, different. We were not even allowed to call them children. Their tiny faces were shielded behind a careful cloak of verbiage. They were simply called a 'choice' and discarded."

"For them there were no tears. No trees were planted in their memory. For them there were no touching tributes, no tender poems, no pious prayers. They were simply killed and cast aside, because their lives were

inconvenient. More of them than the entire population of Oklahoma City have died and the only recognition they receive is the careful averting of our eyes."

"Is it anything strange, then, that there are those within our society who think human life is so cheap, so dispensable, that it can be discarded, cast aside, blown away, just to make a point? Where did these people learn that human life is that dispensable? Where indeed! When human life at its earliest and most helpless condition is disposable, how can human life at any other point be otherwise?"

"We gasp at news accounts of gang members killing gang members to protect their 'turf'. We cringe to hear of a mother who drowns her toddlers to become less encumbered, hence, more attractive to her lover. We shudder at stories of a nurse giving lethal injections to her patients. We cry to learn of a frustrated parent tossing a child who would not stop crying out of an eighth-story window. We ask continually what went wrong with these people, that they had so little regard for human life."

"Then we turn on the television, or go to a movie, or pick up a book, and learn against the master lesson of our generation. That lesson can be summarized as, 'To solve any problem, violence is the answer. Kill the bad guys. Blow up the bad guys' places. Mow'em down. Burn'em up. Do'em in.'"

"The fact is, human life cannot be more or less sacred at one time than at any other time. Life at any point cannot be respected, revered, and protected until life at its earliest and its latest point is equally respected, revered, and protected. We have sown the wind. Why should we be so shocked to reap the whirlwind?"
