SIX MUSTANGS PLAYED LAST GAME AT NICHOLSON FIELD

Wheeler's powerful Mustangs continued to roll on as they whipped a game but outlasted group of Tornadoes from Texline last Friday night at Nicholson Field. The final score was 30-0 but once again Coach Grady Burnett chose to give his reserves need playing experience instead of running up a higher point total.

This was the Mustangs 8th straight victory and brought them to the showdown battle with the Groom Tigers and the Claude Mustangs in the final games of the regular season.

Some of the importance of the Groom game was lost as the Tigers were tied by the Follett Panthers last week.

The Texline game was the last home game for the Mustangs and also the last appearance of six Mustang Seniors. The Mustangs left nothing to be desired as they held the Tornadoes to a minus 13 yards for the game and rolled to a whopping total of 421 yards themselves.

Wheeler chose to receive the second half kickoff and proceeded to grind out 70 yards in 8 plays for their 4th TD of the night. Wallace tackled on an 18 yard gain and Daryl Snelgrooves added another 31 for the big plays in the drive. Dunk Porter hit right guard for the tally.

Bobby Vanpool set up the final Wheeler touchdown of the game as he returned a Purnado punt 41 yards to the Texline 32. Hunter got 8 and Snelgrooves moved to the 20. Wallace took to the airways and after one incompleteness, threw to Porter for the score.

This was only the second completion of the game for the Mustangs but Wallace passed well and would have had a perfect night with just a little bit better receiving. A change in strategy called for an attempted kick for the extra point but this was wide and the Mustangs failed on each attempt to add to their total via the extra point route.

The Mustangs second unit took over in the fourth period and David Jamison took over quarterback duties. Johnny Hutchison broke for one good 32 yard run and ended up with a 53 yard total in 6 carries to pace to ball carriers on the second unit.

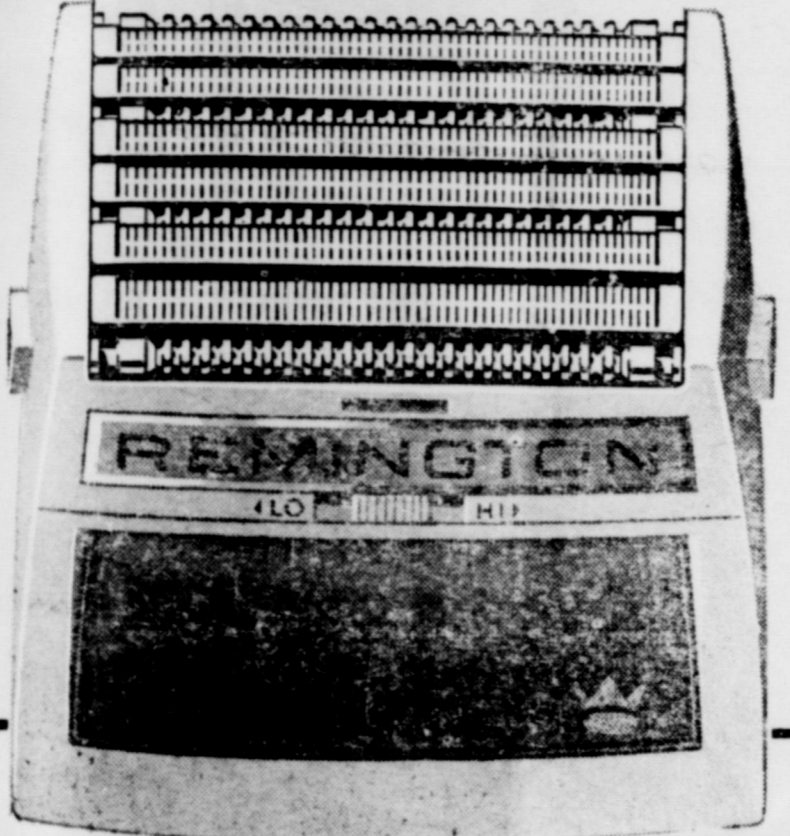

Saturday was a busy afternoon for Wheeler County 4-H members. With three County Wide Meetings being held in the County Court house, at 1:30 P.M. the Agents, Mr. Charles D. Jackson and Mrs. Cula R. Nowlin met with a group and organized a County Wide Rifle 4-H Team Club. The purpose of this club is to improve the knowledge and skill of its members in the proper care and handling of firearms and the management of target shooting ranges and competitions and to develop among its members those qualities of leadership, loyalty, cooperation, and good sportsmanship which is essential to good citizenship.

The following officers were elected: Mike Holt, president; Wheeler; Ken Fields, vice president; secretary-treasurer, Bill Clark; Reporter, Paul Range of Shamrock.

How to properly store grain on the farm so as to prevent insect infestation is a question that is being asked by many farmers. Since Wheeler County has 43,000 acres of grain sorghum, this is a common problem with many farmers that are storing their own grain.

Spraying the inside of the bins with methoxychlor, TDE, or premium grade malathion is advisable before the grain is stored. After the grain is stored, it should be dried to a moisture content of 12% or below. The drying process generally requires about two weeks and after this period, it is recommended that the grain be fumigated. Insects such as the angoumois grain moth may infest the grain in the field and infested grain may be brought into storage.

Several fumigants are effective. They are formulated as various combinations and are sold by trade names under different trade names.

How To Fumigate
Liquid fumigants should be applied to the entire surface of the grain. The surface should be fairly level. A 3 to 5 gallon capacity pump-type compressed air sprayer may be used to apply fumigants to small quantities of grain. Apply the material as a coarse spray. This may be done by removing the spray nozzle and flattening the tip of the spray rod with pliers. Some operators merely remove the disc from the spray nozzle. When fumigating large volumes of grain, use some form of power equipment. Two types that may be used are compressed air tanks, and diaphragm or brass gear-type pumps. These pumps may be operated by a small mo-

tor or from take-off of a tractor. Select or construct a discharge nozzle that disperses the liquid in an even pattern as a coarse stream of spray. Close the bin after applying the fumigant and do not open it for at least 24 hours—preferably 4 or 5 days. "Air out" the bin at least overnight before entering. As an added safety precaution, always have at least two men present at the time fumigant is applied.

Surface Protectants
When the bin is opened and aerated, usually it is a good practice to apply a surface protectant. Materials approved for the purpose are: light mineral oil (approved for use only on shelled corn and grain sorghum—malt and vinyl mineral oil should be applied at the rate of 2 quarts per 100 square feet of surface grain. Three applications can be made without exceeding the tolerance of 200 parts per million. Several companies have a special oil that is recommended for this treatment such as Humble nectane 40, Texaco 1519 and Conoco.

Premium Grade malathion may be applied to the surface at the rate of 1/2 pint of the 57% emulsifiable concentrate in 1 to 2 gallons of water per 1,000 square feet of grain surface area. Malathion 1% premium grade wheat flour dust may be applied to the grain surface at the rate of 30 pounds per 1,000 square feet. The grain grade malathion mixed with two 1,000 bushels of grain.
There is no research information available on how long malathion will protect grain under Texas conditions, nor whether it will kill weevils and moths in field-infested grain. These facts should be kept in mind when using this material.

CAUTION: Fumes are dangerous and should not be inhaled. Follow carefully the cautions listed on the manufacturer's label. In almost all cases, persons applying fumigants should wear gas masks with a full facepiece and proper type, however, will not protect the wear against heavy concentrations in bins where oxygen has been replaced by fumigants. The effective life of a gas mask canister is limited. Keep an account with a new one after 30 minutes of continuous or intermittent exposure to grain fumigants. Avoid curate account of the time that a spilling the fumigant on the skin, clothing or shoes. Clothing wet with fumigant should be removed at once and the skin scrubbed with soap and water. Grain that has been fumigated should not be fed to livestock until odor is gone.

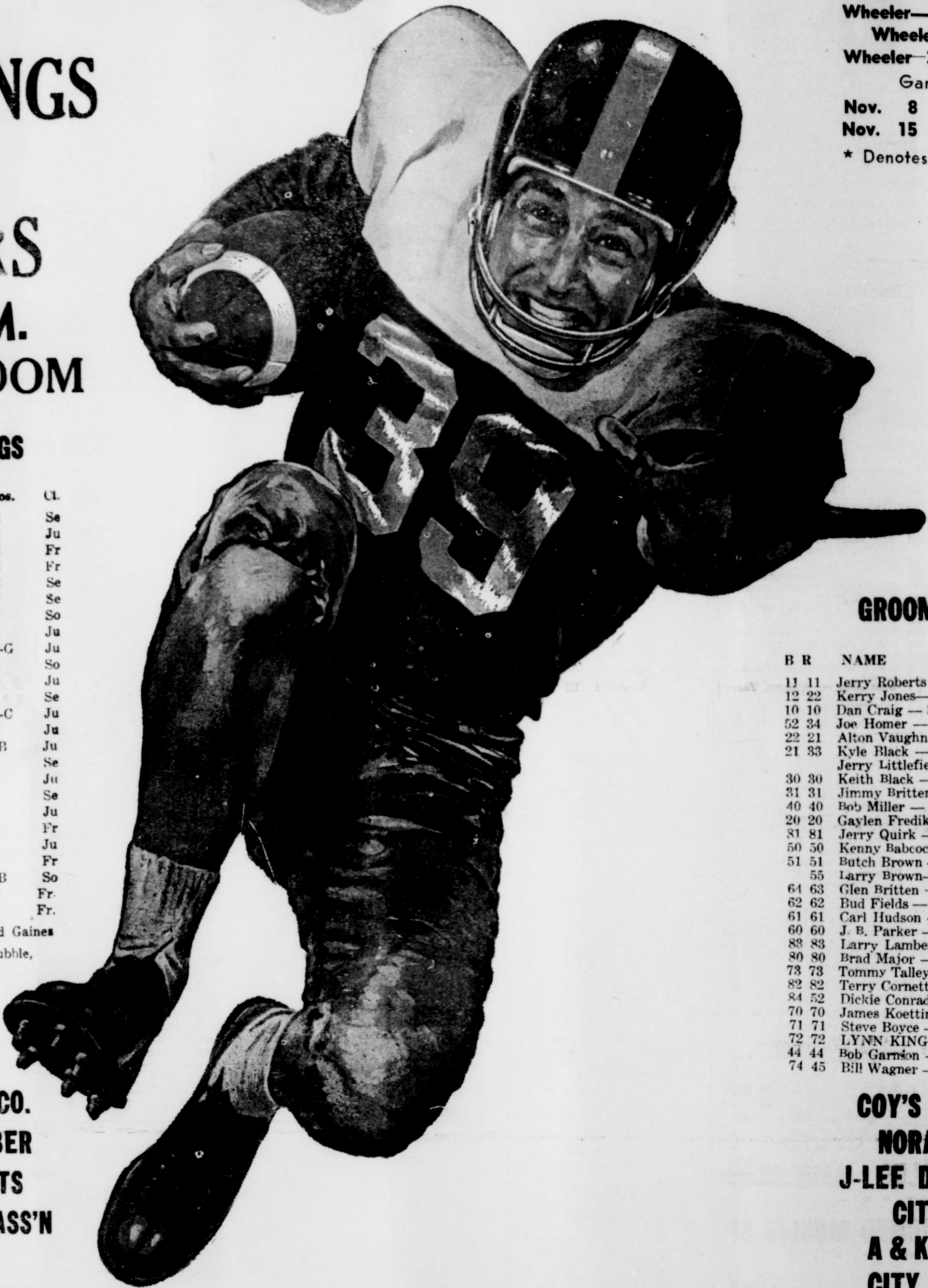

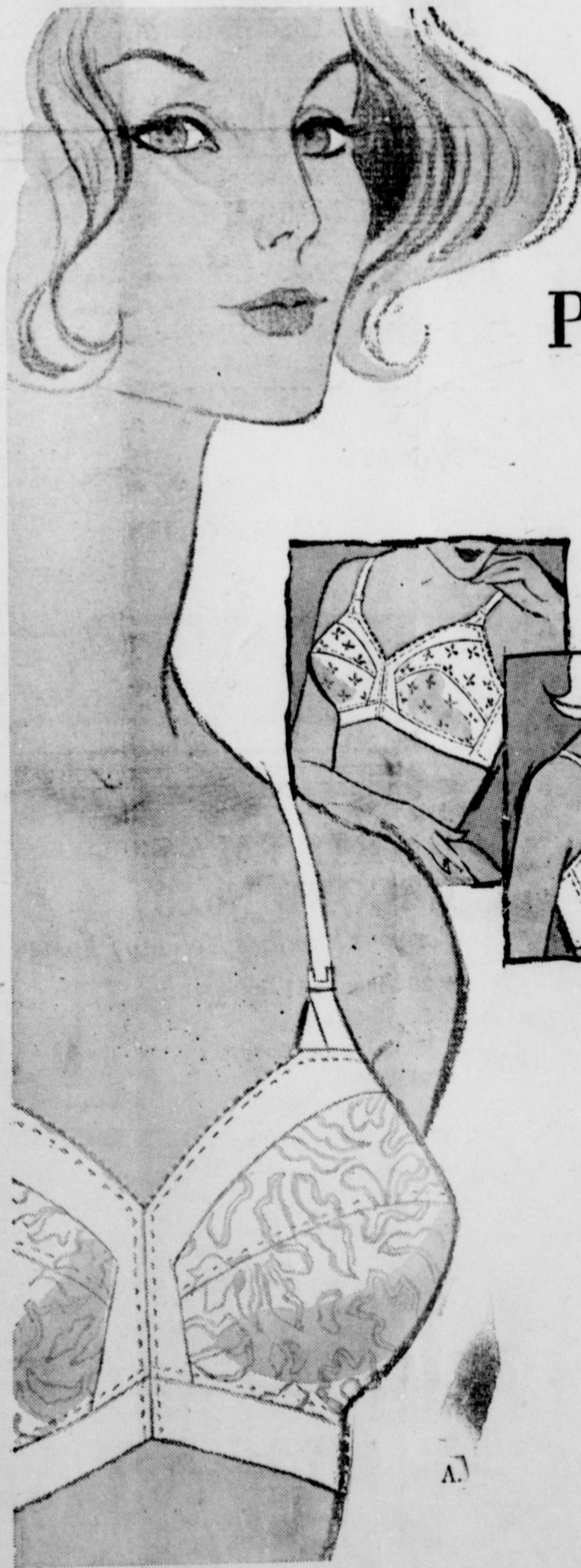

meet the tour at Helsingore on the Danish Riviera. This was quite an experience and you would have been proud of Howard—you feel such a foreigner but we finally found our way to the train station and caught the right train and sat with a Danish couple and he and Howard played "chords" more or less as we managed to find out where he worked and and where they were going and he pointed out the sights of interest to us. He spoke very little English but we both felt that we got a good look at local color on this trip.

We went to the Rosenberg Castle and Christiansborg Palace and Hamlet's Castle on the afternoon tour. We had a wonderful lunch at Marielyst which is the finest restaurant on the Danish Riviera and it was a spectacular stargazing. That night we went to the Atlantic Palace for dinner and floor show.

We had one night free in Copenhagen and went to Tivoli Gardens which is like a big Coney Island but just beautiful—all the trees are lit up like Christmas trees and we had dinner on a balcony overlooking a big outdoor stage where they had entertainment. We went with 2 other couples and ended up riding the big roller coaster and sides. They have fireworks at midnight and it's better than the fourth of July.

We left Tuesday for Berlin and stayed at the Berlin Hilton. The food was wonderful and the first night we had steak and fried potatoes but then we told them we would like to have German food the rest of the time and it was marvelous. Wednesday a.m. we had a tour of the Western Sector—all along the wall where monuments have been made at each spot where people have died trying to escape from the Eastern Sector. The City of Berlin place fresh flowers each day on these markers. There is still much evidence of the devastation in Berlin during the war although there are lots of big beautiful new buildings. West Berlin is a big bustling city with lots of people and traffic. That afternoon we went behind the wall and I don't mind telling you I had mixed emotions about that trip but I decided if Howard was going he wasn't going to leave me behind.

We had to sign up the day before to go and they gave us instructions and asked that no one on the tour make remarks to the guides on the buses or wear these little lapel pins of the Brandenburg Gate which is a sign of resistance to the Wall and not to offer anyone a cigarette from a pack because they would take the pack & trade it for a month's rent or something. We had to tell them exactly how much money you were taking in with you and all this sort of thing. We went in 4 buses so I felt like maybe there was safety in numbers. We had to leave our local guides and the F. E. McDonald Agency representatives at "Checkpoint Charlie" the gate that tourists are allowed to enter that tour in the buses about 40 minutes while the East German Intelligence officers came aboard and checked our passports and looked us over. He didn't look too friendly to me and I was about ready to go home then. Finally they gave us a guide and we were off on a tour that lasted about 3 hours—of course they gave us their grand tour of all the new and best sections of the City. We were allowed to stop and leave the bus at one point and that was the Park honoring the Russian soldiers—a beautiful park with tremendous monuments honoring the weeping mother and the old and young Russian soldiers. We passed Russian soldiers as we walked through it. As we drove through the city pass apt. building there was a lady up in a window that waved all the time our buses were passing. The people looked oppressed to me. (I asked Howard if I read this into their expression or if he noticed it too.) There is very little traffic and everyone rides bicycles or walks which is quite a comparison to West Berlin. The stores are all small and display very little in the way of merchandise and of course are all State owned. Our guide was quite nice and little things he very subtly said let us know he was not completely happy with his way of life—he was a man between 50 and 60 and told us that he was paid 100 Marks per week, which is \$25.00 American dollars. I wouldn't have missed that trip for anything after I made it because you read constantly about this

part of the world but until you see it you can't really comprehend. As we drove back through the gate to the free side we couldn't help but applaud and cheer that we were Americans and allowed to return to a free way of life. A poor old lady was standing on the corner waving to all of us as we left and I said I just felt like she just wanted some contact with the outside world. We passed the underground bunker where Hitler committed suicide and Howard got pictures of it although we weren't supposed to take pictures there. While we were in Berlin there were several attempted escapes and several of them were successful although one young man was killed we heard. There is just so much to tell we'll just have to wait until we see you and can look at our pictures (if we ever get them all developed). We saw so much in such a short time, it will be a thrill to us to see the pictures because I'm sure we have already forgotten some of the things.

We flew to Frankfurt on Friday and left there for the U.S. at 3:00 in the afternoon and arrived N.Y. about 7:00 A.M. time. We gained 6 hours coming back and that was the longest day of our trip. No one slept and we had been up about 26 hours when we finally went to bed in N.Y. We flew into Orlando Saturday and Mother and Zeke and Other Mama and Mary Louise met us and Mother drove us home. We were a sad looking crew when we arrived back in N.Y. and when the Public Health Officer came aboard our plane to look us over and check certificates I was afraid he wouldn't let us back in. I tried but didn't know was. And everyone was a little homesick to get home and see their kids. Believe me there is no place like the good old U.S.A. and we should all thank our luck stars we were born Americans even if Howard and I did have it little trouble proving it.

The only disappointing part of the trip was that we didn't have any time for shopping. We did manage to get Zeke a pair of the leather pants like the German boys wear and got Linda a leather bag and wallet and bracelet but Ditty (my aunt) had sent me a check to buy something for myself and I didn't even have a chance to spend it. You didn't want to miss a tour to go shopping so I came home with no mementoes of my trip.

We flew a total of about 30 hours in 10 days and I said I had just about had enough flying for a little while. I used to drive the kids out to our new jet Port and watch the planes leave for Houston and L.A. and I would always say, "I wish that I could get on one of those big jets and fly away someplace."
