Trees and Shrubs Will Be Available in 1964

By Charles Jackson, Co. Agent

Wheeler County residents are reminded that some 17 species of trees and shrubs will be available for planting by Texas landowners early in 1964. These plants are made available by the Texas Forest Service at a delivered cost of \$1.50 per hundred.

These trees and shrubs may be used for windbreaks, soil stabilization, and Christmas tree (red cedar) plantings, but they cannot be used or resold for shade or ornamental purposes. All seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof papers and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser. Orders must be in multiples of 50 and orders for less than 100 seedlings or seed (black walnut) will not be accepted.

Application forms for ordering trees may be obtained by writing to the Director, Texas Forest Service, College Station. A supply of these forms are also available at the County Agents office.

Mimeographed guides for planting these shrubs are available from the County Agents office also. These guides are written by the Extension Forestry Specialist and they should be very helpful to landowners.

LEAFWORM IN AREA COTTON

Leafworm damage has been noticed in several fields in the area. Leafworm damage is easily seen when any sizeable populations exist in the field. Leafworm populations increase rapidly and heavy damage may occur in a short period. Control should be taken before extensive leaf damage is evident in the cotton. In fields where bollworms are present, producer, should insure that insecticides applied for leafworm control will also control the bollworm population. Increased bollworm damage has been noted in several fields, in the area where light insecticide applications were made for leafworms.

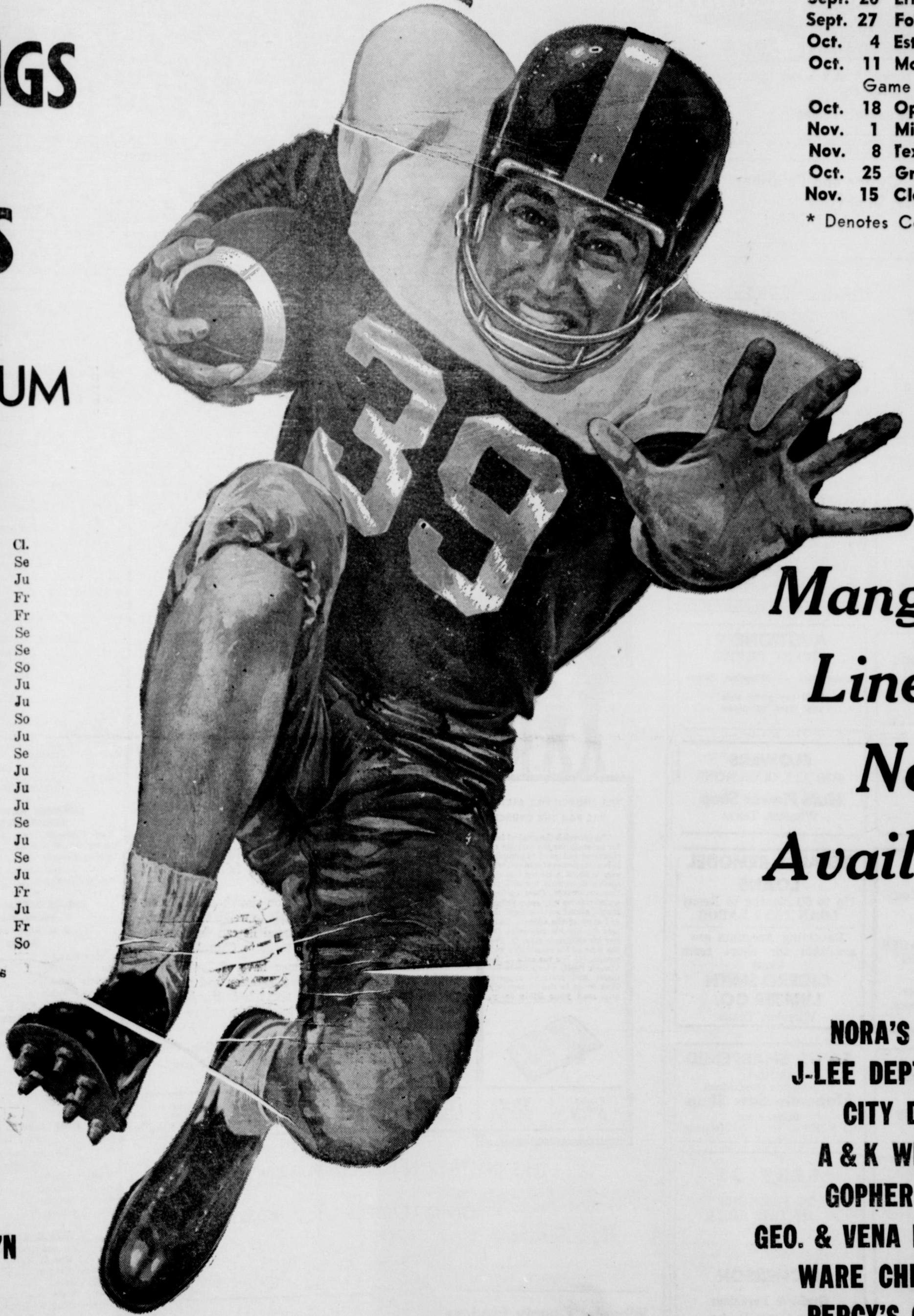
