MUSTANGS TO MEET MATADOR AT CLARENDON FOR REGIONAL PLAY

The Mustangs were crowned champions of District 5-B last night following their victory over the Claude Mustangs.

They kept the Mustangs unsteady and enabled them to enter the playoffs against Matador at Clarendon.

The defense kept Claude out of the game except for a few screen passes in the half that gave them the opportunity to cross the goal and score quick to take advantage of their two touch-downs.

After receiving the opening drive and nine plays later they were 30 lead with the drive capped with a 13 yard scoring pass from Dunk Porter to Bobby Vanpool.

Claude leaped high between Claude defenders to haul in the pass. Daryl Snelgrooves circled right end for the two point and the huge crowd settled to see if Claude could catch the Mustangs.

Mustangs ripped the Claude Mustang blockers paying the big chunks of yardage by running Wheeler backs.

Porter made the hard run drive when he turned the ball and made 31 big yards in a play to carry to the 30 yard line.

Coach Fox, ex Claude halfback, carried the ball one time and enough for the night as Menninger put a crushing tackle on the Claude 35 a couple of plays following the kickoff.

Porter passed to the next play to Porter who returned 2 yards to Wheeler 46. A personal foul by Claude moved the ball to the Claude 41. Bobby Vanpool fumbled and recovered for Claude on the 34 yard line.

Porter moved the home crew a first down with a pass and fumbled as he was hit hard by the Mustangs and Wheeler nothing on the Claude 49. Nothing to stop the Mustangs this time and they headed for the end zone. Vanpool picked up 2 and Porter added another 8. Hunter hit the first down with a 6 yard run and Porter hit the Claude 23. Vanpool lost a yard but Porter hit back and scored again on his left end for 24 yards and TD. Hunter and Porter led the Mustang blockers to the end zone. The first quarter ended minutes later and the Mustangs enjoyed a 14-0 lead.

The visitors started a drive from the Wheeler 41 late in the first quarter and moved right down to the Claude 30. Wallace hit Porter with a 15 yarder to the 15 but the Mustangs were penalized for delays on the next play back to the 20. Snelgrooves turned the corner at left end and outran the Mustang secondary to the end zone as an official caught a Mustang fumble and the TD was wiped out. The Mustangs went to the air and were unable to gain and Claude took over on their 20. This seemed to take just a little of the

stream from the Mustangs and gave Claude a new life. Wheeler moved deep into Claude territory late in the first half, but after gaining the Claude 19, were forced to give up the pigskin on the 27 as Wallace was thrown twice for losses attempting pass. Bartley started throwing, trying to get a quick score before the half, and twice had a man behind the Mustang defense but overthrew his receiver each time. Mitchell picked up 14 yards on a draw play as the first half came to an end.

Wheeler got the ball on the Claude 49 following an exchange of punts that in the third quarter and seemed headed for another score but once more bogged down deep in Claude Territory. Hunter muddled the Claude defense up the middle and the Mustangs found themselves on the Claude 22. Two incomplete passes from that point killed the drive and Claude took over. Mitchell got a couple and then Bartley passed to Mitchell on a screen pass that moved all the way to the Wheeler 30. Two running plays netted nothing and Bartley took to the air once more and hit Morrison on the Wheeler 3 yard line. It took Claude 3 plays to get over with Wood hitting off his left tackle for the final yard and with only 23 seconds gone in the last quarter, the Mustang lead had been cut to 14-6.

The Mustangs showed their championship quality by taking the kickoff and driving 65 yards in only 7 plays to add to their insurance TD. Hunter returned the kickoff to the 35 and quickly got 11 more as he rammed off guard. Wallace moved the pigskin into Claude country with 6 yards on a keeper. Porter was held to just under 2 yards and the measurement for the first was 3 and the first down on the 43. Porter literally rammed his way down to the 36 and Hunter tackled on another first down with a 14 yard blast up the middle. Snelgrooves hit off his right tackle and after getting into the secondary, cut back on his left and left everyone behind as he scored standing up.

This touchdown came with 8:18 to play. Wallace passed to Burks for the extra points and the Mustangs had a 16 point bulge.

Both teams exchanged punts after the kickoff and Claude got the ball for their last time on their dead at that point. Bartley lost a yard and then threw incomplete. The big bomb hit the Mustangs again on the next play when Bartley passed to Mitchell on the screen and he was finally stopped by Bobby Vanpool at the Mustang 43. Vanpool was the last Mustang defender and got by a blocker to down Mitchell. An incomplete pass and another completion on the screen pass to Mitchell gave the Claude Mustangs the ball on the Wheeler 13. Bartley then hit Mitchell on the 1 and Wood carried over on the next play. The try for point was no good and Claude had the consolation of being the only team to cross the Mustang goal twice in a game.

Wallace was content to fall on the ball for three straight plays and time ran out and the Wheeler Mustangs had won their second consecutive district championship.

Wheeler and Matador officials met in Clarendon last Saturday morning and when the discussions were all completed, both parties agreed on Clarendon as the site of the bi-district clash between the Wheeler Mustangs and the Matador Matadors.

The contest will be played this Friday night at 7:30 and Arling Cordell, Wheeler Superintendent of Schools, said that Wheeler has been designated the home team and will be seated on the south side of the field. The Clarendon officials said that temporary bleachers would be put up to help take care of the overflow expected.

This will be the second year in a row for these two old rivals to meet for the bi-district crown. Matador prevailed last year and the Mustangs haven't forgotten and will be out to avenge that loss. Coach Burnett listed two boys as being out for the game, Jamie Moore and Mike Goad both have the mumps and will be unable to play. No injuries were suffered in the Claude game and the rest of the team should be in good shape.

"We will play just like we have all season," Coach Burnett stated and he also said, "I think the boys remember last year and want to get even with the bunch from Matador. This is their game and I think they are ready for it."

Votes were cast on a basis of 10 points for first place and 5 for second. If a coach voted for a player from his own team for a first place spot, the player was given only five points thus the maximum amount of points a player could receive was 105.

Neil Rogers of Wheeler and Bob Patton of McLean were the leading vote getters with 65 each.

All positions was a battle royal between standouts of the panhandle to get four players on the first team and two on the second team.

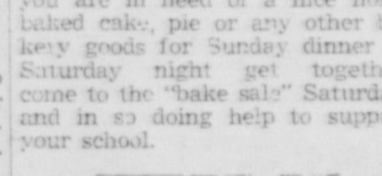

I had the pleasure of attending the Golden Wedding anniversary celebration of the Marvin Bradstreet's today, Sunday, Nov. 17. The cake was delicious, and the punch refreshing but the most wonderful thing to me was feeling of true friendship. You see I taught some of the Bradstreet children while I was teaching in the Wheeler school. Don't ask me how long ago.

It was a joy to see Mr. and Mrs. Bradstreet looking so young and pert on their 50th wedding anniversary. I enjoyed visiting with the children and friends.

One very pleasant surprise was meeting an old friend from New Mexico days. She now is Mrs. Bradstreet. I failed to write down her husband's name, but he is a nephew of Marvin's. Her first husband, who passed away several years ago, was named Rowland. I remembered he was barber. When I met them the yard started a little farming operation out near Pie Town, N.M.

On the 13th of June, 1935, several farmers in our area had pinto beans up and looking good. That night we had a killing frost in about 8,000 ft. elevation. Many farmers lost most of their crop. Mr. Rowland said,

"I'm leaving this country. You can't make a living in a country where it frosts every month in the year." He left.

While he was there my uncle and I walked across the mesa for about a mile and paid his in Tex. canned beef to cut our hair. He was doing barber work in a dug out. The next time I saw Mrs. Rowland she was living in Vernon Tex., in 1951. She has since become Mrs. Bradstreet and she and her husband still live in Vernon.

It was a real pleasure to talk over old time with her today at the Bradstreet celebration.

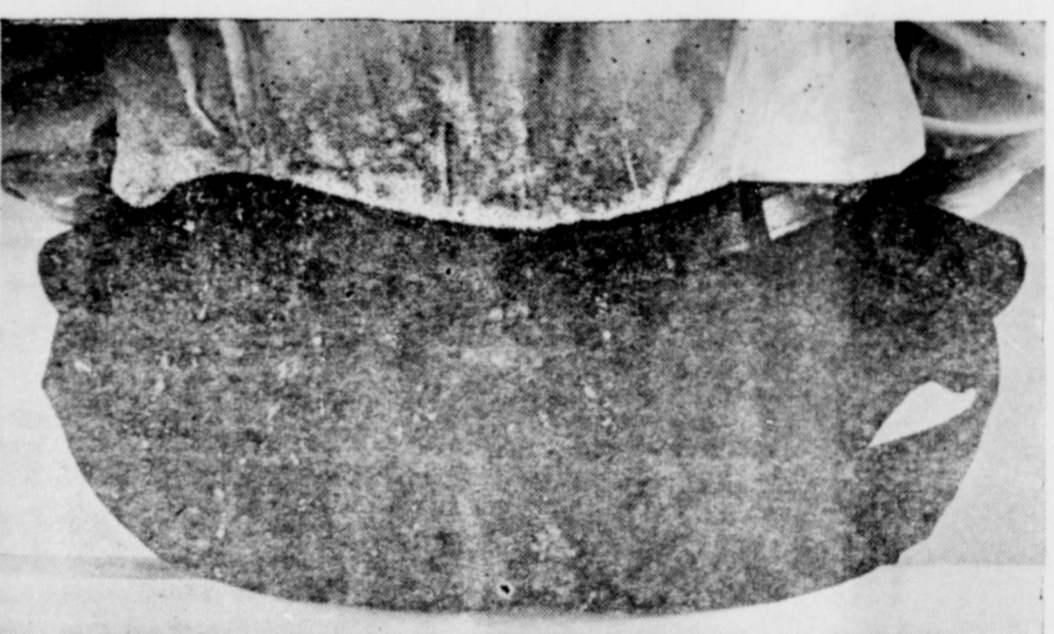

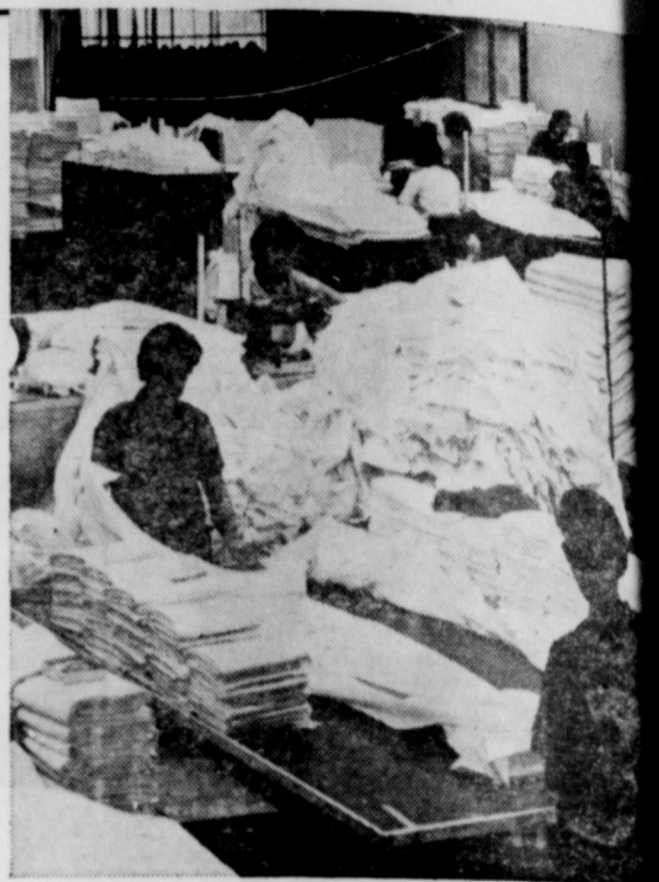

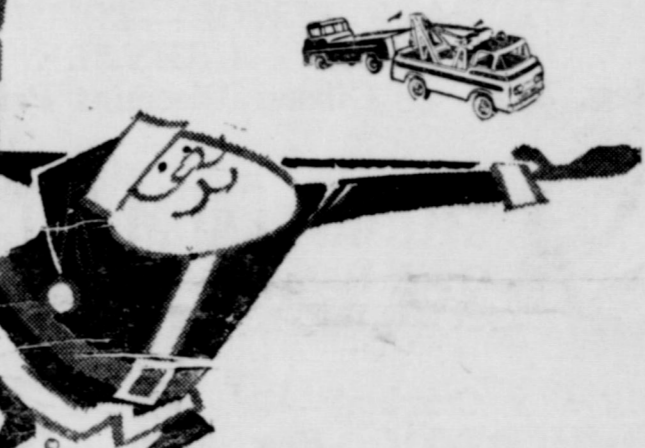
