The District 1 4-H Electric Leadership Camp held last week at Camp Scott Able at Cloudford, N.M., was most valuable to those who attended from Wheeler County.

Eight hours of intensive electrical instruction were given to the 4-H members, Adult Leaders and Agents who attended. Those attending were divided into groups each attending the four sessions.

Awards and projects, dealing with the Southwestern Public Service and National Awards in the Electrical Field which are given on the merits of the 4-H Electric Record Books. The session was taught by Gains Franks, County Agricultural Agent, Potter County and Lewis Hollingsworth and Nelson Brown of Southwestern Public Service Company. The sessions on Electrical Terms was taught by Joe Luscombe and Jake Webb, Southwestern Public Service Company. Common electrical terms are learned and some practical wiring connections were actually made.

This course included how to care for the cord and the appliance and the multiple use of many of the newer appliances. This also included experience in preparation of each class at the food they prepared, therefore it was enjoyed by all.

The District 1 4-H Council had charge of a leadership laboratory led by Marshall Crouch, Assistant State 4-H Club leader. All District 4-H Club members attended these sessions.

The Council members had charge of the Flag Ceremonies, Vespers and Grace. Recreation was planned by various Agents in the District which included, Table Tennis, Shuffleboard and Volleyball tournaments between the various counties.

The four evenings were full of fun and fellowship with planned parties in the form of Circus, Drama Night, College Field Day, Folk Games, Square Dancing and games.

More Details On 1964 Grain Program Given Bob Byrd, Of The ASCS

The 1964 feed grain program will be basically the same as the successful 1963 program, Bob Byrd, Wheeler County ASCS Office Manager, said today. The sign-up period for both fall and spring-sown crops is planned for early 1964.

As recommended by producers, the Department of Agriculture has held changes to the "fewest consistent with law and economic circumstances." The major change in next year's feed grain program is an increase in the top limit on diversion from a farm's base acreage with an increase in the rate of payment for maximum diversion. This is intended to encourage producers to divert additional feed grain acreage and to increase their income.

In 1964, a producer may divert as much as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage (in 1963 it was 40 percent) and those who divert from 40 to 50 percent will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acres diverted. As before, the minimum acreage diversion will be 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base.

As in the 1963 program, two rates of diversion payments will be offered: (a) Producers who divert at least 20 percent of their base acres will be eligible for payments (based on the county price support rate for the feed grain diverted) on 20 percent of the diverted acres; (b) for diversions between 20 and 49 percent of their acreage, the payments on this part of the diversion will be at a rate of 50 percent of the farm's normal yield times the county support rate. Participants who divert 40 to 50 percent of the base (or 25 acres, if this is greater) will receive 50 percent maximum rate of payment on all acres diverted. Under a new legal provision, payments may not exceed 20 percent of the value of the land diverted.

The total national average price support levels in 1963, but a slightly larger proportion of the support will be made available through loans. For the feed grains covered by the program, the loan rate, support payment and total national average support are, respectively: Corn (per bu.), \$1.10, 15 cents, \$1.25; barley (per bu.), \$1.15, 12 cents, \$1.27; sorghum (per bu.), 84 cents, 12 cents, 96 cents; grain sorghum (per cwt.), \$1.73, 23 cents, \$2.00.

Payments-in-kind for both diversion and the non-loan part of the price support will again be made in the form of negotiable certificates with which the producer may receive grain from CCC stocks or cash at the ASCS County Office if he wishes CCC to help in marketing the certificates.

As in the past, eligibility for payments and price support will be conditional upon maintenance of normal acreage (1959-60 average) in soil-conserving crops or practices. Also as in the past, a producer who owns or operates more than one farm will be eligible to participate in the program on one farm only if, on each of his other farms, the feed grain base is not exceeded.

Charles Jackson Gives Sorghum Survey Results

Recent results of the sorghum midge survey in the High Plains area have shown a steady population increase in the midge field in certain "uncultivated" grasses. It is generally agreed among workers in his area that grain sorghums "heading out" after 1 August will be most susceptible to infestation.

Questions from persons interested in grain sorghum production indicate that further explanation concerning chemical control of the midge is needed.

Previous work has shown that the heaviest egg laying by midge usually begins about the third day following sorghum head emergence from the boot. Chemical control depend upon the destruction of the adult female before egg laying begins. Thus each sorghum head must be covered with insecticide within three days after emergence from the boot to prevent egg laying within its spikelets. Under ideal conditions of uniform heading, a single well-timed insecticide application should give good midge control. However it is realized that many fields will not head uniformly and two to three applications at three to four day intervals may be necessary for effective control.

Both Endrin and Toxaphene may be applied only once each season to grain sorghum. If either of these chemicals are used for the first spraying, Sevin should be used for additional applications.

Sevin should be applied at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 lbs. spray concentrate per acre when using 80% wettable powder.

Toxaphene should be applied at the rate of 1/3 to 1/2 gal spray 6 lbs. of toxicant, per gal.

Endrin should be applied at the rate of 1 1/2 pt. of spray concentrate per acre when using 1.6 lb. of toxicant per gal.

J. B. McLEAN HAS POEM PRINTED IN CONGRESSION RECORD JULY 11

During World War II J. B. McLean of Mobeetie wrote a poem in tribute to Gen. Douglas MacArthur. With the assistance of Walter Rogers, Texas' representative to Congress, the poem, entitled "That Man in the Philippines" was published in the July 11 Congressional Record in Washington D.C.

Introductory remarks by Congressman Rogers appears before McLean's preface and the eight stanza poem.

A baker, McLean wrote the poem Dec. 31, 1941, just after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. He was working in a bakery in Dallas at the time. He is presently employed in Coston's Bakery in Pampa.

"I have been asked many times why I have not had it published before, but a proper outlet never presented itself until Congressman Rogers came to Mobeetie to speak at Old Settler's Reunion," McLean said.

In his speech he described how General MacArthur had looked when he last spoke before Congress, still standing straight and erect and speaking with a vigorous voice. Mr. Rogers' speech reminded me of the poem I had written and filed away so long ago."

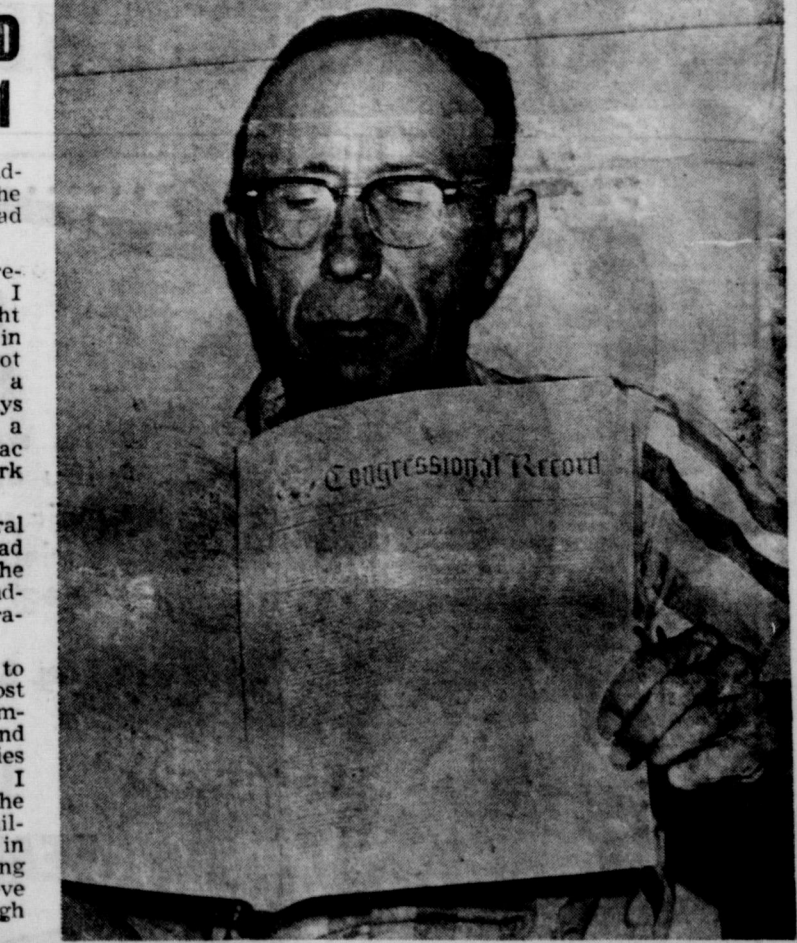
After Congressman Rogers' address, McLean told him about the poem and that his speech had "brought it to mind again."

"He said he would like to present it to General MacArthur. I had no idea at the time he thought it was good enough to appear in Congressional Record and did not know about it until I received a copy of the Record a few days ago. He told me he had mailed a copy of the record to General MacArthur, who lives in New York City," McLean said.

McLean has never met General MacArthur personally, but had watched and admired him as he performed his duties as commander of the Far Eastern war operations.

"I just wrote it to pay tribute to a fellow man. That doesn't cost anything," McLean said. "He seemed to me like a man qualified and capable of performing his duties with efficiency. At the time, I wrote the poem, I noticed that the Japanese were passing the Philippines, where MacArthur was in command. They were occupying territories farther out. I believe they respected him, even though they were our enemies."

This inspired him, McLean, said, to write the tribute poem.

GAS AT PHILLIPS WILDCAT WELL

Phillips Petroleum Company gauged 6,210,000 cubic feet of gas daily on a drillstem test at the company's No. 1 Carville "A".

The test on the rank wildcat was run between 14,885-928 feet in the Hunton Lime. Location spots some four miles northeast of Mobeetie 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of section 99, block A-5, H&GN Survey.

Nearest Hunton production is some 125 miles east in Oklahoma. The test was open 47 minutes on the tool and operator had water blanket to surface in 17 minutes and gas to surface in 28 minutes. Recovery was the 4,000-foot water blanket plus five feet of distillate, 680 feet of distillate cut formation water and 272 feet gas cut drilling mud. The initial shut-in pressure was 6,610 pounds in 31 minutes and final was the same in 61 minutes.

Phillips was running another drillstem test, also in the Hunton, from 14,938-987 feet and had gauged 4,260,000 cubic feet of gas daily with gas to surface in eight minutes.

The test spots some six miles northeast of the Pan American Petroleum Corp., Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 1 Mobeetie, Operating Unit which was completed from Douglas perforations between 6,886-70 feet feet for 7.6 million cubic feet of gas daily.

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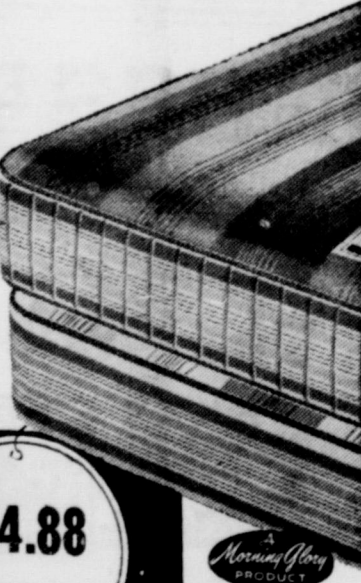

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:
"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County, Texas; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.
"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:
"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointed officers and employees of said political subdivisions."
"AGAINST the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointed officers and employees of said political subdivisions."
Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Monday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount of such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amount expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary election form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a, which shall read as follows:
"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for the payment of assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:
"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall provide the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.
"(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not eligible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for a period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.
"(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.
"(4) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.
"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinafter set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).
"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

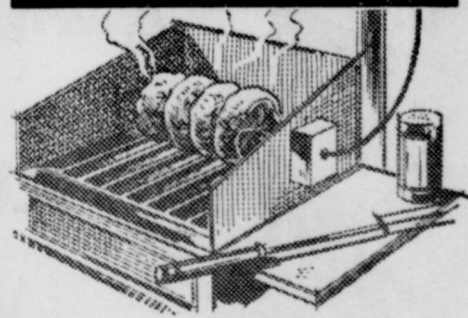

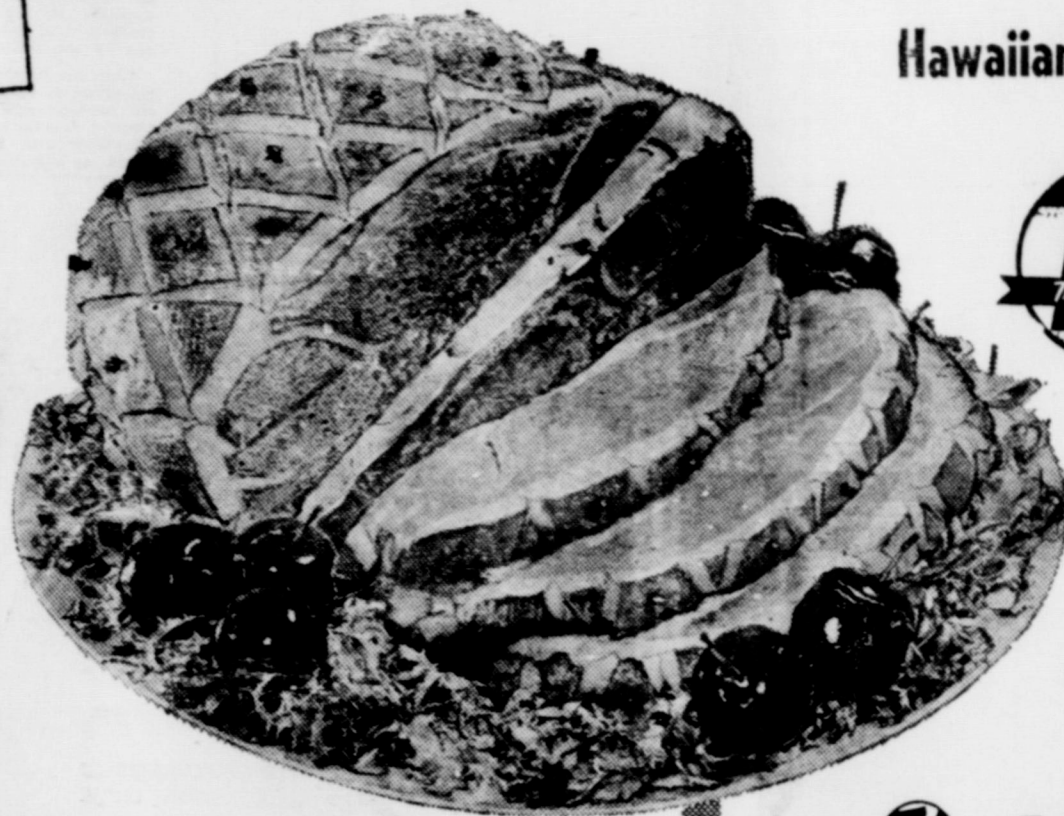
