MANGUM DOWN 28-6; ERICK NEXT

Wheeler Mustangs went on Friday night and opened the season for the Mangum team in good fashion. The Mustangs ripped the Tigers 28-6.

The Mustangs second half was a row and it was a ball club than the one that had been beaten. Crisp running by all in the backfield stood out in the defense was tough on the offense for the one drive the Tigers mustered.

Snelgroves contributed a big gain on the drive with a 13 yard run down to the 6. The attempted pass for the 2 pointer failed and Wheeler had a 6-0 lead with 1:34 left in the quarter. The first half was all Wheeler's as Mangum was unable to get any drive started. Bobby Vanpool brought the crowd to its feet early in the second quarter as he took a booming punt off the foot of Houck, Mangum quarterback, on his 4 yard line and headed up the sideline. Vanpool was finally hauled in on the Tiger 49 and again the Mustangs hit pay dirt.

Stout running through the Tiger line by Hunter and Snelgroves moved to the 3 and Hunter ran up the tally with a bull like run over his right tackle.

With the extra point try failing, the lead was upped to 12-0. Terry Vanpool set up the next Mustang score with a pass interception on the Mangum 24. This drive brought the only pass completion of the night as Wallace hit Bobby Vanpool with a 21 yard

er from the 23 down to the Mangum 2. Two plays later Mendall Hunter rammed it over and Wallace added the two points on a keeper around his right side. The half ended three plays later and the Mustangs took the breather with a 20-0 lead.

If the Mustangs thought that they would run the Tigers out of the park in the second half, they soon found out differently as the Tigers rolled 80 yards in 15 time consuming plays following a punt. Henderson was the big ground gainer on the drive, as he was for the Tigers all night, and made the last 33 yards on a good run over the Mustang right side. The Mustangs took the kickoff and quickly dispelled any Mangum hopes as they used only six plays in moving for their 4th touchdown.

The big play on this drive was a 34 yard run by Daryl Snelgroves down to the Mangum 17. Hunter cracked the line twice and the ball was on the 4 and Richard Wallace went off his right tackle for the score. Hunter went in standing up for the extra points and with 11:55 to go in the contest Wheeler had a 28-6 lead. Neither team could get any drive going after trading punts until late in the game when Houck punted and Snelgroves took it in on the Mustang 15. Bobby Vanpool threw a

yards on 16 tries and Snelgroves picked up 66 yards in 9 plays. Dunk Porter added 46 yards to the Wheeler rushing total as he carried 9 times. Burks and Rogers were in on a number of tackles for the Mustang defense which held the heavy Tigers at bay most of the game.

Coach Grady Burnett said that the Mustangs play was improved over last week with fewer mistakes and much better blocking than was shown against Canadian.

ERICK NO. 3

The Wheeler Mustangs travel to Erick, Okla., to take on the Erick Bears this Friday at 8 p.m. This will be the second week in which the Mustangs have taken on an opponent from Oklahoma. Erick opened their season last weekend lost to Sayre 14-0 while the Mustangs were racking up their second win of the season over Mangum 28-6.

Coach Burnett said that Erick was not as big as Mangum but that they had good scrappy ball club that could grow as well as run and that the Mustangs would be in for a real tough game. Coach Burnett also said that he didn't know just yet who his starters would be for this ball game. The Mustangs defeated Erick last year 16-0. PROCLAMATION BY THE

GVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

IT KNOWN THAT I, John Connally, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby order a Special Election to be held on the State of Texas on November 9, 1963, and hereby given to the people as required by law. The Judge of each county is directed to cause said election to be held on such date in each precinct in the county in the manner required by law.

SPECIAL ELECTION IS ORDERED FOR THE

purpose of adopting or rejecting the following Constitutional Amendments submitted by the 58th Legislature of this Regular Session in 1963:

Amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance grants to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government for the United States for purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are available out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amounts expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

Amendment of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article VI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Debt Compensation Fund covering appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions.

Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 8, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto signed my name officially and caused the Seal of State to be affixed hereto as Austin, this the 12th day of September, 1963.

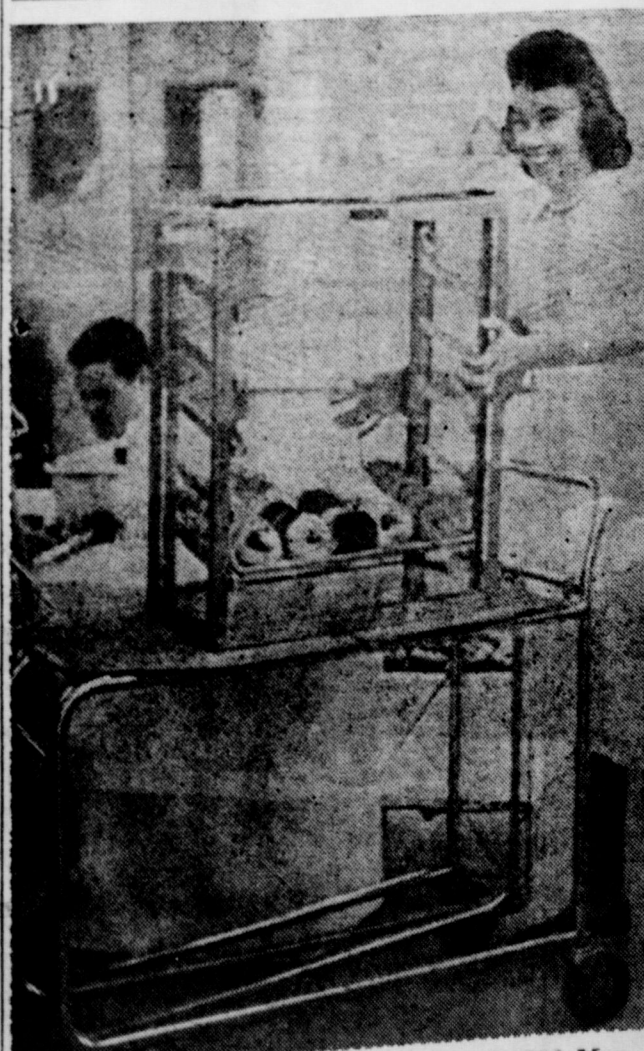

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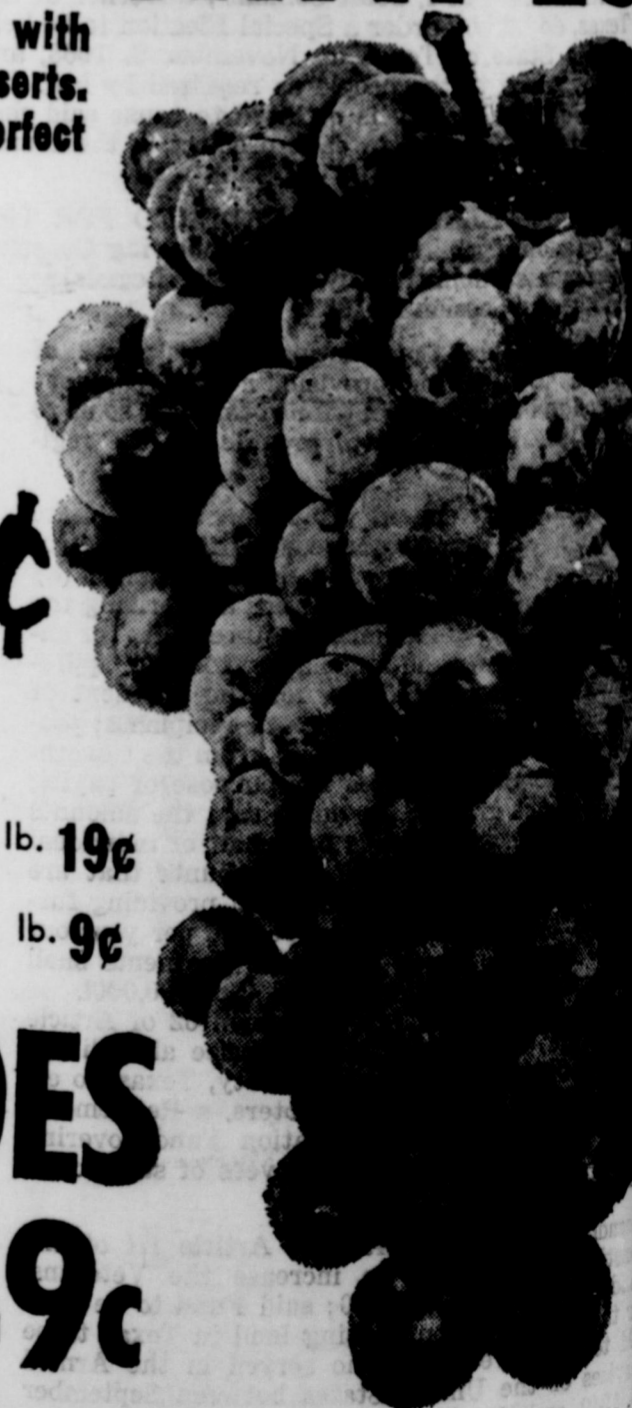

Results from the statewide small grain performance trials are now available, according to Dr. I. M. Atkins, agronomist and small grain section leader Texas A&M University on the High Plains at the U. S. Great Plains Field Station by Dr. K. B. Porter, and on cooperative farm locations at Stratford and Wellington and in cooperation with Delhart Langford at the High Plains Research Station at Plainview. Performance trials are in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Recommended varieties for the area are based on several years of testing and include, not only information on grain yield, but also disease reaction, cold tolerance, forage characteristics and for wheat, milling and baking characteristics. Dr. Atkins said. Twenty varieties and strains of wheat were tested at all locations. At Wellington, Kaw ranked first in grain yield averaging 17.4 bu. per acre followed by Rodeo, T. 1. Alamo, Cascade and Edison in order. At Stratford, the highest yield was produced by Warrior, a Nebraska variety, which averaged 40.5 bushels. Bison ranked second averaging 40.0, while Crockett and Kaw third with 39.5 bushels.

The irrigated test at Bushland was destroyed by hail near Stratford and Wellington. Performance tests over several years show that high quality varieties are available for the High Plains. They include Tascosa, Warrior, Bison, Kaw, Aztec and Ponca. Good yielding varieties, classed as mellow gluten wheats in quality include Triumpa, Improved Triumph, Crockett and Concho. Tascosa, because of its hail resistance and good straw characteristics has proved especially adapted to irrigated wheat areas.

Oat performance trials throughout the state were seriously damaged by low temperatures. At Bushland, all varieties were winter-killed. More than half the state acreage was destroyed by the low temperatures. Survival data from several stations show that Wintok, Winter Excel, Cimarron, Bronco and Mustang are the most cold tolerant and are recommended to the High Plains.

A spring seeded test at Bushland was damaged by hail but produced yields of 39 to 67.8 bushels per acre. Alamo ranked first in yield followed by Surograin with 61.9, Frazier with 61.3 and Mustang with 57.7 bushels per acre.

Barley trials also were seriously damaged by low temperatures. About 45 percent of the crop in Texas was lost during the freeze. The varieties, Kearney, Chase, Hudson, Meimi and Dutches survived but were destroyed by hail at Bushland. Varieties recommended for the High Plains are Kearney, Meimi, Rogers and Cordova. The last two are less hardy but usually survive. The new Oklahoma variety, Will, is well adapted in Texas and foundation seed will be available in 1964.

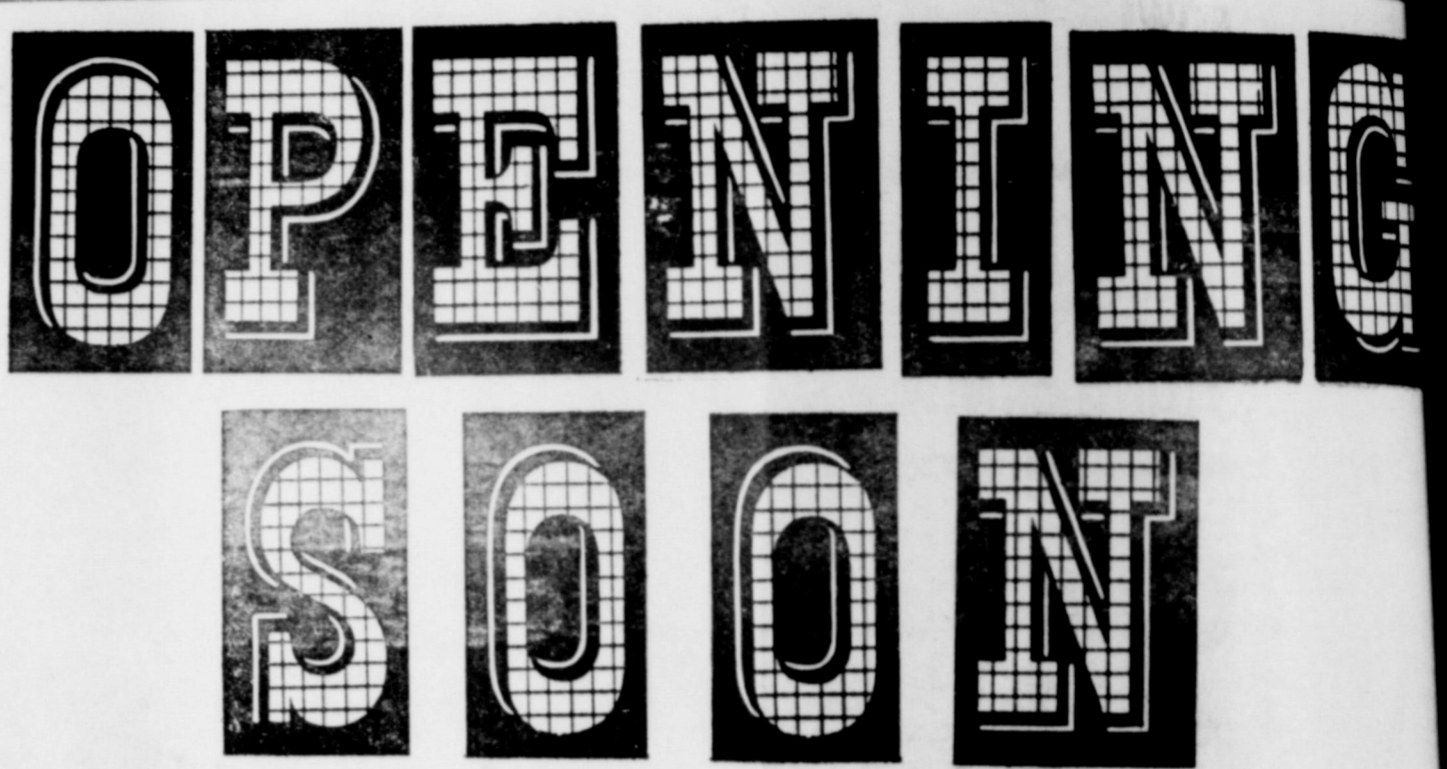

WHEELER COUNTY
Soil Conservation News . . .

It is time to plant cover and green manure crops on row cropland in the Wheeler Soil Conservation District. Several farmers already have their cover crops planted. C. O. Killingsworth and Harold Hill of Wheeler-Kelton Community, Bennie and Norbert Schlegel of Lela-Shamrock area, and Bob Stokes of Texla Community are only a few that have planted cover crops.

The use of Cover Crops pays in three ways. Wind and water erosion control is probably the biggest benefit. Increased crop yields due to increased organic matter and fertility for the crops to follow is a big item. Winter grazing of the cover crop saves a lot of feed as well as additional income.

Rye, barley and wheat make excellent green manure and cover crops. Tom Bryant at Kelton and Fred Waters at Wheeler have used vetch and grain mixtures to add a nitrogen building crop. Vetch is also very good winter grazing plant.

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District Supervisors want to encourage the conservation of grain sorghum stubble as much as possible. The trend is toward a lower rainfall for our area. Leaving the stubble will help hold down the sandstorms so common to our type soil. The use of cotton burrs on the sandy soils has increased crop yields this year. Cotton burrs are excellent erosion control material. Conservation pays dividends.

Accomplishments in the District last week included the layout of a terrace system on Farmer Heflye's farm on Gageby creek, and on Wiley McCray's farm just north of Gageby creek. In that same vicinity Grady Dodd is in the process of building a grassed waterway and two diversion terraces.

R. D. Mills had a farm pond staked last week for the purpose of providing livestock water.

Conservation plans for the best treatment of their lands were prepared by J. T. Cummings, C. M. Sullivan and B. W. Brown. J. T. Cummings is planning to plant some alfalfa, clover and grass. C. M. Sullivan is planning to construct a reep type pond. B. W. Brown is planning to do some range seeding, brush control and drill a well and erect a water storage facility.

Walker Bags Lynx Cat
Bus Walker, owner of a farm 6 1/2 miles Southeast of Wheeler discovered a large cat trapped in two number two steel traps placed on his land after he had seen the cat several days ago. Mr. Walker exhibited the animal in town Tuesday morning. The estimated size of the animal was about 25 pounds.

According to Mr. Dick DeArment of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, in Wheeler, the lynx cat, such as the one caught by Mr. Bus Walker this week is relative active in this area. The lynx is a member of the bobcat family. It is medium sized, short-tailed, reddish brown or grayish cat about the size of a chow dog. There are pronounced spots on the whitened underside of the animal while the upper portions have a reddish brown cast and are streaked with black. The tail of the animal is usually shorter than the hind legs and is colored with black and white on the tips. There is usually a tuft of longer hair on the sides of the tail of the lynx while the rest of the fur is shorter.

The average adult lynx will weigh 12-20 pounds with a rare cat weighing as much as 36 pounds. Although the cats have a decided preference for rocky canyons, they adapt well into the area where they are and easily are at home in less rugged terrain. The lynx is an apt tree climber and will take to the foliage when chased by dogs. They are active mostly at night but often begin their roaming well before sundown. They are consumers of mostly small animals and birds. Ground squirrels, mice and rabbits make up the bulk of the diet.

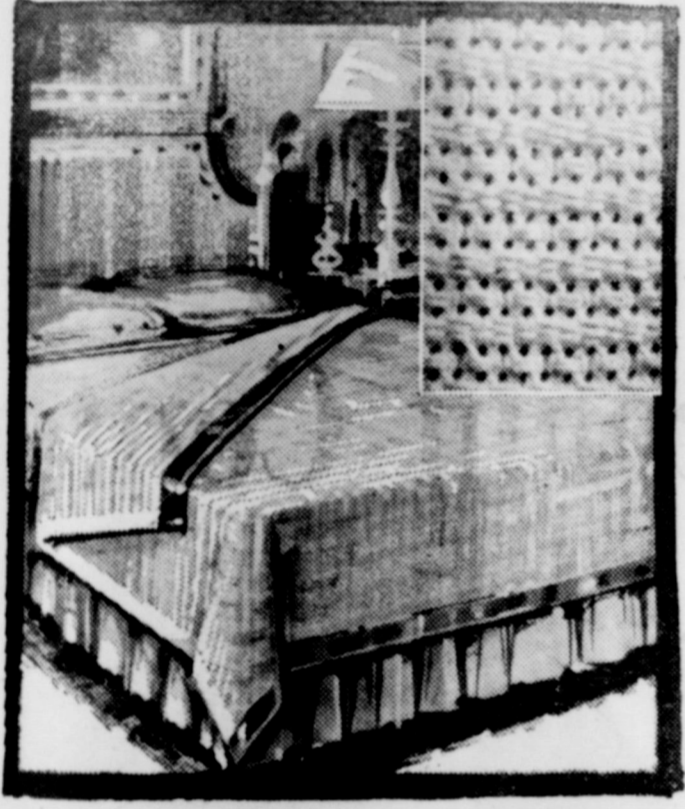

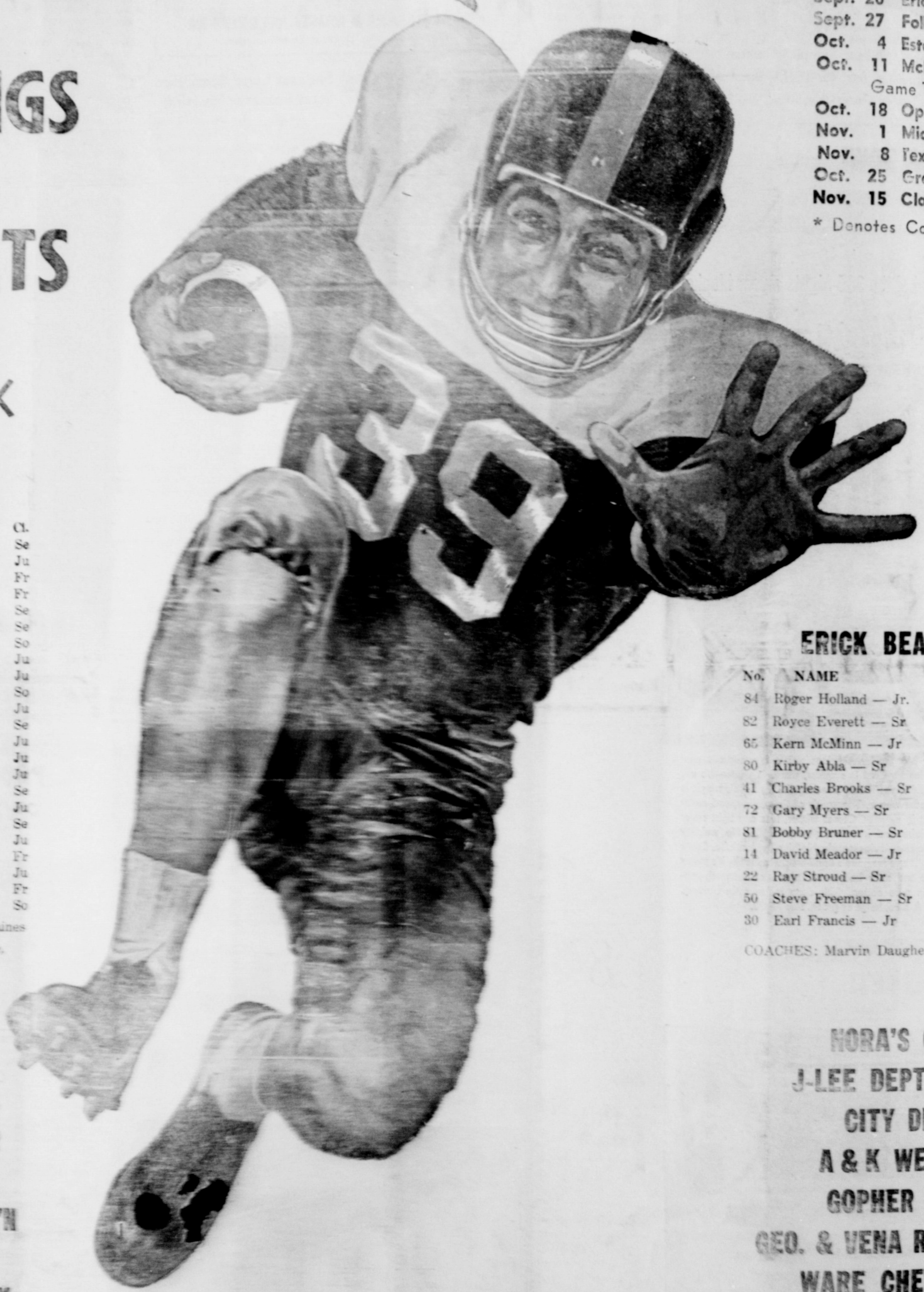

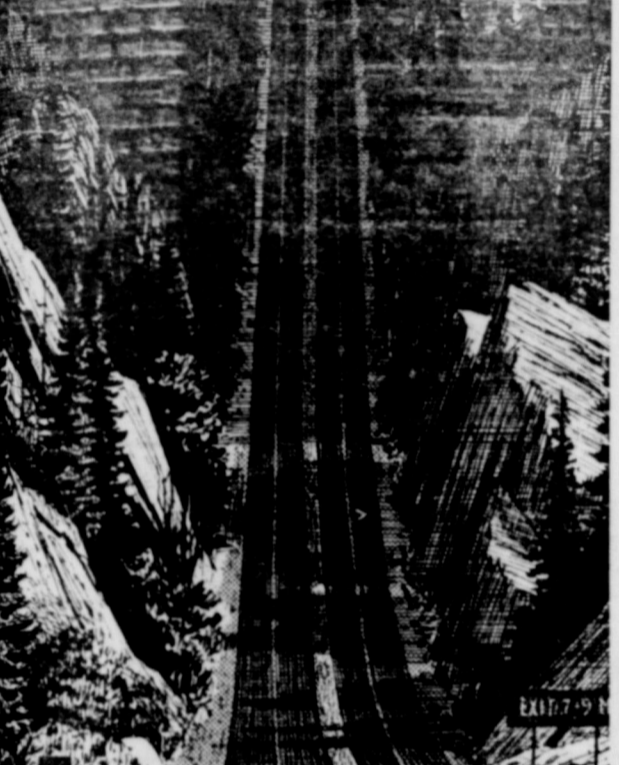
