4-H TEXANS TAKE TOP HONORS AT 'RODEO DE SANTA FE' IN N. MEX.

The Wheeler County 4-H Texans took top honors July 14 at the Rodeo de Santa Fe, held last week in Santa Fe, N.M.

Riding under the Six Flags of Texas, the 4-H Texans were first among the host of 35 riding clubs attending the annual celebration.

The Texans left the Shamrock Sheriff's Posse Rodeo Grounds at 5:00 a.m. Wednesday, July 10 and arrived in Santa Fe on the afternoon of the same day. John H. Hargis of Shamrock headed the Texans for the riding club and the members, traveled in private cars. Most of the parents made the trip along with Mr. and Mrs. Ben Freeman, the Texans Adult Leaders.

The Texans were met at Santa Fe Holiday Inn by the rodeo officials who welcomed them and made their stay a most pleasant one.

Dressed in their colorful cowboy and white riding outfits, and carrying the Six Flags of Texas and 4-H flags, the Texans were the first mounted guest group in the street parade. Carroll Russell of Shamrock, club president, rode Piggy, head of the parade and carried the 4-H flag.

The Queen, Miss Jodie Coyle of Shamrock, riding at The Yellow

Rose of Texas" led the club. Miss Coyle, who rode with the club, wore a beautiful dress of yellow tulle with a matching pink sash and carried a basket of yellow roses and threw them into the crowd.

The annual rodeo of the Wheeler Riding and Roping Club was held July 11, 12, and 13 at the rodeo arena in Wheeler.

The celebration started Thursday afternoon with a street parade and eight wagons. The wagons were a part of the trail ride which came from Canadian to Wheeler especially for the rodeo. Riding clubs were from Wheeler, Shamrock, Berlin, Okla., Canadian Pampa and Tulla. 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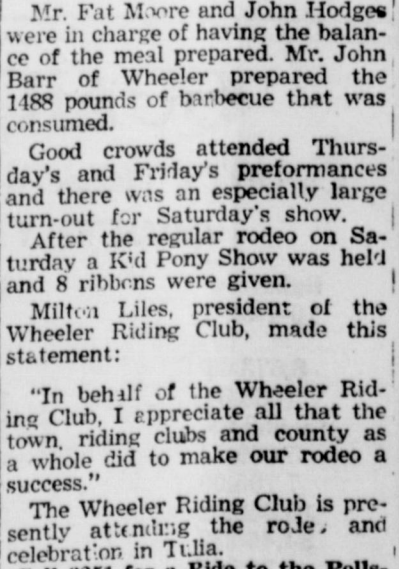

Oil Conservation News . . .

H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, of the Soil Conservation Service, has announced the transfer of Keith F. Myers to Huron, South Dakota, where he will serve as State Conservationist of the Service in that state. Myers will report to Huron June 17 and the family will move as soon as housing is secured in the new location. Myers is a veteran of 23 years with the Soil Conservation Service, having started work in Colorado during Dust Bowl Days in the mid-1930s. Since that time, he has worked in different capacities in Montana, Utah, Kentucky, and Texas. In Texas he has worked as Assistant State Conservationist, serving a wide area of central, north and west Texas. The three sons of Mr. and Mrs. Myers, Bill, Bob and Gary, plan to enter school in South Dakota this fall. Bill is a junior in South Dakota State at Brookings while Bob and Gary will be in high school at Huron.

Thirty members of the Texas Great Plains Conservation Program Committee representing more of the agencies, groups, and associations working in the field of soil and water conservation, met in the Pecos area June 26-27, reported H. N. Smith, State Conservation Service. The occasion was the annual field meeting of the committee when results and experiences of the past year are discussed and recommendations for improvement of the program are made. George Skeet, rancher near Water Valley and a director of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts explained that the principles of the GPCP where cost share assistance is provided in accordance with a complete conservation plan developed for the entire operating unit and scheduled for application on a systematic basis, and proved to be the best demonstration and educational tool for soil and water conservation to date. Skeet explained that management must accompany any treatment applied if it produced the greatest return and was to be of time. Jack Stone, supervisor of the Toyah Limpia, Soil Conservation Service, talked to the group and showed pictures of the work done on his ranch with GPCP assistance. Stone explained how he spread run-off water over flat draw-type ground that had been postplowed and seeded to such grasses as Johnson and blue panicum. Stone stated that he was very proud of the results and invited the group to tour his ranch. E. L. Thaxton, head of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located at Pecos, explained the research work being carried on there and conducted a tour of the station for the committee. James Abbott of the Soil Conservation Service reported on progress and accomplishments of the GPCP. He said that approximately 900 contracts had been signed since July 1, 1962, obligating just under three million dollars and over a million acres of farm and ranch land. It was noted that the Soil Conservation Service had about 300 proposed contracts on hand for which cost-share funds would be available before July 1. This backlog of contracts illustrates the 're-commend' build up in interest in the GPCP that has taken place in the past four or five years. Abbott also said that 250,000 acres of cropland have been planned for conservation to uses, such as pasture and rangeland. This represents over 21% of all cropland placed under Great Plains contracts. Brush control has been carried out on over one million acres with assistance from the GPCP with an average cost-share assistance of \$2.35 per acre. It was pointed out that since 30.68% of the total cost-share assistance has been spent on brush control, which is a disproportionate share of the available funds, a priority limitation had to be placed on brush control. Following the business session, the committee toured the James P. Coode and Allgood and Avary farms near Barstow, George Avary and Mrs. Anna Herring ranches near Pyote, Edd Cox ranch at Monahans, A. J. Hoelscher at Coynosa and the Winfield Estate Ranch at Fort Stockton. Many outstanding examples of conservation were observed on each farm and ranch. Others participating in the meeting were: Dr. R. E. Patterson, Dean of Agriculture, A&M College of Texas; Dr. G. W. Thomas, Dean of Agriculture, Texas Tech College; Harvey Davis, Executive Director, State Soil Conservation Board; Ben A. Jordan Jr., State Director Texas Agricultural Extension Service; John D. Wells, President, Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts; A. L. Badling, Executive Director, Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts; Dr. J. R. Johnston, Agricultural Research Service and D. C. Stevens, W. P. Blaney and Brad Emery of the U.S. Forest Service.

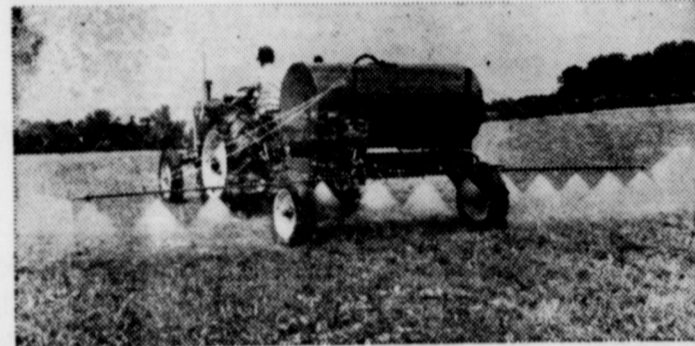

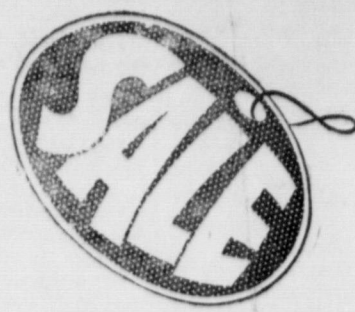
