MUSTANGS DEFEATED, FIRST TIME THIS SEASON

Wheeler's Mustangs came to the end of their winning ways last Friday night at Clarendon when the ground eating Matador Matadors defeated them 16-12.

The Mustangs had gone through 10 games undefeated in the regular season and this ball game was a rematch of last year's bi-district clash. Many things can be said about the game but for that night, the 'Tors were the better team.

Halftime saw the Mustangs leading a 12-8 lead after scoring two touchdowns late in the second quarter. Matador scored their first touchdown 2 plays deep in the second quarter and faded the go ahead tally with 6:27 left in the third period.

Matador's offense had been billed as a "three yards and a cloud of dust" attack and they didn't vary that a bit. Campbell, the hard driving fullback, carried the ball a whopping total of 47 times during the game and ended up with 145 yards gained. Several times the Mustang defense would have Campbell stopped but he would drive for the extra yard or two.

The key to the Matador victory was the ability to control the ball as they ran twice as many plays in the game as the Mustangs and at one time, during the late stages of the third quarter and in the fourth quarter, Matador ran 24 plays without giving up the ball. Their drive started on their own 14 and ended on a fumble by Campbell on the Wheeler 3.

Matador drove 43 yards for their first score after recovering a fumble on the Mustang 43. Showing their plan to play ball control Matador took 15 plays to make the yardage with Edzel making the last yard on a naked keeper around the Mustang right flank. Campbell ran the two pointers and the Mustangs uphill battle began.

With barely 5 minutes to go in the half, the Mustangs got the pigskin on their 36 and few fans figured the score would be different at the half than the 8-0 it stood as then. Then lightning struck the Matadors in the form of a first play of bunch of Mustangs.

Snelgroes galloped 23 yards on the first play to set up a first down on the Matador 41. Bobby Vanpool grabbed another first with a 10 yard scamper. Dunk Porter then set the Mustang fans in an uproar as he broke over his left guard on a trap, cut quickly to the outside and outran the Matador secondary for the 31 yard scoring play. The run for the extra point was short and with 2:06 to go, the Mustangs had new life trailing by only 2 points.

Campbell fumbled after a 6 yard gain following the kickoff and Porter recovered on the Matador 34. Both Matador touchdowns were set up by fumbles and this fumble was a part payment for the Mustang gifts.

One of the best runs of the year came on the first play by Wheeler as Snelgroes set sail around his right end. Hunter cleared past the line of scrimmage with a good block and then Snelgroes was pretty much his own after a couple of more blocks by airt Mustangs.

Snelgroes looked to be cornered by two Matador defenders but dodged and darted out of their grasp and sped 34 yards for the go ahead touchdown. Only 37 seconds remained as the try for extra two was fumbled.

At this point, the Mustangs had Matador on the ropes but the clock was in favor of the defending champs. Pitts fumbled two plays after the kickoff and Rogers pounced on the ball at the Matador 34 but the gun went off and Wheeler was unable to get a play in.

The Mustangs held Matador on the first series after the halftime and got the ball on their 12 following a punt and a 15 yard clipping penalty. Two plays later, Wallace fumbled and Matador recovered at the Mustang 25. Campbell carried every play except one as the Matadors moved downfield to the Mustang 10. At that point, B. COUNTY AGENTS' REPORT

4-H Club volunteer adult leaders and 4-H Club members in every county of Texas will benefit from a recent \$25,000 grant made by the Board of Directors of the 4-H Youth Development Foundation, Moody Foundation to the Texas 4-H Council.

Calvin T. Johnson of Dallas, Chairman of the Texas 4H Youth Development Foundation, stated on receipt of the grant, "We believe this investment in 4-H approved by the Directors of the Moody Foundation, is representative of a growing awareness and appreciation of the part of individuals, firms, and foundations in the 4-H Club youth movement. No other youth organization, in my opinion, provides boys and girls greater opportunity to experience first hand principles of our agricultural economic system and to gain understanding of individual citizen rights inherent in our U.S. Constitution."

The Texas 4-H Youth Development foundation was organized by Texas leaders of agriculture, business and the professions in October of 1962. The Foundation's mission is to seek and disburse funds from private sources to underwrite 4-H Club activities for which no prior funds were available. Individuals, firms and non-profit foundations are given opportunity to place with the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation a contribution grant, bequest or through its program will Texas 4-H Club Youth money or property.

The Moody Foundation grant is the largest single contribution to the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation during its first year of operation. The grant will be invested in 4-H Club volunteer adult and youth leadership training workshops. Fourteen training workshops are to be held across the state. 4-H Club volunteer leaders in each county will have opportunity to attend at least one training workshop.

Just what a "yes" or a "no" vote will mean in the Dec. 10 referendum on cotton marketing quotas was explained today by John O'Gorman, chairman, Wheeler County ASC Committee. All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the referendum.

The Chairman said that the basic program choices are:

1. If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approved of quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop, marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton produced on a farm, and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

2. On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties applicable to the 1964 upland cotton crop, and price support to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Allotments are not affected by the outcome of the balloting. They will remain in effect—whether or not quotas are approved—as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

Mr. O'Gorman pointed out that, while the Secretary of Agriculture is directed by law to proclaim quotas for the next crop when the total cotton supply exceeds normal, it is the growers themselves who decide whether or not quotas shall be used. Previous votes on the subject have been outstandingly favorable. Marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop were approved by 93.7 percent of the growers voting.

Allotments for individual farms will be made available to growers within the near future, so that farmers may have information prior to the Dec. 10, referendum.

Gold Star Boy And Girl Achievements Listed

The 1963 Gold Star Boy for Wheeler County is Mike Shannon of Shamrock. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Williams of Shamrock. Mike has been a Shamrock 4-H member for six years.

He has been president and secretary of his local 4-H club as well as council delegate to the County 4-H Council.

Mike has had electricity, safety and beef cattle for his projects. In the beef cattle field he has had beef steers as well as breed cattle and he has shown at numerous shows in the Panhandle of Texas as well as breeding beef cattle and he has shown at numerous shows in the Panhandle of Texas as well as the State Fair of Texas. In 1962 he placed first at the District 4-H Elimination Contest with his safety demonstration and went on to compete at State Contest of Texas A&M during 4-H Roundup as on the County Council and as served as a Junior Leader as well.

In his local 4-H Club he has County Camps. His leadership in helping with the 4-H Junior Rodeo has been most helpful in making it a success each year.

Besides his 4-H work, Mike has been very active in other community, church and school activities. He has served as president and secretary of his Sunday school Class and Secretary of M.Y.F. In high school he has been a member of the Student council, F.F.A. and he participated in most of the athletic activities. He attended the District Gold Star Banquet that was held in his honor Nov. 16 in Amarillo. He received his Gold Star Award and was recognized at the 1963 Wheeler County 4-H Achievement Program Nov. 23.

There are only two 4-H Gold Star Awards available per county. One to be awarded to the 4-H Club Boy and one to a 4-H Club Girl. This is the highest county award provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The award states the member must be at least 13 years old as of January 1 of the current year, and must have completed at least three years of club work including her current year. He or she must be an active 4-H member during the current year and may receive this award only one time.

The 1963 Wheeler County Gold Star Girl is Penny Puryear, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Puryear of the Kelton Community and a member of the Kelton 4-H Club. Penny is a Sophomore in the Kelton High School. She has been a 4-H club member seven years. She has held the offices of president, vice president, secretary, and council delegate in her local 4-H Club. She served as vice chairman, co-chairman, reporter and secretary of the County 4-H Council. She has served on the District 4-H Council and is the secretary for 1964 for both District and County 4-H Councils.

Penny is a diversified member in that her projects have been in various fields. Beef Cattle, Swine, Poultry and Nutrition, Clothing, Public Speaking Junior Leadership, and Wildlife. She has participated in the Better Make Show 4-H Favorite Foods Show, and the Dress Review. She was narrator for the 1963 District 1 Dress Review. Savings Bond Sales

An interesting item has been brought to our attention this week. In a report from the Treasury Department, giving statistics for thirty-two counties of Area 1, Wheeler County led all the other counties in the purchase of Series E and Series H Savings bonds.

During October, Wheeler purchases amounted to \$12,350.00 while the cumulative total for 1963 was \$179,825.66. This was over the 1963 goal for the year which was \$170,000. The percentage had already reached 105% and there remains November and December to finish the year.

The 1963 goal for the nation is \$14,100,000 in Savings Bonds. Thus far, across the nation 68.8% of the goal has been reached. Colingsworth County has reached 26.5% for the year.

57.6% and Hemphill county shows Mr. R. J. Holt indicates that Wheeler has been at least 100% almost every year since 1941.

The general indication is that the residents of Wheeler County have been prosperous this year and are investing more of their income in savings bonds. The reasons may be numerous and it would be pure speculation to try to determine them, but it speaks well for Wheeler Co., and shows that we have our share of prosperity.

Soil Conservation District News

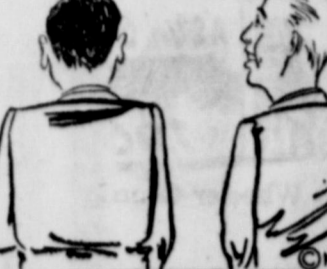
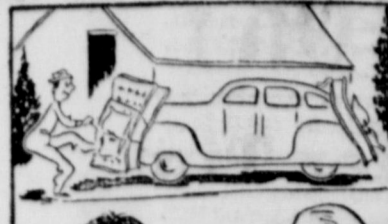

Jack Young initiated plans to construct some diversion terraces to assist in healing gullied area. He also plans to sprig some Midland bermuda grass and will seed some native grasses. Jack will do some brush control and construct seep type pond.
Wiley McCray did a good job of irrigation and now plans to construct a grassed waterway. Mr. C. W. Flyr has developed a conservation plan that includes digging a well (windmill) laying pipeline for livestock water, constructing water troughs, constructing water troughs, do brush control and range seeding.
Frank Rodgers and Charley Walker are starting conservation work they have scheduled to do through the Great Pains Conservation program. They are starting to construct farm ponds this week.
Mr. J. O. Helton has started work on a drop structure on his farm near Briscoe. This is a concrete chute-type that is constructed around the shaped "head" or starting of a large gully that is eating its way back up through Mr. Helton's farm. If not stopped it would eventually ruin some good land.

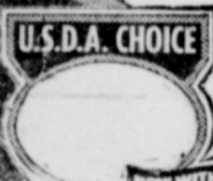

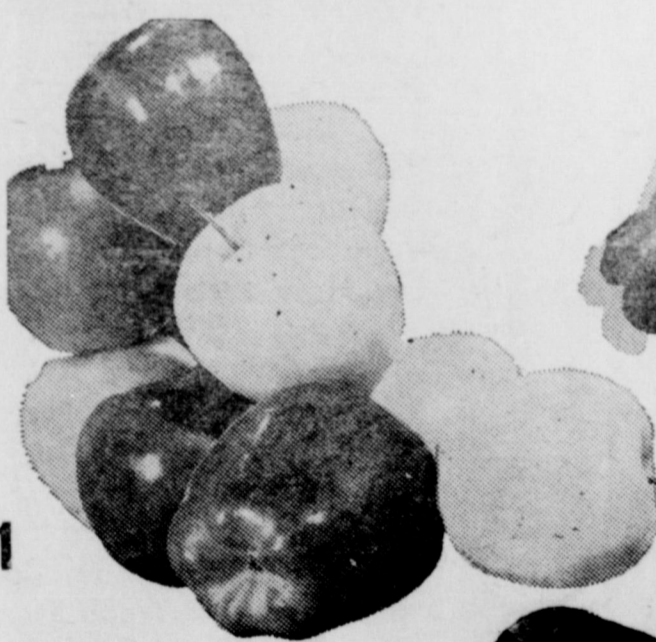

Thursday Review Club Hostess for Federated Clubs of Wheeler

The Thursday Review Club had as their guests, members of other Federated Clubs of Wheeler on November 14 for a workshop and Salad Supper in the Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church.

Mrs. Bob Henderson, club president, introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. Bedford Harrison of Shamrock. Mrs. Harrison, who is well known for her oral book reviews, discussed for the group "The Preparation of Oral Book Reviews."

According to Mrs. Harrison, the oral book review originated in California in the 1920's and gradually spread Westward. Mrs. Harrison emphasized the fact that the purpose of the book review is to arouse the curiosity of listeners and to persuade them to read the book as well as to present the reviewer's opinion of the book. Steps to be followed on the preparation of book reviews, Mrs. Harrison pointed out, include: examine the book; read fly leaf; read book for pleasure; after several days, re-read the book slowly and finally, outline the book from memory.

In closing, Mrs. Harrison, who is District Chairman of the International Affairs for the Federated Clubs, answered questions from the audience concerning book reviews, as well as various phases of Federated Club work.

There were approximately seventy members and guests present at the meeting.

BANK NAME CAN NOT BE CHANGED

If you have encountered any difficulty in writing a check for a purchase by changing the name of the bank to the one you have used, there may be a good reason. The Federal Reserve system has halted the use of checks which have been changed from one bank to another. This action became effective 1 November of this year.

The reason behind the action lies in difficulty in processing your checks through an automatic sorting device which processes and sorts at a rapid rate. The machine sorts the checks from a magnetic code which is on each check and sends the check to the place indicated by the code signals on the check. Even if the coded material has been marked through in pen or pencil, the machine reads only the magnetic signal and sends the check to that bank.

As a result of this coding, checks which may have been changed from one bank to another, will go to the first bank in spite of the name. This leads to extra time in processing and may indeed make a check arrive at an inopportune time and cause it to be returned uncovered or insufficient.

The trouble is nation-wide and is not local in nature. Mr. R. J. Holt, Jr., urges folks to make use of the blank Bank Drafts when necessary to use a check other than one of another bank.

Highway Dept. Has In Wheeler Co. for Oct, Reported 10 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of October, according to J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$81,270.00.

The rural traffic accident summary of this county from January through October October, 1963 shows a total of 85 accidents resulting in three persons killed, 73 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$91,270.00.

The Sergeant said, "Don't walk yourself to death," that is a slogan we would like for you to remember for the rest of the year. November and December are noted as dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians. During these last two months of 1962 in Texas there were 65 pedestrians killed and 768 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. There are many reasons for this: Longer

hours of darkness, bad weather, pedestrians not visible to drivers, holidays and lack of drivers and pedestrians concentration.

The veteran patrol supervisor stated some tips to aid both the pedestrian and drivers. Always wear something light colored when walking after dark. If possible, carry some kind of light, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic day or night so that you can see approaching traffic. If you have a dark colored raincoat or overcoat, put a strip or two of reflectorized material across the back and front when walking on the highway or street.

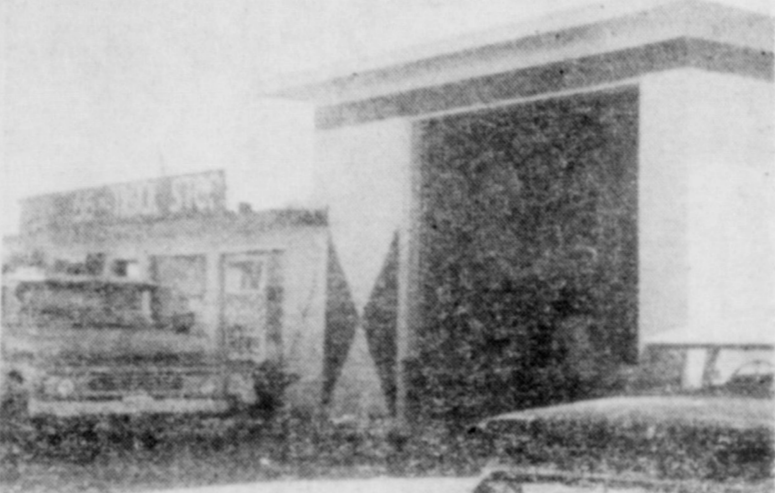
