est of gaining a hospital for North Wheeler County.



BATON ROUGE, LA. - Compared to the first prefabricated home introduced in this country in 1624, modern day manufactured houses are palaces.

Manufactured in England and shipped to the U.S. where it was erected in what is now the state of Massachusetts, the first

prefab house in this country was a two-story frame building. It was constructed of precut oak timbers which, when fitted together, formed the frame of the house.

It is believed that the exterior of the "Great House," as it was called, was made of handhewn shakes or shingles.

American manufactured homes first appeared in 1727 when two houses, complete with component parts to be erected on site, were shipped to the West Indies from New Orleans. Ironically, Louisiana is the headquarters state of one of today's leading home manufacturing companies, Crawford Corporation of Baton Rouge. Crawford, a pioneer in mo-
