Jimmie Ed Smith, 15, who came to Mobeetie in September from Portales, N.M., to live with his aunt and attend school, was killed on Nov. 7, at 3:50 P.M. when the car in which he was riding went out of control one mile east of Mobeetie.

Coach Cecil Reynolds was driving the car in which his two year old son was also a passenger. The coach was taken to Hyland General Hospital by the Kirk Funeral Home of Wheeler. He was partially pinned under the car and received a broken left arm and head injuries. He is reportedly doing fine at this time. His son was not injured.

The coach was bringing Jimmie to Wheeler to get a physical needed to play basketball for Mobeetie High School. This is the first year Mr. Reynolds has been coach at Mobeetie. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Reynolds of Pampa. Mrs. Morris, wife of Mobeetie superintendent will coach the girls basketball team and Supt. Morris will coach the boys' team until Coach Reynolds is able to return.

Bobbie was born in Amarillo, on June 6, 1948, and was a sophomore student at Mobeetie High School. His mother was Mrs. Joyce Smith, of Portales, N.M.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church in Mobeetie of which he had been a member since he was ten, on November 9, 1963 at 2:00 P.M. with Pastor, Rev. D. C. Read assisted by Rev. Charles Uzzle, pastor of the Mobeetie Baptist Church officiating.

Unofficial Returns On Last Saturday's Election

Last Saturday, Nov. 9, was election day here in Wheeler as well as throughout the rest of Texas. We have the results of the election in Wheeler County.

In Proposition No. 1, which concerned the repealing of the payment of the poll tax as a requirement for voting and to authorize the legislature to provide for the registration of all voters, 158 voted for with 516 voting against.

In Proposition No. 2, which was the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the needy aged, disabled, blind, and needy children, authorized the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility, to make appropriations of funds from the government to pay these grants; providing that the state should not pay more than the federal governments, and providing that the total amounts spent each year out of state funds should not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (60,000,000.) there was a vote of 383 for to 252 against.

Proposition No. 3, providing for additional subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, received a vote of 177 for and 331 against.

The final proposition, No. 4, which was to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000, which was to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans, who served in the Armed Services of the United States between Sept. 16, 1940 and March 31, 1955, failed with a vote of 305 against and 294 for.

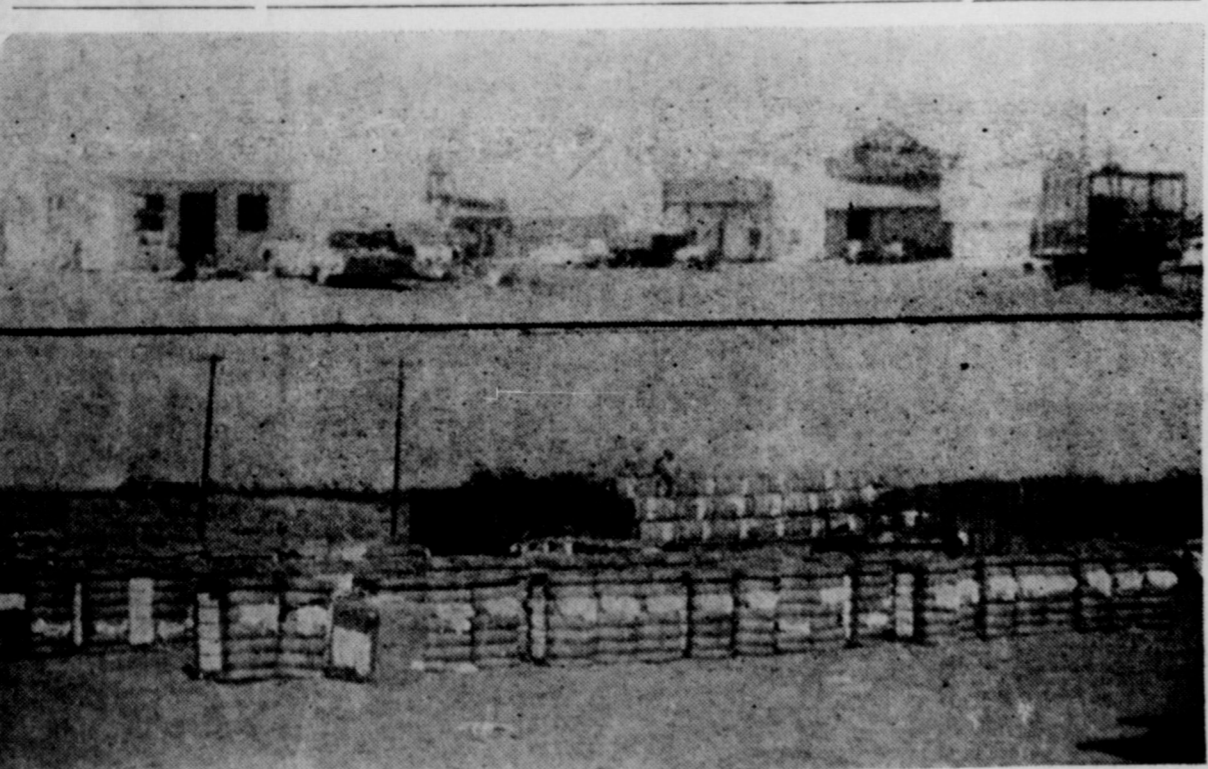

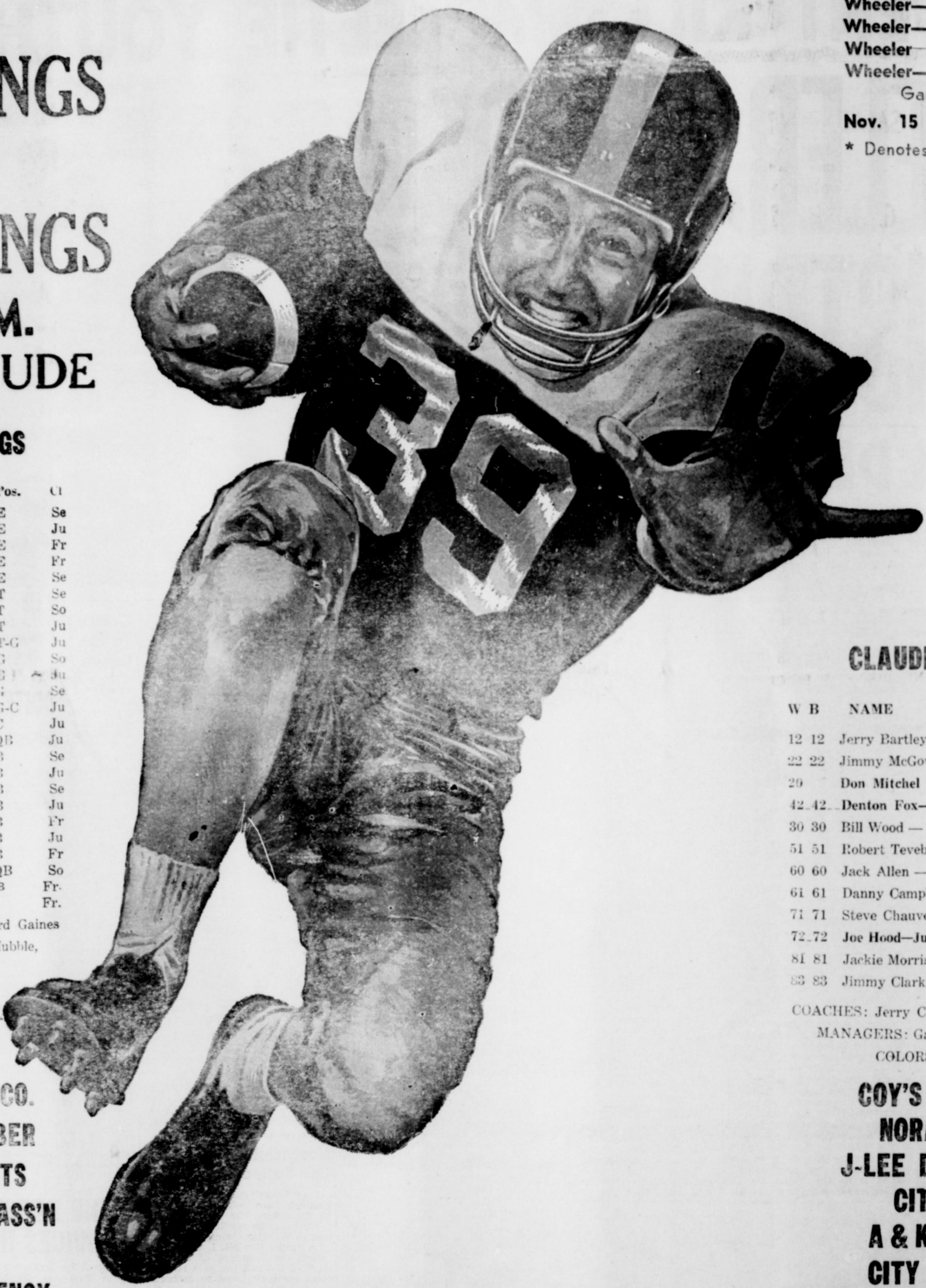

Seniors Are Eligible For College Scholarships

Senior students at Wheeler high school are eligible to apply for nearly 400 four-year scholarships offered by General Motors at more than 200 colleges and universities. There is no restriction on course of study or career. Stipends range from an amount of \$200 per year to a maximum of \$2,000 per year, depending on demonstrated need.

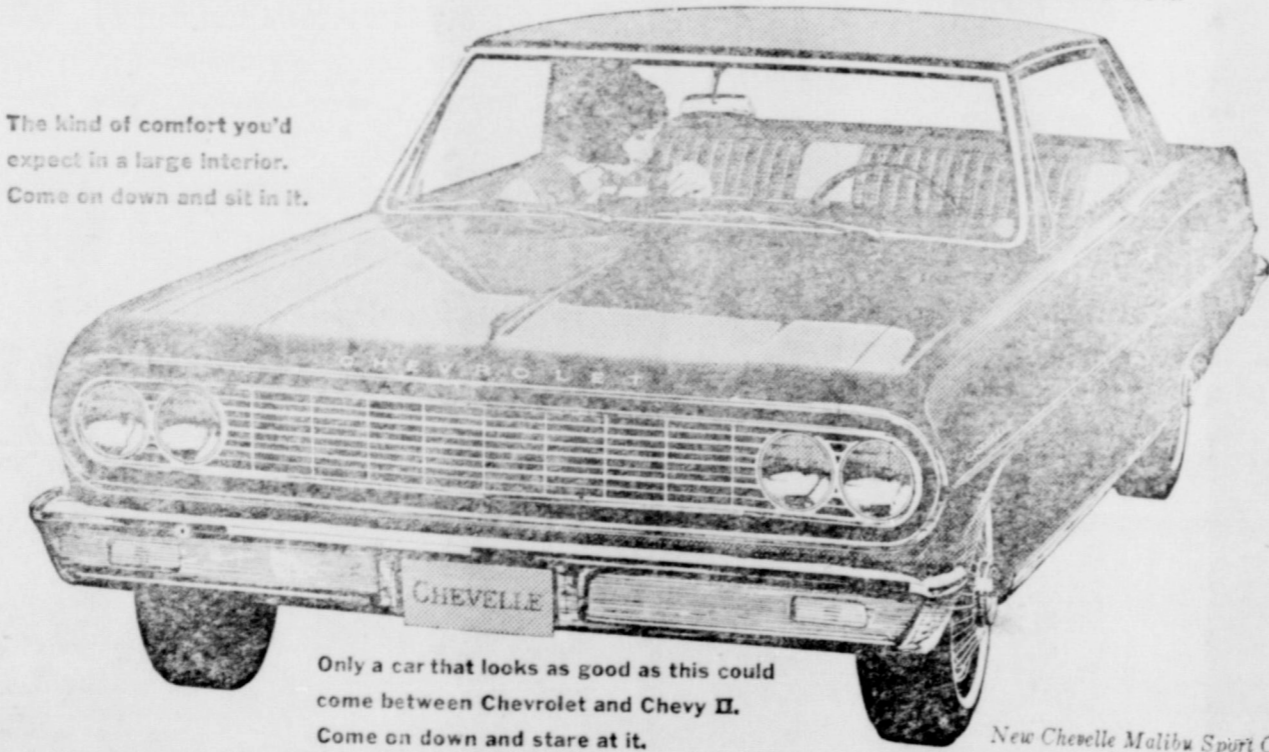

COUNTY AGENTS' REPORT

By CHARLES D. JACKSON, County Agri. Agent

"Texas Family Account Book" is just off the press and is available for Wheeler County farmers and ranchers that are interested in keeping good records. This excellent guide for handling farm records was prepared by staff members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The account book explains in detail how to keep records and was designed for families to keep records of all transactions affecting the farm and home. Keeping records is needed by farm families more today than ever before. This is because more reports are checked more widely and keeping records for social security purposes by self-employed persons that net \$400 per year or more \$600 is a must.

These account books may be obtained at The Farmers and Merchants State Bank in Shamrock; and from Palmer Sivage at the County Treasurer's office in Wheeler, and a small supply will be available from the County Agent's office, Wheeler.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A READY-TO-COOK TURKEY It's almost globe-trotting again and every homemaker should know some of the basic rules for buying turkeys, says Mrs. Cula Nowlin, Home Demonstration Agent for Wheeler County.

The first consideration when you buy ready-to-cook turkeys is the amount of turkey to buy and whether to buy a whole turkey or a turkey roll, says Mrs. Nowlin. Whichever the choice, the homemaker should consider cost on the basis of the edible portion of the pounds bought to get the true picture of the cost of each, she says.

When deciding the amount of turkey needed, she must also take into consideration the number of people to be served and whether she wants to have left-overs. When buying whole turkeys allow about 1/2 to 3/4 pound per person, and about five to eight ounces of uncooked turkey roll or five to six ounces of cooked roll per person, explains the agent.

Quality and wholesomeness is the next consideration in buying turkey, she says. The bird should have broad breast, large drumsticks, bulging thighs, be well covered with fat over the body and be fully fleshed, it should be free of defects such as torn skin, bruises, and broken bones, and should be free of pinfeathers. Wholesomeness means the condition of the bird as to cleanliness, freedom from disease and completeness of processing. If processed under USDA supervision, tags on the wings of the birds will show their grade and that they have been inspected for wholesomeness. Mrs. Nowlin explains turkeys vary in price from one to another because of differences in quality, wholesomeness and in some cases because of special sales at holiday seasons and local markets.

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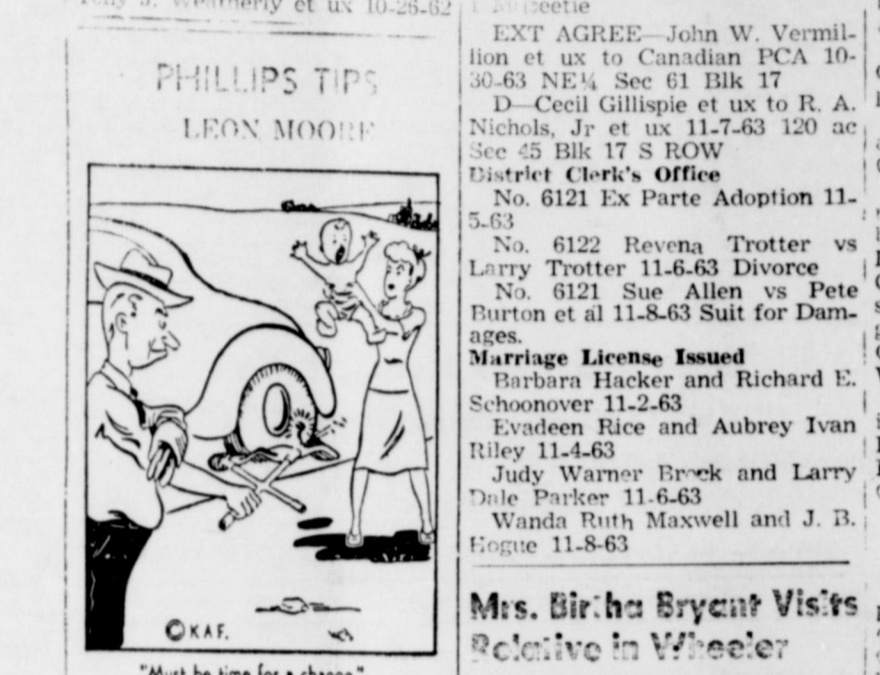
