Mr. Burgess called the Chamber officers to the podium and introduced them. Chamber members would never be present to see them serve in their official capacity. He also pointed out that a community of this size spends \$50,000 to \$100,000 on medical expenses in other towns which are never returned to the local area. A local hospital would mean the money would never leave the community, but would stay and be used by the community to pay for the local hospital. The North Wheeler County Hospital Board has been and will be holding "Town Hall Meetings" in the surrounding communities. The county tax roll is available at each meeting so that each person may see how much his taxes would be on any piece of property he may own. It has been figured out that taxes on the average home in Wheeler would be \$6.50 figured at the maximum rate of 75c per hundred dollar evaluation.

Wheeler Oil Action Causing Lease Boom

WHEELER — Residents of this Panhandle town have their eyes fixed on an oil-gas rig near Mobeetie and with good reason. Drilling efforts by Phillips Petroleum are expected to begin sometime this week on what could be the second well in a production show that has the earmarks of a million dollar oil boom. The action is on part of a nine-section area located on the Carville ranch that has produced what many oil men call "one of the better gas wells" in the Panhandle. The first well, Phillips No. 1 Carville, in section 99, block A-5 of the H&GN survey, broke drilling depth records and tasted shows of production in the Hunton lime the first time in the Panhandle. As a result, real estate agents in Wheeler have been swamped with calls for leases and mineral purchases. Don Earney, a Wheeler realtor and former newspaper publisher, said that another well

AGENTS' REPORTS

FROM THE CO. AGRI. AGENT

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

"Adapting Leases for Successful Farming", a new Extension publication just off the press, will answer many questions of both landowners and tenants. In addition, the publication will assist both parties in arriving at a mutually beneficial lease arrangement.

The authors point out a lease should serve two requirements of major importance. The first is to assure that total income is shared by landlord and tenant in the same proportion as total expenses of production, harvest and sale.

Secondly, a functional lease promotes farming efficiency by guarding against conflicting interest between landlord and tenant in the day-to-day farm operation. Also, it provides the economic incentives to operate in the most profitable manner for the farm.

The publication emphasizes these three points are required for efficiency...Every cash operating expense must be shared in the same proportion that income is shared. Otherwise, both parties will not have an incentive to operate in the most profitable manner for the farm.

...The length of the lease must not reduce return on investments. For example, a tenant with a one-year lease will overemphasize short-term investments when long-term investments for conservation, land reclamation, facilities, fertilizer, etc., may be the most profitable investment. A longer lease, or the landlord paying the outgoing tenant for his share of unused resources, can avoid this handicap.

...Income from all production must be shared in the same proportion as the expenses of production, harvest and sale were shared. Otherwise, the enterprise most profitable for the tenant may not be the most profitable for the whole farm.

In addition to discussions on the above topics, the publication also goes into detail on how to improve the traditional lease, shifting from an

old lease, plus a table for estimating rent. Copies are available at the County Agents office.

THE HOME DEMON. AGENT USING THE OLD BEAN

Dry beans -- and their cousins, dry peas and lentils -- can be used in a variety of warming winter dishes that are nutritious and easy on the budget say ARS nutrition experts.

These foods that grandma used to simmer in an iron pot for half a day can be stand-outs in the modern housewife's menu, with cooking shortcuts and variations ranging from the old Southern favorite "hopping john" to a company fare baked dish of curried lima beans and pork chops.

They are a real budget buy -- a pound of dry beans will make 7 to 9 3/4 cup servings -- and all are substantial foods, good for energy.

Dry beans, peas and lentils contain calcium and B vitamins, especially thiamine, and a rich source of iron -- a cupful provides almost half of a day's needs. They also supply protein, which is most useful when combined with the types of protein in meat, cheese, or eggs.

USDA Leaflet No. 326, "Dry Beans, Peas, Lentils...Modern Cookery," gives tips on soaking and contains recipes for casseroles, soups, stews, and salads, as well as a bean puree that can be canned or frozen or later hurry-up use as a base for sauces and soups or as a meat stretcher. Copies of Leaflet 326 may be obtained from the office of your County Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Cal R. Nowlin.

 would be begun within a few weeks on the southwest quarter of Section 81 on the same area. Both the well about to be drilled and a proposed third effort would be 17,500 feet depths.
 Earney, who like many Wheeler residents, is all smiles over the oil action that has brought "something like \$500,000 in min-

All Involved
 Mineral buyers have spent \$300,000 in Wheeler around the Carwile well alone, plus another \$150,000 around Mobeetie with prices ranging from \$50 an acre to \$350 an acre.
 A large number of other ventures are working in the Wheeler County area with every company studying possibilities of moving into the play.
 All this began within the last six months after the Carwile well went down. Phillips was the operator, holding the largest interest, with Northern Natural Gas, Sinclair, Ozark - Mahoning and Rip Underwood of Amarillo aiding the venture.
 Shortly after the well tested at 17,500 feet, another group was formed by Pan American and Standard Oil of Texas in the Mobeetie area.
 Taking the southwest quarter of section 56, block 85, the group sank a 7,400 - foot well called the Mat Sims No. 1.
Heavy Potential
 The result surprised all the people involved and spurred lease action in the area. The well came in with a potential of some 450 to 500 barrels a day.
 The group is presently completing a well which would be an offset to the first. Earney said. It is located just west of the Mat Sims No. 1 some three-quarters of a mile south of new Mobeetie and a half mile north of old Mobeetie.
 Earney said leases in the area had been granted to Phillips, Humble Oil, Northern Natural Gas, Atlantic Refining, Sinclair Oil, Kerr-McGee, Shell Oil, Cabot Corp., Gulf Oil, Standard of Texas, Pan American; J. M. Hubert Corp., Ozark - Mahoning, Skelly Oil and Sun Oil.
 Earney said prices on oil and gas leases had been ranging from \$5 to \$50 an acre during the past two years, but the heaviest action in the last half year shot leases up as high as \$350.
Boom Is On
 "Until just recently, there hadn't been any conclusive test drilled in the north part of Wheeler.
 We had a couple of deep wells around Kelton and one a few miles west of Wheeler, which had shows, but were finally called dry holes," he explained.
 "Then boom."
 What does all this mean to Wheeler?
 "It could mean a great deal. It already has had an effect on the area," Earney said. "I wouldn't be surprised if all this doesn't cause Wheeler to grow to be larger than Perryton within a short period of time."
 Earney recalled that Perryton had grown largely because of oil finds in that area.
 Meanwhile, all eyes in Wheeler County are fixed on the tall tower in the middle of the Carwile ranch, waiting to bite into another oil find.

1964 CANCER CRUSADE
 The Attorney General of Texas has accepted appointment by the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society to head its 1964 Cancer Crusade.
 Appointed during the division's recent annual meeting in Houston, the Honorable Waggoner Carr will lead 80,000 volunteers from all over the state in a Crusade which last year totaled \$1,575,203.11 in contributions.
 Mr. Carr was also elected to the State's Board of Directors and Executive Committee during the meeting.
 The month-long educational fund-raising Crusade which gets under way April 1 marks the beginning of Cancer Control Month, so designated each year by the President of the United States.
 "There is a growing need for everyone to do his share in striking back at cancer - a disease that will attack some 48 million Americans now living if current rates continue," Mr. Carr said. "For this reason I accept the Crusade Chairmanship and will do everything within my power to help conduct the most successful Crusade ever held in the state of Texas."
 The Attorney General appeals for a record number of volunteers to join the Crusade so the fight against Cancer can be accelerated.
 Contributions to the annual Crusade will be used in the Society's continuing program of research, education and service, Mr. Carr explains.
 In 1959 and 1960, Mr. Carr, then an attorney, worked with the Crusade Committee in Lubbock County where he was graduated from Lubbock High School and Texas Technological College.
 He received his law degree from the University of Texas in 1947 and was admitted to the State Bar.
 Mr. Carr, with a background in public service as a lawmaker and enforcer, has served five terms in the State House of Representatives and as Speaker of the House in the 5th and 6th Legislatures. He is one of only three men in the state's history to be elected to the Speakership for two consecutive terms.
 Before election to the Attorney General's office, Mr. Carr practiced law in Lubbock where he was also active in church and various other community projects.

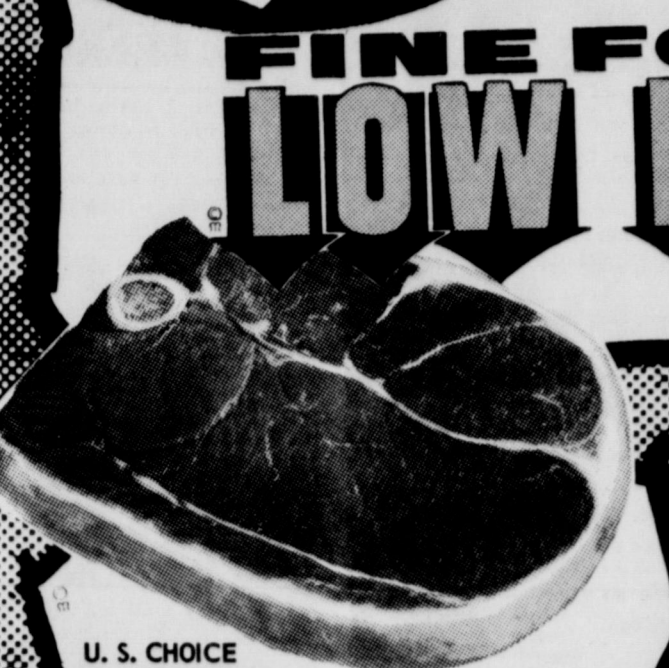
