INCOME TAX FACTS

A federal income tax return must be filed by every citizen or resident of the United States, including minor children, who had gross income of \$600 or more in-1963, Ellis Campbell, Jr.. Director of Internal Revenue for the Dallas District, reminded today.

A taxpayer who is 65 or over is not required to file unless his gross income in 1963 is at least \$1,200, Mr. Campbell said. Document No. 5107 which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.





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

How can you avoid such tactics? There is no sure reputable established merchants, and using common sense in reading the ads. But there are certain sucker signals that should ring the alarm bell. Here are a few: "Buy now or lose the chance "

"You have been specially selected ' "I t's only a legal form "

"You can save up to" "Yours absolutely free.." These signals do not necessarily indicate a bad deal, but they are frequently used by shady promoters. So read carefully, think it over, compare prices, and ask for information from a merchant you know, or from a friend. Remember, in this world of tough business competition, one seldom gets any. thing for nothing. Once you have signed an order, even the law may not be able to help you, no matter how improvident the deal may be for you. In fact, unless the seller is doing something illegal, the law may wind up helping him to enforce the bad deal that you made. So watch the signals and look before you leap -- or sign!
