He begins to feel important because now everyone has turned an eye in his direction. Granted, he may realize that the attention he is getting is not with approval, but it is better to him than no attention at all.

Our schools have many activities such as Athletics, Band, Pep Squad, Thespians, Key Club, Future Homemakers, Future Farmers and many varied classes in which to excel.

If a student is a good athlete praise him.

If he is a good musician, praise him.

If he is better at acting than in other fields, praise him.

Look to the other organizations; why should our young people not be praised for learning the governing aspects of a community in the Key Club or learning to be better farmers and homemakers?

If a student is busy applying himself to one of these character building organizations, why not take just five minutes to tell him you appreciate his every effort.

## Price Announces for Congressman

Rep. D. (Bob) Price, Gray farmer and rancher, announced in Panama his intention to seek the nomination of the Republican Party for the position of United States Congressman from the Congressional District.

A sabre jet fighter pilot veteran of the Korean War and father of three, Price is engaged in ranching operations in Roberts, Gray, Hutchinson and Carson Counties. Upon returning from the service, he joined with other members of one of the oldest pioneering families in this section of the country in the active operation of their Panhandle holdings.

Price labeled himself a "conservative Goldwater Republican" advocating a return to a free market economy in agriculture, an end to foreign aid to Communist nations and the "so-called neutrals," and a tax cut with a corresponding cut in government spending.

In declaring his philosophy to the gathering Price told them, "Let no one be mistaken, I am a conservative Republican subscribing to the views of the Hon. Sen. Barry Goldwater, and I believe that these are the views most held by the citizens of the 18th Congressional District of Texas."

Speaking on the farm issue Price told his audience, "Contrary to the voting record of the incumbent congressman, I believe that the answer to this serious problem lies in less controls not more controls, and a program aimed at returning the agricultural industry to a free market economy, such as is advocated by the American and Texas Farm Bureau."

Addressing himself on the U.S. foreign policy, Price was most critical of the administration. "Many years ago I was told you can't buy friendship with money. After 20 years of sowing billions and billions of American Dollars in this vain attempt we have

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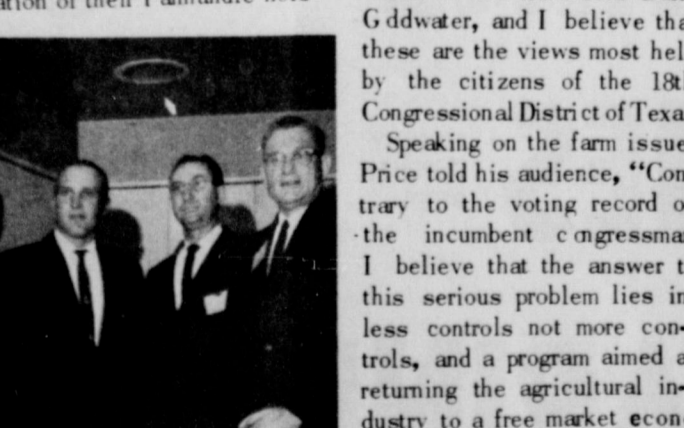

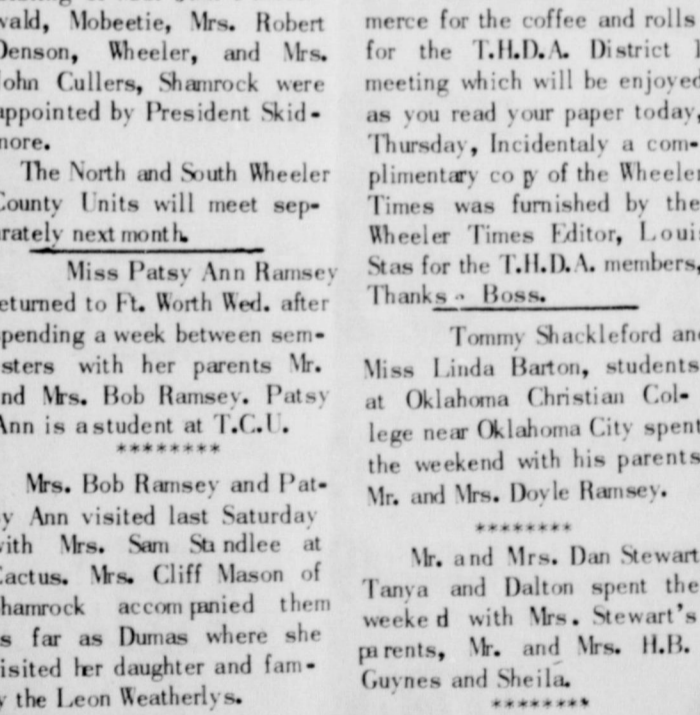

Most drop-outs - a serious problem over the nation - are found to have a reading comprehension level at least two grades beneath where they should be. In other words if a pupil is in the eighth grade and reads only on a fifth grade level, he is much more liable to be a failure in school. You can encourage them to read more, to read all kinds of current materials such as a daily newspaper, magazines, good fiction. A love of good reading is the basis for a good education. Without it, you just can't learn enough, quickly enough to succeed. High school students who are preparing for college should test their reading rate and comprehension by reading a newspaper column, writing what they remember, for one minute. It is said that for college success the minimum reading with understanding rate is 450 words per minute. Why not help your children to carry

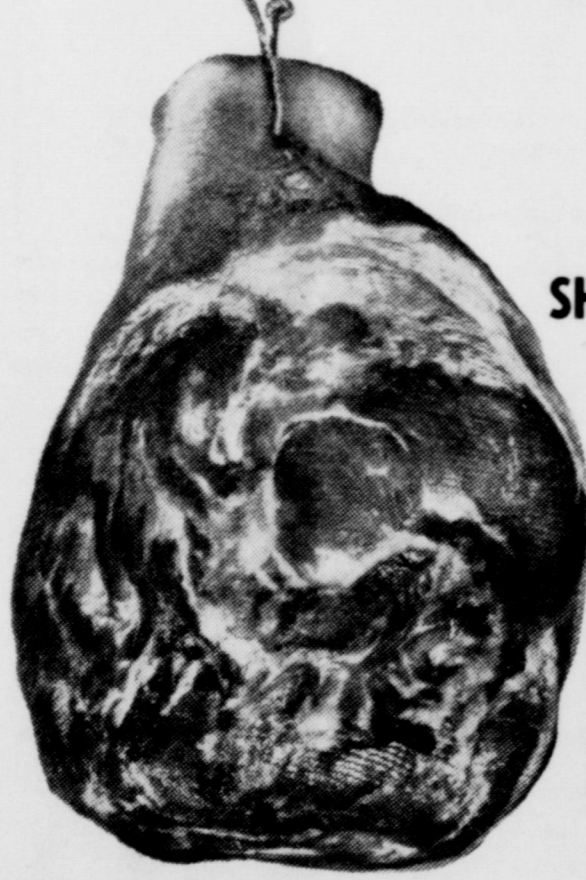
