


LIONS CLUB BROOM SALE FRIDAY

MUSTANGS LOSE FIRST GAME, 22-0

TO FACE PANHANDLE PANTHERS FRIDAY

The 1995 Wheeler Mustang Football team kicked off this years season on a rather sour note as they were soundly defeated by Gruver 22-0. The

Mustangs had had two warm-up scrimmages against WT High and Clarendon, two tough AA opponents, but looked as if to get off on the right

foot. However, the Mustang defense just never rose to the occasion as the Mustangs recorded 44 tackles but had 47 missed tackles throughout the game. As a team, the Mustangs, known as an excellent defensive team, played poor but Ramon Meraz and Jeremy Davis led the team in tackles w/ Meraz also intercepting 2 passes so there was a few bright spots.

Offensively, the Mustangs started the game with flair as Junior quarterback Travis Stevens connected on several passes to Jason Porton and Dusty Case and seemed to drive the ball, but were halted when they could not get their running game established. The first half was close as Gruver took a 7-0 lead into halftime and again missed tackles were the sole reason the Greyhounds were able to move the ball so effectively. Coach Whitely stated, "We had more starters on defense miss six, seven, or eight tackles and recorded only one or two."

In the second half the Mustangs then collapsed as they had two punts blocked, fumbled three times in the second half (a total of 5 fumbles losing 2) and intensity just appeared to have fallen off. The Mustangs were just never able to get back on track on either side of the ball for the rest of the game.

Statistic wise the Mustangs were 11 of 30 in the air for a total of 118 yards and one interception. In carrying the football the Mustangs rushed 34 times for 61 yards, creating a total offense of 179 yards, and 14 first downs. This compared to Gruver's 261 yards total offense and 17 first downs.

Leading the Mustangs in carries was Andy Francis who carried the ball 7 times for 39 yards, J. Davis had 3 carries for 28, Jason Bradley had 5 carries for 24 yards, Trent Ware with 1 for 6 and Bryan Judd who had 4 carries for 5 yards. Travis Stevens who threw for 118 yards was minus 31 in the rushing department, most of those minus yards being attribute to socks. Jason Porton caught the ball 6 times for 78 yards, Dusty Case had one reception for 28 yards and Keith Rose with 1 catch for 6 yards.

In the offensive line the Mustangs lost Charlie Flanagan to approximately 10 days due to a couple of broken

bones in his left hand. Again the Mustangs line made a few mental mistakes in blocking and will continue to improve as well as the entire Mustang team. Good things will happen to the Mustang football team as the year progresses due to the commitment made by the team, their coaches and their fans.

The Mustangs will host the Panhandle Panthers this Friday night at 7:30 p.m., so come out and support your team.

Alstacheia Walker Hill, Dallas Civic Leader, Services In Wheeler Sunday, September 10

Alstacheia Walker Hill, well known civic and philanthropic leader of Dallas, Texas, died Friday, September 8 at Chertwell, her Highland Park home. Funeral services were at 2:00 p.m., Sunday, September 10 at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler, Texas. Rev. M. B. Smith and Rev. Bill Morrison officiating. Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery.

Mrs. Hill was born February 19, 1907, the daughter of Sarah Emmaline Reed Walker and Edwin Albyon Walker in Bonita, Texas. She received her secondary school education in Wheeler, Texas, and her graduate education at Oklahoma City University. Her first business position was that of office manager in 1939 for a prominent medical group, Doctors Moore, Moore, and Gettler of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. After five years she resigned and moved back to her native state. She accepted a position in Dallas, Texas, as administrative office manager for Acme Brick Company, the world's largest brick manufacturing company. She resigned this position to marry J. Hub Hill on June 6, 1953, in Portland, Maine. In 1960, she rejoined the business world to be-

come vice president of Hub Hill, Inc., an independent oil producer and exploration firm. She has also served continuously since 1960 as a director of Hill-Elliott Investment Company of Dallas, a firm involved in ranch holdings in California, which took her back to her first love, ranching. She sometimes recalled with considerable interest her great grandfather, Joseph Reddeford Walker, who was the first white man to cross the Sierra Nevada mountain range between Nevada and California, and was the discoverer of the beautiful and magnificent Yosemite Valley. Walker Pass is reminiscent of his discovery and Walker Lake in Nevada was named for him.

Mrs. Hill was well known for her civic and philanthropic work and has served in many significant and contributory capacities: president, 1964, Dallas Health and Science Museum Guild, member of its Advisory Council 1964 to present; president of President's Council of Dallas Area Hospital Auxiliaries 1964-65; past director of Dallas Federation of Women's Clubs. One of her rewarding experiences was her active association with the American Cancer Society, Dallas County, 1955 to present, serving as a Block Worker; and as Zone, District, Area, Division, Women's Special Gifts Division and Women's Division Chairman of this great work in cancer research; and recently served on the board of directors. Her benevolence extends to Goodwill Industries of Dallas, as a member of its Women's Auxiliary. Further evidencing her humanitarian disposition was her membership on the Texas Council for Wildlife Protection and in the Dallas Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

She was an accomplished organist and a patron of the performing arts. A member of the Dallas Country Club, Dallas Country Club Women's Tennis Association, Dallas Athletic Club and Willow Bend Polo and Hunt Club, she could frequently be seen on their courts successfully competing in her favorite sport, tennis. A beautiful dancer, she

KEEPING SCHOOL CLOTHING COSTS DOWN

There's heavy peer pressure for kids to wear the right clothes, but few parents can afford 50-dollar jeans and hundred dollar shoes. The experts say start early to keep your child from developing expensive tastes. Extension clothing specialist Alma Fonseca did a study on the buying power of a child. Her conclusion was that children spend millions of dollars on clothing and accessories and they are able to influence their parents a great deal. Fonseca advises parents to instill a sense of financial responsibility at an early age. Teach the children the value of the dollar by giving them an allowance or letting them earn money by mowing lawns or babysitting. That way they spend their own money on clothes and realize how quickly it disappears. You can start the lesson as early as pre-school by setting a good example. Look for bargains and shop at resale stores. Using common sense makes financial sense.

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
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
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Tri-State Fair Set For September 16-23



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PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinancing of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

The Texas counties are Childress, Collingsworth, Hardeman, Wheeler, Wilbarger and Wichita. The 10 original Oklahoma Counties are Beckham, Caddo, Creek, Grady, Harmon, Jackson, Kiowa, Lincoln, Logan and Tillam. Twenty-one contiguous Oklahoma Counties also are eligible for assistance through this declaration.

The Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act allows that contiguous counties in adjacent states can be included for assistance where eligible family farmers may qualify for emergency loan assistance for physical and production losses.

The designation allows family-size farm operators in the designated counties in both Texas and Oklahoma to be considered for low-interest emergency loans from CFSA. CFSA will receive and process emergency loan applications through Feb. 26, 1996, for physical and production losses related to this designation.

CFSA has a variety of farm-loan programs available, in addition to the emergency loan program, to assist eligible farmers to recover from periods of adversity. Additional information and assistance is available through local CFSA county offices.

From The Minister's Desk:

In 1939, a brilliant German theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote a book that was entitled, **The Cost of Discipleship**. This book was a stern condemnation of the tolerant attitude that the Lutheran Church in Germany was demonstrating towards Adolph Hitler and the Third Reich.

Mr. Bonhoeffer believed that this tolerant attitude was a denial of the church's mission in the world. In his book, he angrily wrote: "Cheap grace is the deadly enemy of the church. We are fighting today for costly grace."

While Adolph Hitler and the Third Reich have long passed into history, I believe that disciples of Jesus should still be characterized by costly grace. They should recognize that the Bible plainly teaches that salvation is by the grace of God. (Titus 3:4-7) But they should also recognize that while salvation is by the grace of God disciples of Jesus must present themselves as "—a living and holy sacrifice." (Romans 12:1-2)

John Gipson, the minister of the Sixth and Izard Church of Christ in Little Rock, Arkansas, recently wrote a bulletin article which emphasized the importance of costly grace. This article was entitled, "Graced To Death" and it read:—

"Far be it from me to speak a word against the grace of God. For by grace you have been saved through faith; and this is now your own doing."

ing, it is the gift of God—not because of works, lest any man should boast. (Ephesians 2:8-9)

"Eternity will not be long enough to speak of the wonderful grace of God. But a grace which eliminates the "can do" or "must do" of persons is not something I find in my Bible. No less an authority than God's Son said, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." (Luke 9:23) Self-denial is something I must do. Taking up the cross is something I must do. To expect "grace to cover all my sins" without self-denial, cost-bearing, or following Jesus is to expect the impossible."

"We are followers of the Crucified, and his crucifixion must have its counterpart in our lives. C. F. D. Moule refers to this as an inexhaustible paradox; on one side, a true and total self-denial, on the other, a daily need of self-crucifixion."

"Salvation is by grace! But it is not the easy, cheap thing that so many have made it out to be. It certainly doesn't eliminate responsibility on my part. God's grace gave the cross; my faith responds to it."

"It is wonderful to be rocked in the cradle of grace and sing about the love of God, but there is more. The cross is constantly calling us to sacrifice and suffering and a bleeding ministry."
