

COUNTY AGENTS REPORT

BY CULA R. NOWLIN

PAST YEAR

Meat supply experts have taken a head count to see what the meat prospects are for 1964. Their findings should be of interest to consumers. Other protein foods as eggs and dairy products will be in ample supply.

Domestic supplies, along with large beef imports, point to a record year in meats available. Estimates are that there are 107 million head of cattle on the nations' farms and ranches, according to the American Meat Institute. This means that more beef than last year will be appearing at meat counters.

For capita consumption for beef is expected to be 97 pounds in a variety of ways in your per person, an all-time high. Although beef is a year-round heavy, well-finished beef reaches the market after the first of the year and continues in good supply through June. In with the year's peak coming usually in October.

EXAMINATION OF BULLS FOR BREEDING POTENTIAL

The beef industry is subject to considerable economic loss each year because of of breeding failure. The acceptance of the concept of "herd infertility" has become increasingly noticable during recent years. While individual females may suffer sp radic, non transmissible infertility their effect on the breeding efficiency on the herd is insignificent when compared with the sub-fertile male. In the USDA herd at Miles City.

Montana, conception rates in single sire herds varied from 45.5 percent to 93.9 percent. Their findings are in common with the observations of commercial cattlemen and show the importance of quickly identifying the poor breeding bull to enable his elimination from

We have a visible measure of the cows reproductive performance in the calf that may or may not be at her side. The only similar measure for

the bull means that we have to wait a long time after he has been used to see whether or not he is siring calves. Should he fail to settle the cows we have a definite but very costly answer. There is little profit in the dry cow business. "Testing" the bull offers a means of determining in advance whether or not he is satisfactory for breeding p urposes.

SOIL TEST SUGGESTED FOR FARMERS SOIL BANK LAND Wheeler County Farmers

have seventy - one Soil Bank Contracts that total 7,234 acres that has been released from the Soil Bank as of January 1st. Farmers will want to test this soil for fertility, says Charles D. Jackson, County Agricultural Agent. Land out of production for some time may be less fertile than regularly cultivated land, depending on what has been growing on it.

"Don't guess -- - soil test," the county agents advice to farmers in this situation.

If the land coming out of soil bank contracts is to be returned to agricultural product ion, soil test should be made even if it is to be used for pasture or hay. If this land is to remain in a protective cover of grasses and legumes, farmers can apply for cost - sharing assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program for fertilizers to re-establish range grasses.

Soil tests are the best way to help de cide proper fertilizer applications. Test results help farmers decide the treatment to bring land up to most efficient levels of production.

If fields with abundant grass cover are returned to cultivated crops, they may need heavy nitrogen applications to help decompose plowed - under organic matter. This is especially true if non legume crops are planned. Land planted to legumes on the other hand, may not need this treatment.

ROOT KNOW NEMATODE CON-TROL ON ORNAMENTALS

Many gardeners and homemakers are being outsmarted by tiny roundworms that have neither brains nor eyes. These worms are rootknot nematodes that find their way into roots of living plants and cause conspicuous swellings on the roots. Many, if not most, ornamental garden plants are susceptible. The grower first notices that the plants are not doing well and many suspect that a nutrient deficiency is responsible. An examination of the belowground parts of severly infested plants will reveal a mass of knotted roots, the typical symptom of root - knot nematodes.

Root - knot nematodes can be controlled. Addition of large amounts of organic matter to the soil often helps to lessen damage but cannot be relied upon for complete control. The addition of table sugar to the soil definitely is not recommended. Certain chemicals can be used around living plants while others must be used before planting. These chemicals are called nematocides. Several of these that may be applied preplant or around living plants are Nemagon E6-2 50%, Fumazone 70-E, and Nema- X. Nemagon and Fumazone is a liquid material and Nema- X comes in granules. Two tablespoons of either Nemagon EC-2 50% or Fumazone 70-E per gallon of water will treat nine square feet Linda Topper visited with of ground. One pound of the Nema- X will treat 120 square feet or 120 ft. of row.



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


