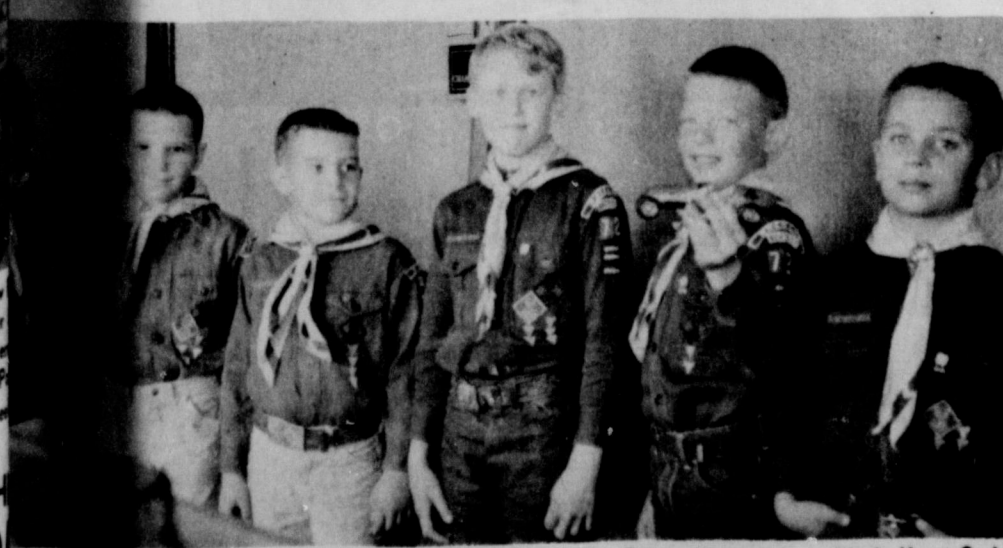

Mr. Read had been in bad health for the past ten years and seriously ill the past six months. The last eight days of his life was spent in St. Anthony Hospital at Amarillo. He was 68 years 10 months and 21 days old at the time of death.

Survivors are the wife Mrs. Vera Read of Canadian; one brother, Flee Read of Iowa Park, and one sister, Mrs. C.E. Buckner of Waynoka, Okla. One sister preceded him in death.

TEXAS SCHOOLS WEEK

Texas Public School Week will get off to a good start with a P.T.A. meeting and open house Monday, March 2. The Wheeler schools will be open to the public all week in observance of the occasion as proclaimed by Gov. John Connally.

Be it therefore resolved that the State Board of Education hereby designates the week of March 2 through 6, 1964 as the fourteenth annual Public Schools Week in Texas, and urges all citizens in the State to visit a public school during that week, and

That the State Commissioner of Education and State Department of Education staff shall join with the Board in encouraging public school administrators, teachers, parent-teacher organizations, and other organizations and agencies to work with individual citizens in improving educational opportunities available to children in their respective communities, and

That Public Schools Week be suggested as an appropriate week for local school officials to plan school events and educational programs which will give to each pupil, and to each citizen who visits in the schools, a better understanding of the vitally important responsibility which rests upon the public schools of our country.

The P.T.A. program, The Family Cradle - a Spiritual Strength - will be given by Harold Purdue, Pastor of the Methodist Church. All school patrons are invited to attend and to visit the classrooms in recognition of Texas Public School Week.

FILING DEADLINE NEARS

Filing deadline for the city election will be March 6 with the Mayor and two council men up for election. The City election will be April 7.

Don Earney has filed for the position of Mayor which is presently held by Thomas Daughtry who will not seek re-election.

Trustee Election will be April 4

All school districts in Wheeler County will hold Trustee Elections on the first Saturday in April, as prescribed by law. This day falls on Saturday April 4th in 1964.

Candidates for the office of Trustee, both District and County, must file, personally, with the County Judge not later than 5:00 P.M. March the fourth in order to get their names printed on the ballots. These filings must be accompanied by both a Loyalty and a non-subversive oath.

All required forms and oaths may be obtained at the County Superintendent Office upon request.

GAS & LIGHTS OFF

Wheeler residents found themselves without gas for six hours Saturday and they were one of the many communities which was without gas Saturday, and they were one of the many communities which was without electricity Monday morning.

For the first time since 1929, the entire city of Wheeler was without gas Saturday, due to a break in the main line south of town.

The gas was shut off at 1:20 Saturday morning after the main line was punctured with a plow. The break was located near the cemetery and consisted of a two inch hole.

Repairing the pipe line required only 30 minutes, but a house to house check was necessary before the gas service could be resumed. Six men worked the afternoon to each of the 520 customers to make sure

they knew the gas had been turned off and to turn the meter off where the customer was out of town. The gas service was resumed at 5:15, but it was 11:20 before all the meters had been turned back on.

Some 90,000 people in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas were without electricity Monday morning when a turbine located near Amarillo went out. In most cases other generators would have supplied the power, but they were disconnected to make improvements in the service.

The power failure which left Wheeler without electricity for a period of thirty minutes left some merchants with flashlights to show their merchandise in the back of the store. Secretaries were without typewriters and were given their second coffee break of the morning, and one of the stores found themselves without a cash register.

Clay Food Store found themselves opening the door for their customers. Everyone is used to the automatic doors and upon approaching would assume the store closed when the door didn't open.

The city of Wheeler has been very fortunate in that they had gas and electricity during the extreme cold weather. These failures occurred during the mild spell, and none suffered any extreme discomfort.

PLANT OR RELEASE

County Agent's Report

By Charles D. Jackson

Cattle lice may not create much of a problem in the warm months but its a different story during the winter months. Closer confinement aids the spread of lice from infected to clean animals.

By the time the lice are easily seen much of the damage has been done. Treating before infestations become severe will always pay dividends.

Sprays which are recommended and have Food and Drug Administration approval for use on dairy cattle are pyrethrin, rotenone and cyodrin. The manufacturer's directions on the labels of these insecticides should be followed very closely.

Malathion, Lindane, corral roneel, texaphene, cyodrin, methoxychlor, neulene, sevin and delvan are materials which may be used for lice control on beef animals.

This time of year it would not be profitable to spray with an insecticide that is recommended for grub control, because it would not be effective now. For just lice control your cheaper insecticides such as lindane and toxaphene will give good control. The animals may be treated by either dipping or spraying and a second application is usually recommended in two to three weeks after the first application in order to kill new lice as eggs hatch. Usually two treatments will control the pests on beef cattle for the winter season unless new animals are placed in the herd or feedlots. New stock should be treated before being put in with clean stock.

Lice generally cause milk production to drop in the dairy herd and weight loss in beef cows and reduced feed efficiency in feedlots.

You can't be too careful in carrying out the manufacturer's directions. Treating milk cows with the wrong insecticide, treating them while they are in milk production or treating beef animals too near slaughter time can get you in trouble with the Food and Drug Administration.

Some people are surprised to learn that there's a limit on holdings of United States Savings Bonds. Maybe they have actually been violating the regulations, without being aware of it. So this may be the time to review the main points of this often misunderstood provision.

At present, the limit on holdings of Series E bonds bought in any one calendar year is \$10,000. The limit on & bonds is \$20,000. It hasn't always been this way. The H bond limit was once \$5,000, and later was \$20,000. But it's been fixed at \$10,000 since 1957. The H bond limit was increased

5. Members who miss two consecutive drill practices, without approved excuse will be dropped from the Drill Team Roll, and may ride only in parades.

6. Members who are minus any part of their riding gear will be fined 50 cents per article. This rule applies both to parade and drill team appearances.

7. All riding club and drill

team horses must be at least fourteen (14) hands high. All horses must be solid colored. No stallions will be permitted in the riding club or drill team.

8. Queen will be selected at close of year by majority vote of club membership. Girl must have been a riding club member for one or two seasons in order to be eligible candidate. Girl may serve only one term. Club will pay \$10.00 toward expenses of outfitting queen.

9. Violation of the above rules (Excepting Rule 6) results in members being dropped from the riding club for the remainder of the season. Any amendment must be made by two thirds vote of membership parents or advisory committee.

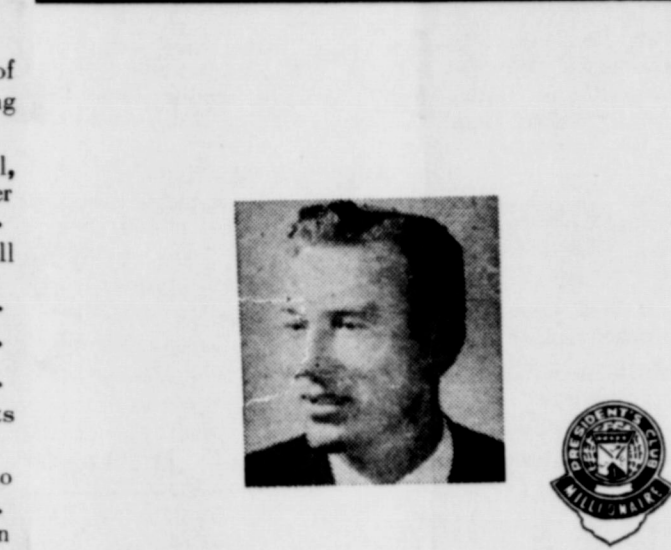

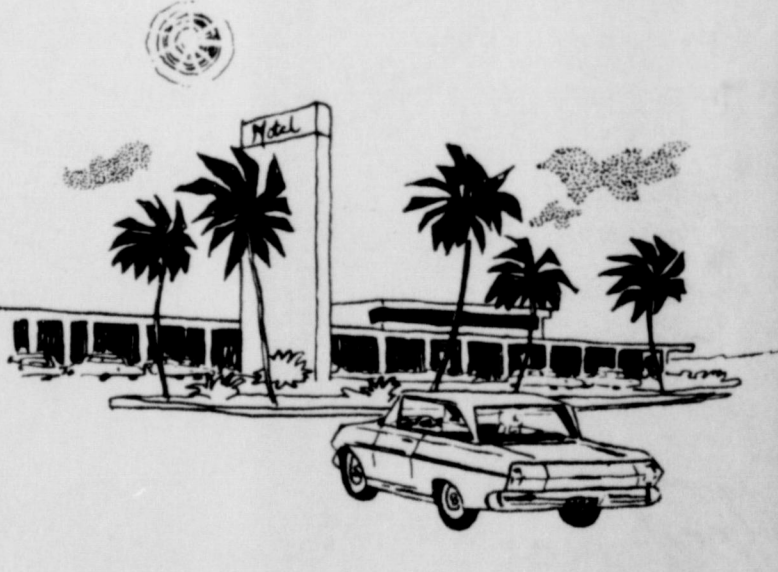

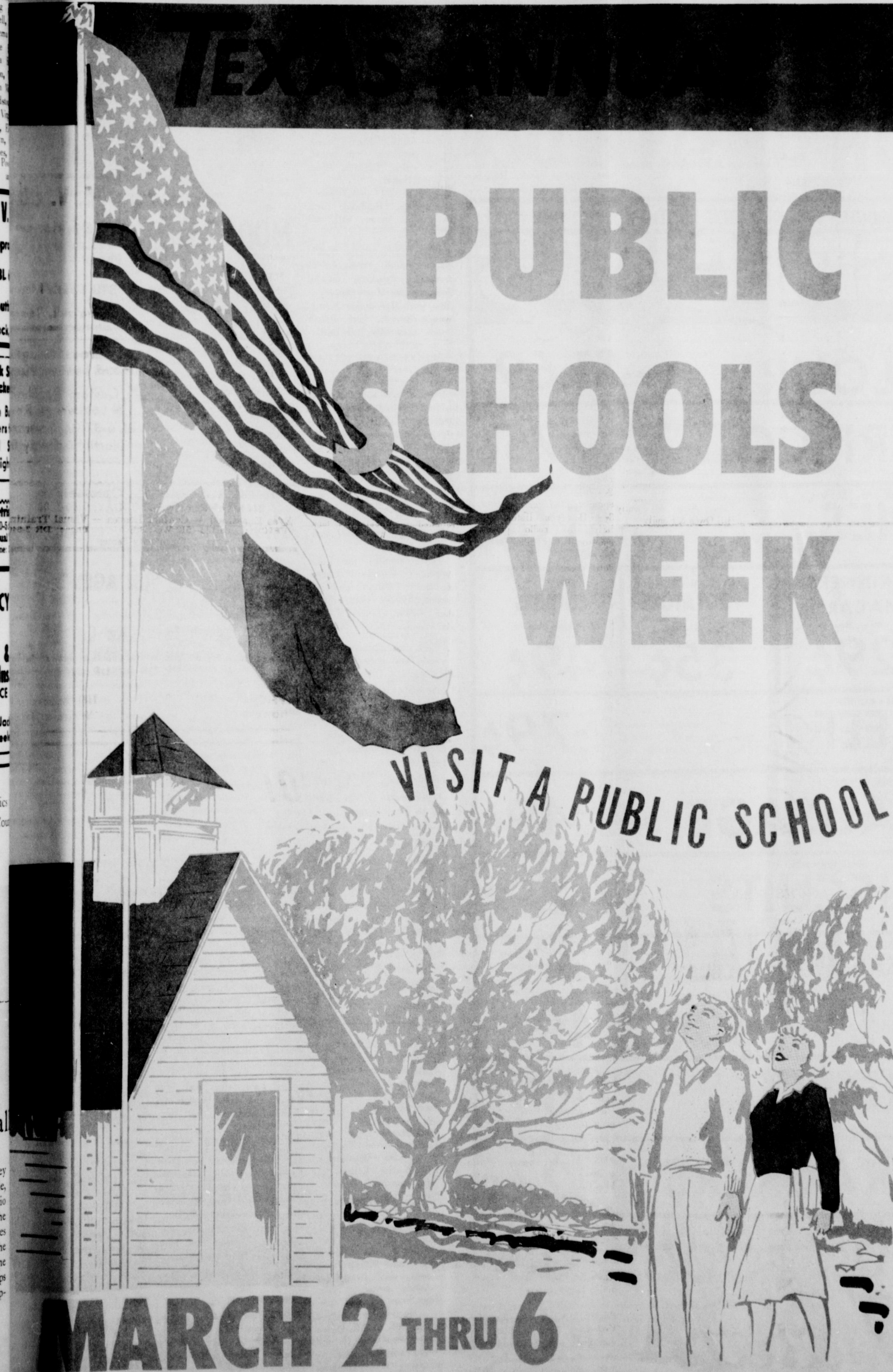
