The Wheeler Times will be printed at Clinton, Oklahoma this week and for the weeks to come.

The Wheeler Times has been printed offset since December 12 weeks and the printing has been done by the Southwest Offset plant at Hereford, Texas since that time except for the February 2 edition which was printed at the Clinton Daily News in Clinton, Okla. when the road to Hereford were closed by blowing snors The Clinton Daily News

has been printing their paper offset for nearly two months and feel that they now have enough experience to print the Times. The change will cut the driving distance from 160 miles each way to 80 miles.

Absantee voting began Tuesday for the city election which is set for April 7, 1964. Voters will have the oportunity to'elect a mayor and two council men for Wheeler. 





To Insure Game CONSERVATION PLAN What has happened to the Wildlife? We often hear comments such as this when

Feed Wildlife

we have difficulty in finding game and fish. Often with very little trouble we could keep wildlife on the farm. No matter what the major purpose, anything done on the land for soil and water conservation also produces something wildlife needs. Many conservation practices produce additional food and water and other practices provide a safe place to raise their young, hide or travel unseen by their natural enemies.

More and more conservation farmers and ranchers are making double sure that wildlife has what it needs. Small areas can be plowed and allowed to grow wild with weeds for food. Low shrubs and plants that bear fruit and seeds especially liked by wildlife are included in windbreaks and other odd areas. Brush is piled here and there to provide cover for wildlife. A few outer rows of grain crops may be left standing bordering protected areas or game feeders located over the farm to provide additional food supply. "Odd areas" on farms and
