HUNTER SIGNS WITH TECH

Mighty Mendall Hunter, "Mr. Everything" of Wheeler, signed a pre-enrollment application to Texas Tech with backfield coach Merrill Green.

Hunter, 5-11, 178 pound fullback and linebacker, has been a starter on the

football team since his freshman year. He led the Mustangs to 10 straight wins this past season, topping the team in scoring and in yardage gained. He was named as the second team All-Top O' Texas fullback, and was a two-way all-district the past two years.

Hunter will graduate with 12 varsity letters. He has also been a starter on the basketball team since his sophomore year, is a two-year all-district and led the cagers in scoring as well.

In track, Hunter runs the 100, 440 and on the sprint and mile relay teams. His best times through last year were a 10.4 100 and a 53.0 440.

Hunter chose Tech over a number of other major colleges because "I like the coaches and the boys." He plans to major in business or agriculture.

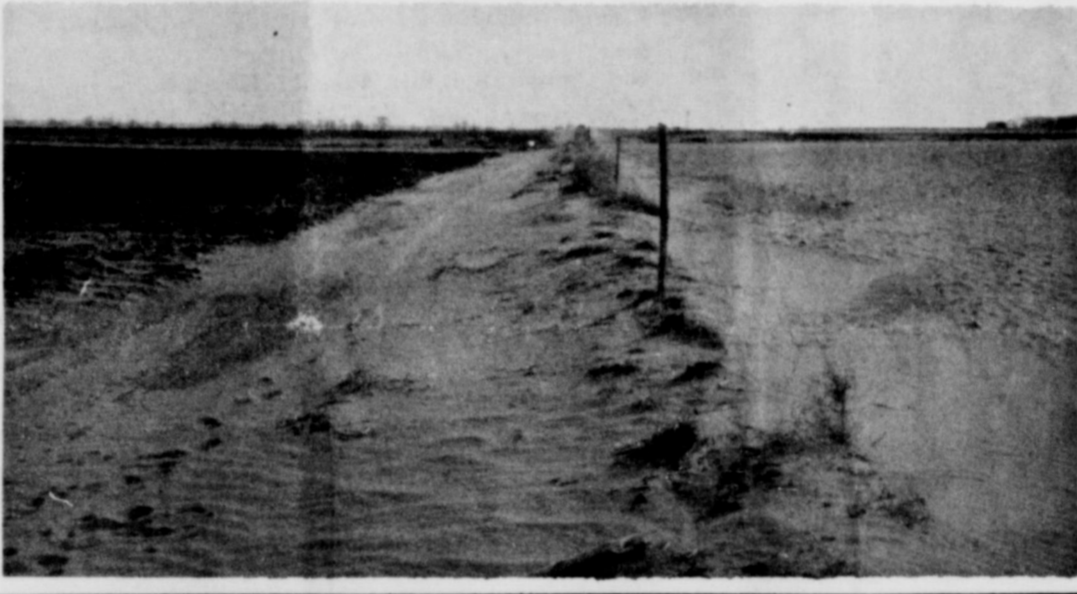
Interment was in Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Kirk Funeral Home of Wheeler.

HERE LIES A WHEAT CROP... A strip of land just across the county line in Hemphill County is experiencing a drought going on the second year. The area is approximately 8 miles wide and an undetermined length. This strip of land has received 9 inches of rain in the past 18 months. The top picture was taken on Mrs. George Bradstreet's property which is farmed by Roy Meadows and bordered on the left by the John C. Vise property. The lower picture

was taken one mile further east and shows the fence line between another Vise field and the Bradstreet property. The furrows on the left are the remains of a wheat field and are rapidly filling with sand. Farmers on either side of the strip have excellent crops and are surprised to learn of these farmers drought. The Clifford Hefley home is located on a hill overlooking the blowing fields and Mrs. Hefley has been referring to her home as "Poverty Knob."



TCU GETS NEIL ROGERS

Neil Rogers, giant Wheeler tackle, signed a pre-enrollment application to Texas Christian University last night, climaxing a hectic talent hunt by more than half-a-dozen major colleges for his services.

Probably the most sought after lineman in the Class B ranks in the state this year, the 6'2", 223 pound speed boy finally decided upon TCU after a visit there this weekend. A pre-enrollment application was mailed to his home and signed last night by Rogers and his father, Joe Rogers.

Rogers is a 10-letter athlete at Wheeler and will win another letter in track before he graduates. A four-year man in both football and basketball, Rogers is a two-time two-way all-district, and made the first All-Top

O' Texas football season this past fall. Astonishingly fast for his size, Rogers runs the 220-yard dash in 24.1.

Rogers plans to major in Physical Education.

TRACK TEAM PLACES THIRD AT MEET

Favored Wellington won overwhelmingly, as expected in the 6th annual Pirate Relays, scoring 121 points to second-place Lefors' 85. Although lacking in depth, the Pirates surprised Wheeler for second place by winning six first places, including two relay events. The Mustangs, who finished with 66 1/2 points, were hurt when their favored sprint relay team dropped the baton and lost out in the preliminaries.

Fourth place went to Memphis as figured, with their depth pulling them to 63 points. Dark horse Panhandle

grabbed fifth with 57 points, sixth was Sanford-Fritch with 42, seventh was Canadian with 35 and Pampa B, figured a strong contender in the meet, dropped to eighth with 32 points. They were followed by Clarendon with 28, McLean with 20, Stratford, with eight, and Gruver with two, breaking their shutout in the last event with a sixth place in the mile relay.

The Clinton Daily News has been printing their paper offset for nearly two months and feel that they now have enough experience to print the Times. The change will cut the driving distance from 160 miles each way to 80 miles.

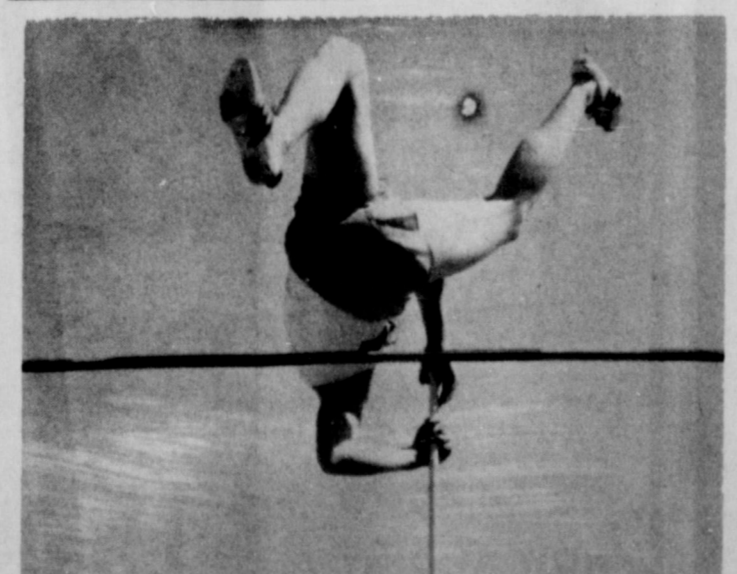
Just for the record, the trip was strictly business and not a shopping trip.

TAKE SCHOLARSHIP TESTS

Twelve students at Wheeler High School took the 1964 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, Arlington, Superintendent, announced today. The test was administered at the school at 9 a.m., Tuesday, March 10th. All students who wished to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1965 took the test at that time. An additional 35,000 students, selected on a national basis, receive Letters of Commendation for their high performance on the qualifying test. These students are considered for special awards made through the Merit Corporation, and their names and test scores are also sent to their first and second-choice colleges. Each Semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance will become Finalists in the Merit Program.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, colleges, associations, unions, trusts, and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. In 1963, 1528 Merit Scholarships were awarded; 951 were provided by 179 sponsors and 577 by the Merit Corporation. There are 4118 Merit Scholars attending 425 colleges in the current academic year.

The test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Some 14,000 Semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Names of Semifinalists are published in a booklet which is distributed to all colleges and to other sources of financial aid for undergraduates. Further, their names and test scores are sent to

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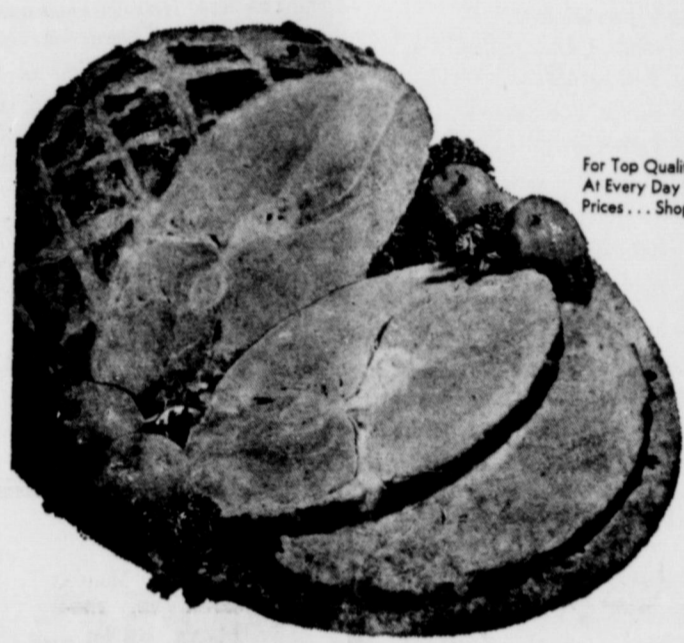

Feed Wildlife To Insure Game

CONSERVATION PLAN

What has happened to the Wildlife? We often hear comments such as this when we have difficulty in finding game and fish. Often with very little trouble we could keep wildlife on the farm.

No matter what the major purpose, anything done on the land for soil and water conservation also produces something wildlife needs. Many conservation practices produce additional food and water and other practices provide a safe place to raise their young, hide or travel unseen by their natural enemies.

More and more conservation farmers and ranchers are making double sure that wildlife has what it needs. Small areas can be plowed and allowed to grow wild with weeds for food. Low shrubs and plants that bear fruit and seeds especially liked by wildlife are included in windbreaks and other odd areas. Brush is piled here and there to provide cover for wildlife. A few outer rows of grain crops may be left standing bordering protected areas or game feeders located over the farm to provide additional food supply.

"Odd areas" on farms and ranches can be managed for wildlife. These areas include such places as fence corners, rocky spots, blow-outs, abandoned roads and good land isolated by ditches streams and gullies. Stock ponds should be protected by fencing and keeping out silt. The shallower portions will give suitable cover and food to water fowl and fish. Wildlife, if managed correctly, can be a very good

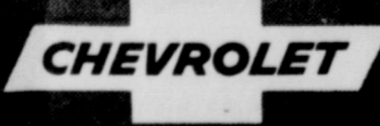

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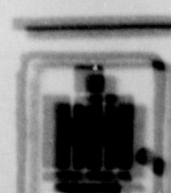
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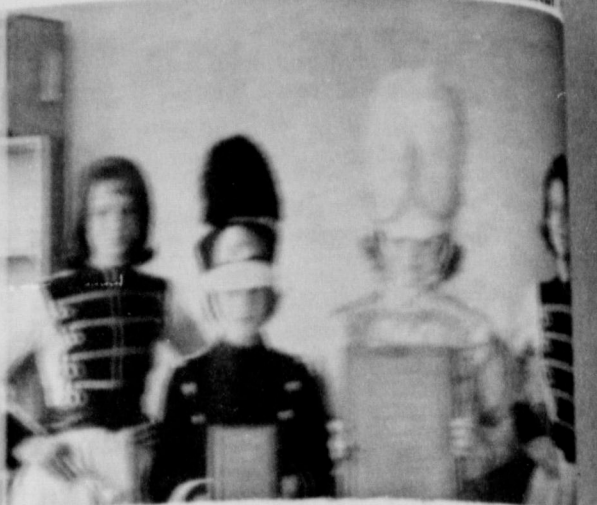
