HALE ENTERS PANHANDLE HALL OF FAME



Sam Hale, a Wheeler resident was inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame at a ceremony Sunday afternoon. Mr. Hale has been in ill health, he made the trip to Amarillo for the ceremonies, but was unable to attend. Hale was number nine to be placed in the hall of fame. At the same time, the late Sam Burton was also honored.

The award was accepted by Tommy Hale of Bobbs, N.M. Three of the Hales children attended the ceremony.

Mr. and Mrs. Hale moved to Wheeler in September of last year after he retired as greens keeper at the Phillips Golf Course in Borger. Mrs. Hale stated that even though they have not lived in Wheeler all the time, Wheeler has always been considered their home.

During Mr. Hale's active life, the Hales have lived in Detroit, Portland, Ore., Philadelphia and St. Louis, while he was in the major leagues. They lived in Borger, Midland, Wichita Falls and Pampa.

In behalf of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Jim Wright, president, extended congratulations to Mr. Hale.

The following information about Mr. Hale was taken from a story written by Tommy Bryant of the Amarillo Sports Staff.

Hale played 24 seasons of professional baseball and had a .302 batting average through 10 major league seasons.

After graduation from Estelline High School,

Hale signed a pro contract with Dallas and moved to San Antonio. He reached the major leagues in 1920 with Detroit.

Connie Mack purchased Hale in 1922 for \$75,000 for his Philadelphia Athletics. Hale closed out his major league stay in 1930 with the St. Louis Browns.

The third baseman's best hitting year was 1925, when he belted a .345 clip. Hale continued to belt minor league pitching.

A Chat with The Editor

Tuesday February 1, marked the sixth anniversary of the wife's and my arrival in Wheeler. We arrived with our belongings loaded in the car on a Sunday afternoon. Monday morning began my work at the Wheeler Times.

The town has grown considerably since our arrival. Note also that two more Stases have been added during our stay here. The youngest celebrated her fourth birthday Tuesday. The oldest born seven months after our arrival.

It was mentioned a few weeks back that Jim Wright, Chamber of Commerce President, was interested in projects which improve people's first impression of Wheeler. Much has been done in the past six years to improve one's first impression. The remodeling of many of our local businesses, removal of the old buildings on Texas Street and new buildings. Five new buildings in the immediate business district—Don Earmey building, Wheeler Medical Clinic, The Moore building, Honey Inn and Abernathy's Mobil Service Station which replaced two well deteriorated buildings were added during this period.

Numerous new homes have been added. Most small towns have a new section where the new homes are lined up for you to drive down one street and see them all. Wheeler, however, has new homes scattered throughout the well established section of town. For instance, in the first four years we lived here we witnessed eleven new homes built on Canadian from Texas to 110 Canadian. These filled vacant lots between older homes.

A check with the papers see what Wheeler Gas ran on new homes, business. We found nine new homes added in 1960. Panpool-Burton remodeled and Jolly Hobby, Yreva's Pop and Albert's Shamrock were added to businesses. The Baptist Church remodeling was completed.

The year 1961 added four new homes. Mustang Bowl, Fertilizer Plant, now R&R Fertilizer, North Texas Producers building and Modern Courts were added. Remodeled were Ware Chevrolet and ASCS office.

Our records show that the size of Wheeler increases by the addition of five

SEIBERT WORLEY SEEKS STATE REPRESENTATIVE POST

Seibert Worley, mayor of Shamrock and one of the city's leading civic workers, this week announced his candidacy for state representative of the new 84th district.

His announcement followed immediately a statement by Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler, representative of the former 87th district for more than 17 years, that he would not seek re-election to the office. Mr. Worley said he would seek the political post as a conservative Democrat.

The district has been enlarged by four counties and now includes Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler counties. Collingsworth, Gray and Wheeler counties comprised the old 87th district.

Mr. Worley is co-owner of motion picture theatres and cable television systems. He finished high school in Shamrock, lived in Austin 12 years and moved back to Shamrock in 1943. He attended Oklahoma State University, Stillwater and Texas A & M University, College Station. His wife is the former Frances Blackburn, member of a pioneer Shamrock family. They are the parents of one son, Jack Worley, who, with his family, live in Shamrock and is associated with his father in his business operations.

Mr. Worley is a former director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation. He is a former member of the State Industrial Advisory Board and a member of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission and State-wide Water Committee, serving under former Governor Price Daniel.

He is a Director of the Oklahoma-Texas Panhandle Theatre Owner's Association, a group which he served as president for two years. He also served two years as president of the Texas Community Antenna Television Association and is currently a member of the auxiliary committee of the National community Television Association.

Mr. Worley is a member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Khiva Temple of Amarillo. His masonic affiliation is with the Shamrock Lodge.

On a local level, Mr. Worley was the first president of the Shamrock Extension Student's Association. He headed the association for two terms. He is a former

general chairman of the St. Patrick's Day Celebration and is currently serving as program chairman of the Irish festival. He is a member of the industrial committee of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Shamrock, the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

He is serving his third term as mayor of the city of Shamrock.

It is doubtful if the Golden Spread and Shamrock has ever had a more active and enthusiastic booster.

Mr. Worley's formal announcement to the residents of the 84th legislative district follows:

"It has been my observation that so many bills are introduced in the legislature that it is practically impossible for each legislator to keep informed and abreast of the merits or demerits of all of the issues. I

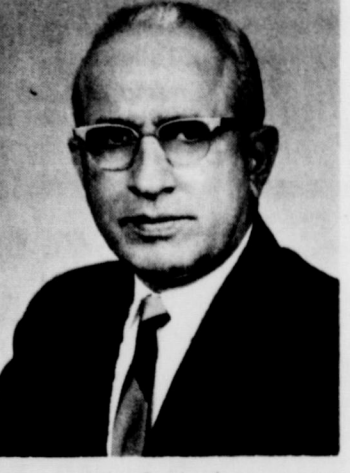
'Oofie' Abraham Files for Rep.

Roy Carter Herd, 59, passed away at Northwest Texas hospital in Amarillo Sunday January 30, 1966 after a months serious illness.

Mr. Herd was born in Cook county, Texas July 19, 1906 to John and Mary Louise Herd and was married to Iona Vernice Gaines March 5, 1934 at Cheyenne, Okla.

He moved to Wheeler county in 1920 and had farmed all his life.

Mr. Herd was a member of the Wheeler First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Iona; one daughter, Mrs. Dean Tippy of Briscoe; one brother, Hammy Herd of Wheeler; four sisters: Mrs. Clara Maxwell of Wheeler; Mrs. Ara Crowder of Wheeler, Miss Bessie Herd and Mrs. Mattie Hargett of Tahoka, Texas; 3 grandchildren and one brother and 2 sisters preceded him in death.

Services were held in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler, Monday January 31, 1966 at 2:30 with Rev. C. M. Abercrombie officiating.

Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright-Denson Funeral home.

DEDICATION CEREMONIES

A small number of people attended the dedication ceremonies to commemorate the obtaining of a medallion and plate for the old jail on the corner of the courthouse square.

Harry Wafford served as Master of Ceremonies. He introduced Mrs. Grady (Sallie) Harris and recognized her for the hard work and many hours she has put in working with the Texas Historical Committee.

In regard to the small number of people in attendance, Mr. Wafford stated that because of the willingness of a few people 75 to 100 years ago, this meeting was possible.

Rather than recognize just a few of the people present, Mr. Wafford introduced the entire group.

A B Crump, 60 year resident of Wheeler, was called upon to give the dedication message. Mr. Crump gave the history behind the founding of Wheeler. Wheeler was the dream of James E. Stanley, who at the turn of the century owned the land where Wheeler stands. Mr. Stanley is Mrs. A. B. Crump's father.

When the surveys, under the direction of Mr. Stanley, layed out the town, block 21 was set aside for public use and could be at any time be deeded to the county for a courthouse and jail.

Mr. Stanley then started the circulation of a petition to move the county seat to Wheeler in 1906. The election was held in November 1906. A majority of 11 votes called for the moving of the county seat. The election results were taken before the court of appeals in 1907 before the courthouse could be moved to Wheeler.

Mr. Crump stated that he visited the Stanley Ranch in 1904 and Mr. Stanley pointed out where he was going to build a town. The town was surveyed in 1905 and Mr. Crump first moved to Wheeler January 7, 1906 after selling his business in Pampa.

Cora Hyatt, president of the Garden Club, presented the Medallion and plate to Mr. Crump. The acquiring of the plate was a project of the Garden Club. Mrs. Hyatt is the daughter of Mrs. Millie Jones Porter, author of "Memory Cups," a book about Wheeler County. The presentation of this plate gives Wheeler county a total of six historical markers.

Mr. Wafford told the group of his experiences in the Old Jail. His father was the county sheriff in 1920 and Harry lived in the jail for a short time.

The Crumps have many items to contribute to a museum. It is their hopes that a thriving museum can be set up in the old Jail and their possessions can be left in Wheeler County. Wheeler County has the greatest opportunity for a museum, as it is the first county in the panhandle, established in 1879.

In addition to fellowship, several matters of business were discussed. Among the projects for 1966 were discussed the possibility of sponsoring some type of religious emphasis in all the schools of the county, a union open-air revival services, a religious census and the Easter Sunrise Service.

The religious emphasis and the religious emphasis in the schools are to be worked out in each local community. The other projects are under consideration and study and will be reported on at the next meeting.

The next meeting of the Minister's Association will be on Wednesday, February 9 in the Kelton community. Members will be informed of details of meeting later.

The North Wheeler county Ministers association is a voluntary association of ministers in Wheeler, Kelton, Allison, Briscoe, Gageby and Mobeettie. All ministers are welcome to its fellowship. There are annual dues of \$2 each.

Entering its second year of organization, the group can look back upon a good beginning and pleasure at the success of its first officially sponsored meeting, the area Thanksgiving Service, conducted in November.

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Water Saving Methods Used

The recently issued 1965 high plains irrigation survey prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service indicates area farmers continue to adopt better water management practices, according to W.M. Lyle, Extension Irrigation Specialist here.

The specialist said increases in 1965 of acres bench leveled and field leveled and acres irrigated with underground pipe systems reflect this continuing trend toward making better use of available water here in the nation's largest underground water irrigation region.

The 42-county survey shows that 6,223 acres were bench leveled in 1965. This brings the total acres bench leveled on the High Plains to near 32,000.

A total of about 105,000 acres were reported field leveled. This is a new classification in the irrigation survey and so it reflects the total acres field leveled; not just those acres leveled in 1965.

Land irrigated with underground pipe systems increased by 148,121 acres in 1965. More than 2.7 million acres are now watered from underground pipe systems, according to the survey.

Land irrigated with sprinkler systems increased by 131,472 acres to bring the total watered with sprinklers to near 797,000 acres.

The irrigation survey was compiled by Extension Irrigation Specialist C.W. Keese, of College Station through the reports of county agents.

Lyle said the survey shows that the land area irrigated in the High Plains dropped slightly from about 5,440,000 acres in 1964 to about 5,260,000 acres in 1965. However, nearly 59,500 wells were used in 1965 compared to about 55,400 used in 1964. This is an increase of more than 4,000 wells in 1965.

The specialist said the increase in wells with a corresponding decrease in acreage irrigated illustrates the rising pumping costs facing some High Plains farmers. Lyle said greater attention to water-management could help reduce these costs.

House Plants Problems

Many ailments of house plants, usually attributed to diseases or insects actually result from the environment in which they are forced to live, says E.E. Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A&M University.

Some of the more common causes of important growth of house plants are listed by the horticulturist. Burned or brown leaf tips and leaf edges can be caused by exposure to low temperatures; by applying too much fertilizer; allowing the plants to become too dry for short periods or by applying liquid fertilizer to dry soil, says Janne.

When leaves turn yellow and drop from the plant at the slightest touch, overwatering is usually the cause. Poor drainage, tight soil mixture or keeping the plants too dry over long periods can cause leaves to be smaller than normal. Small leaves and long internodes between them usually result from low light intensities and/or high room temperatures, explains Janne.

The yellowing or dropping of leaves at various stem levels can be caused from overwatering, poor drainage and aeration, chilling or gas fumes in the air. Weak growth, light green or yellowish green foliage may result from too much light, a root system which is poor or damaged.

Many times plants fail to make proper growth regardless of the care or treatment provided. This may be due to the high salt content of the water available in the area. This condition can be partially overcome, he advises by providing good soil drainage and overwatering. The excess water will move through the soil and drain into the container below the pot holding the plant. The excess water must be poured from the container after each watering and never be left to evaporate, he says.

Take Soil Samples Now

By Charles D. Jackson

January and February are good months for collecting soil samples. Sampling well in advance of planting offers the advantage of allowing time for the samples to be tested and time to obtain the needed fertilizer. Presently it takes about 10 days for processing at the Texas A&M soil testing laboratory.

If the samples are wet, to reduce shipping weight, samples can be dried a day or two at air temperature. However, they should not be heated since heating some soils cause the potassium to be fixed so that it cannot be removed by chemical methods.

If reliable information is to be obtained from a soil test, it's best for the sample to be carefully taken and not represent too large an area. A core or slice of soil from 10-15 spots in fields of less than 40 acres works fine.

The field or farm should be divided according to the type of soil, as well as past and future cropping practices. Take enough time to collect a good sample and fill out the information sheet as completely as possible.

Pint boxes, mailing cartons, history sheets, instructions are available from the county agent's office. Feel free to visit my office and let me see you with information that will help you make great profits from use of fertilizer.
