MAY 2 PRIMARIES NEAR, MUST HAVE POLL RECEIPT

You must present your Poll Tax Receipt or Exemption Certificate to vote.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY ELECTION to be held May 2, 1964 and the voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Please vote early.

This is long hours for those holding the election and you should give them due consideration for they want to give you good service and be able to close the poll at the 7 o'clock hour.

You must present your Poll Tax Receipt or Exemption Certificate to the presiding Judge of the election before he can give you a ballot and if you fail to do this he can refuse you a ballot until you find the Poll Tax receipt and if you make an affidavit that you have lost the receipt and proven otherwise you are subject to a heavy penalty.

So have your Poll Tax receipt ready at all times. Over age may obtain an Exemption Certificate at the time of voting. Before you are allowed to vote, these certificates must be presented and it must be stamped "DEMOCRATIC" before you are allowed to vote.

This is STATE LAW - do not censure your election officials.

Those paying the 25c for voting privileges are not to participate in the Primaries, only in the General Election.

A 58 year resident of the Wheeler Community, Mrs. Edson Sorensen, passed away in Pampa April 18, 1964 at 2:30 a.m. Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler, April 19th at 3:30 p.m. with Rev. M.B. Smith of Pampa officiating. Rev. Smith was assisted in the Service by Rev. Harold Peardue, pastor of the Wheeler Methodist Church and Rev. Frank J. Ross, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler.

May Sorensen was born at Troy, Mississippi on January 19, 1891 and came to this community from Canadian, Texas in 1905. She was married to Edson Sorensen on September 22, 1923 and had resided on a farm near Wheeler until moving to Wheeler in January of 1964.

A member of the Baptist Church, Mrs. Sorensen was a school teacher for many years. She had been in bad health and seriously ill since April 9 when she was taken to a Hospital in Pampa.

Terry McCasland Honored for Work

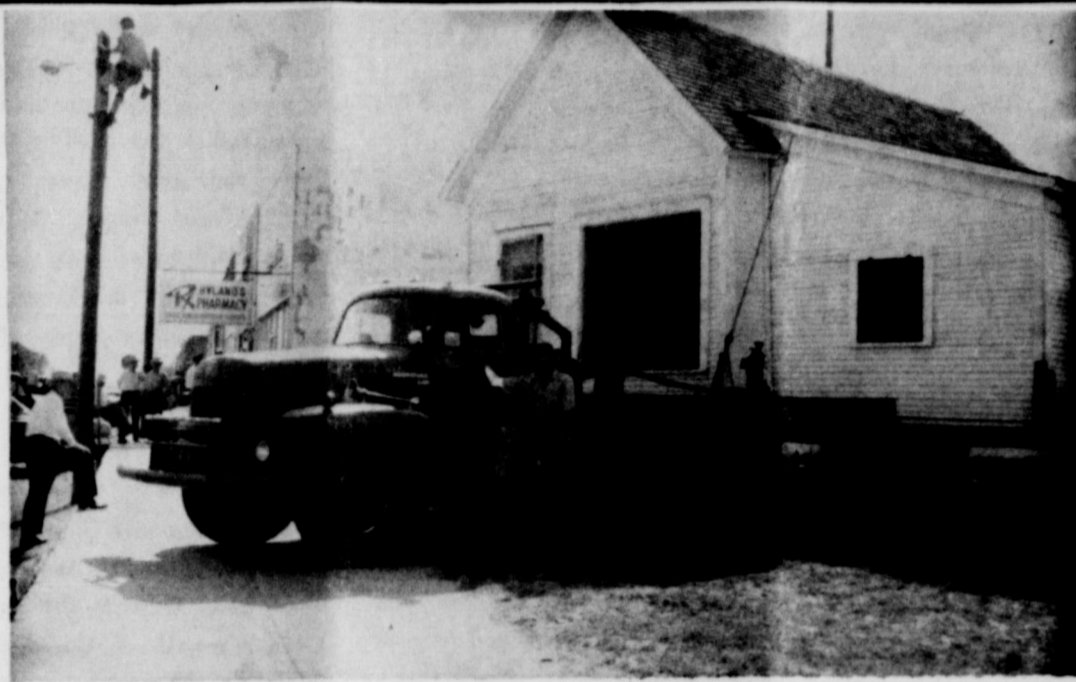
Because of his leadership in the 4-H Clubs of America, Terry McCasland, first Vice-Chairman of Texas, was named as a possible delegate from Texas to the National Conference on Smoking and Youth, to be held in Washington, D.C. April 30-May 2, 1964. This conference is sponsored by the Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare and will underwrite each delegate's expenses for food, lodging and transportation to and from Washington D.C.

Following the Conference, and based upon its deliberations, the U.S. Bureau of Health will develop a publication on "Youth Speaks on Smoking." "To Reflect Upon the Issue of Smoking From the Perspective of The Young People of America." It will call special attention to the recent document Report of the Advisory Committee to the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service.

Four young Texas delegates will be chosen from various National Youth Organizations in the State, ages 14 through 18. Terry received his nomination from Mrs. Jack C. Eisenberg, Consultant of Child Welfare Division of the Texas Department of Public Welfare, Austin, Texas.

Total cost of the proposed hospital will be \$710,000. Of this amount, \$345,000 will come from the Hill-Burton Agency as an outright grant, and \$365,000 from the sale of hospital district bonds, if approved by the voters in the May 5 election.

The bonds would be issued and sold on a 15-year retirement basis. A tax rate of 45¢ per \$100 valuation,

ANNUAL PRODUCTION CREDIT MEETING

More than 500 stockholders and guests from across a six-county area of the Texas Panhandle attended the annual meeting and luncheon of the Canadian Production Credit Association here Saturday, to highlight 30th anniversary activities of the home-owned and operated agricultural financing institution.

Held in the Canadian High School auditorium, stockholders and guests heard W.N. Stokes, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, and Ace Reid, famed cowboy cartoonist from Kerville.

Stokes discussed the current trends of agricultural credit and the trend of rising money costs on the nation's commercial money market, where Production Credit Associations receive their loan funds. The Houston Credit Bank serves as discount and supervisory agency for all 36 PCA groups in Texas.

Ace Reid, originator of the "Cowpokes" western cartoons, presented a humorous address and drew several original cartoons during his speech.

In other business meeting activities I.H. Keahey of White Deer and Hugh Pansell of Canadian were re-elected to three-year terms on the board of directors. Holdover directors are Wallace N. Harker of Booker, C.B. Henderson of Wheeler, M. Lawrence Ellzey of Perryton and Dale Nix of Canadian.

President Keahey presented a report for the board of directors and General Manager Erbin L. Crowell of Canadian gave the association's financial report. Lon Mitchell of Canadian presided at the directors' election, and Director Nix served as meeting chairman.

At a board re-organizational meeting, held following the stockholders' meeting, the following officers were re-elected: President Keahey, Vice President Harker and General Manager and Secretary-Treasurer Crowell.

The Canadian Production Credit Association is owned and operated in its entirety by farmer and rancher stockholder-borrowers in Oklahoma, Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler counties. Offices are operated in Canadian, Wheeler, Pampa and Perryton.

Since its organization on January 3, 1934, the Canadian PCA has loaned more than \$85,000,000 in its six-county area.

FORAGE TESTING PAYS

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

Forage testing pays big dividends. Texas cattlemen now have such a service available to them through the local Extension Service Office. The Texas A&M University Forage Testing Service operation has just been initiated.

Beef cattle producers, feeders and dairymen can take advantage of the new service - and they should. Research shows there are vast differences in the nutritive value and quality of forages used in feeding programs throughout the state.

A ration cannot be properly balanced when the nutritive value of a forage is not known. If the forage is not properly utilized and supplemented according to its feeding value, this will be quickly reflected in beef and milk production - and ultimate profits.

The Texas A&M Forage Testing Service is available to anyone who desires to have dry forage or silage tested. Tests cannot be made of other types of feed and such as grain or concentrates. Tests will be made for protein content only if the producer prefers. Protein test charges are \$2 per hay sample and \$3 per silage sample. When more complete information is desired, the charge is \$6 for each hay and pelleted or wafered forage sample. Each silage sample analysis will cost \$7. The more complete analysis will consist of determining crude protein and crude fiber, calculation of digestible protein, total digestible nutrients and net energy. Moisture in silage will also be determined. As an added benefit - with the more complete analysis - balanced feeding program suggestions will be given those requesting it.

THURSDAY, APRIL 23, 1964

Suggested feeding programs will be offered for three types of operations - for beef breeding cattle, fattening beef cattle and dairy cattle feeding.

This service should be of much benefit to Wheeler County livestock producers as well as give a big lift to our Hay Show at the Wheeler County Fair.

As with the present Extension Soil Testing Service, all forms, mailing bags, instructions and other information are available from the county agents office.

Breakfast cereals have changed in variety, appearance and price in recent years. Breakfast cereals have undergone many changes to meet consumer demands.

There are as many as 60 or more varieties in 100 or more separate packages on the modern grocer's shelves. Packages for the cereals also have undergone drastic changes.

New cereal varieties, smart variations of old ones, new methods of packaging, and advertising have influenced the consumer's continued use of breakfast cereals, points out Mrs. Cula Nowlin, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Americans eat just about as much cereal breakfast foods today as in the 1900's, but they eat more ready-to-eat cereals and less cooking varieties. In 1939, the average consumption was 9.7 pounds of breakfast cereals and today it is 9.5 pounds annually. However, ready-to-eat types account for about two-thirds of the poundage consumed today, compared with about half and half in 1939.

Wheat and corn lead ready-to-eat cereal sales. About one-third of today's ready-to-eat cereals are made from wheat, another third from corn, and the balance from other grains and mixed grains. Fastest growing type ready-to-eat cereals have been made from oats and rice, included in the third category.

In the past decade, uses of grains for cereals have about doubled. Sugar-coated or otherwise flavored breakfast foods also are growing more popular.

Cereal prices have increased, too. This is especially true of the highly processed varieties.

cost of the proposed hospital to remodel the facility to meet the new standards. "The majority opinion of the board is that we save the additional 10 percent of the initial cost times over by construction of a new hospital, we signed that future maintenance expenses and salaries can be lowered. Once it was decided to build rather than remodel the board made many to newly constructed hospitals.

"This was a great step in designing the local building for the maximum of efficiency.

As designed, the new hospital will have 28,000 square feet of floor space, ground level construction and modernly equipped throughout. We will be to use some of the equipment from the old hospital, as the X-ray machine, laboratory equipment, other miscellaneous equipment," the board chairman said.

The new hospital will be a 42-bed capacity and be so designed that an additional 12 to 15 beds can be added with relative construction expense. Service areas and facilities have been designed with capacity sufficient to handle the additional patient should future hospital expansion be required.

In addition to the 33,000 square feet of ground floor space, there will be an additional 5,000 square feet of basement area. The latter will be used primarily as storage space for the hospital but is so designed to meet Civil Defense specifications for shelters. The emergency shelter will be available to the community as a public shelter if a need should arise.
