Track Team Takes Dist.

Although team events in the district 2-B track meet went exactly as expected yesterday, with Wheeler winning overwhelmingly, there were a number of startling upsets in individual events.

Probably the fastest Class B 100-yard dash finish in the area was recorded as Henry Lewis of Wheeler ran a tremendous 10.1, matching the fastest Class B time posted this year, edging Big Ray Corcoran of Mobeetie, who ran a 10.2 and Wheeler's freshman flash, Little Bobby Vanpool, who was clocked in at 10.25. Lewis' time ties the district record established by Shayne Slovacek of Booker last year.

Wheeler almost doubled second-place Miami's point total, with 174 tallies to the Warriors' 94. The other

Attendants at Highland General Hospital said neither person was injured seriously with Mrs. Barnard being kept for observation. Riley was treated and released.

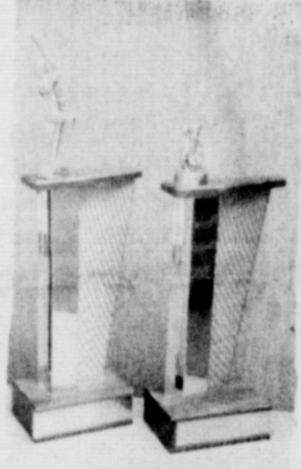
Patrolman Paul Little of Pampa said the accident was still being investigated to determine the cause.

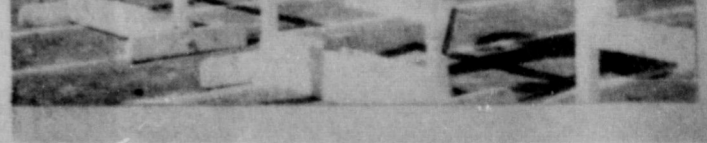
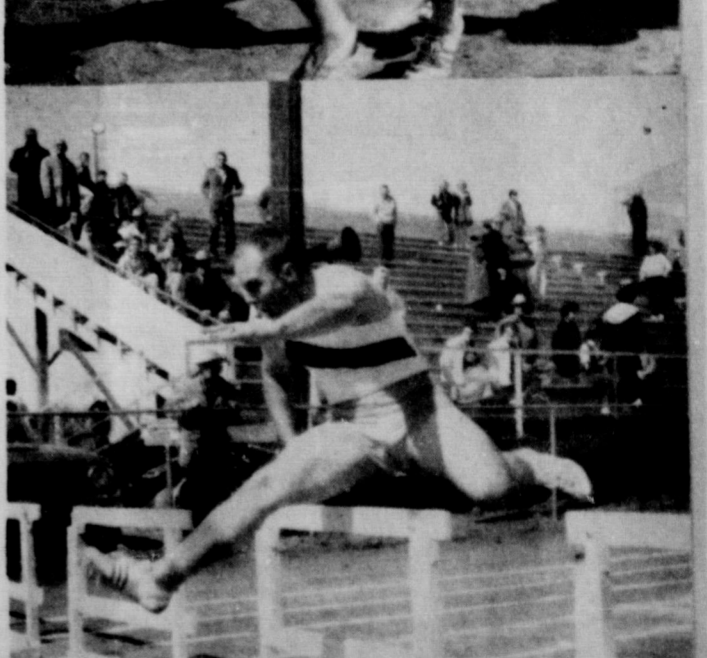

BOND ELECTION

A \$355,000 bond election for the purpose of building a new Hospital has been called by the board of directors of South Wheeler County Hospital District.

The election will be held Tuesday, May 5.

The proposed hospital would be built under the Hill-Burton program, which would be an outright grant of one-half of all costs of building, equipping and furnishing a new plant. Hill-Burton does not participate in the purchase of a site.

The election was called Tuesday night at a special meeting of the directors.

The board proposed a tax rate of 45¢, which would be based on present county valuation. The directors stressed that the rate would have to be based on county valuation, which is governed by the Commissioners' Court and not by the hospital directors.

They pointed out that the county tax rate is approximately 13 percent of the actual value.

Site for the proposed hospital has not been selected but will be in the near future, the board said.

The board recently recommended constructing a new hospital after a thorough study of a detailed survey indicated that the cost of remodeling and enlarging the present structure to the extent of meeting minimum

standards set by the Texas Hospital Licensing Board would amount to approximately 90 percent of a new building.
