Peach and Prune Insect Control

By Charles David Jackson

A good set of peaches and plums from the trees which are beginning to bloom isn't assured. Insects can damage the fruit or even "wipe-out" the crop if they are not controlled.

Insect control on fruit trees is largely a preventive pro-Mobil Oil Co Inc 12--65 603.25 gram. Most of the common fruit damaging insects begin their activity and reproduction durthe trees begin to bloom. the container label. Four spray applications are recommended and they should be timed to coincide with the bloom and fruit formation. The first orpetal fall spray should be applied when about three-fourths of the blossom petals have shed. The second or shuck split 10 days after most of the blossom petals have shed. The third or first cover spray

in 10 to 14 days and fourth or second cover spray should follow the third application in 14 to 21 days. If later infestations begin
